We beg to lay before you, the Annual Report of our Secretary and Superintendent for the City of Saint John, which contains not only a record of the work done, but also various suggestions which appear to him and to us to have grown out of the work; specially in reference to better accommodation for the North-eastern and South-eastern parts of the city, and the erection within their limits of school houses, the improvement of buildings now in use, and the better adaptation of these, to their required uses. Also, in reference to Teachers' meetings-to supervision by Principa's-to improved methods in grading-the change in date of entrance to the first department-to the large number who are not attending school, probably one-third of the whole-to the great neglect of privileges through irregularity of those who are enrolled, which ought to appeal to every parent and guardian for amendment-to the improvement which would result from a change in the course of instruction, making it more continuous and con-

nected, and making, as in former years, the annual examination and grading to take place before the midsummer holidays, and to the general financial statement of our affairs, which are full and explicit.

The work which is under the care of the Board seems to be yearly improving, and we trust that this record of it may afford as much pleasure to you, as the doing of it has afforded to us.

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# REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

#### To the Board of School Trustees of Saint John: GENTLEMEN:

Herewith I respectfully present, for general information, full particulars of the present condition of the Public Schools of the City of Saint John, and of the work performed during the school year ended 31st October, 1883, together with such suggestions as naturally grow out of a consideration of the facts stated; the whole forming my twelfth annual report to your honorable body.

This year I have made some changes in the form of the statistical tables, which, I believe, will afford a better opportunity of comparing results than heretofore. Thus, instead of appending the semi-annual reports sent to the Board of Education in the tabulated forms, which treat every department as a separate school, I have grouped the returns and brought the several independent statements together, so as to show the status of the schools as aggregated in the respective buildings, adding some statements which do not find a place in the semi-annual returns, and to these, especially, I invite your careful attention.

The following brief summary, however, presents the leading statistical information required regarding the schools, attendance, &c., and the appended remarks are intended to emphasize the underlying facts which are apt to be overlooked in the perusal of long and intricate tabular statements.

The total number of pupils attending school was 3,589; but the enrolled number was 3,59,7, of whom, as shown by the School Registers, 1,854 were boys, and 1,743 were girls. As to ages, 3,394 were reported under 15 years, and 203 above 15 years.

These pupils made a grand total days' attendance of 301,973; the average daily attendance in all the schools being 2,710.24.

The percentage of enrolled pupils daily present was, by semi-annual or full time record, 75.51, while belonging; monthly, 84.12; and weekly, 92.28.

The teachers returned the names of 321 pupils who did not attend school during the previous term.

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but the enrolled number was 4,020; of whom, as shown by the School Registers, 2,028 were boys, and 1,992 were girls. As to ages, 3,709 were reported under 15 years, and 311 above 15 years.

These pupils made a grand total days' attendance of  $241,908\frac{1}{2}$ ; the average daily attendance in all the schools being 2,809.79.

The percentage of enrolled pupils daily present was, by semi-annual or full time record, 70.29, while belonging: monthly, 83.11; and weekly, 92.44.

The teachers returned the names of 667 pupils who did not attend school during the previous term.

School Lands and Buildings.—The real estate owned by the Board has been increased during the year by the purchase of the property belonging to the estate of the late Daniel J. McLaughlin, fronting 5c fect on Waterloo street,

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50 feet on Richmond street, and 80 feet on Brussels street with the connecting lots in the rear, for the sum of six thousand dollars. Upon this land stand the building known as Benevolent Hall, fronting on Waterloo street, and used as a school building for many years; a house, not tenantable, facing on Brussels street; and a barn towards Richmond street. The site is one well adapted for the erection of school buildings, and accordingly plans were prepared by Mr. G. Ernest Fairweather for a ten-school brick edifice, with Exhibition Halls, and tenders were called for upon specifications approved by the Board. The lowest tender, that of Mr, Alexander Harrison, was accepted, but he refused to enter into a contract and give security for the proper completion of the work; and, as the next lowest tender was considerably in advance of the figure set as the outside limit by the Board, the question of proceeding with the work of building was laid over until next spring.

