



MORE SCHOOL DISSENSIONS

Nova Scotia Because of Dissatisfaction With Present

SYDNEY, Feb. 1-The province of Nova Scotia before very many months will be the storm-centre of a fierce controversy over the question of schools. Politicians are endeavoring to blind their eyes to the situation; but it is in vain, the rumblings are endeavoring to blind their eyes to the situation; but it is in vain, the rumblings are endeavoring to blind their eyes to the situation; but it is in vain, the rumblings are already heard in the distance.

The Free School Act made no provision for the support of denominational schools, and the present Public Instruction Act is equally silent. Several years ago the Catholics, desirous of having control over their own children in matters educational as well as spiritual, began the erection of convents in all the large industrial centres. There are a great many of these now scattered throughout the province. Then they made application and were allowed by the department of education to share in the county funds. All the teachers employed are sisters, and receive their provincial grant as other teachers and Protestants have protested but their protestations have been overruled. The superintendent of education to whom the matter had been referred, gave it as his opinion that the convent schools were legally entitled to a share of the county funds.

It may be necessary to state that in the convents, Protestants are admitted, and given the same care and attention as Catholic children. The latter are given religious instruction, but outside the regular school hours.

Leading Protestants have not been satisfied with this arrangement and not long ago they submitted a "stated case" to several of the ablest counsel in Canada, and the opinion received has borne them out in their contention that the appropriation of the school funds of the province to convent schools, or in fact, denominational schools of any kind, is illegal. They are now preparing to bring the matter to the notice of the government, and it may be one of the questions that will come up for solution at the meeting of the local legislature at Halifax next month.

The remedy sought is an absolute cessation of the giving of any funds out of the treasury of the province to the support of denominational schools, immaterial of what religious body. It is a foregone conclusion that the application will raise a storm, and that it will be the signal for a fierce religious warfare. The Catholics have gone to enormous expenditure in building and equipping schools, and they are not to be blamed if they fight for the retention of their present privileges to the very last ditch.

It is not likely that a compromise can be effected either. The Protestants claim this payment of school funds as illegal, and being illegal, should stop. Catholics hold an entirely different view. The nearest to a compromise that can be suggested is a submission of a stated case to the supreme court. This, it may be added will be the question at issue in the mayoralty election for the city of Sydney in March next. Delegations representing Protestant organizations have secured pledges from candidates to support them when the psychological moment comes. The school question enters also into civic contests in several of the towns throughout the province. It has become so vital that people naturally inclined toward peace are becoming alarmed at the possible outcome.

The result is problematic; it may end in a compromise satisfactory to both parties or it may end in separate schools. This latter would be decidedly objectionable, apart altogether from the religious aspect. It is scarcely possible that it will end in the Catholic church giving over the instruction of her young to teachers holding views on religion different to her own tenets. In some sections Catholics are already supporting schools of their own. This is a big burden upon her people, but it is borne. apparently, quite cheerfully.
