Comet With Two Tails

It is reported from Germany that photographs taken of the comet Orisk show that it has now developed a second tail. This tail cannot be seen with a telescope. The primary tail also is, to all intents and purposes, merely a photographic object, only the vaguest indications of it being perceptible in a telescope.

A duplicity, or even a multiplicity, of tails is by no means an uncommon occurrence, although it is not often seen in objects so faint as the present comet.

The great comet of 1743, discovered by Klinkenberg, had six tails diverging like the ribs of a fan from its head. In some comets the tails are curved, in others they are straight, while often curved and straight tails exist together.

Blight Threatens Quebec Orchards

Fire-blight is threatening to destroy apple orchards in the Eastern Townships. Inspectors of the Department of Agriculture have been summoned by apple-growers to investigate and help check the ravages of a disease which at all events will seriously affect this year's production of apples and may kill the trees. It is causing trouble in St. Hilaire, Rougemont, Abbotford and Chateauguay. At St. Hilaire it has already rendered the crop of the grower a total loss and is spreading rapidly. The exact cause of the disease as yet baffles Government experts, R. E. Robinson stated.

It is not an insect or a parasite, but a constitutional disease similar to the brown rot which caused loss in British Columbia. The tree's first symptom is the turning of its top-most branches to a yellow or copper color a process which soon spreads to all the branches, causing the apples thereon to wither and the tree to die. At present the most effective treatment is to cut off the discolored limbs; but it has been found that the instruments used must be thoroughly disinfected each time a branch is cut, or they will infect the whole tree. While the disease is not a new one, never before has it caused any serious alarm by its prevalence. Government experts are working hard to find means to stamp it out, but growers are very concerned.

Father Maher's Jubilee

His Grace the Archbishop and sev-
eral priests were present in Ferryland
on Sunday last to fete the jubilee of
the reverend pastor, Very Rev. A. J.

cortege formed in the Convent grounds
and proceeded by throngs of children
in gala attire and by the Societies
of the Parish, advanced to the church.
There High Mass Coram Pontifice
was sung by the jubilarian. After
Mass some two hundred children were
confirmed by the Archbishop, who
having explained to them the signifi-
cance of the Sacrament, urged them
to be always true to high ideals and
to maintain, amidst the inevitable
disappointments of mature life, their
youthful enthusiasms. This religious
ceremony having been completed the
visitors and parishioners massed on
the piazza fronting the new school.
There three addresses with appropri-
ate gifts were presented to Father
Maher by the gentlemen, ladies and
children of Ferryland respectively.

This last was in verse—evidently some
little poetess with considerable metrical
faculties was retained to sing the
praises and magnificence of her Masons.
Father Maher having thanked the
donors for their kind words and gener-
ous offerings, His Grace addressed
the gathering. The Archbishop said
it gave him great pleasure to be as-
sociated with the pastor and people
of Ferryland on this joyous anniver-
sary. His knowledge of Father Maher
and their mutual friendship extended
far beyond twenty-five years; indeed
these remembrances stretched back to
their boyhood days in St. Bonaven-
ture's and their early seminary years
in All Hallows. Both as students
and priests they had always remained
in close touch with each other, and
the changing years had not dimini-
shed their esteem. As Archbishop he
was in a position to appreciate Father
Maher's zeal and success in his work.
For eighteen years he had laboured in
the most difficult missions of the
diocese, and the ideals he had incul-
cated in those parishes were deeply
stamped on them to-day. In Ferry-
land, as the most casual visitor could
note, Father Maher within a few
years had accomplished wonders. To
speak of nothing more than the build-
ing before them—this school with its
large dependencies and abutments,
those solid masses of masonry that
faced the wild Atlantic so defiantly,
all of that vast construction was a
noteworthy achievement and one de-
serving of the highest praise. His
Grace's eulogy was listened to with
profound attention and evoked at its
close loud cheers.

In the afternoon the archiepiscopal
party motored to Cape Broyle, where
confirmation was given to one hundred
and eighty children. The Archbishop
again stressed for his young hearers
the lessons the ceremony contained,
and expressed the hope that Pastor
and people might long work together
in fruitful accord for the material and
spiritual upbuilding of their historic
parish.

