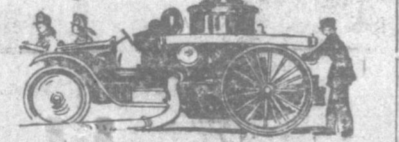

Heirs Numerous

VANCOUVER, B.C.—(Canadian Press)—Captain Wilfrid Kane, 56 Vancouver, never dreamed there were so many Kanes in Canada and the United States until stories more or less correct began to obtain publication regarding an estate will come up for distribution in 1928. He is now receiving letters from many states of the Union, but as far as he is concerned he has a clear record of the people who have a direct interest in the estate in question.

John Kane owned 1200 acres of land at the old village of Limerick, Ireland. Unable to sell it, he leased it ninety-five years ago for ninety-nine years, and this lease expires in 1928. John Kane and his wife and only child to Canada, settling in New Brunswick, where he died. The son, Thomas, who was two years old when the family left Ireland, subsequently settled in Paris, Ontario, and had eight children. They are Captain Wilfrid Kane, Vancouver; Joseph Kane, Sugar Pine, Calif.; Mrs. J. W. Moss, Bellingham, Wash.; Mrs. Maude Briggs, Seattle, Wash.; Charles Kane,

Raymond, Wash.; D. J. Kane, mayor of Kaslo; Mrs. J. D. Keenan, South Vancouver; and Mrs. W. B. Livingston, St. Petersburg, Fla. Capt. Wilfrid Kane, who served in Mesopotamia with the inland water transport (Royal Engineers), visited Limerick in 1916 when on leave. He found that many big business buildings had been erected on the Kane land. The Great Western Railway uses sixty-five acres for its terminals. The 1200 acres were then assessed at one billion dollars. In 1928, when the lease falls in, Capt. Kane and his brothers and sisters expect to share

in the fortune. He says the records are all clear and the leases have paid all the taxes. Their claim is substantiated with birth certificates and other necessary documents.

Astors' Gift to Plymouth

Plymouth, April 16 (A.P.)—Lord Astor is supplementing Lady Astor's donation of \$50,000 to form a housing trust for Plymouth, by an additional \$50,000. The situation now is that Lord and Lady Astor are prepared to found a trust with a joint gift of \$100,000 which will be used to purchase the site, build and institute and erect suitable dwelling houses.

It is not too much to state that almost every single clause of the disarmament conditions in the Peace Treaty is to-day being more or less impudently infringed. It is now proved from the admission of leading Germans themselves that France has every reason for anxiety.

London, April 15 (A.P.)—London Bridge is a hundred years old, still going strong. The first stone was driven March 15, 1824. The old London Bridge, which it replaced was built in the twelfth century and served over the Thames until 1822.

Russia Considers Rumania's Attitude Threatening

WORKS ISSUE ORDERS FOR REMOVAL OF RELIGIOUS SYMBOLS FROM MISSIONARY SCHOOLS—Labour Govt. Endorses Resolutions of Imperial Economic Conference.

ENDORSES ECONOMIC CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS.

LONDON, April 24. The Government has issued a white paper specifying its position with respect to the various resolutions passed at the Imperial Economic Conference in London last autumn. The white paper shows that the Government endorses most of the resolutions, and intends to give effect to them by administrative measures, and the introduction of legislation. On the question of tariff preference, the Government is reserving any expression of views, pending the coming budget discussion in Parliament.

WIL SPIRITS OF GERMANY.

BERLIN, April 24. Adolf Havenstein, late President of Reichsbank, Hugo Stinnes, industrialist, and Dr. Karl Helfferich, Minister of the Treasury, all of whom have died within the past few months, are designated as the three evil spirits of Germany, by Kurt Geyer, Communist member of the Reichstag, in a scorching volume which made its appearance on the very day Dr. Helfferich lost his life in a Swiss train wreck at Bellinzona.

IMPERIAL TRADE COMMISSIONER

MONTREAL, April 24. R. W. Dalton, retiring Imperial Trade Commissioner in Canada and Newfoundland left last night for Vancouver en route to Melbourne N.S.W. where he will take over special duties as representing the Home Office in Australia. F. W. Field of Toronto office who will succeed here as Commissioner will leave to-night for a six months vacation in England. L. B. Beale, Trade Commissioner for the Western Province will be acting

Trade Commissioner for Canada and Newfoundland with main office in Vancouver during Mr. Field's absence.

THE TURKISH PERSECUTION.
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 24. American Missionary Schools in Turkey have agreed to remove from the classrooms all scriptural pictures, bibles, crosses and other religious symbols in accordance with recent orders issued by the Minister of Public Instruction, Yassif Bey. Forty French Roman Catholic Schools remain closed refusing to remove the Crucifix.

