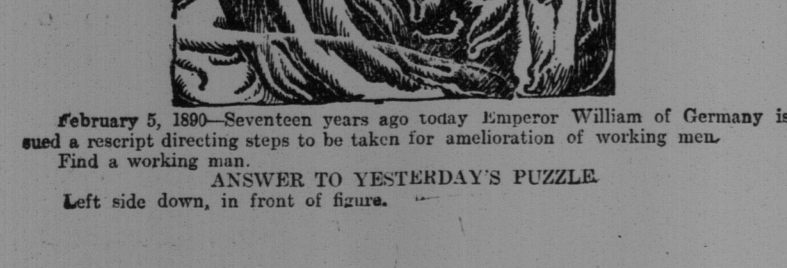

A NOTABLE TRIBUTE TO THE LATE TIMOTHY EATON

Closed Upon Ten Thousand Employees Laid Down Their Duties as a Mark of Respect—Toronto News Styles Him a Great Man—Sketch of His Remarkable Career.

Referring to the closing of the great store of the Eaton's in Toronto employing some 3,000 persons, from Thursday last until Monday because of the death of Timothy Eaton, the Toronto News said: "What is true of the store here is also true of the immense departmental establishments in Winnipeg, and of the company's factories at various points. Likewise the buying offices in Paris and London will remain closed by the fact that last year they employed in 10,000 employees will, in sorrow and regret, lay down their accustomed duties for the moment."

A NOTABLE TRIBUTE

MR. EATON'S CAREER

The late Timothy Eaton was born in Ireland, at Glogher, thirty miles from Belfast, and not far from Blemish, famed in mythology as the place where St. Patrick herded sheep during his sojourn in Ireland. Mr. Eaton's forefathers migrated from Scotland nearly two hundred years ago. They, with many other Scotch families, formed a settlement and for several generations engaged in agrarian pursuits.

EARLY DAYS

He was the youngest of a family of nine. Before his birth, his father died, and his widowed mother faced the world with a dependent family and nothing to support it. She was a woman of strong character, however, and managed to give them the advantage of such education as could be acquired at the National School in Glogher. Timothy was a boy of ten when he came to the acquiring of great wealth.

A BUSINESS TRAINING

Among those who left for other lands to seek their fortunes was the eldest member of the Eaton family. About the year 1820 he came to the city of Toronto, and he was the first to introduce to the city the retail business of the clothing trade. STARTS IN CANADA

He arrived in Canada in 1827, and soon afterward opened a store at Kirkton, in Huron county. At that time little money was in circulation. With wagon he hauled his produce to the nearest port and returned laden with merchandise, which was again exchanged for produce. The Latest Types of British Apparatus to be Manufactured in Canada.

With so much being said and written in respect to the development of electrical energy at Niagara, public opinion has been educated to the belief that the cheapest motive power must necessarily be commercial proposition, but it must be admitted that there are lions in the path as the transmission span extends, and even within a comparatively short distance from an hydraulic plant there are many places where the total power used is not sufficient to warrant the great cost of transmission lines.

MORE SCHOOL DISSENSIONS

A Threatened Cleavage in Nova Scotia Because of Dissatisfaction With Present System.

[Sydney correspondence of Montreal Herald.]

SYDNEY, Feb. 1.—The province of Nova Scotia before very many months will be the storm-centre of a fierce controversy over the question of schools.

THE FREE SCHOOL ACT

made no provision for the support of denominational schools, and the present Public Instruction Act is equally silent.

LEADING PROTESTANTS

have not been satisfied with this arrangement and not long ago they submitted a "stated case" to several of the ablest counsel in Canada, and the opinion received has borne them out in their contention.

THE REMEDY

sought is an absolute cessation of the giving of any funds out of the treasury of the province to the support of denominational schools, immaterial of what religious body.

IT IS NOT LIKELY

that a compromise can be effected either. The Protestants claim this payment of school funds as illegal, and being illegal, should stop.

THE RESULT IS PROBABLY

that a compromise satisfactory to both parties or it may end in separate schools. This latter would be decidedly objectionable, apart altogether from the religious aspect.