The other landed property of the Board are the sites of the Victoria and Albert Schools, situated on the East and West sides of the harbor, respectively, with the buildings thereon; and the commodious school lot on the corner of Saint James and Wentworth streets, which remains in the condition left by the fire of 1877. The need of school buildings, on these unoccupied sites, is very great, and is increasing month by month, as the buildings under rental in these localities become more and more dilapidated and unfit for use. During the past two years nearly three thousand dollars have been expended from capital account in repairs upon buildings under rental, to keep them tenantable; and it becomes a question worthy of consideration, whether, upon the score of economy, it would not be cheaper, as it undoubtedly would be better from an educational stand point, to put the money required for these recurrent improvements into permanent buildings, rather than into "permanent repairs," which, from the nature of the buildings, cannot be made permanent. If, on the other

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hand, the feeling of the citizens generally is opposed to any increase in the amount of debentures the Board is at present authorized to issue, and they are content that about onethird of the children attending school on the Eastern side of the harbor should be housed in buildings under rental, which, even with every care and the expenditure of a large amount of money annually, cannot be made comfortable and attractive, then I would suggest that the amount of money required to be spent for these necessary repairs be no longer made a charge against Capital Account, but be included in the estimates of expenditure on Income Account, and included in the Trustees' Warrant for Assessment from year to year. Such a course would, at any rate, prevent the using up of capital oon buildings which are not the property of the public, while it would still enable the Board to keep rented buildings in as good a state of repair as their age and quality will permit.

The Victoria and Albert Schools are in a fair state of repair, although some work will have to be done upon them before long, especially in regard to making them more wind-tight, and providing for the more thorough and uniform heating of all the rooms during the coldest weather. The water-closets of the Albert School are also very unsatisfactory, and ought to be replaced by a similar arrangement to that in the Victoria School.

The better class of rented brick buildings, such as the Odd Fellows' Hall, Leinster Street School, Saint Malachi's Hall, Saint Joseph's, and Saint Vincent's, are easily kept in good order and with a very moderate outlay, although none of them are provided with sufficient yard room for use as playgrounds by the pupils before school is taken in and during recess.

The Charlotte Street School, though very well adapted for children in the primary grades, is entirely unsuited for the two departments of Advanced Boys therein located, the rooms being small and directly upon the street, the entrance

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from an alley, the yard only a few feet across, and the back windows, which most of the year have to be opened more or less to secure ventilation, opening directly above or in front of the outbuildings, which are seldom free from foul odors, although constant attention is given to their condition. If this building is to be retained for the departments at present located there, I recommend that the adjoining lot on the north be leased, an entrance to the school house be made in the northern wall, and the outbuildings be removed to the north-east corner of the lot. This arrangement would materially improve the sanitary condition of the school, and remove the cause for many of the objections now made against children being sent to this building. With an inexpensive school building upon the Weldon lot, for the primary and advanced pupils resident in the southern and south-eastern quarter of the city, however, such a redistribution of pupils could be made as to secure the Charlotte Street School for primary children only; whilst, at the same time, the present rented buildings on Queen and Sheffield streets could be given up for more suitable quarters,

The entire absence of any public grounds for recreation, within a reasonable distance of the homes of the children, and the demand for the cultivation of the physical as well as the mental powers of the youth of the City, calls for a wider provision in the matter of play-grounds than has hitherto been made. In a number of cases, the children attending the public schools have no other play-ground than the public streets, where it is impossible to keep them under such control as to prevent their interfering more or less with the comfort of the public. I am fully aware that in some cases it is difficult for the owners of buildings under rental to the School Board to provide such play-grounds adjacent to the school buildings as the schools require, but much of the difficulty might be overcome if more determined efforts were made to comply with the wishes of the Boa pres scho to t of th deep you child have mor mad mate Trus be n

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Board by those who accept yearly rents for providing school premises, whilst one of the most important adjuncts to a school—proper school grounds—is entirely wanting. I refer to this matter, not that it needs to be brought to the notice of the Board in this way, but in order that the public, so deeply interested in all that concerns the well-being of the young, and from whom come so many complaints of school children playing upon the streets, may know that few subjects have caused more difficulty, or have been considered with more care, than this very question ; and that, if provision is made for more accommodation in this direction, the estimate for "rents" must be increased, or the Board of School Trustees must be empowered to secure such grounds as may be necessary to meet this growing want.

[NOTE.—It will be seen by reference to the report of the Inspector, which came to hand after this report was written, that this question is again pressed upon the attention of the Board of School Trustees, by that officer.]

