The rope works of Thos. Conner & Sons, Portland, St. John, N. B., are running day and a quarter time, and the orders are coming in so rapidly the firm are talking of increasing their extra time to a day and a half.

Live stock raisers in Ontario are already making preparations for the Christmas fat stock shows.—A grain elevator at the Great Western Railway depot, Norwich, Ont., has collapsed. About 15,000 bushels of grain were stored in the building.—A citizen of Clinton, Ont., has already this season shipped 140 car-loads of apples to the North-West, aggregating over 20,000 barrels.

The death of the venerable Morris Franklin is announced. He expired at his residence, Flushing, L. I., on the morning of October 22d, in the 84th year of his age. Mr. Franklin was the president of the Nautilus at its organization in 1845, and continued in the presidency after the change of the Nautilus into the New York Life Insurance Company, holding such position until his death.

It is intended to manufacture paper-bottles, inks, blueing, mucilage, shoe-dressing, shoe-blackening, stove polish, liquid glue, etc. "The Ontario Wire Fencing Company," with headquarters at Picton, Ont., and capital of \$150,000, in shares of \$100 each.

The turning of the first sod of the Buctouche and Moncton railway was performed in the village of Buctouche on the 5th instant, under auspicious circumstances. The road will be about twenty-eight miles in length, and runs through a fine farming country, the population to be served numbering over 25,000 souls. A company was organized, and obtained the local subsidy of \$3,000 per mile.

A CORRESPONDENT of the Moncton Transcript says there is quite an excitement at Boisford, N.B., over "the recent disappearance of Charles Prescott, of Bay Verte. 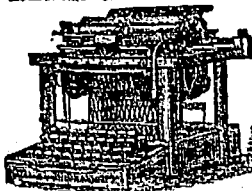

## OCEAN TO OCEAN.

On Saturday the 7th day of November, a day which will ever be memorable in the annals of the country, the last rail in the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway was laid, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific there stretches on Canadian soil an unbroken line from shore to shore.

A railway line, like other commercial enterprises, has its prosaic and mercenary side: indeed these are the main elements and conditions of its existence; but no true Canadian can hear of this achievement without some glow of patriotic pride and rejoicing, however he may have felt as to the wisdom of the enterprise, or the prudence of the vast expenditures which have brought it to completion.

Transcontinental railways are not new to us; yet this one of ours possesses peculiar features well worthy of record and remembrance. In all the great railway systems that cover this North American continent there is none but this that takes the traveller from the ship's side, his Atlantic voyage done, and bears him until he reaches the Pacific coast, there to re-embark on the ocean that will carry him into that East which is now to us but a

further West. It is in very truth a trans-continental line, one and unbroken from shore to shore, directed and controlled from end to end by one central authority.

Such an achievement is indeed worthy of the Queen's gracious message of congratulation which her subjects here cannot but repeat.

Of the labor spent, the skill exercised, the engineering difficulties surmounted, we cannot speak. They are all recorded in the history of the country during the past 14 years, and still more in the great work, which is itself its own best monument. Suffice it to say that in 1881 the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was incorporated, endowed with a land grant of 25,000,000 acres, a subsidy of \$25,000,000, and the portions of the Railway already built or in process of construction by the Government, some 710 miles in all. In May, 1881, the new company commenced work, and by May, 1886, a short five years, it will have in thorough working order its Railway from the St. Lawrence to the Pacific.

Such a work, undertaken and accomplished in a community comparatively so small, augurs well for our future. It has converted our scattered Provinces into one great State, and has brought us before the world as a nation holding sway over half a continent, and courageous enough to stretch forth and possess it to its furthest shores.

But the cost. This great work has certainly been accomplished at no light cost, as indeed few great things worth having, ever are. Will the country bear without injury its share of the burden, and will the earnings of the Road provide all that is necessary on its part? We would not assume the prophet's office, and affect to foretell the future, but we have a confident faith that the development of the years to come, development mainly growing out of, or at least stimulated by this enterprise, will make the burden unfelt. The commercial depression through which we are passing may straighten us till it is over, but we have every reason to believe that it is passing,

In considering this feature of the position we must not forget that the Canadian Pacific railway opens up an entirely new territory, and, as far as the Prairie section is concerned, a territory capable of immediate and enormous development. The increase of business which may be looked for when population flows in to occupy virgin soil is far beyond anything that would result from the opening up by railroads of an old or partially-settled district.

Of the men who have borne the bur-

den of the work it is beyond our province to say much, but we congratulate them on the success that has crowned their labors. Their faith has never wavered, even when difficulties seemed overwhelming; and it is now an open secret that their own private money and possessions were over and over pledged and imperilled to carry on the work. But their confidence has been justified by the result, and the goal they kept in view has been won.

THE BREAD QUESTION.

There can be but little to say of interest to the general reader concerning bread, that which Swift in his "Tale of a Tub" calls the "Staff of Life," if we except the price of the article, which the proletariat invariably complain is much too high. The wealthier classes, from want of time, thought or inclination, go on for year after year paying the same price for bread, however low the market quotation of wheat or flour may fall, seldom or never expressing any dissatisfaction as long as the quality is fairly maintained. The baker gives himself no concern about the occasional murmur from the head of the family—the breadwinner—knowing from experience that after a few weeks' trial of the cheaper article, he will turn again to the more palatable loaf, however convinced that he is paying too high a price.

It is with this question of the quality, which must account chiefly for the difference in price prevailing, according to our contemporaries, in different sections of the Dominion, that we wish to deal, although there are not wanting bakers in Montreal

to assert that it is impossible to make pure white bread in Canada at ten cents per 4lb. loaf. *Nous verrons.* We omit from consideration what is known as "Fancy Bread," the taste for which has been cultivated by imported German or Austrian bakers—for it would appear that Vienna is justly celebrated for the quality of its white bread—and by the principal hotels which in this respect are in advance of the best bakers. In Toronto the Queen's, in Quebec the St. Louis, and in Montreal the St. Lawrence Hall are notable instances of this. An examination of our prices current will show that flour can be bought from \$3.50 per barrel and upwards, as high as \$5 for Manitoba "Strong Bakers," and some bakers in this city say they pay \$1 to \$2 higher for choice "patents." All these brands and qualities of flour are used either pure or mixed, and an almost equal variety of prices for bread is possible, although seldom seen. Inferior qualities are sold at from 3¼ to 3½ cents per pound, but these differ much from the ordinary white loaf, the price of which we have taken as our standard. The ordinary 6lb. brown is sold for 20 cents in Montreal. It is not a little significant, notwithstanding the duty on the American product, that the flour made from Manitoba hard wheat fetches a higher price in this market. But the baker is the best judge of this, and, whatever the boasted superiority of Minnesota flour may be, the product of the grain fields in our own North West is considerably richer in gluten, on the proportion of which depend the strength and nutritive qualities of flour, whether from wheat or other grain. In this respect the following table of the composition of different kinds of grain will not lack interest:—

It will be observed that Hard Manitoba contains nearly 24 per cent of gluten, in which valuable respect it doubtless ranks the highest in the world. In its composition and properties gluten is very similar to the animal albuminoids as they occur in flesh, muscle, etc. As a food material therefore it can replace flesh, and for this reason food materials prepared from the varieties of grain have a higher food value in proportion as they are rich in gluten. That which is known to country lads as "wheat-gum" is the gluten from which the starch, etc., have been washed away by the saliva. Gluten is readily obtained from dough by kneading it in water renewed till the starch, etc., have disappeared, and the water is no longer whitened, the gluten remaining in the shape of a yellowish, tenacious mass. As climate, weather, soil, manuring and harvesting all influence the proportion of gluten, etc., even in the same kind of grain, the analysis in the foregoing table only approximate to a representation of the average composition. Besides the constituents represented, grain in the air-dried condition always contains from 12 to 15 per cent of moisture.

It will be inferred from this distinctive quality in the product of our fertile and practicably boundless North-western prairies what a great future lies before the people of Canada—before Montreal as the outlet of this vast area with its teeming millions—and what a field it offers to the industrious husbandman from Europe, now that that great precursor of settlement and civilization spans the country from ocean to ocean, in the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

But *revenons a nos moutons*. Montreal bakers say that the most satisfactory results are obtained from a mixture of Manitoba hard-wheat flour and St. Louis (Missouri) soft-wheat flour, and that this prevents that incrustation which generally occurs on the outside of loaves shortly after being cut. Potatoes are less used in this country than in England as a cheapening ingredient in bread-making, the cheaper brands of flour being mostly employed for this purpose. Before putting into the oven, the 4 lb. English loaf will consist of flour, 3 lb. 2 oz.; water, 1 lb. 1½ oz.; yeast, ½ oz.; potatoes, 1½ oz.; salt, ½ oz. According to the Encyclopædia Britannica, a series of experiments gave an average of "165 two lb. loaves from 100 lbs. of flour,"—evidently one of the numerous errors which unfortunately characterize the new edition of this great work. It doubtless meant one-half that number. Montreal bakers say they get about 80 four lb white loaves from each barrel.

With these figures which, omitting the potatoes, should apply in Canada, we can arrive at the cost of the materials going to the making of the city 4 lb. white loaf:—

With this liberal allowance the 4 lb. loaf costs somewhat less than 12½ cents. One of the largest firm of bakers in Montreal consume ten barrels of flour per day, and to each of their staff of five men they pay \$2 a night, the foreman receiving \$2.50. The heating of the ovens takes a quarter of a cord of wood, worth say \$1.50. They maintain, in addition, six horses for three delivery-wagons. The wages of the drivers are about \$10 a week. There is here evidently a good margin for profit. If we take the cheaper grades of flour the price at the remaining figures would be somewhat less than 10 cents. With larger quantities made and the use of kneading-machinery the last item could be considerably reduced.