NO DIVIDEND FOR TWO YEARS.

TORONTO, April 24. G. T. Clarkson, Liquidator of the Home Bank of Canada, stated in an interview to-day that the next dividend to depositors in the defunct institution would not be paid for two years. The first and only dividend of 25 per cent. was distributed shortly before Christmas.

RUSSIAN WARNING AGAINST RUMANIA.

MOSCOW, April 24. Rumania's reported action in purchasing four hundred airplanes and other equipment from France has prompted an appeal by the Assistant War Commissioner to the Russian workers directing that they prepare themselves for any possible attack on the Soviet Republic, addressing a Conference of non-party workmen of the Moscow district, he said, the red army must be strong not only in spirit but in technical equipment so as to repel invasion from any source.

FINLANDERS EXECUTED BY SOVIET.

LENINGRAD, April 24. Six Finlanders were condemned by a Soviet War Tribunal here yesterday to death by shooting, for alleged espionage. Six others were sentenced to imprisonment up to nine years. The prisoners were charged with plotting against the Russian State in company with Polish spies.

SMUTS' PROGRAMME.

PRETORIA, April 24. Premier Smuts' last night announced his program for the general election which will be held the middle of June. He declared that the Labor-Nationalist pact against the Government must be taken seriously. He said the Government had achieved its greatest object in the destruction of racialism, a second achievement was the defeat of secession which was the fundamental plank in the Nationalist platform, the third great object had been and still was, to steer the country through the troublous times ahead with safety and credit unimpaired.

FAILED TO HEAR THE KING.

LONDON, April 24. The effort to have the voice of King George heard around the world, as he delivered his speech in the opening of Wembley Exhibition, yesterday, failed of success, according to a report from radio enthusiasts

throughout the Empire. Some ten million of the King's subjects in the British Isles heard his voice, but the Royal voice did not carry beyond the British Isles.

Digby Arrives

S.S. Digby, Capt. W. A. Westgarth, D.S.C., R.N.R., in command, arrived from Liverpool at 2 p.m. yesterday after a good passage across. The ship left Liverpool on Thursday last and experienced fine weather until near the coast, when thick fog was run into. 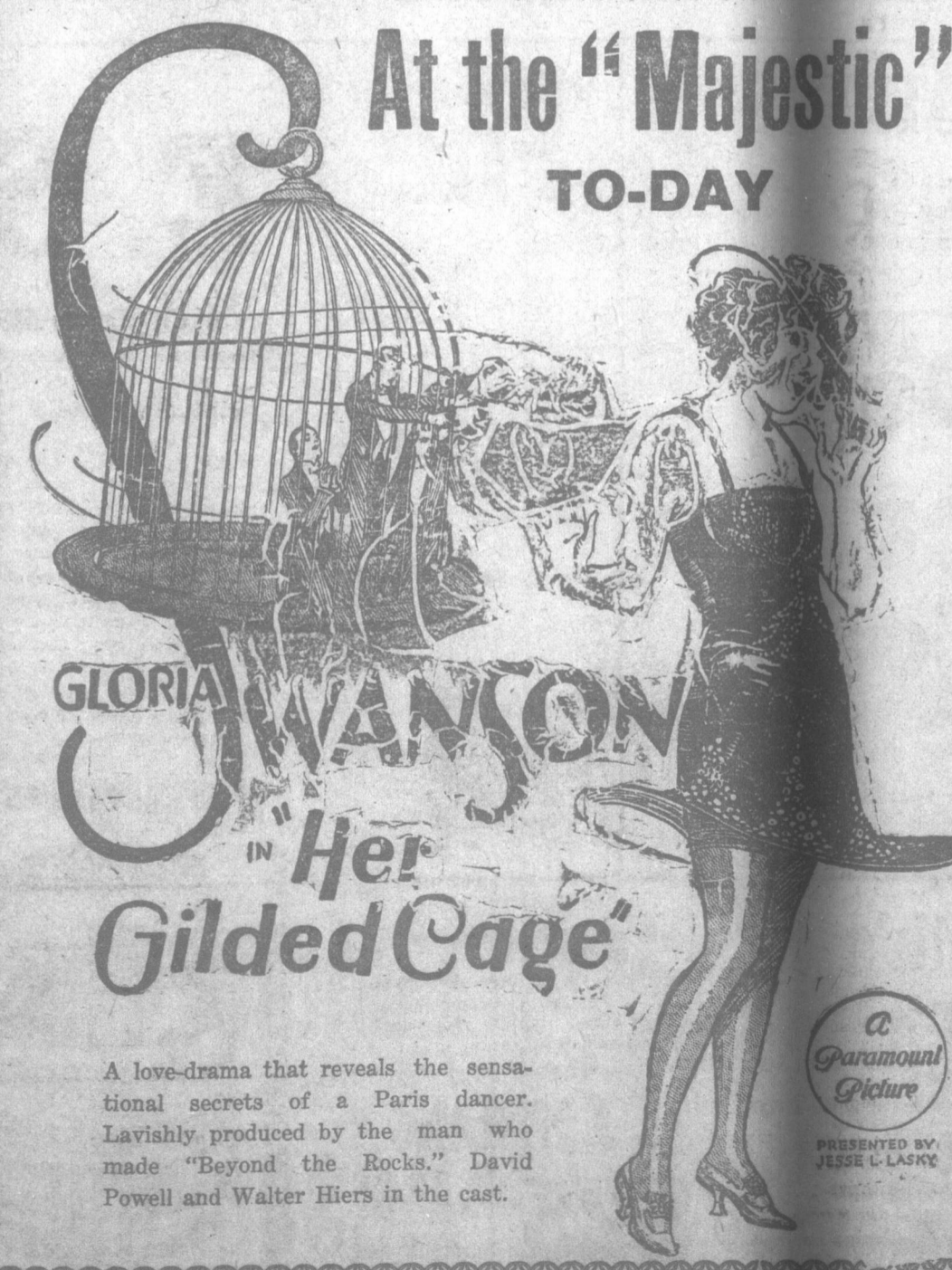

