BITTERLY ASSAULTS MODERN SOCIETY

Had Contemplated Killing King Edward on Nov. 25—Record is Bad.

Brussels, Feb. 6.—The trial of Genaro Rubino, the Italian anarchist, on the charge of attempting to assassinate King Leopold November 15 by firing three shots at His Majesty while the latter was returning from the cathedral here after attending a Te Deum in memory of the late Queen Henriette was opened to-day in the Assize Court.