#### SCIENTIFIC PRODUCTION AND CONSUMPTION OF FOOD.

The American Association for the Advancement of Science, an organization on the same lines as the British Association, held its annual meeting at Ann Arbor, Mich., this year.

We have received a copy of the address made by Edward Atkinson to the Economic Section of the Association, which covers much information on a subject of great importance, the application of science to the production and consumption of food. The questions which Mr. Atkinson presents are these:

What is the present daily ration of the working men and women, who constitute the vast majority of the people of this and other lands?

What does it cost them in labor?

What might be the daily ration if the science of nutrition could be made a part of the common knowledge?

How much could its cost be reduced and its nutritive properties increased?

In endeavoring to find the true answers for these questions, which touch matters of vital importance to every community, he brings to bear great knowledge of the economic history and position of his country, and a mass of valuable information on the scientific values of various foods, dietary, etc., which we can only briefly

notice. His theory as to the position and prospects of the country is summed up in the statement that in the generation which by the close of this century will have passed since the end of the civil war, "greater progress will have been made in the way of material welfare than in any preceding period of the same term, and perhaps more than in any preceding century since history began to be written." He believes that the new forces placed at the disposal of mankind make this present time of more striking importance than any preceding epoch, not excepting the generation in which the steam engine was utilized, or spinning machinery invented. Previous discoveries had largely been centred on the production of clothing, and in working metals, which, important as they were and are, do not compare in importance with food of all kinds, the cost of which exceeds that of clothing by three to one, or even more. In the last 20 years discoveries and inventions have been mainly directed to the increased production and cheap distribution of grain and meat, with a corresponding effect on human welfare.

Amongst the improvements in production and distribution he names, first, the extension of railways. Prior to 1865 the railway mileage of the U. S., was less than 34,000, consisting chiefly of detached and local lines. Now the mileage is 125,000 consolidated into great systems, and worked with an efficiency and economy unknown elsewhere. One half of the traffic over these roads consists of food for man or beast. The grain crop of 1865 measured 1,127 million bushels, for 1884 2,981 millions, while that of 1885 will probably exceed 3,000 millions, over 50 bushels per head. It is the railway that makes the transportation of this food possible, beyond a few miles of the place of growth. The effect he sums up graphically: "The man who now gives up one holiday in each year and devotes it to earning wages, removes the obstruction of a thousand miles of distance in obtaining his year's supply of food. One holiday in the year devoted to work puts the mechanic of Massachusetts next door to the prairie of the West." Within the same 20 years the screw has replaced the paddle on steamers crossing the Atlantic, and the compound-engine has been perfected. The gain is this: that 35 tons of coal per day will now carry a much more capacious steamer across the Atlantic than 200 tons per day would carry then; and more than this, every pound of coal now carries thirty-two times as much cargo as could be carried thereby in the earlier days of steam navigation. All this has brought

food and clothing, at the merest trifle of expense for transportation, to the people of the most distant lands. Cheap and swift carriage, with the telegraph to set it in motion when necessary, have done away with the necessity of great stocks held together at great cost. The perfection of agricultural machinery, of methods of canning and preserving meat, fish, fruits, etc., all belong to the same period, and the food so produced in places hitherto far distant and inaccessible is at the very doors of all the world. Without railroads and steamships the grain of the prairies, the wool of Australia, the meat of South America would rot where they grow.

But, great as the progress has been, Mr. Atkinson finds a reverse to the picture in the fact that, notwithstanding all this prosperity, the average product of each person in the community does not exceed 50 to 55 cents per head, and that the whole accumulated wealth of the United States, aside from land, does not exceed, at the utmost, three years' production. After the necessary provisions for Government, and for maintenance of capital, only 40 cents per head per day is available for each person, man, woman, or child. The great drawback to the minute subdivision of labor, which is one of the factors in cheap production, is the absence in the individual of that handiness, that ability to turn himself to any other occupation, which would save him in the event of his part in the social machinery being found unnecessary. To remedy this better education is necessary, and this is only possible now with a decrease in the cost of living.

The general conclusions arrived at on all these points are as follows:—The applications of science to agriculture, crude as they yet are, have assured an excessive abundance in ratio to any possible increase of population during the present century. The cost of distribution by land and by water has been reduced to such a point that there is little margin left to work on for further saving. In the conversion of crude materials into finished forms the field for improvement is still a broad one. In wholesale traffic there is no longer any great margin to be saved, and even in the retail distribution of staple articles the smallest profits suffice. In the science of consumption almost no progress has been made. It is only within a recent period that even statistics have been gathered, and the beginning of a true study of the chemistry of food and the science of nutrition dates within the twenty years under discussion.

The practical portion of the address we must reserve for another article.

#### THE STOCK MARKET.

The difficulty in finding employment for money, which has been making itself felt for some time, has had the natural effect of increasing the value of bank and other stocks. So far as this is the result of actual investment, the improvement is natural and wholesome, but, so far as it is caused by the facilities which the low rates for call money afford for carrying stocks in margin, it contains elements of instability, which may ere long make themselves felt. The marked improvement in the value of call money in New York, which shows every sign of continuing and of bringing rates to a still higher level, is likely to lead to the withdrawal of a good deal of floating money from this market, in which case a diminished supply here and an increase in local rates is inevitable, and a consequent depreciation in the prices for stocks which are to any extent carried on borrowed money.

It may be said that the diminished profits of the banks and other companies do not justify higher prices for their stocks, but this influence is more than counterbalanced by the increased demand for good investments and the appreciation of choice securities. We recently noted the same movement with respect to the English joint-stock banks, and in Canada the increased value of all municipal bonds is directly in point. These securities a few years ago could be bought to pay from  $5\frac{1}{2}$  to 6 per cent, according to quality; a year ago they were bringing a price equivalent to  $5\frac{1}{4}$  to  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent, while the more recent sales for some of the smaller cities and larger towns bring in less than 5 p. c. to the investors. This is apart from Montreal and Toronto, whose recent loans have brought much higher prices than ever before. Some increase in the value of stocks is therefore natural, especially in those which, although earning diminished profits, are able to maintain dividends without impairing their savings. We have serious doubts whether present prices are not held above this natural level.

The main topic on the street at present is the deal in City Passenger, and transactions to the extent of three-fourths of the whole stock at once might well cause a commotion amongst those interested, but it is after all a matter of no special importance to the world at large.

The *Herald* had a strong—if not wise—article on this subject in a late issue, which we refer to merely to condemn the

loose statements in which it indulges. We doubt much whether a single instance can be found of a bank suffering from a crash in the price of some stock to such an extent that an attack on its credit has followed with wholesale disaster as the final outcome, yet our neighbor says that "history repeats itself," and that this is what "very often" happens. We do not approve of the manipulation of stocks, nor of bankers lending money "on securities which they must know are being held at prices not warranted by the condition of business," but we have been under the impression that all prudent bankers shared the same opinion. We are afraid the *Herald's* well-meant advice is unnecessary with the prudent, and wasted on those otherwise inclined.

#### THE OUTLOOK ABROAD.

The monetary position in England shows the same signs of an approaching tightening in rates, with the same oversupply of funds for the moment that we have noticed during the past week. A drain of gold to Germany has been going on steadily, and there was every sign of an imminent increase in the bank rate, but no change has been made. The bank, however, kept the market nearer its own level by borrowing on its securities, the extent to which this took place being estimated at 2 to 3 millions. In consequence of this the rates for bills rose from 1 1-8 and  $1\frac{1}{4}$  to 1 7-8, while at the present writing 2 per cent is being charged generally. But notwithstanding this bankers are evidently not looking for much increase in the near future, since 6 months' bills are done at 3-8 to  $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent over three months' bills. This is equivalent to an expected increase at the end of the three months of  $\frac{1}{4}$  to 1 per cent.

In New York the money market has been characterized by a steady improvement in the rates for call money. There have been several flurries lately near the closing of the Board, and 6 and 7 and, on one day, 10 per cent were the closing rates, but this brought out such a full offering of money that rates receded below the normal level. As we have before stated these flurries, though merely accidental, are pretty certain indications of a shorter supply of funds and a higher loaning rate generally. They are only possible when the market is becoming more active. The reduction of the surplus funds of the associated banks still steadily continues.

The increase in the business of the New

York Stock Exchange is very marked, and the clearing house returns, which may be taken as a fair test of the activity of business, indicate a much increased volume of transactions. The total amount of the Clearing House Exchanges throughout the country in October are reported by the N. Y. *Chronicle* as \$953,000,000 in excess of those of the same month in 1884, a gain of 27 per cent.

The position of the U. S. Treasury as an element in the financial status of the country is well worth noting. Some months ago when the New York banks came to the relief of the Treasury its gold holdings, in excess of the hundred-million reserve for legal tenders, had fallen off to \$35,000,000, and the proportion of silver received in payment of revenue was so large that it was a mere question of time when the treasury gold would be exhausted and silver payments resorted to, a disaster of the greatest magnitude.

The banks paid in gold for fractional silver coin to avert any immediate danger, but the Treasury now holds nearly \$70,000,000 in gold over the legal-tender reserve, and last week redeemed most of the fractional silver then taken by the banks. So far as this has been accomplished by a change of policy, it is due to the cessation of the forced circulation of silver certificates by the Treasury, and the stoppage of the issue of bills under five dollars. These measures have prevented any excess in silver certificates in the hands of the people, which, under the former practice, found their way back through the customs duties, in lieu of gold. In April, 1885, 41 per cent of the customs duties in New York were paid in silver certificates, in September 9.8 per cent, and in October 11.3 per cent were in currency.

The Sterling Exchange market in New York has exhibited no signs of life. Rates are practically unchanged, and, owing to the uncertainty as to the bank rate in England, bill drawers have been averse to doing much in any way. The supply of bills has been only fair.

