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

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

The sympathies of King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, for Germany and Austria, he said, always have been known. The Government were aware, as early as April, that regotiations were in progress between Bulgaria and Turkey, under German influence. As to why no military assistance for Serbia had been available at the time of the opening of the campaign, Sir Edward declared he was neither willing nor competent to state. Secretary Grey made it clear that the movements of troops at Salonika, and from that point, were dependent upon the consent of Greece. Serbia was notified on Sept. 24th of the despatch of British troops to her assistance. GREEK ARMY REVIEWED. NEW YORK, Nov. 9,

A news agency despatch from Salonika from London, under date Nov. 8, noon, published here to-day, says: Prince George of Greece gave the Allies an object lesson to-day that his country has an army not to be despised. Thirty thousand perfectly equipped men, artillery, infantry and cavalry passed in review before the Prince at the water front here. #### NEW ADMIRALTY RULING.

LONDON, Nov. 9. The Government has decided to recind the order under which British ships, carrying wheat to ports in the United Kingdom were to be exempt from requisition by the Admiralty, another voyage, not necessarily in the North, Atlantic, after discharging their cargoes. 

## Accident On Railway.

While an outbound special freight train made up of an engine and ten cars including one passenger car, was nearing Mount Pearl this morning, the last six cars of the train broke from the couplings and in running backwards two of the cars left the track and went over the embankment near Bowring Park, the remaining four being brought to a standstill about half a mile east of Waterford Bridge. Fortunately no person was injured. The special train left here at 7.30 this morning in charge of Brakesman O'Rielly, acting conductor, and driver Jeans. The accident occurred at about 8 a.m. The con ductor was on one of the six cars that broke loose and was fortunate to escape without injuhy. The two cars that ran off rolled completely over the embankment and were smashed to pieces. The pasenger car which was attached to the train was only a caboose used by the train hands to cook their meals on the way across country. 


