CONJURER WITH ENGLISH. New York American: Lafcadio Hearn, son of a Greek mother and an Irish father, born under the British flag in the Ionian Islands, who spent his early manhood in New Orleans and Cincinnati, died a Buddhist yesterday in Japan. Hearn was a translator of French into English, a novelist, news-paper reporter, a student of religions and a mystic. He also wrote poetry. His books are read in the colleges of the south for their style. His stories of Japan had a vogue, for Hearn, by reason of his professorship in a university at Tokio, secured an accurate knowledge of Japanese life, which appealed to his Celto-Graeco mind. He was the greatest conjurer with words that in this generation used a pen. Only one man in any language wrote like Hearn, and that man was Gautier.