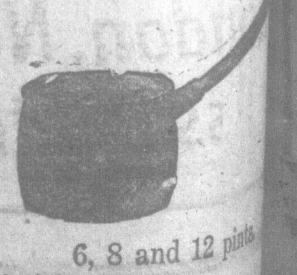

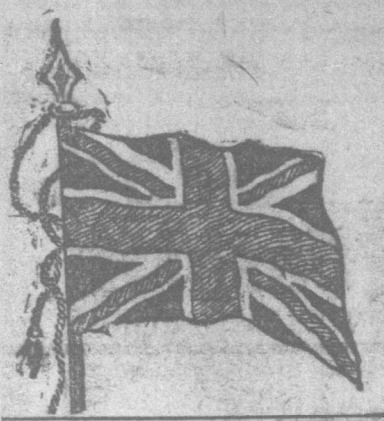

The Overthrow of the Government.

In other parts of the world disturbances which shake countries to their very foundations occur at certain intervals, but here in Newfoundland we are fortunately unfamiliar with volcanic eruptions or the devastating effect of earthquakes.

Yesterday the country experienced another of these periodic shocks as a result of which an administration formed just nine months ago rocked on its base for a few minutes and collapsed like a house built of cards.

It may break the humdrum of everyday life to be subject now and then to thrills of this description. It may be exhilarating to live by the mouth of an intermittent volcano, but it will hardly be claimed that it tends to encourage stability in industry or confidence on the part of those who would invest their capital in the natural resources of the country.

The downfall of the Warren Government has come at a moment when the country required above all else a period of rest and quiet to recover from the effects of the sickness and distress by which it has been stricken during the past five years. It was anticipated that there would be at least a brief respite from disturbances, and that with the promising outlook both with regard to the fisheries and the other industries, we might make a determined effort by loyal co-operation and the sinking of political differences to place the ship on an even keel again and resume the voyage.

A great responsibility rests upon those who have decided that it was necessary in the interests of the country to precipitate this crisis. Undoubtedly the action was not taken on the spur of the moment, but was the result of careful thought and consideration of the consequences. It is somewhat disturbing, however, to be unable to learn what definite course of action is intended now that the overthrow has been effected. We have of necessity to wait and see, a policy which does not commend itself at a time when action is essential.

The position in which the Prime Minister found himself yesterday was due to defection of certain members from the ranks of the Government to the side of their former leader, Sir Richard Squires, and in supporting the vote of want of confidence moved by one of those who had deserted the party, the Opposition found themselves in the anomalous position of supporting that leader who, by their action in co-operation with the Government last summer, had been forced to resign. Certainly the situation is a complex one and

the outcome difficult to foretell.

That there is general sympathy for the Hon. W. R. Warren is undoubted, as it is felt that under most trying circumstances and in the face of great difficulties he conducted affairs in a manner which was fearless and above reproach.

Yesterday's Proceedings in the House of Assembly

Warren Administration Defeated on Want of Confidence Vote.

By a vote of want of confidence from the Speech from the Throne—"I now commend your deliberations to the Guidance of Almighty God and trust they will promote the best interests of Newfoundland and its people."

