London, Ont., March 23—In the ex-plosion which wrecked the city of Hali-fax during the war, George Crichton, the young son of Brigadier Crichton, now of the local Salvation Army staff, but at that time stationed in Halifax, suffered a wound to the head from broken glass, since which time the lad has suffered much pain. Surgeons had found it im-possible to remove the glass, and had advised that nature be allowed to use its own processes in the difficulty. While the boy was in the Wortley Road School this week the piece of glass worked its way out, and the little fellow appears none the worse for the experi-ence.
