## ASSESSMENT SYSTEM.

### NOTICE OF A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT.

Notice is hereby officially given to each and every member of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association of Canada, that in addition to the regular No. 11 assessment for the month of Sept., a special assessment is also required to be paid within thirty days from the 15th Sept., in the same manner and of the same amount as said No. 11 assessment. This, in connection with the statements on page four of this issue, will be the only notice of such special assessment to our members, and is given in compliance with Sections 7 and 8 of the C. M. B. A. constitution.

Officers of branches are requested to be as prompt as possible in remitting the amount of these two assessments.

It requires \$21,000 to pay the beneficiaries of the 13 deceased brothers reported on the statement of assessments for this month.

A member initiated in any month in which there is more than one assessment called for, is required to pay but one.

The street car ride through the principal parts of the city and points of interest, also the trip down the St. Lawrence River were rare treats for our delegates.

The visiting ladies were entertained

right royally by their Quebec sisters, assisted not a little by the Quebec brothers.

A large number took advantage of the occasion and visited Ste. Anne de Beaupré. Many had the happiness of being able to go to confession and receive Holy Communion at Ste Anne on Friday morning, Aug. 26th.

Mayor Parent, who is a C. M. B. A. member himself, acted in a most brotherly manner towards the visitors. He left nothing undone to show our convention how welcome its members were to the city over which he presided.

The Grand President's speech, after the announcement of his election by acclamation for the second term of presidency, was the finest we ever heard. Shouts of "We are proud of our president" came from every quarter.

Much credit is due to brother T. P. Coffey, chairman of the Law Committee, for the able and energetic manner in which he conducted the onerous work he had in hand. He is certainly the right man for the position.

### ASSESSMENT INSURANCE.

The ingenuity of man is constantly at work to devise new methods of accommodating the complex relations of social life to individual needs. In these modern days life insurance is as much of a necessity in the social and commercial world as stores of grain were in the olden days to the merchant of the East. It helps to equalize and distribute the necessities, comforts and luxuries of life from one generation to another. The old method of conveyance and distribution was on the camel's back. The new method is by steam and trolley. It would be a fruitless task to abuse the camel because he cannot do the work of the trolley. It is equally idle to decry the trolley because electricity is a dangerous fluid. The trolley, like the assessment system of life insurance, is here and electricity in some form or other is now and is to be, more and more, as the years advance, the propelling and distributing power. It is the most pliable and elastic power yet discovered, and people will ride on the electrics in spite of live wires and the fact that now and then a badly managed car falls through the bridge.

In the field of life insurance the assessment system is the modern and up-to-date system. Many improvements have already been discovered in adapting it to modern scientific and economic requirements, and other improvements and modifications will, no doubt, be discovered and applied. But the system remains. Now and then poor management or corrupt practices will wreck a company, as it will a train, and disaster follows. But the system is not wrecked. The incorrect, inefficient or wrong application of a correct principle may cause loss and misfortune, but does not discredit the principle. Principles are not automatic, the strings must be pulled by human agencies. If those who pull the strings are weak or vicious and misfortune comes, so much the worse for the interested parties. But the principle remains. The people will ride on the electrics and will insure in assessment companies. The demand has created the supply, and the supply has adapted itself and will continue to adapt itself to the requirements and to the demand. The assessment system of life insurance has come to stay. The people are intolerant of sham and fraud, but they know a good thing when they see it, and will denounce with persistent and righteous indignation the incompetent and selfish administration of even a correct system. —M. CHANGES MADE IN THE CON-  
STITUTION AND PRINCIPAL  
BUSINESS DONE.Conventions shall be held triennially  
hereafter.Our scale of assessments and the  
manner of issuing assessments are to  
remain as heretofore. No change  
made.In order to effect prompt payment of  
beneficiary claims, a sum equal to one  
full assessment may be set aside from  
the Reserve Fund to enable the Grand  
Treasurer to have sufficient money on  
hand to pay claims as soon as proof  
papers are completed. This sum  
so used to be replaced when as  
assessments are paid by the Branches.Every Branch shall have the privi-  
lege of sending a Representative to  
Convention as heretofore; but when  
any Branch has a Grand Council Offi-  
cer among its membership, said Officer  
shall be the Representative of such  
Branch, and if the Branch has more  
than one Grand Council Officer it shall,  
by election, decide which of such offi-  
cers shall be Representative.The members of the Finance Com-  
mittee are to continue to be the audi-  
tors of the Association."Social" members shall be, under  
certain conditions, allowed to join  
Branches.The question of Signs and Passwords  
was referred to our Grand Spiritual  
Adviser, who will, through the Board of  
Trustees, report at next Convention.The Organizers shall inspect the  
books of Branches and report the re-  
sult to the Grand Secretary for the  
information of the Board of Trustees.The Official Organ, THE CANADIAN,  
is to be enlarged, and if possible, made  
self-sustaining by allowing advertise-  
ments therein. The paper to remain  
the property of the Association as at  
present.