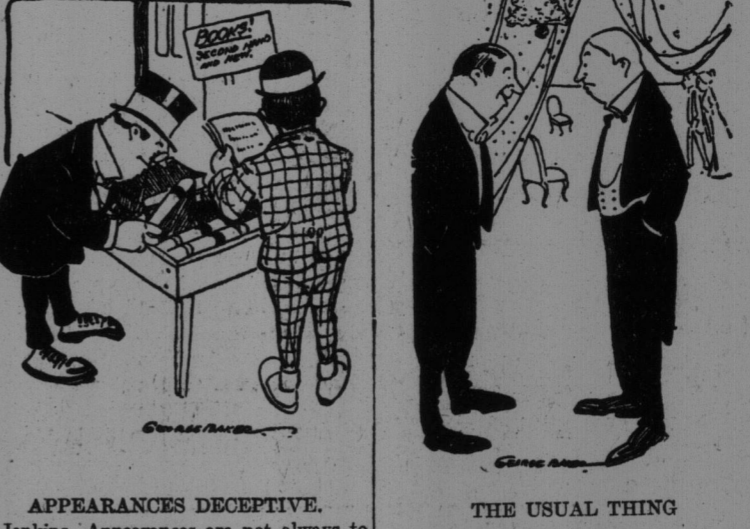

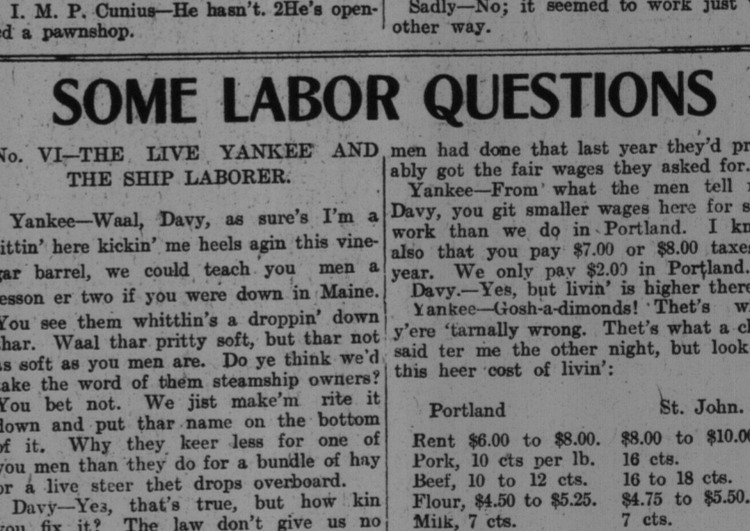

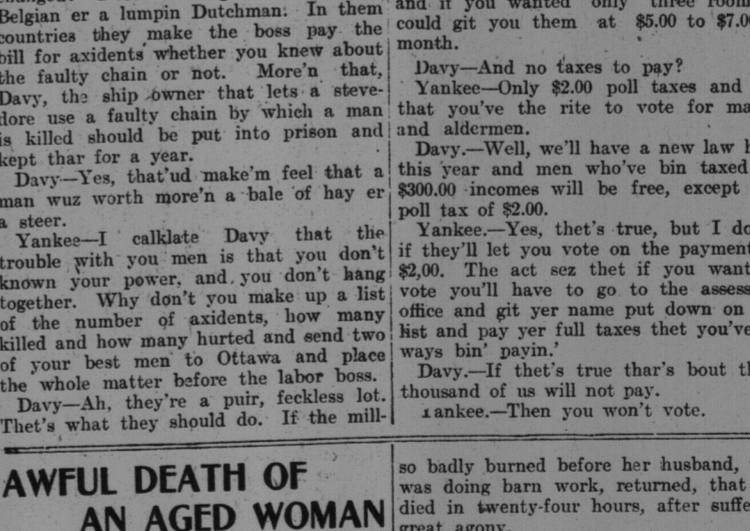

In 1896 running as Conservative, he was defeated by Mr. Ellis and shortly after that he left the Conservative party and announced himself as a supporter of the Laurier government.

He is a close student of commercial questions and should be able to discharge the duties of his new position with advantage to his country and credit to himself. The salary attached to Mr. Chesley's position is about \$3,000 per year.