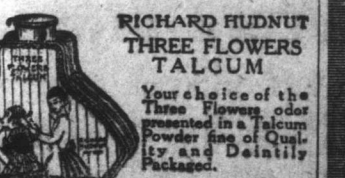

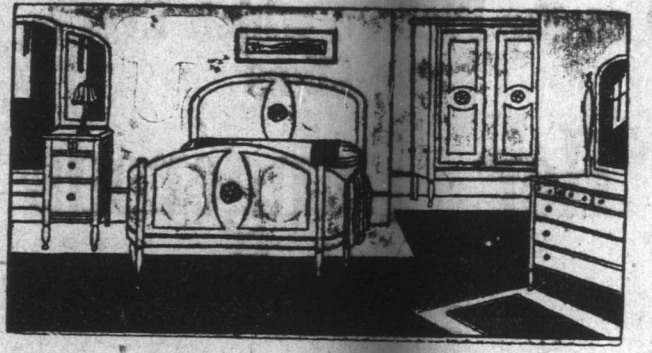

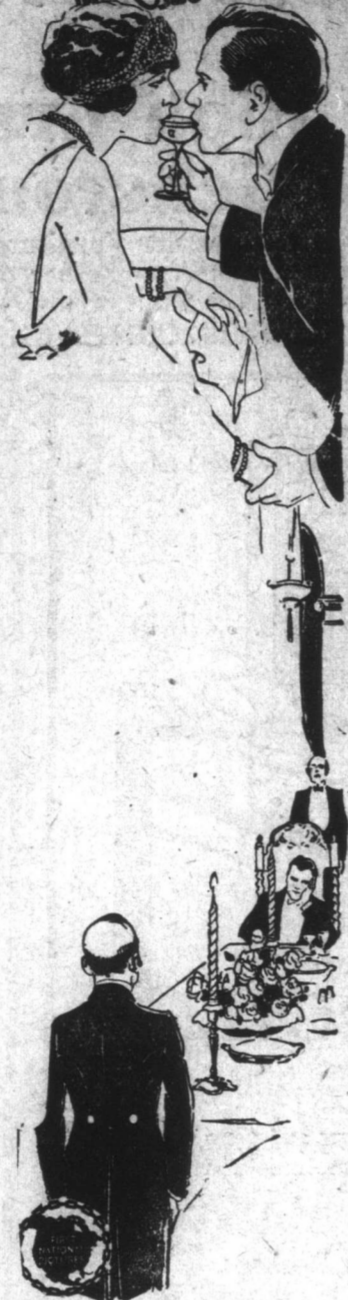

This is, so far, the most significant event in the life of Protestantism in the twentieth century. It is the result of twenty years of persistent efforts, on the part of leaders in those three bodies, to effect such a union. It has received the sanction of the sister churches of these three denominations in the United Kingdom. But this magnificent consummation was not wrought out without groaning, some of which could not be uttered, while others most emphatically were.

Religious dissensions have existed in all ages, among Christians and non-Christians. The message of Jesus Christ in His own days, caused no end of discussion and agitation. This is what He meant when He said that He had brought war upon the earth: the war of ideas, which, owing to the ways of human nature, often resulted in the sword. It is one of the greatest tragedies in history that men went to war against each other, and killed and tortured each other in the name of the Prince of Peace, who taught that the essence of His religion was love, brotherhood, and fellowship. Paul, at the opening of his first letter to the Corinthians, refers to the dissensions already existing in their church. Some claimed to have for leader Paul himself; others, Apollon, a learned and eloquent Alexandrian Jew; others followed Peter; and still others claimed to follow Christ only (1 Cor. 1:12). From the second century down to our own days the same thing happened, though in different ways or for different motives. There are still religious bodies, that separate from the main body of the Christian churches in the early centuries and are still in existence, such as the Nestorians that go back to the sixth century. The United Church of Canada has now for special organ a fine weekly paper called "The New Outlook" published in Toronto. From the first four issues, dated June 10, 17, 24 and July 1, 1925, and from the Boston Congregationalist of June 25, and the Chicago Christian Century of June 20, we gather the few facts mentioned here. These six numbers contain full details of the movement which is called a unique one. And as a writer in The Congregationalist says, its "full and exact significance... will not appear for a generation hence."

Out of the 4,500 Presbyterian Churches in Canada, 674 refused to enter the union, and are called non-concurring churches. They are remaining Presbyterian under the name of the Continuing Presbyterian Church. A special arrangement was made with them by which the fine Knox College property formerly owned by the Presbyterian Church will be for the present under the control of both the United Church and the non-concurring Presbyterians. The Methodist Episcopal Church, of Canada, as a body came into the union. And but a few small Congregational churches refused to join. It is hoped that, in the years to come, many of the non-concurring bodies will see their way to come in.

