

# Organ Lights and Dims Church With Colors to Enhance Music Effect

Pittsburgh, April 22-Calvary Episcopal Church was packed when Mary Hallock Greenewalt's light and color player received its first public marvelous device, in which the colors of the rainbow are controlled by electricity and used to enhance the effect of the pipe organ music, is the property of Pierre do Pont, of Wilmington, Del. 



# START MOVE TO BAN BILLBOARDS

'Frisco Organizations Plan to Eliminate Advertising Signs on Roads.

San Francisco. April 22-Definite steps by civic organizations to eliminate billboards from the highways of nate billboards from the highways of the Pacific Coast, are expected to result from the impetus given the movement by the Standard Oil Company of California, which has torn down 1,200 of its roadway signs in California, Oregon and Washington.

The company removed its highway advertisements on the ground that they detract from the beauty of the roads, and ordered that hereafter such signs should be confined to commercial zones.

"There was instant public response up and down the coast," said Kenneth R. Kingsbury, president of the company. "We have had editorials, letters and telegrams by the hundreds indicating that a keen feeling exists concerning the marring of our great highways by signs."

The Skyline Boulevard, a great highway being completed from San Francisco southward along the high ridges overlooking the Pacific ocean, is reported to be insured against bill-boards.

Civic organizations all over the west have adopted resolutions commending the stand taken by the Standard Oil Company, and calling on other organizations to eliminate highway signs.

# CRIME DETECTION

Adopted in Tracking of Criminals.

London, April 22 — The modern Sherlock Holmes does not rely on abstract theories, but tracks the criminal down by highly scientific means.

Describing what happens when a crime of the first magnitude is reported, Dr. F. W. Crossley-Holland, lecturing at Bath, said.—

A party of technical experts, including a draughtsman, photographers and a finger-print specialist, is soon upon the scene. The draughtsman prepares a detailed plan of the scent in its immediate locality; if there is a body the photographers photograph it and also photographer he interior of the room from practically every angle. A searching examination is made of everything. X-rays are of great value in the detection of crime.





But if this exceptional and unexpected honor is a testimony of my great love for the city then I accept with a grateful and tranquil conscience."

A salvage company expects to obtain from this conflagration \$4,000 tons of scrap iron when the hulls are reduced to aches.



R. A. Hoey, M. P., of Springfield, Manitoba, was the first Progressive to reply. He said it was a pleasure and a privilege to come to a section which in the past had given to Canada some of her most distinguished and outstanding men. These provinces had given to Western Canada many of its most sterdy, frugal, progressive and successful pioneer citi-

Referring to Dr. Baxter, Mr. Hoey said that gentleman had made the Progressives the subject of some of his most scathing and forceful attacks, but the speaker believed they were a group that deep down in his heart the St. John member admired, and some day, no doubt, he would come to know and love them.

Mr. Hoey said that if there was any man he had a tendency to dislike or abhor it was he who spends two or three days in the west and finds a panacea for all its ills. Referring to the present visit to the East he said there were impressions made on the minds of the westerner. The first was that this section has a his-

he said there were impressions made on the minds of the westerner. The first was that this section has a history. It is anchored to the past as the West is not, and it is well not to detach ourselves from the historic setting which fixes its impression on our institutions. The institutions here he found to be established on principals distinctly British, recognizing liberty, justice and tolerance. In Manitoba forty per cent. of the people were non-English speaking, and twenty languages other than English were spoken.

The people in the East, perhaps, regret the departure of young men and women for the west. Do not regret it, said Mr. Hoey. They bring with them a philosophy of life, a conception of reform, a stability that make a contribution of the first magnitude to western progress. If they in turn become less eastern, we become less western. What is best is best calculated to bind us is the consciousness that we are of one stock, one blood, with common ideals. If these do not hold us, economic consciousness can never do it. In any country must hold us, economic consciousness can never do it. In any country must arise from time to time class demands

never do it. In any country must arise from time to time class demands and sectional appeals, and we hear of them in Canada.

It had been said by someone that class consciousness was a step in advance of individual consciousness; but two sessions in Ottawa had convinced him that Parliament was no place for sectionalism or class consciousness. What is required is a humanitarian consciousness, and sympathies as broad as our territory and as deep as the needs of the Canadian people in this crisis. He believed the majority had this consciousness and had faith in Canada; and, said the speaker, "if Canada cannot emerge soon from this crisis, I do not know of another that can survive at all."

Mr. Hoey said the western members were here to see and shake hands with the citizens and return to their tasks better equipped as a result of their stay here. The greatest tragedy in the life of a man is to be denied the right to grow upand earn his living in the land of his birth. That had been his own experience. He loved Canada, which had done more for him than any contribution he could make in return, and if he had fault to find he would leave its shores with sealed lips rather than speak a disparaging word. It was the duty of all to labor for unity and tolerance.



Production of silk dates far into antiquity, and for ages the manner of its production was kept secret. Up to the sixth century A.D. all raw silk was imported into Europe from China, but the Byzantine Emperor Justinian induced two monks to travel into China to procure silk worm eggs and though the export of them was punishable by death, these monks succeeded in bringing back a quantity concealed in the hollows of their pilgrims staves.

From Byzantium, silk cultivation spread into Greece and Syria, thence into Spain, and thence successively into Sicily, Naples, Northern Italy and France, being established in Italy in the sixteenth century.

Worm is given transportation facilities which few other commodities enjoy. The bales of skeins are stowed carefully in the vessels which transport them across the Pacific, and in such a manner that they can be speedily and safely discharged upon arrival at the Canadian or American port. No time is lost. Special trains made up of passenger bagage equipment await the arrival of the vessel if it docks at Vancouver as do the Empress liners of the Canadian Pacific, and once the valuable cargo has been sealed into the cars the train proceeds towards its destination, often making better time than the regular passenger trains.

Most of the silk imported to America comes from Japan, Italy and China where, also, the humidity of the atmosphere contributes no little to the success of the industry in those countries. The greatest importation is from the Flowery Kingdom, and this mostly in the raw-silk form as it is reejed from the cocoons.

Silk is valuable. In one consignment of a few hundred bales, hundreds of 'housands of dollars are tied up, and for this reason, that no time may be lost in making up the raw material and placing the finished goods upon the market, the product of the little silk
