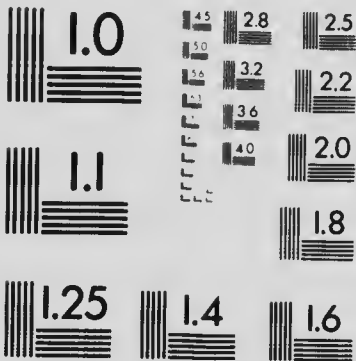

THE GARDEN CITY OF CANADA, and a favorite resort for Summer and Winter, owing to its delightfully mild climate. Situated on Vancouver Island, overlooking the Straits of Juan de Fuca, the outlook across the blue waters to the snow-capped Olympic Mountains on the mainland is remarkable. It is the capital city of British Columbia, and, owing to the characteristic beauty of its residential district, it has often been called "A bit of England on the shores of the Pacific." Although largely a resort and recreation city, it does a flourishing business, being the centre for the lumbering, fishing, and sawing industries of Vancouver Island. The water sports are excellent, the drive north to Campbell River being one of the most spectacular in the world. Golf can be enjoyed every day of the year on excellent courses. The fishing and shooting is of the best, trout, salmon, pheasant, grouse, moose, bear, deer and moose being the prize of the sportsman.

BEACON HILL PARK

One of the city's public parks contains 400 acres, laid out as recreation grounds and pleasure gardens. Artificial lakes and rustic bridges make the park very picturesque. Magnificent view from Beacon Hill across the Straits, of Olympic Mountains, fifteen minutes' walk from Hotel. Park is included in tally book trip and in all sight-seeing trips in the city.

PROVINCIAL LIBRARY

In the Provincial Buildings, and one of the finest in existence. Its historical prints, documents, and other works, which are in charge of E. O. Schofield, are of such value and interest as to occupy people for days at a time.

Two 8-hole courses, which are very convenient, are open to visitors. They are well kept and of fine location. The Oak Bay Links are reached in 20 minutes, and the Colwood Bay Links are reached by E. & N. train or automobile. Green fees for either club, \$1.00 weekdays; \$2.00 Saturday and Sunday.

Motoring in British Columbia

ESQUIMALI

The famous "Old Grand Port" is a bay on a stratum on the Pacific coast. The Rock Yard has been rented over to the Canadian Government, and is now the site of the Pacific Coast Hotel, a hotel and Tourist Camp. A statue of the famous Victor, the hero of England, is situated here, and is a reminder of the sea ships. Four miles from Victoria, reached by the Victoria Road.

SAANICH MOUNTAIN OBSERVATORY

Reared by a blood ant and collected by me. Selected as a type, according to American Entomological Society plan. The new species, which is a new collection, has just been installed and is the largest in the world. DESCRIPTION OF THE FAMOUS TELESCOPE

THIS MAMMOTII TELESCOPE differs from the large telescopes of the world, inasmuch as it is of the reflecting type. Its construction is not so well understood as that of the refracting telescope, the form of instrument so often seen in parks and public places. The lens of the Victoria telescope is 72 inches in diameter and 12 inches thick. It was cast in Belgium and received by the Canadian Government three days before the Germans entered Liege. It was ground and polished in Pittsburgh, Pa. The tube is sufficiently large to allow a small automobile to be driven through it. It is operated entirely different to the usual refracting telescope, such as the one known as the Yerkes instrument in Chicago, the object glass of which is 50 inches.

In the Antoinette instrument the method of observation is reversed. The light rays are collected by the concave 72-inch lens, which is converted into a mirror by its surface being silvered, and reflects those rays of light to a single point to form an image in the upper end of the telescope, that is, the end nearest the object. If a photograph of the object is desired, a camera is placed at the upper end of the telescope, where the rays of light converge, and a photograph is obtained in the ordinary way. It takes about six hours to properly expose a plate to get this picture.

