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Fleet Is Ready To Meet Germans British Navy Again on War Footing in Case Peace Treaty Is Not Signed.

Reuter Despatch. Edinburgh, June 19.—The British fleet is under orders in view of the possibility of the Germans not signing the peace terms.

Chicago Interests Have Over Fifty Per Cent. Claim on Union Stock Yards.

Ottawa, June 19.—Fifty-two to fifty-three per cent. of the stock in the Union Stock Yards, of Toronto, is owned by Chicago interests.

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'PEG STRIKE LEADERS ARE OUT ON BAIL

Premier Denies Class Favoritism Borden Announces Government Will Maintain Law in Connection With Arrested Winnipeg Strikers.

Ottawa, June 19.—In reply to a telegram from Secretary Hamilton of the Toronto Metal Trades Council, with regard to the arrests of the Winnipeg strikers, Premier Borden sent the following message:

The persons arrested in Winnipeg have been charged with acts which under the laws of this country are serious offences. The government intends to maintain the law and to prevent and punish any attempt to subvert the authority of the people as established by their representatives in parliament.

Winnipeg, June 19.—William Ivens, R. B. Russell, Alderman Heaps and Alderman Queen, who early today morning were arrested with others on a charge of Penitentiary to await trial, were released tonight on bail of \$2000 each. It is stated that they have given an undertaking not to take any further part in the present general strike.

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RESCIND DEPORTATION OR GENERAL STRIKE Toronto Trades and Labor Council Call Upon Dominion Congress to Force Government to Repeal Immigration Amendment or Suffer Consequences.

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SENATE REAFFIRMS PROHIBITION ACT BY TWELVE MAJORITY, REFUSES TO VALIDATE LEGISLATION AFTER PEACE.

Ottawa, June 19.—The position of the senate on the prohibition measure was reaffirmed today. The government leader, Sir James Loughheed, moved that the amendment of yesterday cutting off the provision that the measure shall continue for twelve months after the termination of the war should not be concurred in.

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ALICES ARE READY FOR FURTHER ADVANCE CONCENTRATION OF TROOPS WILL PROVIDE SEVERAL HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN.

Coblentz, June 19.—The concentration of British, French, Belgian and American troops began by order of Marshal Foch, preparatory to advancing further into Germany, will be completed Saturday when several hundred thousand allied soldiers will stand ready to march toward Berlin if the Germans do not sign the peace terms.

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WILKINSON WINS ANNUAL PENSION

Retiring Secretary - Treasurer of School Board Gets \$2000 Yearly.

Five thousand dollars a year would not be a cent too much, said Trustees W. D. Dineen at three hundred and education last night in supporting education allowances for W. C. Wilkinson, who is retiring from the position of secretary-treasurer of the board after 47 years of service, two years as assistant and 45 as secretary.

Dr. John Hunter said that Mr. Wilkinson's record had given a standing to the board for integrity. W. D. Boland added words of tribute.

The management committee reported the following recommendations: That Miss L. K. Bar and Mrs. Bucknell be appointed as permanent supply teachers at a regular salary, to be determined by the finance committee.

That sewing be made compulsory for the junior high school girls, and that marks for all the classes, into consideration in promotion the same as any other subject.

That the request of the principal and teachers of Eglinton school to install a moving picture machine in that school to be used for teaching purposes, be granted.

National Research. In accordance with a communication from the Board of Education, forwarded to the Canadian parliament, are confronted with the people of Canada by their very heavy national debt incurred for humanity, and whereas the burden and industry of the part of the nation, our human and natural resources, so that we may be able to share in the world's markets against the rest of the world, that we shall have to meet. Be it therefore resolved that the board of education for the city of Toronto do have the support of the establishment of Canada of a national research institute, which shall carry on and direct research into such industrial, agricultural, commercial and medical problems as will benefit the conservation and development of Canada's resources.

That Miss Edythe C. Findlay, B.A., Toronto University, be appointed as a teacher of household science in Oakwood Collegiate Institute, to take the place of Miss Sutherland.

That Major Wm. Mitchell, returning from leave of absence on military service, be reinstated as principal of Riverside Collegiate Institute, duties to commence Sept. 2, 1919.

That G. B. MacQuarrie, teacher in Oakwood Collegiate, returning from leave of absence on military service, be reinstated on the staff of Oakwood Collegiate Institute, duties to commence Sept. 3, 1919.

Harbord Street Collegiate Institute, be granted leave of absence on account of illness, and that D. A. Glassey be appointed as acting principal in his absence.

That a committee, consisting of five members of the board, be appointed to attend a meeting of representatives of the boards of education and public school boards of cities in Ontario, to be held in St. Catharines on June 21, 1919, to consider the question of forming an urban trustees' association, that their expenses be paid, and that the committee be named by the chairman of the board.

THE DAY AT OTTAWA By TOM KING

Ottawa, June 19.—It is an old proverb that even a worm will turn. As a rule his turning accomplished nothing, but tonight it stirred up a hornet's nest. Sir Herbert Ames, a mid-mannered a millionaire as ever, the boots, essayed the role of the worm and the embattled farmers furnished the hornet's nest. It came about this evening, when and means, and the income tax was under consideration. Sir Herbert suggested that the tax was too high, especially on large incomes, and deplored the popular impulse to go after the millionaire. The government need a lot of revenue, he said, but when he wanted to pass the buck. Naturally the less fortunate members of the community wanted to soak the millionaire. The farmers were especially anxious to have themselves relieved of tariff taxation, and they were clamoring for heavy taxation on business profits and personal incomes.

