



A war office communication received this evening reads: We improved our position during the day north of ueudecourt, on the Somme, where we captured a portion of hostile trench, over thirty prisoners and a trench mortar. We also gained some ground south of Petit Minaumont. south of the Ancre, where we occupied an enemy post. A successful raid was carried out yesterday evening by our troops southeast of Souchez. A number of the enemy were killed, and dugouts destroyed. At dawn this morning hostile raids were repulsed south of Armentieres and in the neighborhood of Ploegstaert wood. A small number of the enemy who succeeded in reaching our trenches were killed or taken prisoners. The enemy's artillery was more active than usual in the neighborhood of the Somme, south of Arras. We carried out an effective bombardment of the enemy's trenches south of Ypres.

> THE TONNAGE SHORTAGE. LONDON, Feb. 23.

Premier Lloyd George said in his speech in the House of Commons tolay, that the success of the Allies depended on the ability to solve the tonnage shortage which was now affecting the ordinary needs of the nation and the military exigencies. The situation, he declared, called for the gravest measures. The Premier said there was no sure way to victory without hunting submarines from the leep. Enormous sacrifices were necessary from the British public, said the Premier. He stated that the Government proposed to dispense with all
