An Act
TO INCORPORATE
"THE TORONTO EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY."

Granted March, 1873.

Whereas an institution under the name of "The Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary," hath for some time past existed in the City of Toronto, having for its object the cure or relief of diseases of the Eye and Ear, and is governed by a constitution and by-laws which have received the assent of the members of the said institution ; and whereas certain members of the institution have by their petition prayed that the said institution may be incorporated : and it is expedient to grant their petition :

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows :—

1. Andrew Taylor McCord, A. Dredge, W. T. Mason, William Elliot, E. J. Palmer, W. J. Macdonell, A. R. McMaster, George Hague, Robert Wilkes, J. H. Mason, John McBean, A. M. Rosebrugh, M.D., R. A. Reeve, M.D., and William Canniff, M.D., and such other persons as now are or hereafter shall become members of the institution, shall be, and they are hereby constituted a body corporate and politic, in fact and in name, by the name of "The Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary ;" and shall by that name have perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to alter, renew, or change the same at pleasure ; and by the said name, may, from time to time and at all times, acquire and hold as purchasers for the purposes of the institution, real estate in one block in the City of Toronto, so that the annual value of the same shall not exceed at any one time five thousand dollars, and the same or any part thereof at any time to alienate, exchange, mortgage, lease, or otherwise dispose of, as occasion may require, and may also

RESOLUTIONS

PASSED AT THE EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE TORONTO EYE AND
EAR INFIRMARY, HELD AT THE INFIRMARY, ON TUESDAY EVENING,
THE 28TH OF DECEMBER, 1875.

Mr. A. T. McCord, late City Chamberlain, occupied the Chair.

The report of the Directors was read by Mr. W. T. Mason, and that of
the Surgeons by Dr. Rosebrugh.

Moved by Rev. S. N. Jackson, M.D., seconded by Dr. G. Wright,—

“That the report just read be adopted, and that it be printed for
circulation with the Constitution of the Infirmary and a list of the
Subscribers.”—Carried.

Moved by Rev. A. J. Broughall, seconded by Mr. Wm. Elliott, and
supported by Mr. R. Wilkes,—

“That this charitable Institution being Provincial in its char-
acter, this meeting urges upon the Government the great need of a
suitable building for the accommodation of *intern* patients, as the
statistics of the Infirmary show that more than three-fourths of the
intern patients treated have been non-residents of Toronto.”—Carried.

Moved by Rev. J. M. Laurent, seconded by Mr. J. H. Mason,—

“That as the Constitution now provides that the Medical Staff
shall consist of a Surgeon, Assistant Surgeon, and one or more
Clinical Assistants, and as it is desirable that the designation of these
Officers should be changed, be it resolved, and it is hereby resolved,

that hereafter the designation of the Medical Staff of the Infirmary shall be Senior Surgeon, Surgeon (or Surgeons,) and Clinical Assistants; that the Constitution be altered to give effect to this change, and that the Constitution of the Infirmary as amended be adopted.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. T. W. Jeffrey, seconded by Mr. R. Shields,—

“That the following Officers and Directors be appointed for the ensuing year, viz., Messrs. A. T. McCord, President; A. Dredge, Vice-President; W. T. Mason, Secretary and Treasurer; and Messrs. Wm. Elliott, Robert Wilkes, ex-M.P., E. J. Palmer, W. J. Macdonell, J. H. Mason, John McBean, Samuel Platt, S. R. Briggs, and G. M. Evans, Directors.”—Carried.

Hearty votes of thanks were then tendered to Mr. A. T. McCord, as President; Mr. W. T. Mason, as Secretary; and to the Surgeons, Drs. Rosebrugh and Coleman, for their valuable services, rendered gratuitously, during the year.

The meeting then adjourned.

At a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors, Messrs. W. T. Mason, A. Dredge, and W. J. Macdonell were re-appointed members of the Executive Committee; Dr. Rosebrugh was appointed Senior Surgeon; Dr. Reeve and Dr. Coleman, Surgeons; Dr. Parsons and Dr. Hobley, Clinical Assistants; and Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Phillips, Superintendent and Matron.

DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The Directors are pleased to be able to avail themselves of the opportunity afforded by another Annual Meeting to present a review of the statistical and financial affairs of the Infirmary for the past year.

The charity still continues to prosecute its benevolent work of affording medical treatment to the indigent poor afflicted with disease of the eye and ear, who resort to it from the different parts of the Province.

It is a pleasing feature to be able to state that the institution continues to have the confidence of the Toronto public by whom its funds have been liberally supplemented during the year.

Nothing of special note has occurred within the year in respect of the patients who have been treated, and the Directors refer to the Medical Report for details relating to them ; nor has any change taken place in the management, except it be that Mr. and Mrs. Hart have resigned, and Mr. J. A. Phillips and his wife were appointed Superintendent and Matron of the Institution in their stead.

