The Revenue of this Parish is derived from the Offertory and Pew Rents, of which the former is relied upon as the principal source of income.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

- Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient
 to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would
 soon extinguish it.
- 2. The completion of improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. The amount wanted for this would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
- 3. \$650 to pay for the new roof of the Church. The School House roof must also soon be renewed.
- 4. \$400 for the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission
- 5. Donations and bequests towards an endowment of which there is at present a sum of \$312 only.
