At 2 o'clock on the afternoon of Aug. 9, 1883, the party of twenty-five men, with the Greely party, was taken to the place which had been to them for 10 years for only a home, but a home in the Arctic. In the early all of his explorations, never in Arctic expeditions, the dogs were found most useful and almost indispensable accessories.

The provisions left by the Greely party in 1881-2, 1882-3, and those which were taken on board the small stores in the Arctic, such as tea, tobacco and sugar, were left as well as a barrel of beef. About midway between Cape Lyell and Bon Buque and Lawrence they were frozen in for five days, when they forced their way out, and after various derivations from the bank getting where they were, they were literally frozen in a severe gale with food and medicine, and found Elton badly frozen and delirious.

During the latter part of October, Long with the two natives, were stationed at the juncture of Rice and Hanchman straits for the purpose of hunting, and suffered greatly with cold and hunger. They had only a tent to live in and were on reduced rations. They returned about November 8, badly frost-bitten, having only killed three seals.

Throughout the entire winter open water separated them from Littleton Island, where there was an additional cache of provisions, which, though not large, would have been sufficient with economy to pull the entire party through, and near at hand were matters on whom they might have relied for assistance, as did Kane and Hayes.

condition, Thanksgiving and Christmas days were observed as usual. For more than a month they saved from their scanty rations in order that they might have, at least by contrast, a good dinner on those days. It consisted principally of their own making, with a glass of rum to wash it down. On March 13, 1884, Long was sent with Peck and Jess to Alexandria Harbor to look for game, the English expedition of 1875 having reported abundant traces in that quarter. They returned on the 21st, having shot a number of seals, but no walrus. The first at Camp City during that terrible winter and spring is simply indescribable. Rice discovered seal strips, which they used on their appetites, but they so missed every little nutriment, and the labor of catching them may be imagined when it is known that it required 100 lbs. to fill a gill net. This fishing was done by hauling bags or nets from the ice with bare hands and with temperatures 25 below zero. The suffering was unrelieved. Like-gathered from the rocks, snuff and boiled seal, which were also eaten. Twenty-four seals, weighing about four pounds each were killed with shot guns, which were procured about the camp, and the following day light frozen plumage, sixty-five small seals, and in April, a bear which weighed 257 pounds of good meat, nothing was wasted, and this last undoubtedly saved the lives of the few who survived. Serg. Brainard, who was in charge of the issue of provisions, which were carefully weighed in the improvised scale, cartridges serving as weights, and equitably distributed. In March it was found necessary to reduce the ration, there being nothing left them but seal, and seal was not to be had. The first death was that of Serg. Cross, who had been the machinist on the steam launch, and then there was a long lapse of time until Esquimaux Thers was killed. This was followed by the death of the other Esquimaux, Linn, Elton and Fredricks, proved a serious loss, as they were both good hunters, and without the kayak much of the game that was killed could not be secured. Long, however, was the main reliance of the party as a hunter. He is an old frontiersman and a deer hunter, and has not been for the security of game he would have had no difficulty in providing for the entire party.

On the 2nd of November a party were sent to Cape Sabine to secure the meat which had been found there. It was composed of Rice, Linn, Elton and Fredricks, with the small sled and several days provisions. On the 9th about midnight, Rice returned and reported the party at the head of the bay, suffering severely with cold and Elton dying with the loss of a party under Linn. Lockwood, which had also come to the rescue, they were taken to Camp City, Elton having both hands and feet frozen so that he never used them again. They had been compelled to abandon the meat at Baird Inlet, with everything not absolutely necessary to save life.

During the latter part of October, Long with the two natives, were stationed at the juncture of Rice and Hanchman straits for the purpose of hunting, and suffered greatly with cold and hunger. They had only a tent to live in and were on reduced rations. They returned about November 8, badly frost-bitten, having only killed three seals. From November 1, the command was placed on further reduced rations, which had been accurately estimated to last until March 1, with a reserve of ten days' rations for the trip to Littleton Island when the sound should freeze over. This reduced ration was composed as follows: Meat and blubber, four and one-half; canned veg. tables and rice, one and two-fifths; butter and lard, three-quarters; soup and beef extract, nine-tenths; cloud berries, pickles, relishes and milk, one ounce; making a total of 1,285-100 ounces per day. About this time the whaleret Narwhal, which had been left on the ice, drifting down near Cape Sabine and was worked in the ice between Brevoort Island and the mainland. She was secured and used during the winter for fuel. After the middle of November hunting became impossible on account of the darkness and cold being useless, as there was no game to be had, so they waited patiently for the closing of the sound by ice, but waited in vain.

Throughout the entire winter open water separated them from Littleton Island, where there was an additional cache of provisions, which, though not large, would have been sufficient with economy to pull the entire party through, and near at hand were matters on whom they might have relied for assistance, as did Kane and Hayes. Every effort was made to preserve observations in that line, and so necessary to its very existence. CONVENTION.—The cotton manufacturers of Canada are seriously embarrassed from over-production. Mr. Clayton Slater, of the Great Western Mills, Bradford, gives the number of looms at 9,000; while he estimates that 9,000 looms would produce all the domestic cotton that could be consumed in the country. This estimate is based on a consumption of 15 yards for each individual of the home market. A reduced production to four working days in the week, Mr. Slater shows would supply all that could be consumed; so that at the end of the year the existing surplus stock would be as large as it is at present. He does not favor reduced production by two days in the week under existing management, because it would not bring the market to a normal level. He proposes instead an amalgamation of all the cotton companies, the different mills and machinery to be taken at a valuation so that a single management could control the whole production. The different mills could be used for producing the class of goods they are best suited for, and some economy in this direction would result. Loss of capital put into surplus plant there is in any case. Whether Mr. Slater's proposal will be found practicable, and whether it will be carried into effect, the advantage expected from it would be realized, are questions which concern the cotton proprietors, and in some degree the public. One thing which is certain, is that a check is to be put on the over-production of cotton, and that a sacrifice of the capital put into the business, over and above what is needed for the production of the cotton in the United States, is inevitable.