Teachers .- During the past year there were in the employ of the Board eighty-one teachers, besides thirteen assistants, who were employed for longer or shorter periods. . Of the regular teachers thirteen were males, holding First Class Licenses; five were males holding Second Class Licenses; thirty were females holding First Class Licenses; twentyeight were females holding Second Class Licenses; and five were females holding Third Class Licenses. The assistants were one male holding First Class License; one male holding Second Class; four females holding First Class; six holding Second Class, and one Third Class or Local License. None of the teachers, so far as I know, passed the examination for advance of Class during the year. There are a few, I believe, who would be greatly helped in their school work by a more thorough knowledge of the subjects required of those who apply for a First Class

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License; and there are others, who obtained this license years ago, who now need the training given in the Normal School to enable them to compete successfully with freshlytrained teachers, who have had the benefit of a well-conducted High School previous to their attendance at the Normal School. All these should be encouraged to lay aside their work of teaching for a time, that they may take it up with fresh vigor and increased power after such a course, or they should take the hint so kindly given, and seek another sphere of labor in which, possibly, their efforts would meet with more success. Notwithstanding all this, I believe that few cities of the size of Saint John can present such an array of thoroughly qualified men and women in the teaching profession as are to be found in the employ of this Board. Not, that they are perfect, by any means, but that they are honestly devoted to the work to which they have set their hands, and are faithfully striving by every means in their power to fit the youth given into their charge for the positions to which they may aspire or be summoned in future years. Indeed, so much has this been the case, that in many instances during the past year health has given way, and even retirement from active service become a necessity. And yet, these teachers cannot afford the rest so much needed, for the compensation received rarely enables them to leave their work when relaxation would be most beneficial, and they toil on until some nervous or other bodily ailment prostrates them and lays them aside-perhaps for ever. One second class male teacher, of very promising abilities, Mr. Hilary S. O'Keefe, was compelled to give up the service on account of failing health; others have been stricken down by disease and confined to their homes for considerable periods; and one first class teacher, who had served the public with great faithfulness for many years, Miss Kate R. Sugrue, passed away from earth and entered into eternal rest. One first class teacher, Miss F. L. Hanson, left the service with the best wishes of

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the Board for her happiness in the more retired sphere of . her own home.

Last year I called attention to the desirability of the teachers adopting some plan by which the less experienced among them, who are anxious to improve in their methods of teaching the several branches prescribed for their respective grades, might avail themselves of the knowledge possessed by those whose long standing in the profession and greater advantages eminently fit them for communicating instruction in the practical work of education; and I suggested that much benefit would be derived from occasional Saturday morning lectures upon subjects having a direct bearing upon the work of the school room. I regret that no action has been taken to establish such a course, but knowing that many of the teachers would gladly avail themselves of an opportunity for acquiring the information they need, and feeling assured that great benefits would accrue to the school service therefrom, I again advert to it, with the hope that the teachers will come together at least once a month during the coming year for the interchange of ideas upon the principles and practice of Teaching.

Supervision.—The work of supervision during the past year has been thrown more than ever before upon the Principals, and their responsibility for the condition and progress of the departments under their charge more clearly defined. This, I believe, has been attended with good results, the reports sent in at the close of the year giving evidence of a fair acquaintance with the work in all the standards taught in the buildings to which they refer. In order more fully to carry out this work of supervision in scattered schools of one or two departments, I have grouped the schools in the north and north-east sections of the District, and placed them under the charge of the Principals nearest to them. Thus, the five departments on Waterloo street, and the three on Brussels street, are to be supervised

by Mr. H. Town; and the four departments on Carlton street, and the two on Peters street, by Mr. W. C. Simpson. Time for visitation will be secured by the Principal's department being in my charge for purposes of examination, and by the occasional exchange of departments for the giving of lessons in special subjects. An arrangement of this character has been in existence for many years in the United States, and has been productive of much good by utilizing the special gifts of teachers to a wider extent than is possible in departments which always remain under the direction of one teacher, whilst it affords to teachers an opportunity of practice in teaching subjects outside of those prescribed for the one grade to which most of their time is given. This grouping also has a good effect in bringing these scattered departments more into line with the work pursued in buildings where the services of a Principal are at all times available. Hereafter, the Principals will be required to make a semi-annual report upon the work of all the departments under their charge, in addition to special reports that may be required from time to time for the information of the Board.

