unconscious. Citizens attracted by the shot armed themselves and hurrid to the bank as the robbers were leaving. The citizens opened fire on the fleeing men, who engaged in a running battle with their pursuers, until they found shelter in the timber on the



## America and Mrs. Pankhurst.



In lieu of open warfare we have had the destruction of precious works of art, the attempted abduction of a British minister, interference with the mail of innocent persons, and, most cowardly of all modes of attack, the throwing of acid.