Mr. W. J. Higgins, Leader of the Opposition Party in the House, on behalf of his colleagues extended the "customary but in less sincere" congratulations to the previous speakers on their speeches. They had led up to what was expected of members of the Government. Their weakness, however, was that common to all mortals all were going to die but themselves.

Referring to the omission by both mover and seconder of any reference to the enquiry and the letters referred to in the last paragraph, Mr. Higgins expressed the opinion that the administration was sick and quoted what the devil was sick the devil a monk would be. For himself and colleagues the leader of the Opposition said they were in accord with having further enquiries and he hoped that they would be broad thorough and comprehensive, as they should be, in the light of recent revelations which showed the absolute abandonment of attention to office which it is the duty of Government. He hoped that when all was done some reforms in the public service would be effected. The fact that there had been waste corruption and shirking of responsibility by the powers that be could not be wiped out, and it was unfair to expect the people to make sacrifices if they are not sure that the taxes are going to be properly spent.

Mr. Higgins endorsed the Government's attitude in reference to new industries. Revelations had been made regarding employment and it had been shown that in the Humber Development only the most menial positions were given to Newfoundland. While it was true that the Prime Minister had made an attempt at settling the strike, there was no evidence that any previous protest had been made by the Government. From a labor standpoint, the Humber has not come up to expectations. Labor foremen and gang foremen were being imported to superintend the work, in spite of the fact that we have competent men aplenty. Ours are the most adaptable kind of men, said the speaker, as he referred to their various big undertakings such as the building of the Coffey Dam at Grand Lake, the Trinity Bay railway "loop" etc. He hoped that when the gender and similar enterprises would be considered that no opening would be left for a repetition of the conditions which prevail under the Humber Contract.

Referring to that part of the speech dealing with the fishery and the remission of taxes on supplies, Mr. Higgins expressed the hope that an attempt would not be made to make up the loss by further taxes on clothing. In the foreshadowed reduction of the estimates he hoped the Government was not pandering to the cheap idea of cutting salaries in the civil service. If reductions are arrived at, better cut out the office than compel servants to live on starvation wages. The railway was pointed out as the service in which the greatest care was required in handling. It has grown to immense proportions and its hungry man was able to eat up large sums if the greatest care was not exercised. In this connection, Mr. Higgins instanced where on the one item of coal alone \$70,000 was saved through competition. Last year competition for supplying was not keen and this amount which could have been saved was lost. Reference was made to the four mill and the forthcoming visit of Earl Haig. Mr. Higgins questioned the legal right of certain members of the executive to their seats in the House. Since last session there had been three bye-elections and three members had been confirmed in the positions. Four of the present ministers, viz., Warren, Hallyard, Cave and Barnes should have gone back for re-election since the administration was formed last July over six months have elapsed and they therefore were sitting illegally under a penalty of heavy fine.

Mr. R. Cramm following, congratulated the mover and seconder on their excellent efforts under the surrounding circumstances. He was forced to come to the House with an entirely different attitude than he had last year, and he did not view with confidence the activities of the present administration and therefore proposed an amendment to the motion before the chair. The speaker ruled that that question should be put first. Mr. Cramm continuing said that since last July many things had come to light. An enquiry had been held in the Controller's Department and in his opinion he was satisfied that one million dollars had gone astray there. It was not, he said, due to any one man and the responsibility was of the door of the executive. After the resignation of Sir Richard Squires, the country was promised by Attorney

Warren. Matters of giving employment remuneration against the local man method, and men were being sent to fill jobs which our men competent to take. Offices were filled with bookkeepers and stenographers from outside, whilst our men received the lowest form of payment, referring to the contract of the laboring man, Mr. Higgins said some of the shacks were like a dog in, and he would like his in some that he saw. He also decried the sub-contracting business, terming it a menace to the development of the industry.

The speaker urged that we should do all in our power to make Earl Haig worthy of the title of Earl Haig worthy of the title of Earl Haig.

Mr. R. Scammell seconding the motion laid stress on the necessity of every encouragement for the development of the fishery. He pointed out the necessity of finding a means to inject new life in the industry, which has now fallen into a deplorable condition. The cause he ascertained to the high cost of fishing, and he hoped that the reduction in duty which had been proposed on oils and provisions would be taken as an indication that the Government was serious in its attempt to solve the problem. In his opinion the knowledge of the price which likely obtain for fish would give encouragement to many who now are discouraged by the industry by reason of the uncertainty of the outcome, and the Government and merchants should get together and explore this matter, and give some guarantee that the fisherman may expect to catch.