I have given more or less time of every school day to a general supervision of the schools, and by visitation and conference with teachers have maintained a pretty close acquaintance with every department of the service. To the teachers I desire to extend my hearty thanks for their ready co-operation and assistance.

Grading .- With the approval of the Board of Trustees, and in accordance with the suggestion which I gave in my last annual report, I have been able, for the first time in the history of our public schools, to establish the principle of holding but one grading examination, to cover the portions of subjects prescribed for each year of the respective standards. To accomplish this, the question papers were prepared with the greatest care, and were necessarily a more

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Trustees, ye in my he in the nciple of portions re standere prea more severe test of the pupils' attainments than has been required when two examinations were conducted in each year. I am glad to be able to state that this arrangement has been reached with less friction in the schools and with less dissatisfaction on the part of parents than I at first feared would result, and after the next examination in April, 1884, I hope to see all the schools working up to the full line prescribed for each grade or standard, and presenting to the Inspector on his annual visit a greater proportion of pupils able to pass with honor the examination he gives them. I also entertain the same hope respecting the grading examinations, by the results of which the pupils pass to a higher grade.

The Grading Examination for 1883 took place during the month of April, extending from the 9th to the 20th, and was carried on simultaneously in all schools of the same grade, certain subjects being set for each day. The question papers had been previously prepared with great care, and values assigned for correct answers to each question. Wherever possible, the answers were required to be in writing, and the aggregate of marks won upon the whole set of questions, plus the term marks awarded by the teacher, determined the standing of the pupil for grading. Returns were made by the teachers of the marks won by every pupil upon each of the subjects, and all who showed a final percentage of seventy-five were advanced a grade upon the first day of May. The return of marks being properly tabulated, showed that 1,605 pupils had duly won this promotion. Of these 8 were graduates of Standard XI., 13 of Standard X., 46 of Standard IX., 70 of Standard VIII., 108 of Standard VII., 167 of Standard VI., 234 of Standard V., 225 of Standard IV., 244 of Standard III., 249 of Standard II., and 241 of Standard I.

Here and there pupils who fell but little short of the required marks were subsequently permitted to pass separate examinations, and were promoted as they showed fitness for the work of the next higher grade.

The principle adopted by the Board last year, of requiring pupils commencing Grade I. to enter school at the beginning of the school year, has had a decidedly beneficial effect upon the condition of these departments, as the time and attention of the teacher, heretofore largely diverted from the work in hand to do something for those who were entering at all periods of the term, have been more closely confined to continuous, progressive efforts to bring the department forward as a whole. At times some dissatisfaction has been felt by parents whose applications for admission to Grade I. have been refused; but, in by far the majority of cases, a clear presentation of the reasons for such a course has resulted in prompt acquiescence with a rule which is both reasonable and beneficial. It is only when parents have permitted their children to remain away from school for two or three years after they have reached the legal schoolable age that the little ones are likely to suffer from the further loss of a few months schooling, and the difficulty in these cases might be met by the establishment of a department for the reception of such delinquents at all periods of the year, provided the number presented for admission was sufficient to warrant the additional expense. I believe, however, that as the public come to understand the nature of the rule, and why it has been adopted, the dissatisfaction will almost entirely disappear.

Attendance.—The school population of the city, that is, the number of children resident within the district of a schoolable age, is in the neighborhood of seven thousand. The number attending the public schools, for a longer or shorter period, was 4,256. Adding to this number those who attend private schools, and making a fair allowance for sick and infirm children, it would still appear that at least one-third of the children of the city, who ought reasonably to be supposed to be in training for the activities of life by taking advantage of the educational facilities provided, were

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that is, ct of a nousand. nger or er those ance for at least sonably life by d, were not in attendance at any school whatever, even for a single day.

Had the 4,256 children, whose names were enrolled, attended school for the 204 days the schools were in session, they would have made a grand total days' attendance of 868,224. But they really belonged to the schools only long enough to aggregate  $678,625\frac{1}{2}$  days, showing that they lost one-fifth of the time the schools were open.

But, further, these 4,256 pupils, during the restricted period of their belonging to the public schools, were in attendance only  $543,881\frac{1}{2}$  days, and thus lost one-fifth of the time they were actually pupils in their respective departments.