That in the past twenty years the projected union caused no end of controversies, bitter feelings, and the like, we can easily see. It has always been so. It should not be, but it is human nature. But it is more interesting to present here the positive features of the movement that found its culmination on June 10 in the presence of 8,000 people, in the Toronto Arena, a huge, unattractive building devoted mostly to sporting events.

The numerical strength of the United Church, as recruited from the three bodies is as follows:

"Congregational Churches, 174, with 12,320 members; Presbyterian churches, 2,509 with 256,111 members; M. E. churches, 4,797 with 414,047 members. In all, churches and preaching stations, 8,806; members, 694,888; ministers, 3,819; missionaries, 648.

In The New Outlook, for June 10 is an article entitled, "A Survey and a comparison," by Prof. J. W. Falconer, D.D., which thus ends:

"While it is impossible to define absolutely the tendencies of each of these communions and to give the exact contribution which each brings into the United Church, the following analysis may contain a fair measure of truth.

"The Congregationalists (1) have never abandoned their conviction as to the rights of each individual community, (2) yet they have increasingly felt the need of a larger fellowship and of a more representative government, (3) and in their religious life there is much stress made upon social and missionary labors.

"The Methodists (1) have never forgotten that their denomination grew out of a personal religious experience and they have accordingly made their appeal to the individual soul, (2) have refused to place limits on the divine grace and have emphasized the responsibility of each person to accept the offer of a salvation open to all, (3) have moved away from their limited monarchial rule towards a more adequate form of representative government.

"The Presbyterians (1) have sought to render increasingly complete their polity of limited republicanism, (2) have never abandoned the Geneva ideals of the educated ministry, (3) but have been modifying their theological standards in the direction of less extreme Calvinism.

"The Congregationalists and Presbyterians have thus been approaching the doctrinal positions of Methodism. The Congregationalists and Methodists have been advancing towards the Presbyterian form of government. The Methodists and Presbyterians have increasingly recognized the democracy of the Congregationalists and the rights of each community. But these are not the determining influences that have brought about the great Union, for the real dynamic is the common religious experience of salvation through Christ. Christ is the heart of Christianity, and as members of the Church which is His body we are inevitably impelled to study everything that makes for the common good. Christian unity is not a mere option but it is a noble obligation due to the con-

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straints of Christian love, which by its very nature strives towards the removal of all barriers that stand in the way of complete fellowship.

It is interesting to notice that one of the most enthusiastic supporters of the movement is Rev. Charles W. Gordon, better known as "Ralph Connor," the author of "Black Rock," "The Sky Pilot," "Glenarry School Days," "The Prospector," etc. We could not expect anything else from the author of such inspirational stories as he writes.

A most fitting close for this article is the editorial in the first issue of The United Church, "What May We Hope For?"

"But if the first note should be one of joy and thanksgiving should not be one of hope and great expectation? Union is not to be thought of merely as an accomplishment; we are not through with it, we are just beginning it. It has had a history, a very interesting history, and we rejoice in it, as we should, but we turn our faces in the other direction. It has a future; what things may we hope of that future?"

"The only possible thing that can go wrong with Union, and blight the hopes of this hour, grows out of the fact that it is left to you and to me to carry it out, and we may forget our idealism, and grow tired of doing the noble and worthy and Christian and unselfish thing, and fall to follow the beckoning hand of a wisdom that is better than our own. But if we do not—then truly the future is as bright as are the promises of God, and we may hope for things great and splendid in the days to come.

"One thing we must remind ourselves of over and over again, that this Union is not so much a thing to be cherished. Union is a fact to-day because men saw a light and followed it with a growing faith and hope and courage, and our only safety for the future lies in doing as they did. Where that light may lead us in some future day we cannot know but our hope lies in following notwithstanding that uncertainty.

"It all comes back to this, that the Master's word about a man saving his life by losing it has application to institutions quite as much as to individuals, and to the Christian Church foremost among all institutions. Mere denominationalism that seeks its own progress and safety chiefly, or even largely, will not be any better thing in a larger Church than in a smaller one; indeed it may be by so much a more hurtful or a more futile thing. The United Church of Canada has committed itself to Jesus' great idea; everything for the future will depend upon how it lives up to that commitment. And this perhaps ought to be said, too, that commitment ought not to be made too lightly or easily. Losing one's life for a great idea has never been too easy for the sons of men and it will not likely be any easier in the days that are ahead of us. But in the name of the Master whom we follow that is what we must do."