Coming on from the encouraging voyage, the speaker referred to the Imperial Conference, and expressed his belief that in time tangible would materialize. On the subject of reduction in the Civil Service, the speaker believed that there in this direction would be a saving to the whole country.

On Railway matters the speaker was now in the happy position that the loss on operating which was about one and a half million dollars, had been so reduced that the end of the present year it will not amount to more than a few hundred thousand dollars. In giving encouragement to the establishment of the Flour Mills in the world serious consideration the following paragraph

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Yesterday's Proceedings in the House of Assembly

(Continued from page 7.)

General Warren a thorough and impartial enquiry into this matter, (quotes Harsard.) He questioned if what had been promised was fulfilled. A partial enquiry costing \$50,000 had been held. Nine months have elapsed since the promise was made and nothing more is known. There was a partial enquiry and not an impartial one. The Prime Minister had used his office as Attorney General to get his late leader. His activities were simply that of compounding felonies. Yet they who stand with him were asked to place confidence in him. The speaker ruled that the remarks were entirely out of order and Mr. Cramm said that he would reserve further observations till later in the sitting.

The Prime Minister replying, stated that it was with mixed feelings he addressed the House. Within the past 20 minutes he had been told he illegally held his seat and was under a penalty of \$250 per day whilst sitting. Mr. Cramm had said he was guilty of all sorts of criminal actions, but he never whom to appeal for a verdict. At about 1:30 p.m. he was informed that he could not count on the support of more than sixteen members of his party. If that was so it looked as if his seat would soon be occupied by some person other than himself. Two courses were open to him in case of defeat on the floor of the House. He would go to the Governor and advise a dissolution and appeal to the country. If that advice was not accepted he would resign and hand the burden over to some better man. He then referred to a visit to the country made by himself and Mr. S. Foot, re the employment of foreign labor would land them trouble. Matters were assuming a more hopeful shape and 10 of 15 were sent back and their places given to local men. Taking up again the matter of the Government's position he admitted it was precarious. He had no apologies to make for anything he had done since taking office. He invited the inquiry to extend the whole of the Government's responsibility for what had taken place. He never wanted to "get" his leader. If the whole truth was known he was more of a colleague to a leader. He had asked for explanations from the then Prime Minister last year when the crisis came, but no explanations were forthcoming if there had been any. He was still investigating the payment of Controller and although he did not know where the millions spoken of was gone, had been determined to find out. He had investigated the matter and had to investigate it, and if on the Opposition side by demanding that it be done. It was not so easy to get clear of him as some people thought. Fortune Day would send him back to the House again as soon as the appeal was made. He did not know if the investigation would go on or not. Perhaps it was to get some people's part to get them out of the way and stop the

enquiry. Time would tell. Mr. Speaker put the question and Mr. Cramm read his motion as given above.

The amendment was seconded by Mr. Calpin.

Mr. Higgins, desiring to make the position of himself and colleagues clear on the matter of the motion said:

Mr. Higgins—Mr. Speaker—I do not think in justice to my associates on this side of the House that I can allow the amendment which has just been moved by the Honourable Member for Bay de Verde, Mr. Cramm, and seconded by the Honourable Member for Harbour Grace, Mr. Calpin to be put without making the position of the Opposition absolutely clear both to this House and to the country.

Ordinarily it would be regarded as the bounden duty of an Opposition to vote want of confidence in the Administration of the day, and usually a motion of this nature emanates from this side of the House. In this present instance I feel bound to explain why it is that we propose to support the motion which has just been made. In my earlier remarks of this afternoon I intimated that the disclosures made at the recent enquiry showed that the conduct of the different departments of the public service, which was conducted by a Government of which practically all the present members of the Executive formed part, was an unparalleled example of gross inattention to the duties of their offices and a revelation of incompetency and misconduct. I intimated that, in our opinion, as a result of these revelations the Administration as at present constituted had lost the confidence of the public, and that however much it might be regarded as inopportune or inconvenient the only way to clear the atmosphere would be by way of an appeal to the people at the polls, and now within the space of a few moments we find ourselves confronted with a proposition which only confirms that statement. From the ranks of the Government themselves has come defection, from the followers of the Government has come the declaration that not alone has our public opinion as regards the outside public had foundation in fact, but that even within the ranks of the supporters of the Administration itself there has been a falling off of confidence.

With the reason which prompted these gentlemen to take this position we of the Opposition are not concerned. I am faced with a situation to the effect that a motion is made which I cannot conscientiously oppose. If I vote against this amendment I am by inference giving my approval and that of my associates to the mal-administration which has made the name of the Colony in the world outside almost a by word. I cannot refuse to vote for the amend-



ment, but in doing so I wish to make the position of the Opposition clear beyond a shadow of a doubt.