One of the features of the past week was the meeting of the presidents of the trunk line rail roads to discuss and close the agreement as to rates, in accordance with the resolutions adopted at previous meetings. Great harmony and unanimity prevailed, and the agreement which is a very elaborate document, was closed and signed. This was one of the causes which tended to sustain the buoyant tone of the stock market.

The export of cotton to Europe is proceeding in a satisfactory way as to quan-

tity the record up to the close of last week standing thus :

In general trade some lines report a lull in the business done during October, while others are showing signs of more life than for a long time past. On the whole, the improved tone is very fairly maintained.

**AGRICULTURE IN GREAT BRITAIN.**—The returns published by the Agricultural Department for 1885 contain the usual information as to the acreage under cultivation, live stock, etc., throughout the United Kingdom. We learn from them that the area under cultivation has increased by about 50,000 acres. The grain area has decreased very considerably as regards wheat, which is not unexpected. The areas occupied by other crops are not much changed, except those used for clover, etc., and grasses under rotation, where an increase of 350,000 acres is shown. The latter is no doubt due in part to the spread of the system of ensilage, partly to other causes connected with the drought in the fall of 1884.

The most striking feature in the return is the increase in cattle, sheep, and poultry, the figures being 445,000, 709,000, and 995,000 respectively. On the other hand, pigs have decreased 219,000. The figures are, on the whole, considered very satisfactory.

**MUNICIPAL GAS SUPPLY.**—From the *Economist* we learn that the returns of the receipts and expenditures, of the English local authorities which supply gas to their own citizens show a fair profit over and above all working expenses, charges for interest, etc. The total indebtedness for municipal gas undertakings was £18,758,900, the gross earnings £4,334,100, and the net revenue £1,267,700. After paying all interest charges, annuities, and providing for sinking funds, there remained £372,900 as net profit for the 12 months. The prices are of course fixed so as to make the works self-sustaining and provide for contingencies, and not to make a profit. But as the average price at which the gas was supplied to consumers was less than 3s. 4d. per thousand, there seems no room for complaint on either score.

**STOCK EXCHANGE QUOTATIONS.**—An effort is being made to induce the governing body of the London Stock Exchange to permit entries of sales on the official list at actual rates, instead of the nearest fractional sixteenth of a pound. It is claimed that the present system affects injuriously the smaller stocks and shares, and leads to friction between brokers and their clients. The English system of quoting prices at so much per share is not nearly as convenient as the American plan of quoting prices per cent, and is wholly answerable for the difficulties now attempted to be overcome.

#### ENDORSEMENT GUARANTEED.

Of all the minor troubles which afflict the banking community, the question of the regularity of endorsements and the necessity or otherwise of a special guarantee, is probably the one which gives rise to most friction.

The rule which prevails here is to seek for a guarantee of endorsement in all cases where the title to the instrument depends on an endorsement which is other than that of the party to whom it is payable, in his own proper person, and by his own hand. No bank has of course a right to demand such a guarantee, but it has a right to demand proof of the regularity of an endorsement by an agent or attorney, and to avoid the trouble and delay of providing such proof banks have adopted the system mentioned.

It is doubtful how far the law gives the protection sought with any special contract.

The general rule as to endorsements, which is well established by numerous decisions, is stated by Chalmers (*Bills of Exchange*, Art. 219).

"The endorser of a Bill by the fact of endorsing it, conclusively admits and warrants to a bona fide holder the genuineness and regularity in all respects of the drawer's signature and all previous endorsements," which would cover the ground fully as to holders, but is possibly inapplicable in the case of a Bank which, as drawee of a check, has paid it.

The limitation of the guarantee of endorsement to such cases as those we have mentioned seems to us somewhat illogical, since no such special precaution is taken to guard against forged endorsements. These are of course always regular as to form, but the effect of the forged endorsement is just the same as that of an unauthorized endorsement by one holding himself out as an agent, in either case the title to the document does not pass.

This subject has been recently discussed a good deal amongst American Bankers, and we quote from the *Bankers Magazine* the following view, which seems to be the prevailing one. The law as to notes and cheques, it need scarcely be said, is much alike in both countries :

"The contract of the indorser of a check is in general a contract with subsequent holders . . . but the indorsement is not evidence of any Contract with the bank on which it is drawn, and when the check is paid by the drawee it has performed its office, and the liability of the indorser, as such, is at an end. If a bank pays a check bearing an endorsement either forged or unauthorized, so that the party presenting the cheque has no title to it . . . the Bank may often recover the amount so paid from the party to whom it has paid it . . . as money paid without consideration, but the right to recover in such a case is entirely independent of the fact that the party receiving payment may have endorsed the cheque . . .

If no special guaranty is given to the paying bank it has no remedy, in case the payment is disputed by its depositor [*i.e.*, the drawer of the cheque], except against the party to whom it has paid the money on the cheque, and this is a remedy which is at best a very uncertain one."

Since there appears to be a doubt, prudence requires that the safe course should be taken,



but the existing practice is one which, if possible, should be dropped.

In the New York clearing house there is a tacit understanding among the Associated Banks that each will be responsible for the previous endorsements on notes and cheques for which it receives payment; and this rule, which has worked very satisfactorily there, might well be adopted here.

**COMPLETION OF THE C.P.R.**—The last connecting rail on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway was laid early on Saturday the 7th inst., Hon. Donald A. Smith driving the last spike. Among those present during the interesting event, which was devoid of ceremony, and who arrived at the "gap" on the first through train from Montreal were Messrs. W. C. Van Horne, Sanford Fleming, Harris, of Blake Bros., Boston; Henry Abbott, Manager of Lake Shore construction; J. M. Edgar, James Ross, manager of construction; M. J. Haney, superintendent British Columbia Division; H. G. Taylor, master of transportation; Major Rogers, H. L. Rogers, F. P. Brothers, Mr. Todd and J. A. Hickey, Government Inspecting Engineer. After congratulations had been exchanged the train passed over the connecting link on its way to the Pacific, chips from the last tie having been gathered up as mementoes of the occasion. The completion of the line has been signaled by numerous congratulatory messages addressed to Sir John Macdonald and Mr. George Stephen, president of the company, Her Majesty the Queen being the first to congratulate Sir John and Mr. Stephen and, through them, the people of Canada on the final accomplishment of the great undertaking. We append some of these despatches, those to the Premier and the President, from the Queen, being couched in much the same terms.

OTTAWA, November 6, 1885.

To the President Canadian Pacific Railway:

I am desired by His Excellency the Governor-General to acquaint you that he has received Her Majesty's command to convey to the people of Canada her congratulations on the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Her Majesty has watched its progress with much interest, and hopes for the future success of a work of such value and importance to the Empire.

**EXPORTS FROM MONTREAL.**—As the season of navigation draws near its close a retrospective glance at the volume of our exports may not be out of place. The live-stock trade has prospered, so far as horned cattle are concerned, but exports of sheep have decreased, due to the large supplies of cheap mutton reaching Great Britain from other sources. The shipments of cattle have reached 60,782, an increase of 5,261 head compared with 1884, of 11,194 over 1883 and of 33,063 over 1882. The exports of sheep were 38,755, a decrease of 18,908 compared with 1884, of 48,294 from 1883, and of 21,410 from 1882. Exports of beef have been 14,040 quarters, against 15,167 in 1884, 16,863 in 1883, and 30,916 in 1882. The export trade in flour has fallen below that of any of the preceding three years, the shipments being 591,292 bbls, against 732,184 in 1884, 683,732 in 1883, and 670,999 in 1882. The export figures for grain allow of a few interesting comparisons. Wheat shows the slight increase of 512,761 bushels for the past season over the shipments of 1884, but, as compared with 1883 and 1882, there is a falling off: the total this year to recent date is 4,053,883 bushels. The most gratifying feature of the grain movement is the steady increase in the exports of peas and oats, which are peculiarly the produce of Canada and not, as in the case of wheat and corn, largely augmented by consignments coming from the Western States for through shipment. Peas reach a total of 2,020,690 bushels, an increase of 538,485 bushels over last year and oats 1,358,290, an increase of 1,131,945, the exports of oats in 1884 being only 226,345 bushels. Corn, barley and rye all show diminished volume compared with the three preceding years. The total shipments of grain have been 9,738,359 bushels against 8,754,750 in 1884, an increase this year of 983,609 bushels. A steady increase is noticeable in the movement of oat and corn meal, which has been exported this year to the extent of 100,133 bbls. Exports of ashes reached 4,526 bbls, a decrease of nearly 2,000 bbls.

Butter has gone forward to the extent of 88,029 pkgs, against 113,474 in 1884, 121,436 in 1883, and 103,064 in 1882. Cheese compares as follows:—1885, 1,049,631 boxes; 1884, 1,087,745; 1883, 867,486; 1882, 708,191. Shipments of pork, 16,580 bbls, an increase of about 3,000 bbls over last year; lard 17,146 pkgs, a decrease of 5,841; beef 1,896 bbls, an increase of 591; dressed hogs, 1,253, a decrease of 264; tallow 1,246 bbls, a shortage of 7,463; petroleum 5,213 bbls, an increase of 433; leather 7,943 rolls, an increase of 709; hams and bacon, 62,792 pkgs. An increase for this year of 5,973. The total shipments of lumber from Montreal to South America during this year were 26,465,543 feet of pine and 467,828 pieces small stowage. The shipments from all St. Lawrence ports for 1884 were 36,938,548 feet; for 1883, 18,768,652 feet; for 1882, 24,419,827 feet; for 1881, 16,147,941 feet; and for 1880, 10,420,080 feet. On October 20, 402,599 feet of pine were shipped for the West Coast of South America. From other ports on the St. Lawrence, this season, the exports were 54,000 feet of pine and 4,825 feet of spruce. Total shipments from the St. Lawrence to South America in 1885:—pine and spruce, 31,344,543 feet; small stowage 526,828 pieces. The exports of apples from this city, to the close of last week, amounted to 39,424 bbls, as against 50,732 to same date last year. These figures will be largely increased by heavy shipments on later steamers. The total from the ports of Montreal, New York, Boston and Halifax have been 289,203 bbls, against 288,865 to similar date last year.