The chief, and indeed the **only** drawback to the efficient working of the Institution, is the unsuitable building used as the Infirmary. Though well enough as a small residence, for which it was built, as an Infirmary within which to board and lodge a number of male and female patients, requiring for their successful treatment spacious and well ventilated chambers, and good yard room attached for out of door

air when needed, the present premises could scarcely be more unsuitable.

For several years the need of proper buildings has been urged upon the Government of Ontario, and recently a memorial was addressed to the Lieutenant Governor in Council, in which it was set forth that although the Institution was more Provincial than Local in its character (the number and expense of maintaining country patients being four times that of patients from Toronto), the Board would nevertheless endeavor to purchase a site and erect the necessary buildings, and continue to bear their share in the future maintenance of the institution provided that the Government guarantee fifty per cent. of the expense necessary.

Your Directors regret to say that up to the present time, no answer has been received to these memorials.

Surely, if there be any benevolent institution within the limits of the Province that can claim assistance from the Local Government for necessary buildings, none can have a stronger claim than that of the Eye and Ear Infirmary. Provincial in its character, in its benefactions knowing no distinction of creed, nationality, or place of abode, and in its results saving numbers year by year from helpless dependence and pauperism, it might reasonably have been presumed that the simple statement and verification of the facts of the case would have been sufficient to secure the aid necessary for the purchase of a site, and the erection of a building adequate to the requirements of the Institution.

It is true that in old and wealthy communities, where benevolent institutions have been in existence for generations, legacies and bequests have so accumulated that many of such institutions are now maintained wholly without Governmental aid. In a comparatively new country like Canada, however, it is unreasonable to expect that local charity would be sufficient to justify the Directors of the Eye and Ear Infirmary in undertaking the entire financial responsibility of purchasing a site and erecting suitable buildings, when it is con-

sidered that more than than three-fourths of the *intern* patients are non-residents of Toronto.

The following extract from the Official Report of Mr. Langmuir, Inspector of Asylums, &c., will show that gentleman's views on this subject :

“Toronto, Sept. 9th, 1875.

“Statutory Inspection was made by the undersigned of the Eye and Ear Infirmary in this city, on this day, on which occasion he passed over the entire house, and found it in a well kept and orderly state, considering the bad internal arrangements of the premises, and their unfitness for the purpose for which they are used. * * * Eleven patients were found in residence, viz., eight males and three females. They were all afflicted with various diseases of the Eye. Seven of this number are paying for their board and lodging in the house ; one is being supported by the City of Toronto ; one was received from the Ontario Institution for the Blind ; one was paying half support ; and one was a free patient. *Only one of these patients was a resident of Toronto.* All the rest were received from other places in the Province, (except a Mennonite emigrant) clearly showing that the Infirmary is *Provincial* in its character and objects. Besides the resident patients he noted that nine external patients received treatment and medicine from the resident physician, Dr. Rosebrugh, on the morning of his visit, nearly all of them being residents of Toronto. * * *

The Directors also refer to the Surgeons' Report hereto appended, for their views on the same subject.

The following are the statistics taken from the Registers kept at the Infirmary. :—

The number of patients under treatment during the year ending 30th September, 1875, was 634, being an increase of nearly 19 per cent. over the previous year.

Of the total number of 634 patients, 507 were Eye, and 127 Ear cases ; 76 were In- and 558 Out-patients. Of the Out-patients, 464 were from the City of Toronto, 59 from the County of York, 27 from other counties in the Province of Ontario ; and 8 were from other countries, including immigrants, foreigners, and aliens. Of the

the total 634 patients, 370 were males (216 boys and single men ; 135 married men, 19 widowers), and 264 were females (127 girls and spinsters, 102 married women, and 35 widows).

The 634 professed to belong to the following Churches : Church of England, 219 ; Roman Catholic, 206 ; Wesleyan Methodist, 102 ; Presbyterian, 56 ; Baptist, 13 ; Primitive Methodist, 13 ; Lutheran Church, 8 ; Congregational, 4 ; Catholic Apostolic, 3 ; Church of Scotland, 2 ; Plymouth Brethren, 2 ; Unitarians, 2 ; Episcopal Methodist, 1 ; Mennonite, 1 ; Universalist, 1 ; Jew, 1.

They were natives of the following Countries : Canada, 192 ; England, 235 ; Ireland, 151 ; Scotland, 27 ; United States, 19 ; Continental Europe, 10.

The Institution was opened in May, 1867, as a dispensary only, and for the three years previous to the opening of the hospital department in 1870, there were 411 patients under treatment, and from that date to the end of the present year there were 2217 intern and extern patients, making a total of 2628 patients who received gratuitous treatment up to 30th September, 1875.

In resigning the trust to their successors in office, the Board would express the hope that the charity will continue to receive in the future as it deservedly has had in the past, the confidence and support of its former patrons and of the general public.