We are not concerned directly or indirectly in any shape whatever with the internal troubles of the Government Party. If they have disagreed, the quarrel is of their own making. The mess into which affairs have been thrown is one that should be cleared up by themselves, and it is not part of our duty to clear out the filthy stables which have been so recently exposed to view. We are not here to use a popular expression, to accept the position of having the "buck passed to us," but should there be any misgivings in the minds of any persons, particularly in view of the utterances of the Prime Minister and the Honourable Member for Bay de Verde, I desire to say that our course is not dictated in the remotest degree by any desire to shield any person or to stifle, alter or interfere with any proceedings of any nature which have either been begun or are to be made of a criminal character or otherwise against any persons in connection with the administration of public affairs.

We are not seeking the defeat of the Government. The very absence from the House of my partner, the Honourable Member for St. John's West, who left St. John's only a couple of days ago, and that of my colleague for St. John's East, Mr. Fox, who is ever in Harbour Grace, should indicate clearly that we have not conspired or arranged for this extraordinary development. We are here with our ranks unbroken except for the absence of the two gentlemen mentioned, and standing four square to the principle which should guide any decent Opposition, to see to it that an opportunity is given to those who are mostly concerned, namely the voters at large, to register their approval or otherwise of the conduct of the present regime.

We do not think that this Government should continue to function for four years. We believe that the only solution in the present spirit of discontent among our people is by way of a general election, and if I might be permitted to say it, Mr. Speaker

no person is less desirous than I am of embarking upon a course which might entail responsibility which might be borne by others.

I am not concerned either stop, impair, or jeopardize the regular course of Justice.

The Clerk of the House then read the amendment and the House divided as follows:—

The amendment was declared carried by the Speaker.

On motion of the Prime Minister the House adjourned until Tuesday next.

The following questions were tabled:—

1. Mr. P. Cashin to ask the Minister of Finance and Customs to table at the next sitting all invoices for liquors purchased by the Controller's Department since its inauguration to date; also a copy of G. N. Wood Sen & Watson's report on said Department.

2. Mr. Sullivan—to ask the Colonial Secretary to lay on the Table of the House a statement of coal purchases by the Railway from the Dominion Coal Company of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company from January 1st, 1923 to April 24th, 1924, give price per ton c.i.f. St. John's or other ports.

3. Also to lay on the table of the House certified copy of invoice of coal purchases by the Newfoundland Government Railway from the Besco Company and discharged in St. John's, January or February, 1924.

4. To ask the Colonial Secretary if tenders were called for by the Newfoundland Government Railway for the 1924 coal supplies, and if not, why not?

5. To lay on the Table of the House a comparative statement showing the cost of operating the Railway monthly from June 1st, 1923 to March 31st, 1924. Also to furnish the House with the earnings of the Railway for the same period.

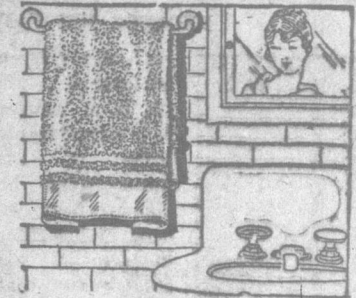

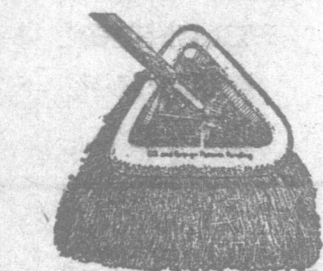

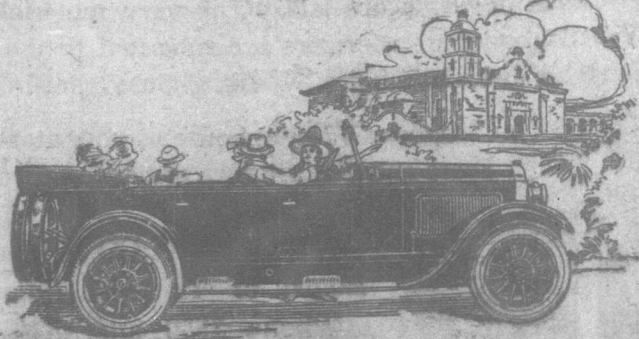

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Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present. After the usual preliminaries, the following business was transacted:
The Newfoundland Light & Power Company, in reply to the Council's communication re projecting stubs of poles in various parts of the city, stated that the poles referred to were not those of the Company. As regards painting of the Company's poles, they stated this would be attended to as soon as the weather conditions are suitable.