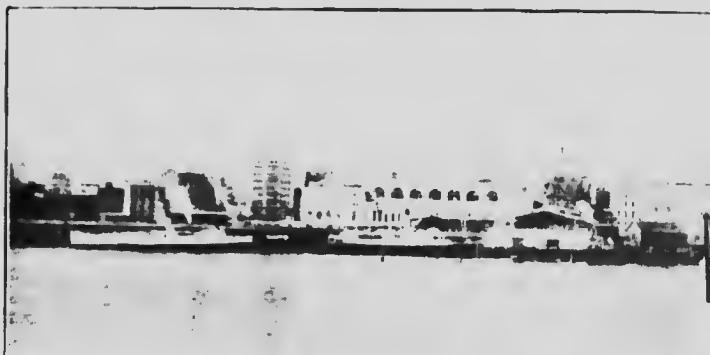

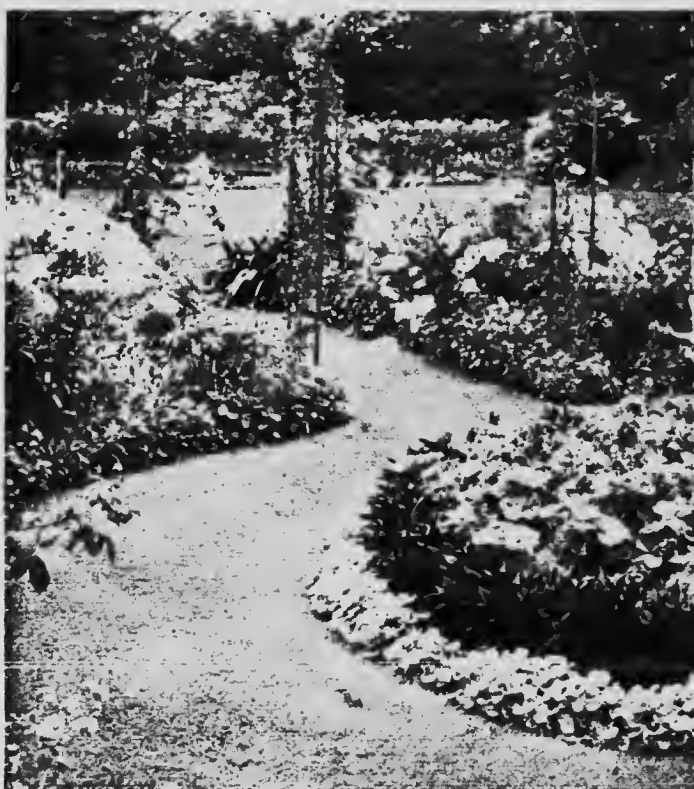

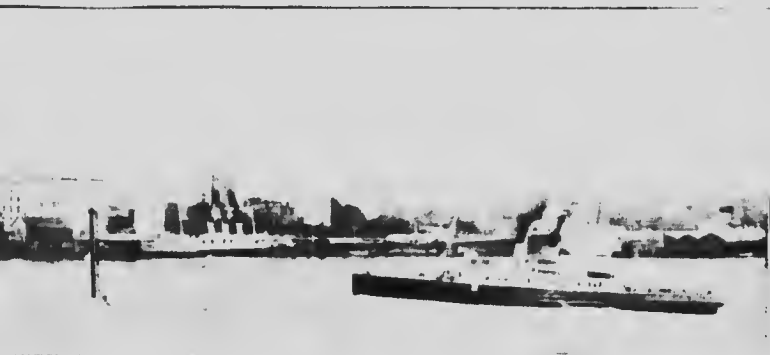

No. 1 Thro' Stanley Park - \$1.00

Past the delightful beaches, also Shaughnessy Heights, Vancouver's splendid residential district, and the principal streets of Vancouver, the metropolis of North-west Canada. One- and a-half hours, \$1.00.

