Wilhelmina, Aged 18, is Now Queen of the Netherlands—The Coronation Was Marked by Great Enthusiasm on the Part of the People and the Young Queen Was Received With Much Warmth.

Amsterdam, Sept. 6.—The events of yesterday were but the overture for far more important ceremonies to-day, upon the occasion of the long-awaited enthroning of Queen Wilhelmina, who came of age on Aug. 31.

From the principal gate of the palace to the church, between lines of naval cadets, was stretched a gay awning, decorated with streamers and velvet carpeting was laid over the short distance, which the Queen had to traverse.

The procession was headed by the King of Arms, with the heralds in their gorgeous, antique costumes and bearing long trumpets adorned with pendant flags.

The jewels worn by the young Queen were part of those stolen in Brussels on Sept. 3, 1850, some of which were recovered by the police of New York.

Cornwall, Ont., Sept. 6.—(Special)—Fourteen men were killed or drowned and eighteen others injured here to-day by the collapse of the two south spans of the O. and N.Y. railroad bridge across the south channel of the River St. Lawrence.

WHEAT FUTURES ARE STEADY.

But Trading Was Narrow at Chicago Yesterday.

Liverpool and Paris Markets Hold Well—Corn Stronger and Provisions Steady—Visible Supply—On Passage—World's Shipments Last Week—Notes and Gossip.

Trading in wheat on the Chicago market was on a very small scale to-day, and North-west receipts were larger again, but market opened at about Saturday's final figures and closed about steady, with a gain of 3/4c per bushel in the December and May options. This month's delivery declined 1/2c.

On the Liverpool board the Sept. and Dec. wheat futures opened 3/4d higher, and closed 1/2d higher per cent than the previous final figures. Paris wheat and flour advanced to-day, but Antwerp went on a little.

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As compared with a week ago, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States has increased 1,200,000 bushels, that of corn has increased 224,000 bushels, and that of oats has increased 94,000 bushels.

World's wheat shipments during the past week totalled 5,487,000 bushels, against 4,925,000 bushels the previous week, and 5,812,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.