The price of the stock on October 31st, 1884, was 189½; on October 31st, 1885, 205, or equal to an advance of \$32 per share. During the six months ending with October last, the Bank had the advantage of the large transactions with the Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway, their loans in June to the Government and corporations.

The *Star* reporters are not slow. Last Monday afternoon a writ was issued for the arrest of Mr. Ahearn, manager of the Montreal office of the Mutual Reserve Life of New York *vice* "Major" John Hopper, to whom reference was made at some length last week. The writ was issued at the instance of James Baxter, not a broker, who it appears, by virtue of power of attorney from the Major to Mr. Ahearn, favored the latter with a trifle of money on the acceptance of one Walker, the agent of the Mutual Fund Life of New York at Sherbrooke, Que. The agent refused to honor the draft, alleging it to have been merely an "accommodation" to the "Major." Mr. Ahearn happened to be at Longueuil across the river



when the writ was issued, and as it could not be served on him that evening, the first intimation he had of the action was through the *Star*, of the same evening. He denied the whole affair by telegraph addressed to the *Gazette*, but on his arrival in the city he soon perceived the advisability of surrendering himself. He furnished bail. The charge is for obtaining money under false pretences. Mr. Ahearn's letter to the "Major" after the arrival of the latter in Boston did as much credit to his head as to that organ said to be the seat of feeling.

#### THE DOMINION SAFETY FUND LIFE ASSOCIATION.

(COMMUNICATED.)

There is undoubtedly a large section of the population seeking the protection of life insurance, but unable or unwilling to pay the price necessarily required by the level-premium or reserve-accumulating method. To meet this natural and legitimate "demand" there is unfortunately an unlimited "supply" of ill-digested, inequitable, often fraudulent, and always unsafe and ephemeral, *post-mortem* assessment schemes. While actuaries and insurance experts have long contended that a system calculated to meet fairly and fully the legitimate want above referred to is possible and inevitable in the near future, no scheme yet presented seemed to combine the necessary elements of security, stability, equity and economy.

In 1881 the Dominion Safety Fund Life Association of St. John, N.B., was organized, possessing several features of unusual excellence, and giving undoubted evidence of an honest and intelligent desire to solve the question. Its status was at once rendered distinct from its competitors by its deposit of \$50,000 with the Dominion Government, and the obtaining of a license under Government inspection. It presented, however, the fatal defect of regulating the cost of insurance on the basis of post-mortem assessments. Two years experience proved sufficient to open the eyes of the management to the dangerous and inequitable effects of such a method, and by a direct and candid appeal to the intelligence of the assured, the evil, by mutual consent, was abolished. A basis of cost of insurance was agreed upon, founded upon a most careful, thorough, and painstaking investigation of the whole subject as revealed by the latest statistics embracing the experience of the entire northern portion of the continent. This change in the system of Dominion Safety Fund Life Association, has rendered it by far the most perfect approximation to the ideal of the actuaries, now before the public, and has secured its enrolment as a "regular" company by the Department.

We believe it has definitely solved the problem of the safe and cheap insurance of the future, and marks a new departure in the history of life insurance.

There is room in the Dominion for both systems, the old and the new, each of which has its own peculiar advantages; and there can be no hesitation in directing the attention of those

seeking the cheaper form to the many admirable and secure features of this Association for obtaining life insurance at cost.

A GENTLEMAN who visited the Argentine Republic in 1865 has just received an evidence of the growth of that interesting country in the shape of a trade letter which shows the business done at the port of Rosario in August last. This city, situated on the River Plate, bears almost the same relation to Buenos Ayres, as regards position, as Montreal does to Quebec, and has a large and increasing population. The arrivals for the month were 36 steamships and sailing vessels, mostly from British, French and German ports with general cargoes. The clearances were 35; and on September 1st, 13 ships were in port, discharging or loading. One steamer bound for Liverpool took 108,200 kilos of wheat, 524,040 of linseed, 961,400 of maize, and 7,280 of barley; and another to the same port was freighted with 6,200 dry hides and 857,500 kilos of maize. Five other steamers had like cargoes for Liverpool. A steamer for Hamburg took 500 dry hides, 966 salted hides, 24 bales of wool, 12,800 kilos of linseed, 248,300 of maize, 80,000 of bran, and 470 pkgs of alloy. A cargo for Barcelona and Marseilles was made up of 13,772 dry hides, 1,809 salted hides, 6 bales of wool, 44 bales of goat skins, 660,400 kilos of wheat, 156,000 of maize and 3,600 of horns. Flour, tallow, horse hides, kips, feathers, honey, etc., are as yet tabulated under the head of "Sundries"—all the flour for the month, 230,300 kilos was sent to Rio Grande. Several vessels completed their loading at Buenos Ayres. The total exports for the month were as follows:—Hides, dry and salted, 47,135; wool, 20 bales; sheepskins, 200 do; goat-skins, 175 do; hair, 76 do; wheat, 1,313,350 kilos; linseed, 615,980; maize, 5,379,110; bran 80,000; silver bars, 24; alloy 2,348 pkgs; bones 441,000 kilos; horns, 33,200 do, and hay 4,643 bales. The writer of the letter says:—On account of the depressed and unsettled state of the Money Market, and the scarcity of suitable tonnage, very little business has been done during the month past. I note a little improvement in rates and demand for vessels for hay for Brazil, also for vessels for bones for the United States. The Montreal gentleman who put us in possession of the above states, that in 1865, during his visit, the Republic was importing flour for home consumption, now it is a large exporter of cereals.

NONA SCOTIA APPLES AND POTATOES.—The potato disease in the Upper Provinces and the consequent advance in prices will prove advantageous to our Maritime kingsfolk who have raised a heavy crop this year. They are also likely to find a profitable market in Great Britain for their celebrated varieties of apples. The *Acadian*, a paper published at Wolfville, N.S., says:—Apples are being shipped to England in large quantities and are also going off pretty lively to local markets. T. H. A. Pitt, from Bermuda, is on hand again this year, and will take eleven or twelve hundred barrels of potatoes home with him. Messrs. Caldwell & Murray are loading some three or four thousand bushels for Messrs. Meily & Co., which go to Montreal. The regular trains being unable to handle the work, specials are out every day taking heavy trains of loaded cars east and returning with heavy trains of empty cars. We are pleased to see the potatoes get a start, as there is an immense quantity of them in this country. We are also glad to see a slight improvement in price for them, and hope they will still go up a little higher. The railway has cut

the freight down to \$15 per car from this station to Halifax or Annapolis and \$13.20 per car to Windsor Junction, which enables shippers to pay a little better price for them. Farmers would like to get twenty-five cents a bushel for their potatoes, and when they get up to that they will pile them in.

The project of connecting Prince Edward Island with the mainland by a tunnel under the Straits of Northumberland is being stoutly advocated by Senator Howland, and others, who have already obtained the opinion of eminent American & Canadian engineers on the subject. The tunnel will be eight miles in length, and will be large enough to admit of a train of cars passing from shore to shore. Among others, Prof. Bull, of the New York University, and H. H. Hall, of the New York Submarine Tunnel and Tube Co., have personally inspected the site, and united in expressing their approval of the practicability of the scheme. Some experts place the cost at \$2,000,000, but others think it would range from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000. The advocates of the scheme state that an offset to the Government subsidy required is found in the annual outlay of some \$40,000 by the Government in steamboat and iceboat communication, which, they say, is so unsatisfactory that large additions must be made to this expenditure. It is also contended that the deficits on the Prince Edward Island railway would be diminished by the continuous and regular communication the tunnel would provide. The saving in these two matters would it is claimed, be at least \$80,000 a year, or a sum equal to the interest on \$2,000,000.

The business men of Waterloo, Ont., have formed themselves into an association "to communicate with and facilitate the coming of persons desirous of opening up new factories or industries, to stimulate a feeling of union and progress, to arrange for more frequent markets, for the systematic cash trade in farmers' produce, &c.—An Ingersoll, Ont., contemporary says:—Large quantities of grain are being marketed at present. This ought to put into circulation a considerable quantity of money. The farmers are also disposing of large numbers of sheep and hogs, for which there is a ready sale, but the prices are low.—Farmers say that on account of the low price of apples, and lack of demand for any but first-class keeping fruit, thousands of bushels of inferior apples will be allowed to rot this season, or will be fed to the hogs. Farmers would find it profitable to have them converted into cider, on which a handsome profit can be made if promptly preserved; if their principles are opposed to cider as a beverage, good cider vinegar is always in request, and is not nearly so abundant as the interests of public demand. Cider jelly, and which is clear cider boiled down to a solid jelly, pays well for its manufacture, and is a treasure to the housekeeper. Set the cider mill and the evaporating kettle going.

Last week, mention was made of an interesting collection of vegetables from distant Gaspé exhibited in Quebec. Since then a quantity of vegetables and specimens of tree life have reached the same city from the Island of Anticosti, some of which have been forwarded to England. Speaking of the later arrivals the *Chronicle* says:—Of the vegetables



records are not efficiently studied; if so it is difficult to understand how men can go through a regular routine of fires and insolvencies and continue to get credit and policies; just as difficult to understand as it would be to comprehend why a man should be trusted with a life policy who had made several attempts at suicide; you do not find the latter, why should you find the former?

If "inspection is a voluntary acceptance of responsibility which belongs to the insured," or, if inspection is after notice, which allows everything to be in review order at the time of inspection, then it should be avoided as both unwise and useless, but surely "Reform" knows that efficient inspection assumes no responsibilities, gives no warning of its time—prevents many losses, avoids many bad risks—and would be less worthy if done by one for the whole, than if done by each inspector for his own company solely—and would, by warning the whole, prevent rejected risks from obtaining insurances. Surely Reform knows that the causes of fires are seldom found by fire inquests; in fact, fire inquests, like one at London a year or two ago, are held for the purpose of preventing the discovery of the facts.

