THE LATE CANON STREET.

How He Delivered His Message in Canad Rev. George Charles Street, canon of the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul, Chicago, died at Winter Park, Florida, on Sunday. Rev. Canon Street was born in Devonshire England, August 1, 1814, and moved to Canada with his father in 1832, his theological ducation being obtained in this country. When a young man he lived for some time in When a young man he lived for some time in Hamilton, and was afterwards rector of the Anglican Church in Newmarket. He moved to Belleview, Ia, in 1854, and successfully conducted that parish a number of years. In 1864 he moved to Chicago, and four years afterwards was created canon of the Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul. He stood very litch in the astronation of the people of Chicago.

He said Mrs. Bradley had decided to part from her husband and that was the direct cause of the shooting. While Bradley was in prison Mann escorted Mrs. Bradley to and from her night assignment. This made Bradley insanely jealous, and with Bradley's dissipated habits led to frequent quarrels and culminated in to-day's tragedy. Mrs. Bradley was formerly connected with the stage.

With the Local Legislature in session the question of the Insolvency Act again comes up. Every business house with any pretensions to business has suffered more or less from the carrying out of the provisions of such a rotten act as the present Ontario Debtors Act. Take for example a general store in a small town with perhaps only one or two competitors. In order to do the bulk of the business, enterprising general store keeper No, I sells his goods at such ridiculously low prices that his competitors cannot sell any goods at all. One of them must go to the wall soon after a mania of this kind strikes them, and then follows the sickly creditors' meeting, and either the wholesale houses pocket the loss and accept 40 or 50 cents, and generally less, to allow the man to go on in business. The fact is it does not pay to wind s. The fact is it does not pay to wind business. The fact is it does not pay to wind up an estate even though the assets and liabilities are nominally equal, and the wholesale men must stand the loss every time. What is wanted just now is to have amendments made to this already cumbersome and awkwark insolvency law so that when a man falls the creditors can run the business on, and without sacrificing the stock get every dollar out of it there is in it.



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


