This office is to be controlled by a governing body of twenty-four members of whom twelve are to be selected by the governments, each elected by delegates at a conference representing employers and workers respectively.

Each delegation to the international labor conference may have two advisers, one of whom must be a woman. When questions affecting women are under discussion the voting shall be individual and not the traditional procedure of voting. The report says that employers and employes must be able to express their views with complete freedom and frankness if the conference is really to be representative of all concerned with industry.

Machinery also has been provided by which a state failing to carry out its obligations may be subjected to pressure.

An industrial association, employers or workers, may make representations to the international labor office, which governing body may communicate to the state criticized. If no satisfactory reply is received the correspondence may be published, which, the report says, probably would create considerable moral pressure.