If Reform will study the reports of the North Western Association for the year 1878 he will find a valuable record of a discussion of valued policy-laws and over-insurance and remedies. If the companies had then taken the stand in Wisconsin which they have now taken in New Hampshire they would have heard no more of valued policy-laws; and if they had then driven out of the ranks all the shyster insurance agents they would have had no more trouble as to the removal of cases from State to United States courts; but it is too often the fact that because an agent—by practices which are productive of losses—secures an enormous business, he is encouraged in malpractice instead of being driven from the ranks;—consequently, by causes which are easily controllable by insurance managers, fire losses are increased disproportionately to income from fire premiums and the fire insurance companies need not look outside for help until they purge the rank from bad agents, insist upon complete applications from the applicant for insurance, apply an equitable tariff efficiently, use the same discretion and ability as is required in every other profession, and adjust all claims for loss without fear or favor.

No one or two managers can successfully grapple with these difficulties because more than one or two other managers will take advantage of any attempts or reform to decry the acts of Reformers. The "other fellow" is always the "bad man," "We" are always liberal with other peoples' money; "We" do not insist on informations from and obligations on the part of our patrons; "We" think the other fellow "a crank" or "has a hobby" to ride or wants to "upset the tariff;" whilst "He" declares that he is desirous of seeing fire insurance elevated to the dignity of life insurance, and as worthy of respect and of justice as any other profession.

**Financial.**

THURSDAY EVENING, Nov. 12th, 1885.

There is nothing to note that is new in the financial position locally since last week. Money still continues in full supply, and rates are unchanged, but there are not wanting indications that the better demand in New York will reflect itself on the rates for call money here before long. If the currency uncertainty

caused by the silver coinage were removed we are satisfied that an immediate transfer of considerable magnitude would be made, but this contingency makes our leading banks chary of increasing their New York holdings. Business has been fairly active but the diminished values of commodities shows itself in the lessened volume of the bills offered for discount. The Bank of Montreal has issued its profit and loss statement for the past half year, which is regarded by bankers as a satisfactory showing. In the absence of any serious losses during the period it covers, a larger balance might have been looked for; in this respect it reflects the lower rates and lessened demand for money that have prevailed. In New York, rates for call money have improved at least one per cent, and higher rates are looked for in the very near future. The steady decrease in the surplus of the New York banks over the legal reserve proceeds with striking regularity, and this with the looker for improvement in England gives a firm tone to the market. that it has long lacked. Sterling Exchange is dull, but lower; it still keeps a little above the specie point, and there are large purchases for cover yet to be made. In England the long expected rise in the bank rate was made to-day, the rate being now 3 per cent. The quotations for call loans here are 3 to 4 per cent, discounts 6 to 7 per cent. In New York 2½ to 3½ for call 4 to 5 on time. London street rate 2 to 2½ per cent. Sterling in New York: opened at 4.86 and 4.83½, and closed easier at 4.85½ and 4.83. On account of the holiday there was no market for sterling here. The stock market during the week has been quiet but generally firm. To-day, being Thanksgiving day, there was no session of the Board. On Wednesday the principal interest centred in Canadian Pacific, which advanced an additional 1½ to 54, with final sales at 53½. The sales were 1,878 shares, against 1,881 the previous day. Montreal fell off ½ per cent to 206 for regular and 201½ for ex-dividend. Small sales of Merchants were made at 118½. Commerce was dealt in at 130, and at 127 for ex-dividend. Ontario was placed at 108½. Jacques Cartier sold at 72. Federal was offered at 103, and Hochelaga at 79, with 75 bid. City Passenger was weak and depressed, selling at 122 in the afternoon. Gas changed hands at 194 to 194½. Richelieu sold ¼ lower at 59½, and Northwest Land was firmer at 45. Cotton stocks and bonds were unchanged. MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY, Nov. 12, 1885.

The weather has again been a draw-back to trade in some lines, and there is no change in the general situation. The season of navigation will be over in a week or so, in fact there are now few vessels to leave. In leading staples a fair trade is expected as soon as wintry weather sets in.

ASHES.—Receipts for November have been moderate. Sales of First Pots have been made down to \$3.65. Seconds \$3.15. Pearls—are quite nominal at about \$5 for Firsts. Market is quiet, owing to advance in freight and the early closing of river navigation. Receipts since 1st January, 4,795 brls. Pots, 353 brls. Pearls. Deliveries, 5,040 brls. Pots, 417 brls. Pearls. Stock in store at 6 o'clock on Wednesday evening, 1,211 brls. Pots, 143 brls. Pearls.

CANNED GOODS.—Tomatoes are firm; they have been sold in round lots at \$1.30 net and \$1.35 is now asked. Lobsters \$5.65 to \$5.75 per case; mackerel, \$2.75 to \$3; sardines, fine \$10.50 to \$11; common, \$9.50; salmon, per doz. \$1.25 to \$1.30; spiced salmon \$3; finnan haddies \$1.25; Hoegg roast beef \$1.95 per 2-lb tin; tomatoes, \$1.15 to \$1.20; pie peaches, \$1.90; corn, \$1.20 to 1.80, the latter for Portland packing; peas, \$1.25; new strawberries per dozen, \$3; raspberries, \$1.75.

COAL AND WOOD.—A good business continues to be done in American anthracite at following prices:—American anthracite in ordinary distributing lots, stove, \$6.50; chestnut, \$6.25; egg and furnace, \$6. Cape Breton, \$3.25 to \$3.50; Pictou, \$3.75; Scotch steam, \$4 to \$4.25; Welsh anthracite, \$4.90. Cordwood—Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4. Wharf prices about 50c lower. Advice from Philadelphia state that the anthracite coal trade continues active, and the general position is favorable to sellers. The Reading Company advanced prices 10 to 25 cents per ton for broken, store and egg sizes for outside shipment.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.—Butter has ruled dull and easier, and with no export demand even, at present prices, greater weakness may be expected. We reduce our quotations. Cheese has been weaker, and some lots under pressure to sell went at lower prices. The prices in Liverpool declined to 48s. The Allan Grove Cheese Combination has closed out the balance of their season's make, amounting to 15,000 boxes, to a Liverpool house, and some of the lot has been shipped. The terms of the sale were not made public, but the amount of money involved probably reaches \$100,000. It was estimated that other sales were made on

Y., this week.—Sales of cheese were 1,350 boxes at 8½c; 3,160 at 8½c; 1,000 at 9c; 15 at 9½c; 420 at 9½c; 525 at 9 3-8c; 50 at 9½c; and 2,375 consigned. The market was off ½c from last week and dull. At Little Falls sales of cheese were 137 boxes at 8½c; 3,800 at 9c; 1,839 at 9½c; 1,275 were consigned; and 850 boxes farm dairy at 8c to 9½c; also 117 packages dairy butter at 20c to 22½c. *Provisions.*—No material change in hog products. Fresh eggs in cases 20c to 22c; held stock, 18c to 20c.

*DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.*—Trade has kept to about former proportions; and vaccine and disinfectants are being distributed far and wide. Quinine continues firm and gum arabic has advanced about 5 cents per lb. Lemon, orange and bergamot oils have recently advanced, and may, in consequence of a small crop, go still higher. Opium, citric acid and morphine are firm; glycerine easier. In heavy chemicals there has been some slight increase in demand, but no change in prices. Dye stuffs.—Cutch, 7½c to 8c; sumac, \$90 to \$100 per ton for prime brands; extract of logwood, 7½c; chip logwood, 1½ to 2c; archil, 27c to 30c per lb. for concentrated.

*FLOUR AND GRAIN.*—The demand for flour has been slightly more active, a fair local business being done in small lots. Choice patents sold at \$5, and low grade bags down to \$1.00. Superior was offered at \$4.30, and extra sold at \$4.25. Two cars of medium strong bakers sold at \$4.40 and one car Manitoba strong bakers at \$5. Other recent sales were 125 brls. fancy at \$4.20, 125 brls. extra at \$4.25, and 125 brls. spring extra at \$4.15. *Grain.*—Trade has been slow and of a jobbing character. Export statistics for the season will appear in a separate article. It is hoped that a larger shipping business will be transacted in future years. The first of the C. P. R. elevators at this port, to contain 500,000 bushels, will shortly be finished. Our quotations elsewhere show little change. The following was telegraphed from Chicago to-day:—The line of "shorts" in wheat has been largely increased this week, and the decline does not bring out any "long" wheat; the movement in the North-west continues to fall off, and we think the market will do better. The "bears" are of opinion that any material advance would soon be followed by a large increase in the visible supply. Late advices from London and Liverpool are as follows:—Mark Lane wheat slow and corn firm. The country markets in England and France slow. Wheat in Liverpool quiet, the public cable quoted spring and red 1d. lower. Corn declined ½d to 4s 6d, and Canadian peas were unchanged at 5s 7d. In Paris wheat and flour were slow. The imports of breadstuffs into the United Kingdom last week show a decrease of 45,000 quarters wheat, a decrease of 220,000 quarters corn, a decrease of 105,000 barrels of flour, compared with the previous week; an increase of 30,000 quarters wheat, a decrease of 10,000 qrs corn, an increase of 55,000 barrels flour compared with the same time last year.

*GAME.*—Supplies of is venison and partridges have been received at commission houses, and the receipts later on promise to be large. Venison, hindquarters, 8c to 10c; partridges, per brace, 35c to 40c.