The present code of procedure is to

be erased and a new and simple code  
substituted thereto.The day of the week on which con-  
ventions shall commence business is  
left in the hands of the Grand Presi-  
dent and Board of Trustees.A committee called "Committee for  
the Good of the Association" shall be  
appointed by each Branch annually.The Grand Secretary's salary was in-  
creased £500 per annum and his office  
is to be provided with a typewriter.Resolutions of condolence were  
passed on the death of His Eminence  
the Cardinal Archbishop of Quebec; Most Rev. Archbishop Fabre of Mon-  
treal; Most Rev. Archbishop Cleary of  
Kingston; Rt. Rev. Mgr. Lalonde of  
Three Rivers, and Most Rev. John  
Walsh, D. D., Archbishop of Toronto,  
Grand Spiritual Adviser of the C. M.  
B. A. of Canada.Votes of thanks were tendered the  
Rev. Clergy of Quebec and Lévis; the  
Local Committees; the Manager of the  
Street Railway Co.; the press and the  
retiring officers.A cablegram was received from His  
Holiness the Pope bestowing his bene-  
diction on the Convention.The reports of the Grand Secretary,  
Grand Treasurer, Auditing Committee,  
Supervising Medical Examiner, Board  
of Trustees, Solicitor, and Or-  
ganizer were approved and adopted.

## TRUSTEE MEETING.

Immediately after the Convention  
the Board of Trustees met and elected  
His Grace Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax,  
Grand Spiritual Adviser, Edward  
Ryan, M. D., Kingston Ont., Super-  
vising Medical Examiner; F. R. Latch-  
ford, Ottawa Ont., Solicitor, at \$100  
per annum. The Grand Secretary  
submitted the name of J. E. H. How-  
ison as assistant in his office. Brother  
Howison was appointed for one, two,  
or three years at the option of the  
Grand President and Grand Secretaryat a salary of \$50 per annum, payable  
monthly, and if Brother Howison learns,  
typewriting he is to receive \$100 per  
annum from and after the date the  
Grand Secretary considers Brother  
Howison qualified in said typewriting  
work. He is to be subject to the  
orders of and under the direction of  
the Grand Secretary.The Grand Secretary was authorized  
to purchase a typewriter and whatever  
other articles he considers necessary  
for his office.It was decided to have a Requiem  
Mass offered for our late Grand  
Spiritual Adviser, Archbishop Walsh.Grand Secretary, S. R. Brown was  
appointed editor and manager of the  
official organ, THE CANADIAN, until  
next Convention.R. V. M. J. Tiernan was elected  
chairman of the Trustee Board for the  
purpose of complying with section 19  
of the Reserve Fund Law.It was decided to continue deposit-  
ing the Reserve Fund in the same  
banks as heretofore.The proceedings of the Convention  
are to be printed in pamphlet form  
and the work given by tender.Brother W. P. Killackey was ap-  
pointed organizer for the Province of  
Ontario. A detailed statement of the  
work done was to be furnished by  
Brother Killackey to the Grand Presi-  
dent monthly.The appointment of organizers for  
the other provinces will be made as  
soon as suitable men can be found for  
the work.The following are the names and

## GRAND PRESIDENT HACKETT'S ADDRESS.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand and Supreme Councils, I believe I have the universal sentiment of the Brethren of whom I write. That we all have had an aversion to regret the decision drawn at the last of the Hamilton Convention.

Brothers.—Two decades have passed away since the first branch of our Association was formed in Canada, and looking back over the field of labor, the obstacles with which it has to contend, the numerous kindred societies straining every effort for patronage and support, I believe the Association has reason to be proud of its success, and that we, as members, can congratulate ourselves on the healthy and prosperous condition of our Organization.

Five years have also elapsed since we obtained separate Canadian Beneficiary jurisdiction and although the effort in that direction was attended with great labor and worry on the part of the Executive, and with some little friction and friction between the then Grand

and Supreme Councils, I believe I have the universal sentiment of the Brethren of whom I write. That we all have had an aversion to regret the decision drawn at the last of the Hamilton Convention.

Since our meeting in Ottawa two years ago, 200 new members have been added to our Association. These branches have been organized, and I am informed upon a reliable authority that there are several others now in progress of formation.

Following a president worthy of emulation I hereby give a list with numbers and location of the 1100 formed branches, together with names of Organizers so that the members may be fully conversed with the workings of the Order, and know and appreciate in what portions of the Dominion our Association is making progress, and to whose energy and exertions we are indebted for such growth:

A perusal of the foregoing list must convince us that for some unknown reason the Province from which we expected so much and which from its population was justly regarded as the recruiting ground of the Association, has done practically nothing during the past few years. It is needless to add that I refer to the Province of Quebec.

