MOTHER GETS BACK BABY SHE GAVE UP

Chancellor Backes Decides What He Calls Hardest Problem of His Career.

(New York Times.)
Vice Chancellor Backes at Newark yesterday decided what he characterized as the hardest problem he had had to solve in his many years on the bench: the custody of two-year-old Beatrice Judge. Two women claimed the child, the mother who had given her away when the child was six weeks old, and the foster-mother who had cared for and reared the child since.

The mother, Mrs. Beatrice H. Judge of Baltimore, a girl of eighteen, told the vice chancellor she had been married when she was fifteen, and deserted by her husband six months later. Five months after that the baby was born in Baltimore where the Judges' lived, and the mother, destitute and in despair, was overjoyed when Mrs. John H. Grieves, who was boarding in the same house, offered to take care of the baby.

Shortly after she had given the baby away, Mrs. Judge repented and tried to get her back, but the woman Mrs. Grieves had moved. Mrs. Judge was working in a store in Baltimore. In January last she learned that Mr. and Mrs. Grieves were living at 205 Fifth street, Jersey City, and she came here and brought her child to her.

"When the child was given into the care of Mrs. Grieves a formal and absolute surrender was not agreed upon," the vice chancellor said in his opinion. "It would be monstrous to hold this girl and society's mother to the supreme sacrifice. In its legal and moral aspects the mother's privilege was in no wise prejudiced by her negotiations with Mrs. Grieves, which at the most were tentative. And, though the latter, by a reciprocal relation of keenest love and affection between herself and the child, and though heartaches and sorrow will follow a separation, she must yield to the superior maternal right and in despair, unless thereby the well-being of the child is jeopardized."

"The parent's right will not be denied unless the foster alliance was protracted and acquired in a spirit of abandonment, and a severance of the child advantageous to the child. This is not the case here. While much sympathy is due Mrs. Judge, her right is self-imposed, nor unimpaired of the infinite grief which she has brought to the mother."

The infant's welfare, all matters considered, is paramount and compelling. The parental right, however, is never lost sight of as an influential and determining factor in the case. The housewife without children. Her grief is that she can bear none, and her solicitude and love for this foster child. Their home is comfortable and they fit in every way to raise the child as becomes their station in life. On the other hand, the mother, in appearance and deportment, is a splendid type of young womanhood, of unblemished character, and rearing a clean and pure in speech. These qualities and virtues are vouchsafed for by relatives and acquaintances."

The death of Samuel L. Peters occurred at his residence, Queenstown, Queens county on June 1 after a short illness. SENATE HEARS SENSATIONAL STATEMENT

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Ottawa, June 1—The discussion precipitated in the senate last week by Senator Bennett's references to Senators McLean, Sharp and Bradbury as "loyal and gallant colonels who kissed the tips of their fingers to these labor men and bade them good-bye and hoped they would come back safe" was renewed in the upper house today when Senator Sharp made some severe comments in reply. Senator Bennett in the course of his speech, made in the resumed debate on the bill repealing the deportation clauses of the immigration act referred to Senator Bennett as a contemptible cur, a statement which produced a commotion for some time.

Second reading of the bill was carried by a vote of 22 to 21, after Senator Lynch-Staunton's amendment for a six months' hoist had been lost on a tie vote of 21 to 21.

LIMITS PHYSICIANS' LIQUOR PERMITS TO 100 A QUARTER

Washington, June 2—In an effort to defeat the "indiscriminate sale" of liquor on physicians' prescriptions, Commissioner Williams of the bureau of internal revenue issued a ruling limiting the number of permits allowed each physician to 100 for each three months, except with "good cause."

The order, which Mr. Williams said was issued "after weeks of study and the investigation of records of scores of physicians," makes it obligatory for physicians to show where the liquor has gone before more prescription blanks will be issued by the bureau.

Officials said that while expecting a "flood of protests," such an order was "clearly within the administrative provisions of the Volstead act."

"It may work some hardship," said Mr. Williams, "but we believe that reputable physicians will not object to

KILLS OBJECT OF HER INFATUATION

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Mrs. Dunlop was thirty-six years of age and Eicheberger was thirty.

VIOLENT STORM HITS OTTAWA

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Ottawa, June 1.—A terrific storm broke over Ottawa this afternoon when two buildings were hit by lightning and destroyed, telephone and electric services were interrupted, many windows broken by the hail, swarms and trees blown down and the street car service stopped. In the twenty minutes during which the storm raged, 1.3 inches of rain fell which is the highest ever recorded in this city. The lightning and rain came with a strong southwest wind which before it was over had blown from practically every point of the compass.