*GREEN FRUITS, ETC.*—Although shipments of apples to Europe have been large, considerable stock is on the market. Late receipts show improvement in quality, and some dealers claim that the winter fruit is generally better than

last year; we quote, fall, \$1.75 to \$2; winters, \$2.25 to \$2.50. Almeria grapes, \$5 to \$5.50 per keg. Malaga lemons, \$3 per half chest; \$6.50 per chest. Oranges \$4 to \$4.50 per box. Cocon-nuts, \$5.50 per 100. Fancy Elme figs, one lb to ten lb boxes, 13½c per lb. *Vegetables.*—Spanish onions, \$4 per case; Canadian in brls, \$2 to \$2.25. Sweet potatoes \$3 per brl. Quebec turnips, 50c per bag, \$1 per brl.

*GROCERIES.*—The amount of business transacted in the various lines was not large. Considerable interest was taken in a trade-sale of fruit yesterday. All the Valencia raisins offered were closed out at 8½c to 8¾c, but wines and liquors and other goods met with poor enquiry. Malaga fruit is quoted as follows:—black basket \$3.75 to \$3.80; London layers \$3.25; layers \$2.80. Sultanas firmer; held at 7c for new fruit; 6½c was refused for a large parcel. Currants in barrels, 5½c. According to advices by last mail the market at Liverpool remains strong, and extreme prices are sustained. Currants 35s 6d to 30s, less 7s or 17s 6d f.o.b. Patras. Total crop estimate only 105,000 tons. Valencia raisins sell as landed 38s to 41s, less 7s, or 27s f.o.b. Denia. Sultanas 36s to 40s, less 7s. Malaga raisins, layers, 48 to 50 reals; loose 43 to 45 reals; Dehesa 68 to 82 reals f.o.b. Malaga. Dates are dearer, 17s 6d now demanded for second steamer and 18s per cwt, for those arrived. Walnuts 18s 6d to 20s for Cornes and 22s 6d for Marbots, fine quality, f.o.b. Bordeaux. Turkey nuts, fine 16s 6d per cwt. Almonds, Malaga—Valencia shelled 72s per cwt f.o.b. Malaga. Prunes, 11s 9d in kegs; 12s in 4 cases. Plums—18s 6d to 20s per cwt in ½ cases f.o.b. Bordenax. *Sugars* have been quiet, with sales of granulated at 6 5-8 to 6¾c and of yellows at 4 7-8c to 5½c. In New York, granulated is steady at 6 7-16c, and under a fair local and export demand the market for refined has been well sold up; raw has been dull and easy. Advices from Liverpool dated October 29, state that the advance of the previous week vanished in the absence of anticipated further reduced estimates of the beet crop. The present estimate is about 2,070,000 tons, and a further concession in price to 14s 3d has taken place. English and Scotch refined is 3d per cwt lower; Nos. 1 to 2, 12s 6d to 13s, f.o.b. Liverpool. The excess in stock of raw sugar is 19,926 tons. *Syrup and Molasses.*—There has been a large turn-over in syrups at 25c to 45c. Barbadoes molasses in lots are quoted at 27½c to 28½c but as high as 30c is asked in a jobbing way. *Teas.*—A moderate business is reported at steady prices; the demand for low grade Japans keeps up. At Liverpool the market is firm. Common congou 6½d to 7d; medium 9½d. Common young hyson 6½d to 7d; No. 2, 8½d to 9½d. Gunpowder Moyune, 11d to 1s 0½d. Lapsing Souchong, 9d per lb. Java coffees of fine descriptions have been run up to extreme figures, 98s to 108s per cwt. f.o.b. Amsterdam. *Cocoa firm.* *Spices.*—Pepper steady, 7 1-8d to 7½d for Penang and 8d for Singapore; white 10½d to 11½d; pimento 2½d to 3d; cloves 5½d to 5¾d per lb; nutmegs cheaper. *Rice* flat at 8s 6d to 8s 7½d per cwt.

*HAY, STRAW & FEED.*—The market has been quiet and steady. Choice timothy is quoted at \$11, and inferior at \$8 per 100 bundles. Straw unchanged at \$5 to \$6 as to quality. Best timothy in bales is quoted at \$15 per ton, and secondary quality at \$14. Straw per ton, pressed, \$8 to \$9. Shorts, best, \$21; ordinary \$18. Moulie, \$22, \$20 and \$18. Bran, \$16 per ton. Buckwheat, 50c. per bushel.

*HONEY.*—The receipts have been fair; sales in large lots at 10c and in small quantities at 11c.

*RAW FURS.*—There have been moderate receipts of beaver, bear, otter and mink, which were of good quality and brought current

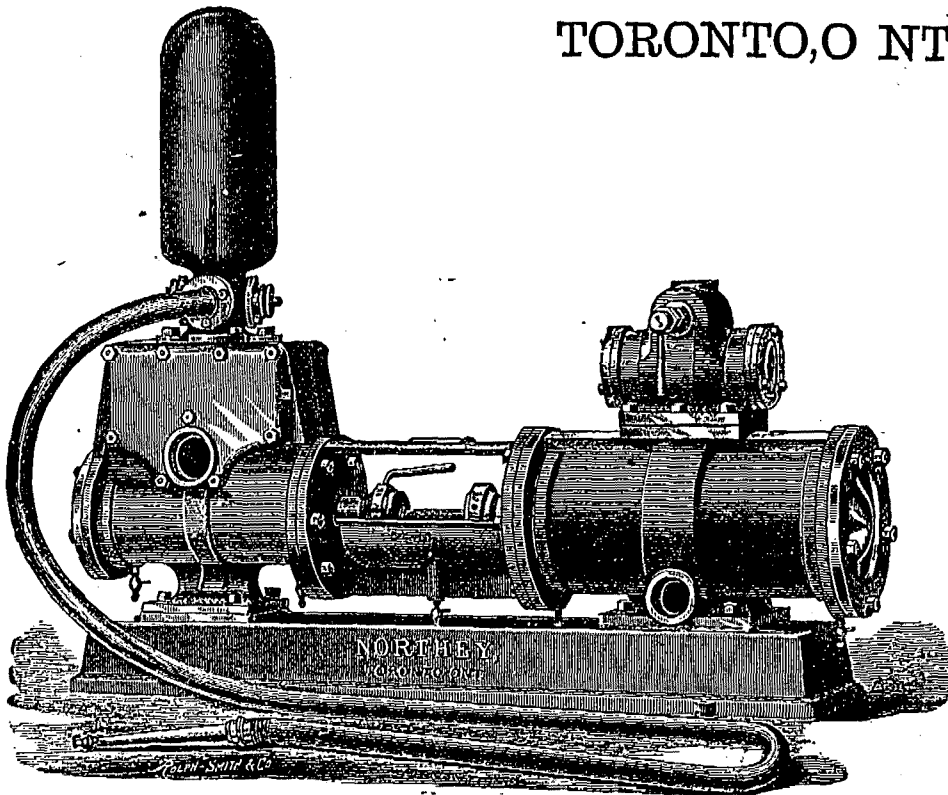

prices. The demand just now is likely to be fair; mink is depressed, but skunk will be wanted. We quote strictly prime skins as follows:—Beaver per lb., \$2.25 to \$2.75; bear, large, per skin, \$8 to \$12; bear, small, per skin, \$5 to \$7; bear, cub, per skin, \$3 to \$6; fisher, per skin, \$2.50 to \$4; otter, per skin, \$8 to \$10; lynx, per skin, \$2 to \$3; mink, per skin, 60c; marten, per skin, 50c; skunk, per skin, 25c to 50c; raccoon, per skin, 25c to 60c.

**Wool.**—A steady trade has been done since last issue at firm prices. Considerable quantities of domestic have been shipped this season from Ontario to the United States, and several fair-sized lots left from here, as before stated. The recent cargo of foreign at this port comprised 900 bales. A sale took place on the wharf of fifty bales damaged greasy Cape, ex brig Louisa, from Port Elizabeth. There was a large attendance of buyers. The sales were as follows: 6 bales at 12½c, 7 do at 14c, 6 do at 12½c, 15 do at 12½c, 9 do at 15c, and 12 do at 14c. About twenty buyers were present.

**Dry Goods.**—The recent cold spell seems to have had a beneficial effect, so far as remittances are concerned, but orders have been limited. Farmers will soon have to cease field work altogether, and will then have more leisure to trade with storekeepers. In the city, considering the inclement weather, a fair business has been accomplished, but there are still complaints from outlying districts. It is

stated that some have gone and others are about to start on the road with spring samples of Canadian manufactures. The movements of travellers have been impeded by the bad roads, or orders might have been larger; a few returned to head quarters. A wholesaler who has been turning over his books stated that September was worse than expected, but October and November not so bad; remittances showed improvement, and he had taken considerable money in the past six days. A Boston trade journal says:—The market for dry goods is very dull. This, however, need not be a cause for immediate apprehension, as the woollen mills are generally well supplied with orders for some time to come, and travelling salesmen lately returned from the manufacturing districts report the mills running on full time. Cheviots and homespuns have been sold more liberally than last year, but manufacturers who have paid no attention to fashions but turned out yards of bilious yellow, mustard brown and other goods of villainous hue for ladies' dress goods, are accumulating rather than selling their product. Cheviots, it is announced, will become gradually more prominent in the market, and manufacturers' agents seem to believe that a demand for them in large proportions is only a question of time.