Attention was called to the fact that the Telephone Company in erecting new poles are in the habit of distributing the paving stones of drains and otherwise leaving the streets in an untidy condition. They are to be notified to see that this is discontinued.

James King applied to be reinstated in the position of Swimming Instructor at the Pool, Quidi Vidi, for the coming season. This application was ordered filed.

Mr. D. White, Pennywell Road, inquired as to whether or not the Council intends widening this thoroughfare during the present year. Engineer, is to report at next meeting.

J. H. Roberts wrote stating that during the past week a considerable lot of poultry had been destroyed by dogs which were unlicensed. He further stated that he would like the Council responsible for the loss sustained him. The Council acknowledges no liability.

PLANS.
That of P. Byrne, to erect garage, Alexander Street, was ordered to stand over until further particulars are obtained.

That of W. R. Sparkes to extend barn, Golf Avenue, was passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer.

Matters in connection with the repairing of fences, etc., Bannerman Park, were talked over, and deferred until next meeting.

Tenders were ordered to be called for the supplying of four new horses for the Sanitary Department.

The Medical Officer of Health reported nine new cases of Scarlet Fever, 1 Diphtheria in the city during the past week.

In connection with the Notice of Motion given by him at the last regular meeting, Councillor Outerbridge, tabled the following Resolutions with a view to amending the present Cab and Taxi Regulations:

1.—That the arrangements in connection with the Cab and Taxi Stands continue as arranged last year.

2.—That the arrangements in connection with the Cab Stands continue as arranged last year.

3.—That the Council remove the "War Tanks" now standing outside the Court House to Bannerman Park or other suitable locality and that the central taxi men be permitted to place their motor cars on the space now occupied by the war tank.

4.—That the West End cabsmen be permitted to stand on the North side of Water Street, from Queen Street to Adelaide Street, with the distinct understanding that a space of not less than eight feet be left clear, between the entrance to any store or dwelling and before the main entrance to the General Post Office and that the entrance to the space East of the General Post Office now occupied by the said cabsmen be also left clear.

5.—That the West End Taxi men be permitted to occupy the space to the East of the General Post Office now occupied by the West End Cabsmen.

The Resolutions were ordered to stand over until the next regular meeting, when a decision will be made with regard to same.

Matters in connection with the Cleaning of the City Streets, etc., were again talked over, and the suggestions made by the deputation of ladies, namely, Mesdames Johnson, Clouston and Piercey, who waited on the Council at last week's meeting, were tabled as follows:

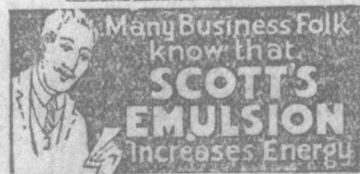
1.—Suggested that a Circular be issued, urging first the householders to burn all garbage possible rather than deposit same in the hoppers and garbage tins.

2.—The same Circular to embody a call on the boys and girls to help keep the city clean by refraining from throwing paper, peels, and such things on the streets, and urging them to protect the trees in public places.

3.—The advisability of obtaining the co-operation of the Fire Department as regards the flushing of drains and gutters at least once a week.

These suggestions were given the fullest consideration, and the Council will undertake to do all possible to carry out same with regard to the cleaning of streets, collection of garbage, etc.

Many routine matters were disposed of, and with the reading and adoption of the reports of City Engineer and Sanitary Supervisor and passing of weekly accounts, the meeting adjourned.

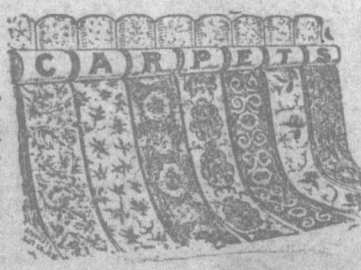

Quiescent in Pace

The second time within a fortnight she visited the Presentation Convent, Witless Bay, on Holy Day, the 11th inst. Sister Mary Walsh was called out of the convent in the evening of that day, to receive the body of her dear and devoted husband, who had passed away to God to receive the reward promised to those who are true to the end, dying as they live—a perfect Christian.

St. John's 84 years ago, and while quite young entered the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square. A short time after her reception she was transferred to the Convent at Witless Bay, where she made her Holy Profession on October 2, 1862. For 62 years she continued to live and labor at this Convent, devoting all her energies to the welfare of the children and leading them by word and example along the straight way that leads to everlasting bliss. Gentle and unassuming, unknown to the world, she continued her glorious work, and though no deeds which men call great have secured for her a permanent niche in the temple of fame, the Recording Angel took count of years

Bernard O'Donnell, her co-worker in religion for over sixty years—united in life, they were not separated in death.