Writing in The Homiletic Review, New York, for August 1925, on "Some Lessons from Church Union in Canada," Rev. L. Westworth Parker, of Parrsboro, Nova Scotia, says in conclusion:

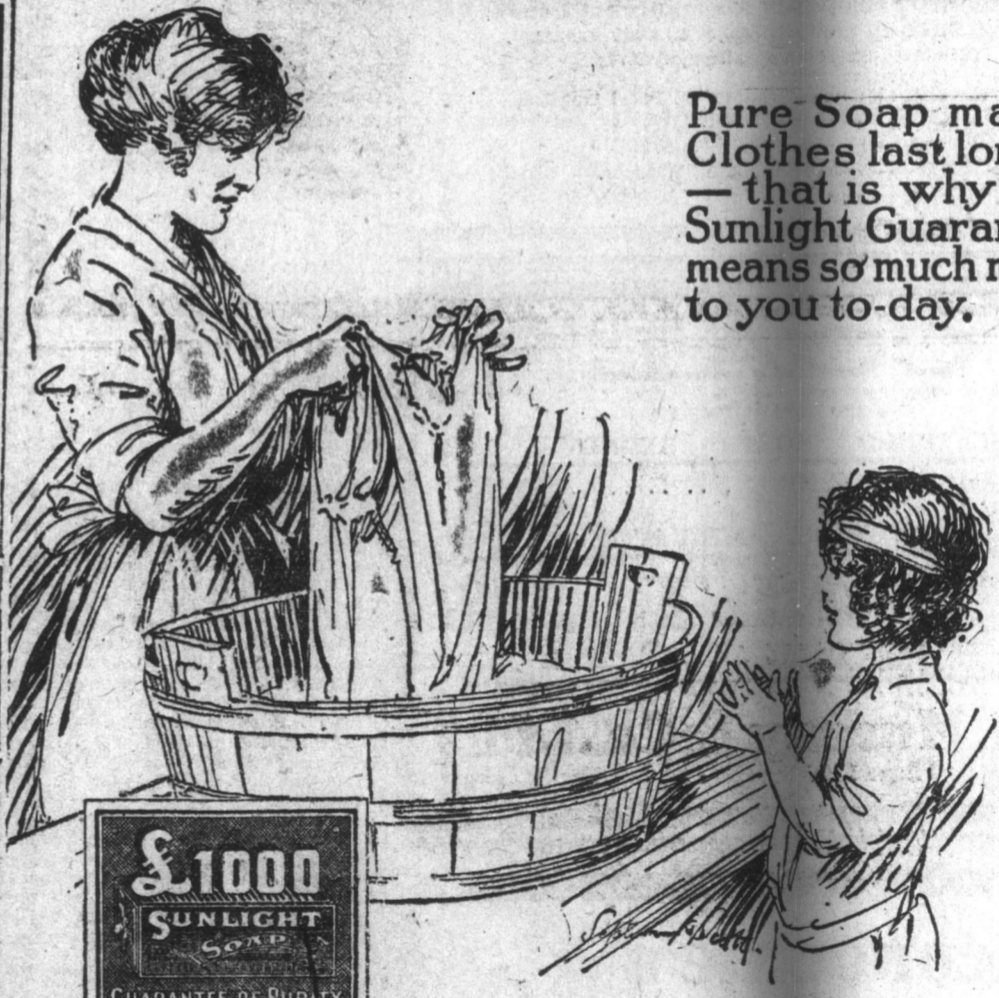
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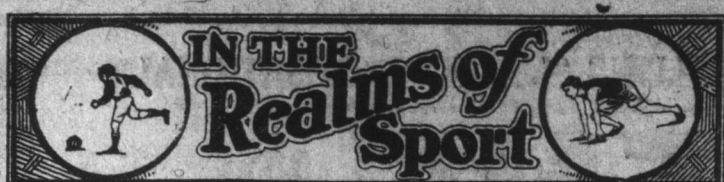

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When Corn Fields Fade
(St. Louis Post-Despatch.)
Corn will be king, no doubt, when crop statisticians make their final reckoning for the year. Latest federal reports indicate a three-billion-bushel crop, although late June conditions mean little to a cereal so largely determined by July and August. Always the yield is large, for the heart of the corn belt produces year after year, with variations, to be sure, but never a general failure. But on the fringe of the corn belt, in Kansas, Oklahoma and Nebraska, the blight of drought and heat has touched the fields since that last report was issued. There is slight solace in a formidable total to the farmer who sees his spring and summer's effort wasted by hot winds; who sees bright prospects wither before a furnace breath. Perhaps he has experienced something of the sort before, but that hardly softens the blow. But this gambler's chance of drought and devastation does carry a lesson our farmers need to learn. Here is the age-old danger of all eggs in one basket; the hazard of the single crop plan, whether it be corn or cotton, wheat or tobacco, for there is no region but has its whims of weather; no land immune from the invasion of insect pests. Beyond question there is greater safety in diversification. In the long run, the greater prosperity for the farmer, for there is no conservation in rotation of crops.