SURGEONS' REPORT.

The Surgeons of the Toronto Eye and Ear Infirmary, in presenting their eighth Annual Report, must express their deep regret that the Board of Directors have not as yet been enabled to procure premises adequate for the requirements of the Institution.

As some time may yet elapse before permanent premises can be got in readiness, the Surgeons would strongly recommend, both on sanitary and moral grounds, that, if possible, temporary quarters be secured, and the small rented building now in use for the Infirmary, with its few feet of yard-room and unhealthy surroundings, be abandoned with as little delay as possible.

The 76 *intern* patients were seen the average number of 48 times, and the 558 *extern* an average of 11 times, making 3,648 consultations for the former, and 6,138 for the latter, or a total of 9,786 gratuitous consultations during the year.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY.

ARTICLE I.

This Institution shall be called "THE TORONTO EYE AND EAR INFIRMARY."

ARTICLE II.

sts.

All Annual Subscribers of One Dollar and upwards shall be Members, and entitled to Vote at General Meetings and Elections.

ARTICLE III.

Any person subscribing and paying at one time Fifty Dollars, shall be a Member for Life, and entitled to the same privileges as Annual Subscribers.

ARTICLE IV.

The Annual Meeting shall be held in October in each year, or as soon thereafter as practicable, to receive the Report of the Directors for the previous year (ending on the 30th September), and to appoint a President, a Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, and Nine Directors, and to transact any other business which may be necessary.

ARTICLE V.

Regular Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in January, April, July, and October. Special Meetings of the Directors shall be called at other times by the Secretary, at the request of the President or any three of the Directors. Five Directors shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI.

An executive Committee of three shall be annually chosen by the Directors from their own number, who shall, in conjunction with the Senior Surgeon, make such arrangements and regulations for the management of the Infirmary as shall by them be deemed best adapted to promote the objects of the charity;—the President to be an *ex-officio* member of this Committee. These arrangements and regulations

to be reported to the Board of Directors at their stated meetings, and to be adopted or rejected at their discretion.

ARTICLE VII.

The Medical Staff shall consist of two or more Surgeons (one of whom shall be called the Senior Surgeon).

ARTICLE VIII.

The Senior Surgeon of the Infirmary shall be an *ex-officio* Director. The Surgeons shall have control of the admission and treatment of *extern* patients, and such *intern* patients as have complied with the published conditions of admission. The admission of free patients shall be subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, or a member thereof acting in their behalf. They shall see that the statistics are accurately recorded, and shall assist in preparing the Surgeons' Annual Report. Meetings of the Staff shall be held from time to time to consider matters affecting the Medical Department.

The Clinical Assistant or Assistants shall perform such duties as may be directed by the Surgeon.

ARTICLE IX.

The Senior Surgeon and other Surgeon or Surgeons, and the Superintendent and Matron shall be appointed annually by the Board of Directors. One or more Clinical Assistants may be appointed by the Executive Committee on the nomination of the Senior Surgeon; such appointment to be subject to the approval of the Board.

ARTICLE X.

One of the Surgeons shall be present at the Infirmary every day (Sundays excepted), at 9 A.M., to examine the patients, to prescribe for them, and to perform such operations as may be considered necessary.

ARTICLE XI.

Students of Medicine attending the Infirmary shall be subject to such regulations as the Surgeons shall from time to time direct and prescribe, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XII.

This Constitution may be revised or altered at an Annual Meeting, on the recommendation of the Directors.

acquire any other real estate or interest therein, by gift, devise or bequest, if made at least six months before the death of the party making the same, and may hold such estate or interest therein, for a period of not more than seven years, and may within that period alienate, mortgage, lease, or otherwise dispose of the same, and the proceeds of such estate, or interest therein, as shall have been so disposed of, shall be invested in public securities, county or municipal debentures, or other approved securities, for the use of the said institution, and such estate or interest as may not within the said period have been alienated or disposed of, shall revert to the party from whom the same was acquired, his heirs, or representatives.

2. The personal property of the said institution shall become the property of and vest in the said corporation.

3. The said corporation shall have for its objects the establishment of a Hospital, Infirmary, or other building of a similar character, for the treatment of persons suffering from diseases of the eye or ear.

4. The constitution and by-laws by which the said institution is now governed, shall be the constitution and by-laws of the said corporation, but they, or any of them, may be added to, amended or repealed, and others substituted therefor, in the manner, and subject to the provisions and conditions therein stated.

5. The officers of the institution at the time of the passing of this Act, shall be the officers of the corporation, and shall retain their respective offices and positions until others shall be elected or appointed in their place.

6. The said corporation shall at all times, when required by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, make a full return of all property held by it, together with such details and other information as the Lieutenant-Governor may require.

7. The funds of the said corporation shall be used for the purposes authorized by this Act, and nothing herein contained shall authorize the said corporation to engage in the business of trading or real estate.
