London, July 14-The governments of the British dominions will have a voice in determining the terms of peace, according to Mr. Lloyd George. The prime minister made this statement in a speech at a dinner given in honor of the Canadian editors who are visiting England, at which Lord Beaverbrook was the host.

"This is a war in which we engaged the empire," said the premier, "when we had no time to consult the dominions as to policy and it is perfectly true that the policy which we adopted to protect small nations in Europe was a policy which we embarked upon without any consultation with the dominions. by the Privy Council of Canada, that But you approved of it. 




