We have made the following ex-tracts to give the tenor of the Board of Trade Report presented at the meeting of the Board yesterday. The Council of the Board of Trade has been also most unjustly accused of meeting to fix the price of fish with the idea of preventing competition and restraining trade. But beyond the ever-present wish to see our produce marketed in the best way at the highest price, the price of our staple has never been discussed, much less regulated by the Council

One of the first matters enterprised by the Board was the inspection of fish, and other products for export. It is impossible to overestimate the importance of this work. It was looked at somewhat askance at first, but more and more it is coming into use, for the protection equally of the foreign buyer and the local shipper, and of more importance perhaps than either is the necessity which arises for care in the curing of our staple products in order that the standards may be maintained.

#### Common Carriers.

It is unfortunately the case this year that exporters have not been able to operate with profit, and it is evident to those that are most closely in touch with the export trade that the prices paid during the latter part of last year were in excess of those warranted by the conditions of the foreign markets. Not only has the European warcloud had a depressing effect and made money exceedingly difficult to obtain at reasonable rates, thus restricting the operations of those who purchase cargoes of fish, It is unfortunately the case this thus restricting the operations of those who purchase cargoes of fish, but there has been during the past year another very heavy advance in freights, and the premiums charged for insurance have increased from 25 per cent to 50 per cent. In all shipments in which cooperage has been used, the net price obtainable for fish has been decreased by the very high prices demanded by the mills making material for casks and drums, and by those who have engaged in the indus-

material for casks and drums, and by those who have engaged in the industry of making hoops, so that although the same prices may have been obtainable in the foreign markets as were received last year, yet the net result to the exporter has been from these various causes fully 30 cents and 45 cents per qul. less.

In the opinion of the Council it is impossible to expect in view of the financial and labor conditions of the countries to which we export our fish that a greater gross price will be paid in future than was paid last year, or the year before. It has often been pointed out by the Board of Trade that fish of prime quality will sell, even on a bad market, when fish of an inferior quality must be held in store unsalable resulting in a great loss to the shipper, therefore the Board of Trade takes this opportunity of again urging on all those

#### **Great Father's Sons.**

The other day in the Federal Court n New Yory City there were found guilty and sentenced to terms of imprisonment for swindling, the sons of two of America's distinguished citizens. One was Julian Hawthorne, son of Nathaniel Hawthorne, America's great novelist; the other was Dr. William J. Morton, son of William Thomas Green Morton, dentist and physician, the discoverer of the use of ether as an anaesthetic. It might be mentioned in passing that the chief of this gang of swindlers, Albert Freeman by name, received a five year sentence at the same time. He is mentioned here by reason of the fact that he is well known in Canada, and was the promotor of one of the producing Porcupine mines, though it was not in connection with this property that the present charge was laid and the verdict brought in. The case is not only noteworthy in view of the distinguished ancestry of two of the convicted men, but goes down in the records as being as cold blooded an attempt to swindle the public by the use of lying literature as was ever perpetrated in the mining game in Canada and the United States (the "mine" being in Canada the operating office in New York). Freeman was unquestionably the brains behind the enterprise, and the court showed nice discrimination when he was given a longer term than were the rest. However, not a great deal of sympathy will be lost upon any of them. They richly deserved the treatment accorded them by the U. S. Federal Court.

#### Blackmail by a Music Journal.

It is to be hoped that the heavy fine and sentence of imprisonment imposed on one of the staff of a certain New York musical journal will have a salutary effect in cleaning up what has been for years one of the standing disgraces of the publishing business in the United States. The manner in which musical publications prey upon artists, singers, and piano manufacturers has been notorious among those on the inside of musical affairs for years past. In the case in question, the agent of the trade section of the best known of American musical journals told a piano firm that it must "come across" to the une of \$50,000 in advertising or the publication would "put him out of business." The methods in this case were so coarse that it was not diffimembers of the staff escaped conviction on technicalities and the propri-etor of the journal is under cover in Paris. A wealthy piano firm has the means wherewith to fight black-mailing methods of this kind. DEADWOOD, South Dakota,

A forest fire raging in Custer Couny is said to be the worst in the hisory of the Black Hills. The fire is twenty miles long and a mile wide. Troops of cavalry from Fort Meade have gone to the scene of the fire fighting. The town of Buffalo Cap is said to be in danger.

WASHINGTON, April 17. Surgeon General Blue is reported to ave asked Dr. Friedmann for further samples of his serum, so that more careful analysis could be made. The loctor is said to have declined, sayng that he had already supplied Surgeon Anderson, Director of the Hygenic Laboratory, and could spare no more. Surgeon Blue declares the amount furnished to have been a

RADVILLE, April 17. Prairie fires, which raged through the hills, have cut off Radville, burning a strip of from 15 to 20 miles wide and destroying thousands of acres of pasturage. As a result feed will be scarce. The fire burned fiercely, and nany stables and granaries, filled with grain, have been wiped out. Other districts report men fighting the flams for two days and nights. Sveral farms have been burned out.

BERLIN, April 17. An unpleasant incident at Nancy continues to occupy the columns of the newspapers. Foreign Secretary von Jagow made another statement in the Reichstag, which amounted to little more than that the French Government were making an inquiry, and had not yet completed it; that the Germans concerned had made depositions before the proper authorities, and that their sworn statements had been forwarded to Paris. It is clear from to-day's reports that feeling runs very high, and Baron von Schon is reported to have said that the Nancy incident dangerously resembles a spark in an already explosive atmosphere. According to reports from witnesses, German ladies at Nancy were insulted in an indescribable manner. The men of the party were pelaboured with sticks until they consented to make oriental obeisance to the students, and to allow dry bread and black sausage to be stuffed down their throats. Members of the German party, personally describing the affair, say that the ladies as well as the gentlemen, were kicked, struck and spat upon, while railway officials, policemen, officers and soldiers looked on laughing. The Germans were insulted and mishandled in the lowest nanner by the station soldiers, who were finally ordered to protect them, while those in the railway carriages joined in the excesses of the crowd, who forced their way with the soldiers into the carriages, for over half an hour.