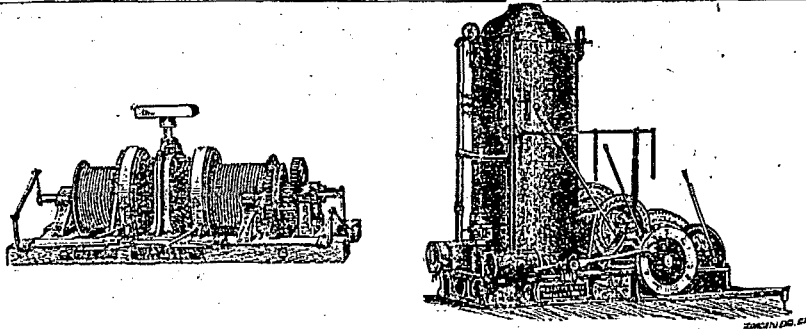
**FISH AND OILS.**—Sales of round lots of No. 1 Labrador herrings have been made at \$3; for smaller quantities \$3.25 is asked. Green cod is scarce, and some holders ask \$4.50 for No. 1 and No. 1 large; we quote \$4 to \$4.50. There are few Cape Breton herrings here, but \$3.50 is about the asking price. Dry cod is quiet, at \$3 to \$3.25 as to quality. Salmon and mackerel dull at former prices. In oils we

hear of a sale of S. R. pale sale at 48c ex-wharf quotation from warehouse 49c to 50c. Gaspe; cod is worth 51c to 52c and Halifax 48c to 50c. We quote Newfoundland cod at 55c to 57½c, but the latter is a jobbing quotation. There have been sales at 54c to arrive; now held at 55c. The stock of pure Newfoundland is small and in few hands. Several lots of cod-oil are offering as Newfoundland, but are known by the trade to be bank oil which is similar to Halifax, A in quality.

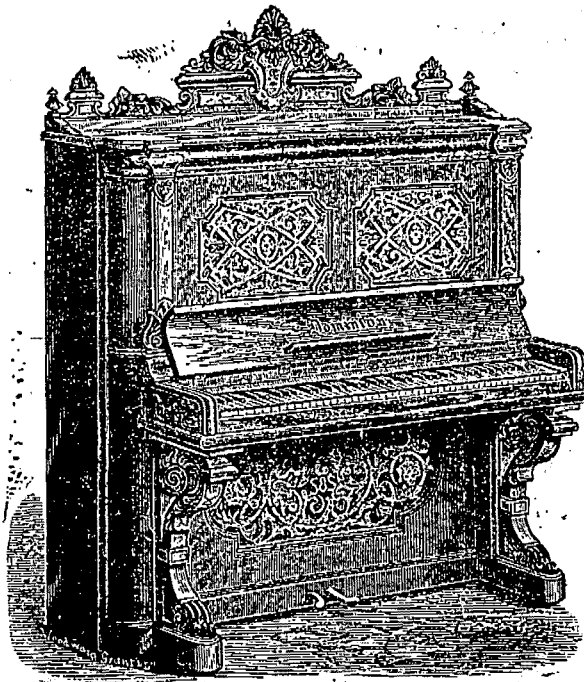
**FREIGHTS.**—The market is nominally unchanged, but a pinch is expected, as return cargoes were engaged for the wrecked steamers, Titania and Brooklyn, and they are in the market; a scramble for freight space may therefore be looked for. The season is virtually ended on the St. Lawrence. Grain to Liverpool, 3s; to Glasgow and London, 3s 6d. Cattle 35s to 50s. Phosphate 8s 6d to 10s 6d. Deals to Liverpool and Glasgow 52s 6d to 55s. Butter and cheese to direct ports, 25s per gross ton. Flour in sacks 11s 6d to 12s 6d per ton to Liverpool, London and Glasgow. Winter rates from Liverpool to Montreal have been arranged as follows:—Rice, soda, etc., 17s 6d to 20s; raisins, figs, currants, 25s to 30s; London, groceries generally, 25s; Clyde, sugar, 30s; Tyne, chemicals, 20s—all per 20 cwt. and with 10 p. c. primeage. Arrangements for shipments from London during the winter to Quebec, Montreal and Canada-West, have been made in some cases at rates below those ruling in summer.

**HIDES AND TALLOW.**—So far as hides are concerned there is little to add to previous remarks. The market is firm. The supply of

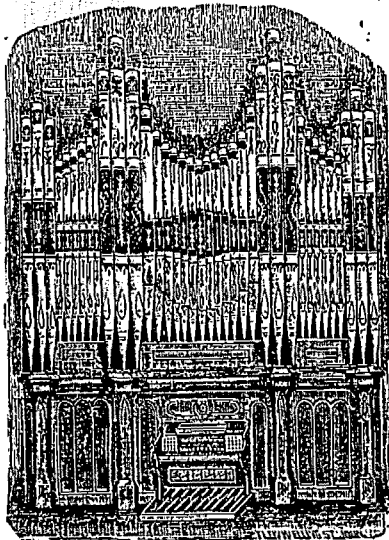

tallow at the abattoirs is said to be large, and in one direction the demand has fallen off; steamboats now using a substitute for tallow. There have been sales of rendered at 5½c, and an offer was made to shade this price for a round lot. We quote 5½c to 6½c as to quality and size of lot; rough 2½c to 3c.

**IRON AND HARDWARE.**—These markets have ruled quiet. The steamer referred to last week as reported lost was the *Titania* from Glasgow, which had considerable pig-iron on board for Montreal and the West. The *Brooklyn*, wrecked on her way here from Liverpool, had a quantity of bar iron and other metals in addition to her other cargo. Pig-iron on this market has been dull, but an average trade has been done in bar iron, tin plates, lead, etc. Large shipments of nails are being made by the last lake and river steamers. One vessel going West takes 4,000 to 5,000 kegs. Last advices from Liverpool, just to hand, state that, as regards tin and terno plates, the prices obtained for the cheaper grades of coke and steel have fallen nearly 6d per box: while this is so, a large proportion of the makers have their order-books filled for the next two months, and decline to accept orders unless they obtain late quotations. The future hinges on the question, how does the present consumption correspond with the present limited production? In finished iron there is not the slightest improvement to be seen, and with but few exceptions makers are anxious for orders. Copper dull and tin quiet. Recent cablegrams quote:—warrants 41s 7d; M. No. 3 foundry, G. M. B., 3s. 9d tin (London) £91 10s three months, futures £91; market dull. Chili bars £39; best selected copper £44-10s; soft Spanish lead £11 5s; Silesian spelter £14 5s; Hallett's antimony £35. A late report of the New York market says that the volume of business in American pig continues very good, and the market holds quite firm in tone. Consumers seem to buy only what the condition of their trade warrants, and dealers purchases are likewise governed solely by the current demand for small lots. In short, it is a case of hand-to-mouth buying generally, with the aggregate movement quite liberal and current output closely taken up. Prices are without quotable change, but very firm at \$18 to \$18 50 for No. 1 X foundry, \$16 for No. 2 X foundry, and \$15 for grey forge. Inquiries for iron for delivery next year are still on the market, but furnace men will not offer. **Steel Rails.**—There is no change in the tone of the market. There are a good many orders still in hand, and Eastern mill agents generally quote \$32 at works as the lowest rate for standard sections. Some are naming \$32 50 to \$32. A lot of 10,000 tons have been sold to a Southern road at \$34 at tide water, and a large Western order is reported at \$34.50 to \$35 in Chicago. **Lead.**—Pig lead for prompt delivery is very firm at 4.20 at 4½c, and selling in small lots at those figures. For future deliveries prices are unsettled, however, with the range of 4 to 4.19c quoted, and about 200 tons said to have been sold at the inside figures.

**LEATHER, BOOTS AND SHOES.**—The activity in the leather trade, noted last week, has continued, and several large sales are reported. The demand has spread to all lines, and is to a certain extent speculative. The manufacturers who purchased leather valued at \$50,000 to \$60,000, previously reported, have had it stacked in their storehouse, and will probably not work on it before next month. Measured leathers (buff and pebble) are fully one cent per foot higher. Sole leather, owing to advance of ½c in dry hides already mentioned, is stronger, and in splits there has been an advance in the lower grades of 1c. Some considerable sales are understood to have been made with a view of covering jobber's orders. Several boot and shoe men are believed to be

buying ahead, thinking that leather is more likely to be higher than lower, but there is also a general consumptive demand, as manufacturers report that, while the sorting trade in boots and shoes is not up to the record, business being obtained through travellers is of larger volume than expected. Shipments are being pushed forward preparatory to stock taking.

**LIVE STOCK.**—The market has improved, owing to higher cable quotations; but while freights from Boston to Liverpool have declined to 20s, freight and insurance rates from Montreal have been advanced. Insurance from here is now 4½ to 5 per cent on cattle, 8 per cent on sheep under cover, and 10 per cent on deck. Total exports this season have reached 60,782 head of cattle and 38,755 sheep. Choice cattle for export sold at 4½c to 4¼c. Sheep dull at 2¾c. Butchers' cattle 2c to 3¼c. Live hogs easier at 4½c to 4¼c. Lambs better at \$2.25 to \$3.50 each; calves \$4 to \$8 each. The heavy supplies in British markets being reduced higher prices have resulted, prime Canadian steers selling for 11c per lb, a rise of ¾c. Fair to choice were quoted at 10½c; poor to medium at 9½c; and inferior and bulls at 7c to 8½c. Dressed beef in Liverpool was cabled easier at 4½d; refrigerated beef 5½d for hindquarters and 3½d for forequarters.

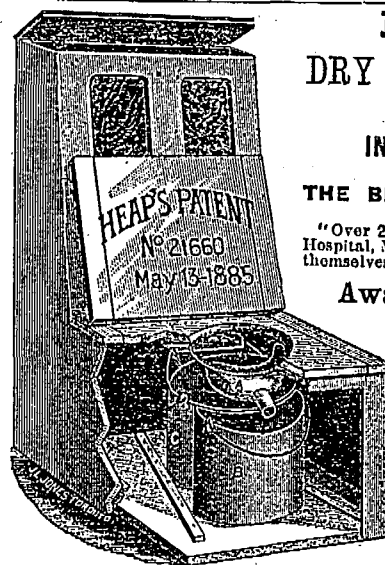

**TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.**

(Revised by Telegraph.)

TORONTO, Nov. 11, 1885.

