Once more the time has arrived when the Catholic people of this city are called upon to respond to the request published from the altars o the churches that they would make the annual collection for improving and beautifying the cemeteries a re cord one. Every effort should be made to make them the beauty spot of the city. Hundreds of our most eminent people sleep therein, and nearly every Catholic family is represented amongst those who slumber under the grassy mounds. Much has to be done by the energetic commit tees and caretakers previous to the celebration of the annual Requien Mass which take place in the beautiful and historic little Chapel at Belvidere and Mount Carmel in due course. The graves have to be trimmed, railings and fences put in or der, walks repaired, etc., and all this necessary work which entails considerable expense will be a sufficient inspiration that a ready and hearty response will be given on Sunday ai all the Masses in all the churches which will be sufficient to enable the committees to leave nothing undone towards the improvement and beautification of these venerated and sacred

We do not consider it necessary to dwell at any length upon this important matter, because the generous responses of the Catholic people upor all occasions has been proverbial Amongst the first places visited by the visitors to our shores are our cemeteries-those cities of the dead-and the condition in which they are kept is, to a great extent, an indication as to the character, thoughtfulness and Christian feeling of the people. The committees are untiring in their efforts, giving their time and attention freely and willingly, and the caretakers are courteous and capable, but all their efforts to carry out the good work will be unavailing unless they are assisted by the Catholic pcople who, as we said before, will make the annual collection of 1918 a record one, and place in the hands of those appointed to look after our cemeteries the necessary funds to make our "Cities of the Dead" equal in beauty to any in the British Provinces.
