REPORTED BATTLE AT MONTE ROTUNDO.

Garibaldi said to be Killed!

DEPARTURE OF THE ABYSSIN-

RIOTS IN FRANCE.

Paris, Nov. 4.—The Moniteur of this morning contains an authoritative article asserting that on the 1st of Nov., M. de Moustier despatched a note to the French Charge D'Afairs, at Florence, in which he said that the Italian advance into the Papal territory was a violation of law and treaty. The Emperor Napoleon, M. Moustier continues, will not approve it by word or silence, and asks an explanation of Italy.

There are only two French regiments in Rome. Large bodies of troops are continually leaving Toulon for Civita Vecchia. The Papal forces will assume the offensive immediately.

London, Nov. 4, p. m.—Late despatches from Florence state that the vote of the towns in the Province of Rome was unanimously for Italy. It is now reported in Florence that the Emperor Napoleon requires King Victor Emmanuel to expel Garibaldi, and if that is done Napoleon will retire. [To-day's Despatches.]

The result is known. The heroic resistance of the garrison of Derry, the battles of the Boyne and Aughrim, at the last of which King James lost the flower of his army, the final stand of the Irish, and their surrender at Limerick—all these great events combined sealed the fate of James, reduced him to an exile and a pensioner on the bounties of the King of France, and forever excluded his dynasty from the Throne of England. On the fifth of November was Orange landed at Torbay, and waited his dynasty from the Throne of Eng-On the fifth of November was fought one of the most terrible battles of modern times. In the uncertain light of a misty morning, an immense host of drunken Russians, having se cured their position the previous night, attacked a small force of apparently devoted British soldiers at Inkerman. The Muscovites fought with savage fury, still further incensed by the knowledge that they were combatting ander the eye of him whom they reparded as the vice-gerent of the Most High; and still their efforts were vain, for that invincible wall of British bayonets defied their attacks until late in the evening, when French cheers rose above the thunder of cannon, and the clink of sabres, and the beaten Muscovites retreated within their fortifications. If we mistake not, that day was eventful even further than in its effect on the Eastern question. Two field pieces, dragged with immense labour into the battle at late hour in the day contributed in no small degree to the victory of the allied forces, and it was this circumstance which the ingenuity of Mr. (afterwards Sir William) Armstrong to work, in he endeavour to invent lighter field rtillery than that in use, capable of long equal or greater execution. Had the plot, the frustration of which is this day celebrated, been successful, a remodelling of the laws as they existed would have been a speedy consequence, and it might have required years of arduous struggling, and entailed a series of revolutions before Britons were again as free as they had been previously. LORD ROSSE.—The death of Lord Rosse, an English peer, is announced by cable. He was born in 1800, and after having graduated at the University of Oxford, became a member of the House of Commons, and afterwards Lord Lieutenant of Kings County; in 1845 he was elected to be representative peer of Ireland, and voted for the Liberal party. Lord Rosse was a passionate admirer of astronomy and the optical science, and had an observatory erected on his domains with a telescope inferior in quality and size to none but Herschel's. As a philanthropist he is entitled to the thanks of the community, and the Academy of Science in St. Petersburg elected him to be one of their members. He was decorated with the Legion of Honor, and became in 1862 Chancellor of the University of Dublin. He leaves a son, who becomes heir to his father's estate.