I am not unmindful of the fact that in this Province there are many religious and national benevolent societies appealing for sympathy and support; but the field is broad enough for all, and the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association of Canada has no rivalry with any other kindred organization except in doing public and private good. And I trust you will not deem me egotistical if I cherish the hope and venture the prediction that the fruits of the present Convention, now being held in Quebec's rock-bound capital, will impart new life and vigor to the work, will stimulate our members, will direct our energies, and will cause us to take a more active interest in our Organization, so that when we meet again in convention, Quebec may take her place as the banner Province of our Association.

It has been my pleasure during my term of office to appoint a number of Grand Deputies in each Province.

While many of them have done their duty nobly and well, some there are who do not seem to realize their duties and responsibilities, and I believe that a change in the system of appointments would redound to the greatest benefit of the Association.

The time has arrived in the history of our Association when the employment of organizers has become a necessity, and I believe the future progress and welfare depend largely upon immediate action in this respect.

The keen competition of sister societies, the amount of money by them spent in advertising, the great inducements given for cheap insurance, all combined, render it necessary and imperative that competent organizers should be employed in the various Provinces, in the interests of this Association.

Acting upon instructions received at the last convention, the Board of Trustees have recently secured the valuable services of Brother Killackey as organizer in Ontario, and during the short period that he has been engaged, has done most excellent work. In Quebec arrangements were made with Brother Montrou during the winter to take up the same work in that Province. He started under most favorable auspices, but was prevented from carrying them to a successful issue, owing to family sickness.

Our reserve fund, which in 1896 amounted to \$33,319.33, has now reached the sum of \$80,500.00, the whole of which is on deposit in the following banks: Canadian Bank of Commerce, Merchants' Bank of Toronto, British North America, Bank of Montreal, and Eastern Township Bank in Stanstead. These deposits are drawing, three per cent., compounded semi-annually. Our general fund is in excellent condition; we owe nothing, and have sufficient funds on hand to defray the expenses of this convention.

In fact, I have much pleasure in stating that at no previous convention were we in as sound a financial position as we are at the present time.

For further information upon our financial and legal affairs, our membership, death-rate, cause of death, etc., I take much pleasure in referring you to the very complete and elaborate reports of the Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary, the Grand Medical Supervisor and our Grand Solicitor as well as the report of the Trustee Board, all of which will be placed before you.

La promenade en tramway électrique à travers les principales parties de la ville et les points d'intérêt, et l'excursion sur le fleuve St. Laurent, furent un régal pour les Délégués.

Les dames en visite furent reçues royalement par leurs mères de Québec, assistées pas qu'un peu par les frères de Québec !

Un grand nombre profitèrent de l'occasion pour visiter Ste Anne de Beaupré. Plusieurs eurent le bonheur de pouvoir se confesser et recevoir la Sainte Communion à Ste Anne, le Vendredi matin, 26 Août.

### AFFAIRES PRINCIPALES TRANSIGEES ET CHANGEMENTS FAITS À LA CONSTITUTION.

Les Conventions seront tenues dorénavant tous les trois ans.

Notre échelle de cotisations et la manière de prélever les cotisations restent les mêmes qu'auparavant. Pas de changement sous ce rapport.

Dans le but de payer promptement les réclamations mortuaires, une somme égale au plein montant d'une cotisation pourra être mise à part à même le Fonds de Réserve pour permettre au Grand Trésorier d'avoir en mains suffisamment d'argent pour payer les réclamations aussi tôt que la preuve sera complète. compte plus d'un officier dans le Grand Conseil, elle déclera, par élection, lequel de ces officiers sera le Représentant.

Les membres du Comité des Finances continueront d'être les Auditores de l'Association.

Des membres "Sociaux" pourront, sous certaines conditions, joindre les succursales.

La question de Signes et de mots de Passe a été renvoyée à notre Grand Avisseur Spirituel qui fera rapport à la prochaine Convention, par l'intermédiaire du Bureau des Syndics.

Les Organisateurs inspecteront les livres des succursales et feront rapport du résultat au Grand Secrétaire pour l'information des Syndics.

L'Organe Officiel, LE CANADIEN, sera agrandi, et si possible, on le fera se payer lui-même en permettant des annonces. Le journal restera la propriété de l'Association comme à présent.

Le code de procédure actuel sera aboli et un nouveau et simple code lui sera substitué.

Le jour de la semaine pendant laquelle les Conventions devront commencer les affaires, est laissé entre les mains du Grand Président et du Bureau des Syndics.

Un comité appelé, "Comité pour le bien de l'Association," sera nommé par chaque succursale chaque année.

Les Rapports du Grand Secrétaire, du Grand Trésorier, du Comité des Finances, du Bureau des Syndics, du Médecin Examinateur en chef, du Solliciteur et de l'organisateur, furent approuvés et adoptés.