The result presented is one to be deplored by all who take any interest in the welfare of the rising generation, Here then is the fact that needs to be squarely faced, that at least one-third of the time, and correspondingly one-third of the benefits provided for the education of the boys and girls of the City of Saint John, were entirely lost by reason of the non-attendance at school of pupils who were not only enrolled, but were marked as in actual attendance for longer or shorter periods of the school year. How much of this laxity in regular attendance arose from causes beyond the control of parents, I have no means of knowing; but the question is one of growing magnitude, and I should be derelict to the duty I owe to the Board, and the public in general, not to place the facts on record, and having done this I leave them for such consideration and action as the importance of the question demands.

The School Year .- There is a question of some importance to which I invite the attention of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Education. Two years ago, in order to make the financial year coincide with the school year, the assent of the Common Council was obtained to close the books and accounts on the 31st day of October, in each year. Shortly after this action was secured and the change made, the school year, by order of the Board of Education, was made to close at the end of the school term in which the schools are inspected by the Government officer, and the Inspector was instructed to visit the schools of this city during the Winter Term. This order was probably issued because of the large number of schools in and near to the

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city which can be visited when travelling in country districts is rendered somewhat difficult by reason of stormy weather. The effect of the change, however, so far as Saint John is concerned, was to make the school year end on April 30th, whilst the financial year closes on October 31st. Moreover, the schools during the Winter Term are not as well attended as in the Summer Term, and the probability of the teachers' ability to present the required percentage of pupils is thereby considerably diminished. It is therefore of some moment to the teachers, as well as to the citizens, that the educational year and the financial year should be concurrent.

Perhaps I may be permitted to add-although I am aware that it is beyond the jurisdiction of this Board-that cogent reasons exist why the School Terms should be changed to Spring and Autumn, the former terminating at the opening of the Summer vacation, and the latter at the end of January. Such a provision would preserve the continuity of instruction during the Summer Term, which is now so sadly broken by the long vacation coming on just as the pupils are beginning to get into the work of the new grades upon which they now enter on the first of May, and it would also make the two terms of about equal length. Ι do not know how such an arrangement of terms would affect the efficient working of the school system in other districts, but I am convinced that it would meet with general acceptance on the part of painstaking teachers, who now find so much difficulty in satisfactorily completing the work expected of them during the Summer Term, by reason of the holidays falling in the middle rather than at the end of a School Term. In the event of such a desirable change as that now suggested being consummated, the annual examinations, inspection and grading would take place immediately before the midsummer holidays, and the financial year could be again changed to correspond with the school year.

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Centennial Exhibition .- Within three weeks of the opening of the Centennial Exhibition in this city, in the month of October, I received a request from a committee appointed by the executive body to aid them in preparing an exhibit of school work, and so earnestly was the request preferred that, notwithstanding the shortness of the time left for preparation, I determined to do what I could to help forward the movement. Circulars were prepared, and on the day named as that for the reception of specimens of manual school work, a large assortment was received from the city schools on both sides of the harbor, from Portland, and schools in the suburbs ; and also from more distant places, as Sackville and Upper Woodstock. The specimens consisted chiefly of samples of penmanship, free-hand drawing, mapping, and needlework; and, so far as the city schools were concerned, were mainly taken from collections of work done in the schools during the Summer Term, in the regular course of instruction, without a thought by any one that they. would be brought so prominently before the public eye. The location of the exhibit in the building was by no means a good one; the material was not designed for the rough-and-tumble style in which it was handled ; the awards properly should have been made as soon as the articles were in place and whilst looking their best, and many other drawbacks were experienced; and yet the display possessed sufficient character and merits to secure constant attention and words of praise. Indeed, from morning till night the tables were thronged with people, and very few who carefully examined the work of the little ones passed away without expressing their gratification at what they To many the whole display was doubtless merely an saw. agglomeration of fair to medium specimens of school work; whilst to others, who were willing to devote sufficient time to a close inspection of the heaped-up papers and needlework, there was sufficient to illustrate in quite a marked degree the character of the graded system under which the

