Mr. Editor,—In last week's Review I noticed that there had been shipped from Streetsville flag station during the year 1896, by four farmers, 2800 cans of milk and the C. P. R. had been paid \$20 for freight on the same. Since Jan. 1, 1896, they have shipped 33,000 cans and paid \$4950 for freight. In 1880 the price of milk was \$1.35 per can laid down at the Union Station Toronto, the freight being 10c per can, leaving the farmer \$1.25. In 1886 the freight was raised to 15c per can, and since 1890 the price of milk has dropped every year. The price is now 85c a can, and the freight is still 15c. Little wonder the Patrons of Industry say the farmer is discrimianted agains.


