Topics of the Week.

Every now and again certain influential city papers may he noticed ringing the changes upon the well-worn subject of the relative merits of rural and city corps, and always from the standpoint of admirers of the latter. Here is the latest, an editorial utterance of the Montreal Star:

"The idea that has been entertained throughout the old provinces for some time is that it would be a good thing for the country if, instead of scattering the militia grant over a lot of country pattalions which are of very little benefit, the money was expended in making better provision for the needs of the city regiments. It is not the country battalions but the city regiments that are called upon in the hour of need, and to keep them all on the same footing is not wise."

Now, it just depends on what the need is. Should a regiment be required for a day or a week's service, look to the city for it; should, however, a lengthy campaign be called for, by all means let the burden be divided between country and city. However willing they may be to serve, it is not fair to ask the young men of the towns to desert their offices and workshops, incur financial losses they can ill afford, and inconvenience their employers—including those whose patriotism makes them readily consent to be so put about, whilst the youth of the rural districts, whose services from their nature may more readily be temporarily dispensed with, are denied the privilege of joining in the campaign. There are certainly defects in the present system of maintaining and training rural corps, but these defects are, it is to be hoped, but a temporary bar to our obtaining even better than the good value secured at present for the outlay upon this important section of the militia.

Rumour has it, according to a Montreal paper, that Lieut.-Col. Ouimet, Speaker of the Commons, is about to resign the command of the 65th Battalion. Should the rumour prove true, the loss will be one to the militia generally. Amongst the officers of the 65th a worthy successor will doubtless be found, but the force as a whole will be sorry to see the retirement of so prominent a public man from active participation in military affairs. However well disposed non-military friends in parliament may be, there is nothing like the personal interest incident to holding a command to incite an influential politician to vigorous action in the House.

Lord Wolseley recently issued a memorandum from the war office, stating that the commander-in-chief had been considering the reports on field-firing at home, in India and the colonies, and that he was "satisfied with the improvement manifested, particulatly in India, in carrying out these practices." The memorandum then goes on to recommend, on the authority of his Royal Highness, that "certain features incidental to the attack and defence of positions" should be introduced in order to give an air of reality to the practice,

Regimental Notes.

Pte. Dunning, a member of the band of the York and Lancaster Regiment, now stationed at Halifax, suicided last week, blowing his brains out with a shot from his rifle. He has had attacks of insanity.

Christopher Hanlon, a survivor of the six hundred participants in the famous charge at Balaclava, and now a resident of Toronto, is petitioning the British authorities for an increase in his pension, which is now a shilling a day. He served 24 years in all.

It has been suggested that a detatchment from the Fifth Royal Scots, Montreal, should attend, without arms, at the ceremonies connected with the unveiling of the Burns statue at Albany, N.Y., next month. The event will be celebrated by the Caledonian societies of the entire continent.

A former member of the Governor-General's Foot Guards, Pte. A. F. Cotton, who removed to British Columbia last spring, has won a high place in the grand aggregate of the provincial meeting and is amongst those likely to be chosen to represent the province at the D. R. A. meeting at Ottawa.

A portable military railway, brought from France on the "Chateau Leoville," and consigned to Mr. E. Rodier, of Montreal, is at the Drill Hall there. It is according to a plan adopted by the French Minister of War. The sections are about twenty feet in length. The supports are movable trucks that rest on heavy planks. This portable line renders it possible to move heavy artillery over marches which would otherwise be impassable. Sir Adolphe Caron is expected to examine the invention in Montreal shortly.

Capt. R. J. Wicksteed, law clerk of the Commons, and formerly of the Montreal Garrison Artillery, was the host at a happy little supper party gathered last Saturday evening at Ottawa in honour of Ouarter-Master-Sergt. Edwards, of the 6th, who has been making a brief stay in this city. Capt. Wicksteed having conceived the idea that a meeting of representatives of corps in which he had served would be interesting by reason of the reminiscences, happily carried the idea into effect, his company in consequence spending a thoroughly pleasant evening.

The sculptor Percy Wood writes that the castings of the Shapshooters' memorial to be erected in honour of Privates Osgood and Rogers, was completed by the founders on Aug. 1st, with the result that a casting of peculiar excellence has been obtained. The work will shortly be shipped to Canada. Mr. Wood, who sailed by the Etrnria on Saturday to fulfil professional engagements in the United States, will be present at the unveiling in Ottawa. He has presented a cast of his bust of Professor Owen to the Canadian National Gallery, and it will be placed in the collection at Ottawa.

The correspondent of the Toronto *Mail* who interviewed Major-General Cameron upon his arrival in Kingston to take over the command of the Royal Military College, writes as follows:—"General Cammeron is short in stature, sharp-featured, spectacled, and grey-haired. He has a moustache, but no whiskers. 'I was surprised,' he said, 'when I was offered command of the college. The offer was most unexpected. After I attended the Fisheries Commission in Washington, I spent some time in travelling on the Continent, and was just about to take a house in Germany to settle down when the position was tendered to me, and I accepted it.' His children, of whom he has several, are now attending school in England. They, with Mrs. Cameron, will probably not come to Kingston until next year."

Lieut. Henry C. Chamberlin, of the 43rd Battalion, who has just returned from his trip as a member of this year's Canadian team for Wimbledon intends to remove to British Columbia to reside, and is about to start for New Westminster. He is one of the three famous shooting brothers of that name who have so often won renown for themselves and their corps in provincial and Dominion contests. Lieut.

