## SELECT JUDGE CASSELS TO MAKE THE ENQUIRY INTO DEPT. OF MARINE

In the Meantime Three Officials Have Been Suspended and Col. Gourdeau Renews Request for Retirement.

OTTAWA, April 1.-(Special.)-Walter Cassels, judge of the exchequer court, has been appointed a compais-sioner to investigate charges made by the civil service commission against the administration of the marine and fisheries department. The prime minister made the announcement in the house this afternoon.

He accompanied this with a statement that three officials of the department had been suspended and that De-puty Minister Rodolphe Gourdeau had during the day pressed the minister for acceptance of his resignation. The suspended officials are: J. F. Fraser, commissioner of lights; J. W. Gregory, agent of the department at Quebec, and A. W. Owen, accountant.

Premier's Statement. "Before the orders of the day are proceeded with," said the prime minister, "it is my duty to inform the house what action has been taken by the government on the report of the civil service commission. The house is aware that on two previous occasions I stated that the report, in so far as it concerned the department of marine and fisheries, called for consideration and action by the government. My honorable friend who is in charge of that depart-ment has been engaged for some time, as far as his other duties will permit him, investigating his department, so as to determine in what respect it could be reformed. In the discharge of that duty one of the officers of that department was suspended by him some few weeks ago. Since the report of the commission has been laid on the table my honorable friend and colleague has come to the conclusion that he should also put under suspension two other prominent officials. It is only just to the deputy minister of that department that I should say in this connection that on two previous occasions he tendered his resignation to the minister, and this morning again pressed his re-signation, and that the matter is in the hands of the minister for consider-

# JURY SHOCKS

Did Not Want to Condemn Tearse to Death --- A Commutation For Him Will Be Asked For.

BRAMPTON, April 1 .- (Special.)-A thunderbolt from heaven could not have produced a greater shock upon the 3000 people assembled in and around the court room this afternoon, than when the jury brought in the verdict of "Guilty of murder, with a recommendation for mercy" against John D. Tearse, accused of killing William Curry in Peel County on Christmas

Tearse was sentenced to be hanged on Thursday, June 11.

The 12 talesmen admitted afterwards that they had no idea that their verdict left no course open to the court but to pronounce a death sentence upon the prisoner. To Crown Counsel Blackstock, and to Counsel Hassard, they admitted that they believed their verdict would elicit nothing more serverdict would elicit nothing more serious than a life term in prison. They ignored an insanity verdict because they thought, like the possibilities with Harry K. Thaw, the accused would merely be locked up for a short while and released. They realized the insane tendencies of the prisoner, but thought they would be relieving society of a pernicious element if he were locked

OTTAWA, April 1.—(Special.)—By 19 to 15 the senate railway committee threw out Mr. Conmee's bill to incorperate the Ontario and Michigan Power Company. A big fight was made on the proposition, but the protest of the Ontario legislature against this new invasion of provincial rights had its ef-

The bill sought to give the company The bill sought to give the company very wide powers, namely, the purpose of developing power and distributing it to any place in Canada or in Isle Royale, or in any place in the United States. The company should be permitted to acquire lands and water rights on Pipeon, Nepigon and Sturgeon Rivers in Thunder Bay district, to construct dams and reservoir and otherwise control water in any lake whose waters flow into any of these whose waters flow into any of these rivers or in any streams conveying such discharge to bore for natural gases, manufacturing gas and sundry