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Big Voyages in Little Boats

Some people say that the men of the present day are not hardy enough to do as their forefathers did—brave the oceans when the biggest ships were small and the shortest voyages long.

But the people who belittle the present generation are evidently unaware of the many daring voyages that have been carried out successfully in tiny craft. There is no doubt that the spirit of our forefather still lives!

Some few years ago the steamship Holbein during a passage from New York to Manchester, picked up a boat which was only some fifteen feet long. She contained a Captain Andrews, who was attempting to cross the Atlantic in her. He had travelled 700 miles, had suffered great privations, and his limbs were swollen by exposure.

He was sighted previously by other vessels, but had hitherto refused assistance. A few years before he had actually succeeded in crossing the Atlantic in a small boat.

Still near our own time a sea captain sailed from America to England in the Great Western, a cutter only thirty feet long. He sailed alone, and reached Gloucester in two months. At the end of the voyage he had neither fingers nor toes, having lost them by frostbite during his hazardous journey.

About the same time two men crossed the Atlantic in a rowing boat fitted with water-tight compartments. They were captized by a big wave, but righted their craft and continued the voyage. They arrived at St. Mary's, Scilly Isles, very little the worse for the many exciting adventures that had befallen them.

A Voyage of Ten Months. Another notable voyage was that of the Homeward Bound, a boat twenty feet long and seven feet broad, manned by three men. She left Port Natal, South Africa, for over, which she reached after a voyage of ten months, touching at only two ports on the way. These three men encountered terrible weather. Their boat was subsequently exhibited at the Crystal Palace, London.

Another famous craft which has only recently been rescued from its mud-birth off Canvey Island, Essex where she lay for years, is the Tallikum, a native dugout, thirty feet long, with a tiny cabin built on her by Captain Voss.

This navigator had invented a sea anchor, which he claimed was the best of its kind. He proved this by navigating the Tallikum all over the world, braving tornadoes and hurricanes and everything else that comes to the life of a sailor. All his voyages he completed in safety.

Probably the greatest achievement of all was a voyage round the world, single handed, by Captain Joshua Slocum, a native of Boston. His boat, the Spray, was built entirely by himself. She was thirty feet long.

He took ocean routes and completely "circled the world's wide compass round." Cape Horn and other dangerous spots had no terrors for this daring navigator and he sailed the oceans in his tiny craft with every confidence.

"I don't see how he ever catches anything," said the little rabbit. "He's so slow. Goodness me, he's slower than a month of Sundays."

"You don't know him," answered Little Long Bill Wren. "He can stand up on his hind legs as quick as a wink and dart out his head just like a snake. He caught me before I knew he was even near."

Compass Always Changing

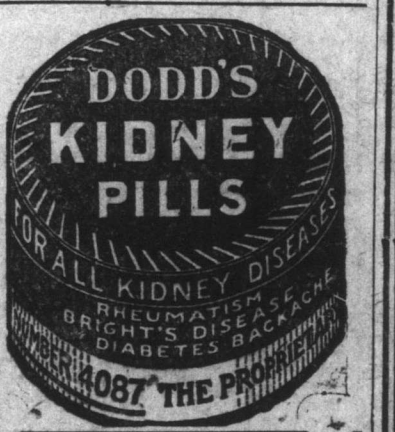

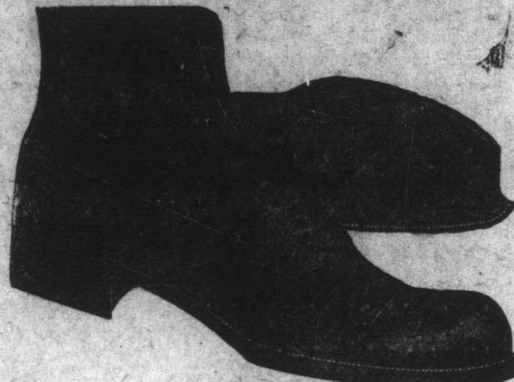

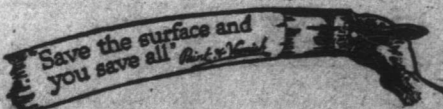