The wholesale trade of the city is reported as moderately active, and the feeling continues of a favorable character. In all lines there is a fair consumptive demand, and stocks are being steadily reduced. Prices are maintained, and the movement in this as well as the following month is expected to be good. Payments have slightly improved. The money market is moderately active and rates unchanged. Call loans rule at 4½ to 6 per cent. on stocks and at 3½ to 4 on debentures. Time loans are quoted at 6 to 7 per cent. Commercial paper in fair supply: A 1 is discounted at 8 to 6½ and ordinary at 7 to 7½ per cent. Sterling exchange is slightly easier; 60-day bills are quoted at 108 5-8 to 108½ between banks, and demand bills at 109 to 109 1-8. The stock market has been less active, and prices somewhat irregular. There have been sales the past few days of Montreal at 202 and 202½ ex-dividend, Ontario at 109, Toronto at 189, Merchants at 118½, Commerce at 130 regular and at 127 ex-dividend.

**BUTTER.**—The market has been dull this week, and prices somewhat heavier. The demand is limited to choice qualities, which are scarce and firm at 16c to 17c in a jobbing way. Round lots of store-packed ordinary tub can be had at 10c, and medium sells in a small way at 12c to 13c. Eggs continue scarce and firm; dealers pay 20c per dozen for fresh, and sell lined at 18c. Cheese is rather easier in price; the best jobs at 9½c, and ordinary to good at 8½c to 9c.

**BOOTS AND SHOES.**—The movement just now is hardly up to expectations. There is, however, a fair sorting-up demand and prices rule firm. Factories are fairly busy.

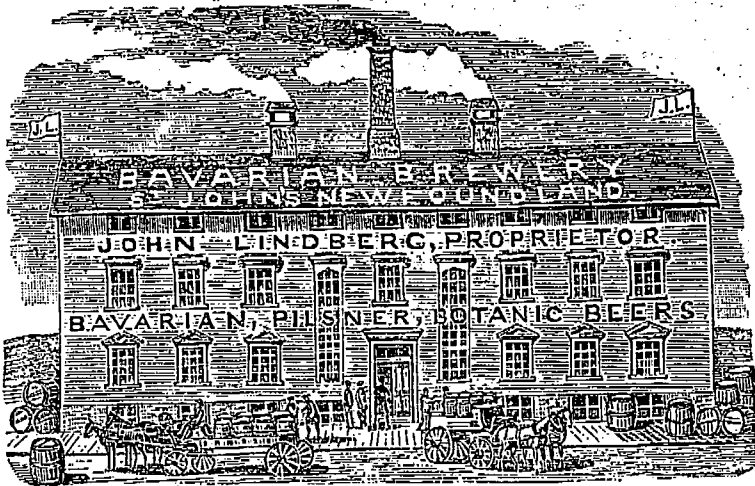
**COAL OIL.**—The market is quiet, and prices of Canadian ¾c lower. Single barrels are quoted at 15½c, and five to ten barrel lots at 15c. Carbon safety at 19c. American oils unchanged at 23c for prime and at 26c for water white. Orude firmer at 81c to 82c per barrel in Petroleum, and refined unchanged at 11c per gallon in car lots.

**DRUGS.**—Business is fairly active, and prices continue firm. Turpentine 58c to 60c a gallon; alcohol at \$3.27 per gallon; castor oil at 10c to 12c; opium at \$3.75 to \$3.90; glycerine, easier,

at 16c; quinine, \$1.15 to \$1.20; morphia, \$1.90 to \$2.00; bicarbonate of potash, 18c; potass iodide, \$4.40 per lb; tartaric acid, 55c to 60c; cream of tartar, 33c to 35c; linseed, raw, 66c; do, boiled, 68c; best Dutch madder, 12½c to 14c; cochineal, 40c to 45c; camphor, 35c to 45c. Oil of peppermint firmer at \$4.75 to \$5.25.

**FLOUR AND GRAIN.**—The flour trade has been dull and unsatisfactory this week. There are few buyers, owing to the depression of outside markets, and no export demand. Superior extras are nominal at \$3.85 to \$3.90, extras at \$3.75, and spring extras at \$3.70; no sales reported this week. Stock in store 375 barrels, the same as last week, against 500 barrels at the corresponding period of last year. Wheat has also been dull, and prices nominal in most cases. There is little offering, which keeps prices steady. No. 2 fall sold in car lots at 85c and 86c, and No. 1 is worth about 88c. No. 2 spring is quoted at 87c to 88c and No. 3 at 85c. The stock in store is 195,870 bush, against 121,395 bush. at the corresponding period of last year and 52,835 bush. in 1883. Barley quiet and firm; the high grades are in best demand, with sales of No. 1 at 85c. No. 2 at 75c, and No. 3 extra at 69c. No. 3 has sold at 68c, choice 3 at 65c, and No. 4 at 50c. The stock in store is 297,062 bush. as against 269,120 bush. last week and 277,304 bush. a year ago. Oats are quiet and prices steady; new sold at 32c to 32½c on track, and old are quoted at 34½c on track. No stock in store. Peas are unchanged; purchases are being made outside at equal to 61c here. The stock in store is 32,633 bush. as against 29,354 bush. last week and 18,868 bush. at the corresponding period of last year. Rye is quiet and nominal at 60c to 61c. No stock in store. Oatmeal is dull and easy; car lots are quoted at \$3.75 to \$3.80, and small lots sell at \$4.10 to \$4.40. Bran quiet; car lots are quoted at \$10 to \$10.50 on track.

**GROCERIES.**—Trade is fair and prices generally steady. Fruits scarce and firm; London layers \$3.25 to \$3.50; black basket, \$3.75; Valencia 9c, currants 5½c to 6½c. Fish in fair demand; trout firm at \$3.60 to \$3.65 and whitefish at \$4.25. Teas in moderate demand

and steady. Sugars unchanged at 6½c to 7c for granulated and 5½c to 6c for Canadian refined. Tobaccos and liquors steady.

**HARDWARE.**—A fair business is reported in builders' material, and prices generally are steady. Tin plates firm at \$4.10 to \$4.25 for I.C. coke and at \$4.50 to \$4.75 for I.C. charcoal. Galvanized iron and sheet zinc in good demand. Pig iron is held at \$19.

**HIDES.**—The offerings of green are limited and prices steady at 8½c for cows and 9c for steers. No. 1 cured cows sold at 9½c to 9½c,

and steers at 9½c. *Sheepskins* are firm; 80c paid for the best and 60c to 70c for ordinary. *Calfskins* are dull, and prices nominal, at 11c to 13c. *Tallow* quiet; rough is quoted at 3c, and rendered at 6c.

**LIVE STOCK.**—The feeling has slightly improved this week as regards cattle. Receipts were fair, with bulk of offerings, however, of medium and inferior qualities. The demand from shippers is fair, with sales at 3½ to 4½c. Butchers' cattle in moderate demand and steady; the best sold at 4c, and in-

ferior at 2½c to 3½c. *Sheep* are in limited demand, and prices steady at 3c for the best and at 2½c for inferior. *Lambs* in limited supply and prices firm at \$2.90 to \$3 for the best and at \$2.00 to \$2.50 for ordinary. *Calves* dull; the offerings are light, and demand just fair. *Hogs* easier; heavy fat are dull at 4c and light at 4½c to 4½c.

**PROVISIONS.**—Trade is on a small scale and confined to small lots. Prices show little change from last week. Old long clear bacon sells at 7c, and new at 7½c to 7½c. New Cumberland cut 7½c. *Hams* in moderate demand; new smoked sell at 1½c to 12c, and old at 11c. *Lard* is in fair demand; round lots in tierces are quoted at 8½c, and small lots in tubs and pails sell at 9½c to 9½c. *Pork* steady; the only business is in small lots at \$12.00 to \$12.50. *Hops* are quiet and prices unchanged, at 7c to 9c for new. *White Beans* sell at \$1.25 a bush for hand-picked. *Potatoes* are steady, with sales of car lots at 45c on track and small lots at 55c to 70c per bag.

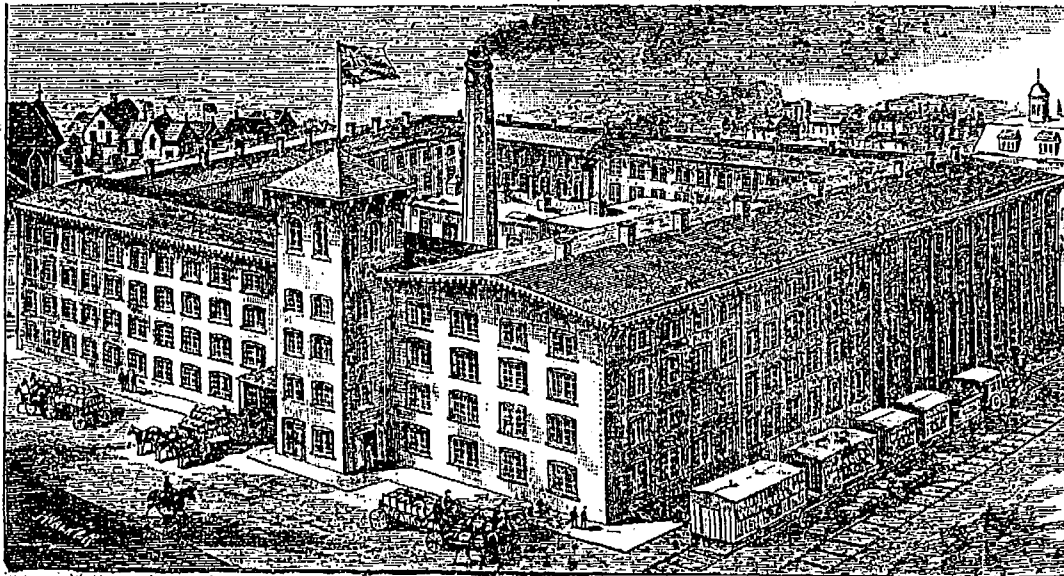