Horace W. Chamberlin has gone upon the retired list and given up shooting for the present. The third brother, Sergt. John C. Chamberlin, removed to the Western States something over a year ago. Preferring Canadian citizenship, however, he again crossed the border and is now a citizen of Winnipeg. It will be seen by the report of the provincial meeting appearing in this issue that he is now a Staff-Sergeant of the 95th Battalion and has won a place on the team to represent the province at the D. R. A. meeting at Ottawa.

The Carleton, N.B., county rifle association had their annual prize meeting on the 14th and 15th inst., close on forty competitors being in attendance. Hamilton. On the 21st inst. "C" company of the Thirteenth battalion turned out about forty strong to welcome home Capt. Zealand, after his trip to Wimbledon. The remainder of the evening passed rapidly amidst speech and song, and at midnight all arose with the conviction that it had been most enjoyably spent. Lieuts. 77TH BATTALION.

The annual rifle matches of this battalion were held at the Victoria rifle club's ranges on the 21st inst. No. 2 Co. succeeded in distancing the other companies of the battalion, while Pte. Rymal of that company, took first prize at 200, 500 and 600 yards (the three ranges shot at), scoring 22, 24 and 23 respectively of a possible 25; total, 69 of a possible 75; extremely good shooting.

The success of No. 2 Co. as a company, and of Pte. Rymal individually, is due to the company having some time since formed a rifle club, secured ranges and practised conscientiously. There is a lesson to be learned here, and it is to be hoped when comprehended that it will be sufficiently lasting to cause the remaining companies to follow No. 2 Co's. admirable example.

D. A. A. Shifting Ordnance Competition.

Gananoque wins the Gzowski Cup-Durham F. B. again a Close Second.

THE complete returns, published below, of this year's shifting ordnance competition, carried on by the different batteries in camp, for
prizes offered by the Dominion Artillery Association, show the Gzowski
cup to be still without a permanent owner, and Gananoque to have
secured temporary possession for this year. This cup becomes the property of any battery winning it twice in succession, a difficult feat which
none has yet been able to accomplish. In the first competition, in
1884, the Quebec Field Battery won; in 1885 the cup passed to the
Kingston Battery; in 1886 Durham was victorious, and in 1887 the
same battery came near putting an end to the contest, for while it was
adjudged second Durham was only a fifth of a second of time behind the
Ottawa Battery, the winner on that ocasion. This year again Durham
pushes the winner, being only 2½ seconds behind in time, and taking
second place in the list of twelve batteries which competed. The prizes

No. 2.—ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE OF CANADA.—Payments, etc.

That portion of paragraph 26 of the General Regulations Royal Military College of Canada, February, 1888 (Pamphlet form) which provides that each Cadet be required to pay annually in advance a fee of \$100 as contribution towards board and instruction during each year, has been amended by His Excellency the Governor-General in Council, dated 25th July, 1888, by substituting "\$200" for "\$100" as the said annual contribution; the increased tate to affect only Cadets who enter the College after date of said Order in Council. The paragraph as amended will read as follows;

"26. Each Cadet joining the College after 25th July, 1888, will be required to pay annually in advance a Fee of \$200 as contribution towards board and instruction during each year. (Term 1st September to 30th June.) Cadets who joined the College previous to 25th July, 1888, will continue to pay the fee of \$100 while attending the College course. A Cadet withdrawing during the year will not be entitled to repayment of any portion of the Fee. The Fee must be paid in full each year, on or before joining or rejoining the College."

In consequence of the amendment to paragraph 26, omit "\$100" in first line of paragraph 27 of said Regulations Royal Military College (Pamphlet form).

No. 3.—Permanent Corps.

Officers—Confirmation of Rank.—If an officer who has been appointed a lieutenant, provisionally, in a Permanent Corps, holds at the time of such appointment a certificate qualifying him for rank of lieutenant in the arm of the service to which the Permanent Corps belongs, and he, prior to 1st August, 1888, obtained a "Long Coutse" Grade "A" Certificate of that arm, he will be confirmed in rank from date of such provisional appoinment.

Status of Officers transferred.—Officers transferred from one arm of the service to another become junior of their rank in the corps to which they are transferred, but retain the rank and precedence in the militia previously held by them in the Permanent Corps from which they were transferred.

Purchase of Discharge. - A recruit may purchase his discharge at any time within three months after the date of his attestation, on payment of thirty dollars, provided is not out on, or warned for, active service.

REGULATIONS AND ORDERS FOR THE ACTIVE MILITIA, 1887.

Organisation—(Provisional) Officers.—The following has been added as sub-paragraph (3) of paragraph 56 Regulations and Orders for the Militia, 1887:—
(3) When a provisionally appointed Officer has resigned, or been removed from

his Corps, without having obtained a certificate qualifying him for substantive rank, he will not be eligible for re-appointment, provisionally, to the active militia in a higher grade than he held in the corps from which he resigned or was removed.

No. 4.—ACTIVE MILITIA.—Troops of Cavalry.

Troops of cavalry are not allowed staff-sergeants, but the senior of the three sergeants of each troop will be known as Troop Sergeant-major.

The pay of a Troop Sergeant-major is 85 cents per diem.
