



local dealers at \$8 to \$9 per ton, as to quality, and shorts \$10 to \$11 per

OATS.—Offerings in the Winnipeg market have not been heavy, and prices unchanged at from 18 to 20c per bushel of 34 pounds, for feed quality.

BARLEY.—Prices for feed barley are about the same as oats, per bushel, but slower sale than oats. GROUND FEED .-- Prices are unchanged Finest brings \$13 to \$14 per ton, as to quality, and lower qualities \$11 to \$12 per

Meals, etc.—Oatmeal is jobbing lower. Rolled and granulated oatmeal held at about \$1.80 to \$1.90 per sack, according to brand, and standard meal 5c lower, these being prices to retail traders.