The late Sister M. Gertrude leaves three sisters to mourn for her. They are Sister M. Francis, Presentation Convent, Renewa; Mrs. Williams, Witless Bay, and Mrs. Miller, residing in the United States, to whom and to her Community sympathy is extended. May she rest in peace. Amen.

Canadian Trade

Although somewhat more favorable weather and the approach of Easter have benefited Canadian business, the operations of buyers still tend toward conservatism, and there is little anticipation of future requirements, according to dispatches to Dun's Review from branch offices of R. G. Dun & Co. in the leading cities. Orders for practically all kinds of staple commodities in small amounts are numerous, however, which would seem to reflect a general scarcity of stocks in the hands of retailers, and it is believed that the advent of real Spring weather will be followed by an active demand for seasonable merchandise. Business in retail lines at Montreal has been helped by the approach of Easter, but in only a few wholesale departments is there any particular activity. At the same time, a steady run of small orders covering a wide range of commodities is being received and conditions are expected to improve materially with the appearance of real Spring weather. Collections are about fair.

There has been no change of moment in the business situation at Quebec, generally quiet conditions being still the rule. The outlook is generally considered favorable, however, and an active demand for seasonable merchandise is looked for with

the opening of Spring. Collections are slow to fairly prompt.

Slightly more favorable weather and the approach of Easter have stimulated demand for seasonable commodities at Toronto, but orders are being placed cautiously and, as a rule, are little in excess of current requirements. Sentiment, based on the encouraging industrial outlook and generally prosperous conditions in the farming sections remains distinctly optimistic, however.

While business conditions in the Far West and Northwest are much the same, sales of Spring merchandise display an improving tendency, and advices from the chief wholesale and distributing centers indicate a growing feeling of confidence regarding the future. Collections are slightly better.—Dun's Review.

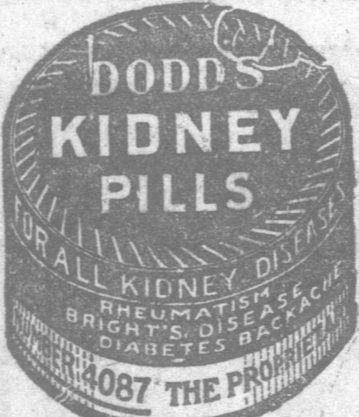

CHICAGO, April 14—The Northern Baptists of America, representing churches of that denomination in 27 states, will hold their annual national convention at Milwaukee, May 28 to June 3.

BECAUSE OF EARTHQUAKES.

MCKINLEY PARK, Alaska.—(A. P.)—Tradition has it that Mount McKinley, the loftiest peak on the American Continent, sinks about 2 feet a year from its official altitude of 20,300 feet.

Residents of the region are convinced that this happens. They point out that there is an average of four earthquake shocks a year, and contend that the mountain settles about six inches with each tremor.

According to recent reports from scientific sources, no one can state the location or altitude of many of the small islands in the Aleutian archipelago. 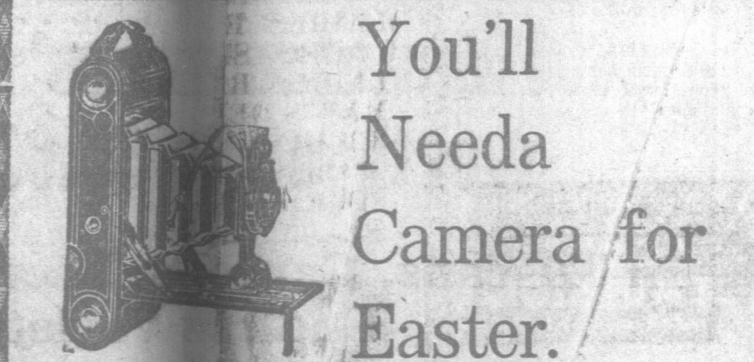




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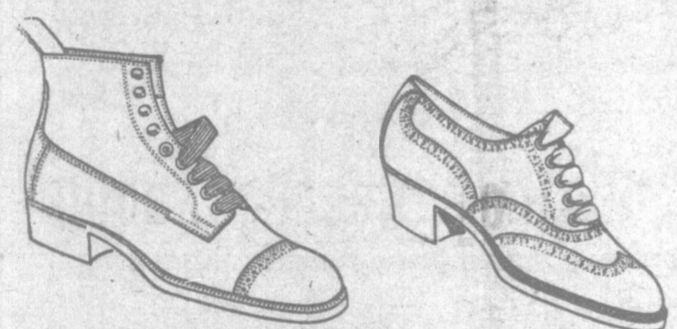
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