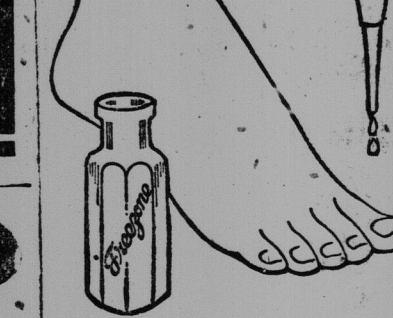

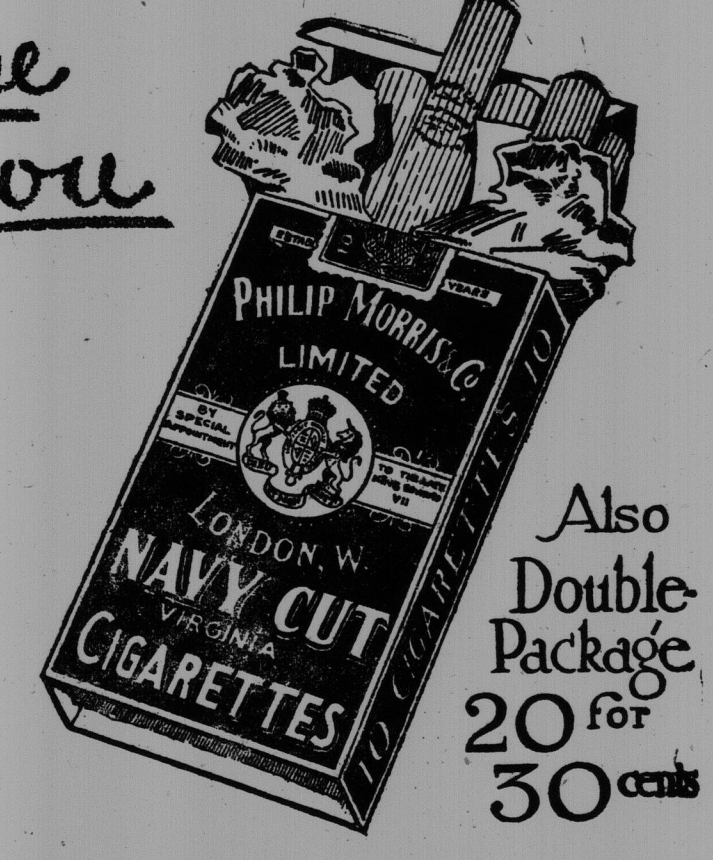

CATHOLIC RULERS

MAY VISIT KING OF ITALY IN ROME Rome, June 2—An encyclical document was published on Monday announcing an arrangement whereby Catholic sovereigns will be permitted by the Pope to come to Rome to visit the King of Italy. This paper is considered one of the most important since the fall of the temporal power. Indeed, it is surpassed in importance only by that issued by Pope Pius X. giving Catholics permission to vote in political elections and serve as deputies in parliament. Prior to that the watchword was 'neither electors nor elected' and in the general election it was the custom of Catholics to send their ballot papers to the Pope as a sign of loyalty. Word that President Louvet of France had decided to visit the Italian sovereign in April, 1919, led to the breaking off of diplomatic relations between the Vatican and France. Other attempts made by the kings of Belgium, Spain and Saxony to obtain permission to come to Rome were frustrated.

Preliminary arrangements were made for presenting a play in the autumn.

TO FIX PRICES FOR GARDEN PRODUCE

An unusually large attendance marked the meeting of the Market Gardeners' Association, held last night in the Silver Falls schoolhouse with Henry Shillington in the chair. The drought which is affecting the farmers and gardeners throughout the province was discussed, and it was the general opinion that the crop this year will be very small, if not a total failure, unless nature is assisted or the needed rains come. Some members reported that the only way they could urge the crop along under present conditions was a day-long tilling of the soil.

Several new members were elected and the co-operative spirit of the association, especially with regard to buying equipment, seed, and so forth, was explained. It was decided to standardize the price of vegetables, and the prices to be set will be based on a minimum of profit. Not having been notified of the intended increase in market rates, the matter was not discussed, but members later declared that they thought the rates high enough now.

CONTRACT FOR CITY ROAD LET

Matters Before Common Council Yesterday.

It was decided at yesterday's meeting of the common council to pave City road at a cost of \$137,000.50 to be paid for by bond issue. The contract was awarded to the Stephens Construction Company. The recommendation to lease a portion of the city town site at Lancaster to the parish for recreational purposes for a period of fourteen years at \$8 per year was approved. It was decided to send to the hospital authorities a letter from the Trades and Labor Council complaining of lack of sufficient medical attendants at the hospital.

The matter of training police and ambulance drivers in first aid was referred to Commissioner Thornton. The offer of the N. B. Power Company of a number of cars for the use of delegates visiting the city was accepted. The by-law affecting traveling shows was amended, the new rate being: For shows of ten cars and less, \$10 per car; between ten and twenty cars, \$22.50; more than twenty cars, \$300.

The committee of the whole recommended: That the tender of Estey & Company, for 180 boiler tubes for the ferry steamer Governor Carleton, at 48 1/2 cents a foot, be accepted; that the tender of George Moses for opening and filling the trench for a water main on Mount Pleasant Court, at \$2.50 per foot for earth, and \$13.75 for rock, be accepted; that the commission of public safety be authorized to call for tenders for the painting and calking of the city market; that Robert

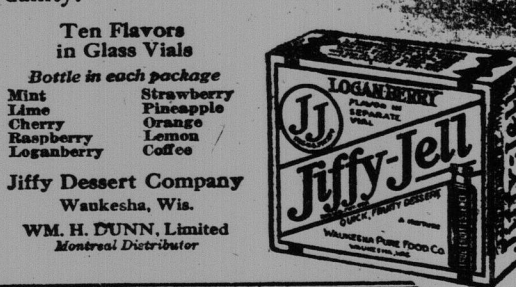