When, however, it came to paying these taxes, Sir Herbert suggested that the farmer was not in evidence. The present budget continued the onerous tax upon business profits, but should be provided that no tax should be levied upon the profits of the farmer or raiser of live stock. There were ranchers in the west who cleared a hundred thousand dollars a year, but they were exempted from the war profits tax, so were the grain growers. Many of these grain growers realize princely profits on their business; he had one in mind who last year cleared at least one hundred thousand dollars.

True the farmers were subject to the personal income tax, but when it came their turn to walk up to the captain's office and settle, they were wondrously cool and strangely relaxed. Fifty-four per cent. of our population were engaged in farming, but who paid an income tax were farmers, government from this tax in 1918, the farmers only contributed 1-2 per cent.

and could only get it from this country, therefore, we had to ship the nickel matte to Wales and New Jersey in order to have it refined. The British government had intended that the Canadian government should prevent any Canadian nickel shipped to New Jersey, finding its way to Germany.

Mr. Maclean then turned his attention to the National Policy aspect of the nickel situation. We had a monopoly of nickel ore; why should it not be refined in Canada, instead being exported to Wales or New Jersey? The nickel matte was rich in platinum, a metal invaluable in war and five times as valuable as gold. The United States government had seized a lot of nickel matte at the plant of the International Nickel Company, New Jersey, and found it so rich in platinum that it was able to collect \$3,000,000 from that company as a profit tax. The company had then a provision for refund, as neither our Dominion nor provincial governments seemed to care how much platinum was shipped out of the country, nor how little was paid by way of taxation.





It is well constructed, with strong collapsible framework of cypress wood and iron, and the covering is of heavy khaki duck. A carrier is furnished with each tent, which attaches it to the side of your car—a neat-looking bundle—dimensions as above, and weight about 100 pounds.





Atlantic City v. Winnipeg.
 Winnipeg is a less faithful picture of trades unionism than Atlantic City, where the American Federation of Labor is assembled. The intelligence and experience of trades unionism is opposed to the One Big Union, the I. W. W. and all the other Bolshevistic patent "just-as-goods" that have been offered as specifics for the maladies of society.

Industrial versus craft unions found the federation in a large majority for craft unionism. The proposal that contracts should be synchronized with the view of bringing all labor to a cessation of the same day was taboed. The proposal that the workers elect their own foremen was not taken up. Even the initiative and referendum was rejected, and not without reason, as it is a clumsy substitute for prudence and does not work effectively in Switzerland, which is the only place of importance where it is in operation.

The better element of trades unionism as represented in the federation has been five or six to one against the tendency towards revolution. This is decisive, and coming from a body which represents the intelligence of the labor party, leaves little reason to fear the ultimate success of the extremists in America.

The Senate Handicap.
 So long as the senate continues to represent special and even personal interests to the exclusion of any consideration of the public wishes, so long as it turns down the legislation which the elected members of parliament, closely in touch with their constituents and voting in large majorities, have passed, so long as it is a reactionary body of gentlemen who fear nothing but death and have made a record in escaping that, so long as the senators negative the will of the people, there will continue to be a clamor for their suppression.

One of the bills that has been held up for about three months and is apparently to be slaughtered is the copyright act, which is identical with the British act, and would bring Canada into line with the rest of the civilized world.

The bill is designed to help Canadian authors, painters, composers, picture makers of all kinds, but the senate has no interest in Canadian literature, art or music. It is a Canadian literary man who has written the bill, and would bring Canada into line with the rest of the civilized world.

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The literature, art and music of Canada have fastened round their necks an old man of the sea, as inexorable as death, and as difficult to be rid of as Sinbad's. They are at present the greatest handicap that the creative brains of Canada "have to contend against."

The German Factions.
 Prince Lichnowsky has taken issue with Bernstein, who wished to throw all the blame for the war on the Kaiser. Lichnowsky, who was, it will be remembered, ambassador to England in 1914, asserts that the Kaiser was suffering from breakdown at the beginning of the war, and that "one word from Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg would have avoided the catastrophe by inducing the Kaiser to accept my proposal for English mediation."

The one word was not spoken by anyone, but whether Bethmann-Hollweg was guilty or not, nothing can lessen the responsibility of the Kaiser for plunging into war when he knew that the machinery for conciliation and arbitration was always available.

More important than its bearing on the guilt of the Kaiser is the evidence in the incident that the junker military party is full of dissension. The effort to excuse the Kaiser represents one party. The attempt to exonerate Bethmann-Hollweg represents another. When thieves fall out honest men come by their own. Anything that will shake the German idea of their own infallibility will do good to Europe.

These matters have a considerable bearing on the signing of the peace treaty. There is not the slightest doubt that the junkers wish to repudiate the treaty if that were possible. Another monarchic element does not wish to sign it and bring domestic affairs to a crisis until assured of their own predominance. The socialists and other radicals would sign at once and take their chances, which seem less favorable as time passes, and the junker element gets opportunity to entrench itself.

The Outlook has adopted the opinion that there is no calamity if the Germans refused to sign the treaty and our troops occupied Berlin and other districts and imported a little democratic sentiment into Germany. It is all very well to say self-determination should rule, but when there are several parties with widely differing views, no one of which can possibly be in a majority, how is self-determination to be arrived at? Like many other places, Germany needs education.