No. 2 Along Marine Drive - \$1.00

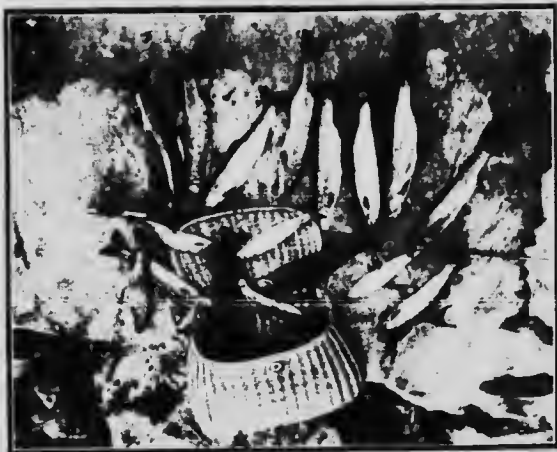
No. 4 Special Trip - - 50c

THE WORLD-RENOWNED SUSPENSION BRIDGE AT CAPILANO CANYON



A DELIGHTFUL TRIP, crossing the ferry to North Vancouver, thence to the Canyon, one of the most picturesque regions of the Continent. The Canyon is several miles long and from 100 to 400 feet deep, and from 100 to 500 feet in width in many places a mere stone's throw. Through this canyon the Capilano River, a glacier-fed stream, rushes to the sea.

To attempt to describe a perfectly beautiful piece of mountain scenery is both difficult and futile; also, who is to say when the Capilano Canyon is at its best?

Lovely are the gray days when the Suspension Bridge is the only real thing in a fairy landscape, the mornings in mauve and pearl, joyous with bird-song, the flawless summer noons, full of gold, and sweet with scent of trees, the evening rose of the hill tops, the green of the pools with treasures of salmon trout; incomparable the nights when the Canyon fills up with blue—blue shadows which creep and spread over the hill tops to the sleeping valleys beyond.

There are old, forgotten trails and lumber camps, and a cougar, perhaps; mountain bogs with shy things growing; splendid trees, mosses and ferns, with possibly the sight in the forest vista of a hungry bear eking out his supper of salmon or trout with a dessert of huckleberries and blueberries. Lichen-covered thunes of by-gone days, and moss-covered corduroy roads, indicative of the spots where the forest giants fell, for the building of a metropolis a quarter of a century ago—and then back to the delightful Tea House at the head of the Suspension Bridge, for the welcome cup of tea which awaits one there.

And always and everywhere the song of the Capilano—and yours to keep—a cool and fragrant memory.

A PARADISE FOR FISHERMEN



SPACE will not permit to give full details of the fishing to be had near Vancouver, but it is extremely doubtful whether there is another city on the Coast where such a variety could be obtained. In season, Salmon, Spring, Coho, and Tye; Steelheads, Dolly Varden, Rainbow, Cut-throat and Sea Trout are plentiful. Fishing tackle, bait, and flies, are easily obtainable in the city. Flies in most use are Hardy's Favorite, Palmers, Royal Coachman, King of the Waters, Professor, Zulu, Montreal, for trout; Silver Doctor, Jock Scott, any standard Sea Trout fly, are good for the Sea Trout. Siwah, Tacoma, Victoria, Stewart spoons are all good. Devon Minnows, gilt or silver, are also good.

GOLF

VANCOUVER has three good courses, and guests of the Hotel Vancouver have special privileges at the Shaughnessy Heights Golf Club.

(1) **Shaughnessy Heights Golf Club.** This is an eighteen-hole course within fifteen minutes' drive from the Hotel, and recognized as one of the best links on the Pacific Coast. 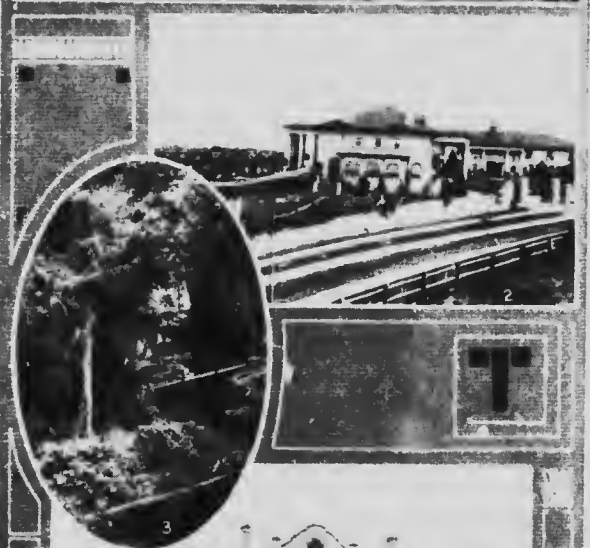