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schools are conducted, and the general excellence of the work that is being done in these schools. Especially was this the case where the progress of the writing, for example, could be traced through a given series of departments from a pupil's first efforts in printing and print script to the fine set of business forms produced by a pupil of the High School; or in drawing, from the first attempt to draw a straight line to the elaborate design for a wall paper, carpet or oil cloth pattern, or lace curtain; or again, from the threading of a needle in the first grade of our girls' schools through all the stages of needlework, to the completed article of attire-shirt, skirt, apron, or whatnot-by the girls in the more advanced schools. In the collection was the cabinet belonging to Miss Gregg's department of the Victoria School, which, although it did not receive as much attention and mention as it deserved, ought not to be passed over in this brief review. It contained almost everything requisite to illustrate the work of the first grade of our schools, including a set of geometrical forms, samples of different grains and common vegetables, the useful minerals, pictures of animals, a color chart, and sets of colored silks, wools, and papers and other articles for quickening the powers of observation and giving proof by selection of the knowledge gained.

The medals and certificates awarded by the judges have not yet been received. Mr. Keohan has kindly offered to supply frames for the latter as soon as they come to hand.

Prizes.—In a tabulated form, to be found in the appendix to this report, will be presented in detail the various prizes which were awarded to pupils, either for highest standing in their respective departments, or for special excellence in given subjects. These prizes came to the Board through so many sources that mention cannot be made of all the donors, to all of whom, however, the thanks of the Board, the officers, the teachers, and the children are alike due.

The munificent donation of two hundred dollars by the Hon. Isaac Burpee, and the generous gift of a large number of books by Geo. F. Smith, Esq., however, entitle them to a more special reference. These prizes were distributed as widely as possible, so as to be in competition by every grade of pupils throughout the whole range of schools. They were offered at the commencement of the Winter Term, and were duly worked for by the children, among whom the prospect of their award caused a very general rivalry, and awakened an interest that was felt in every part of the service. The offer was set forth in the following terms:

One Prize of Twenty Dellars to Boys of Grammar School. "Girls of High School, "Boys of Grammar School,

Girls of High School, in Grade IX., for highest marks on examination of papers on work of Grades VIII and IX.

One Prize of Twenty Dollars for competition by Boys of Grammar School, and Girls of High School, on uniform subjects in Grades X. and XI.

Competitors must show at least seventy-five per cent. of attendance during term, and make an average of at least seventy-five per cent. of marks during term. The awards will be made upon the highest marks won during term and upon the examination papers.

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The examination papers will cover the whole ground embraced within the several standards of the course of study prescribed by the Board of Education.

All competitors will be furnished with a number, which must be placed at the head of every paper, together with the name of the school, name of the teacher, and grade of the pupil.

All work must be performed neatly upon the uniform sheets which will be provided.

Every paper must be worked at the time indicated thereon, and each day's work must be carefully gathered up and placed beyond the reach or control of the pupil, at its close.

The examinations will commence on Monday, April 9th, and all returns must be in the hands of the Secretary on or before Saturday, April 21st.

The presentation of prizes will be made in the hall of the Victoria School, at such time as may hereafter be decided on.

When the time arrived for making the award a special set of question papers was prepared, covering the work called for, and the committee, to whom the task of examining the answers was given, found a mass of papers and material placed before them, as a result of the examination, that surprised if it did not terrify them. The work, however, was at last completed, and a day appointed for presenting to the winners the rewards for their toil. A large company of ladies and gentlemen gathered in the Exhibition Hall of the Victoria School upon the occasion, and the presentation was made to the happy children who had distinguished themselves in the contest. In addition to the money prizes and books, the Board gave to all those whose marks brought them in close competition with the winners of prizes, a handsomely printed Certificate of Honor. The name of the winners of prizes are given, with other particulars, in the appended table, before referred to.

As J. W. Gallivan had secured the Corporation Gold Medal for Classics and English, the Lorne Medal was awarded to Wm. C. Cross.

Financial.—On the 1st of November, 1882, the books showed a balance in favor of Capital Account of \$16,737.24. The amount was increased during the year, by the sale of debentures for \$8,600, which realized \$9,119.69, to \$25,856.93. The expenditures for Lands and Buildings, Furnishing and Repairs, amounted to \$7,567.19, leaving a balance on hand on October 31st, 1883, of \$18,289.74.

The Income Account, at the opening of the year, showed a balance on hand of \$2,448.95, which was increased dur-

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ing the year by Assessments, \$50,865.01; County School Fund, \$7,881.31; Provincial Grant (Superior Allowance), \$463.72; and Rents, \$50, thus bringing the total amount up to \$61,808.99. The expenditures on this account were made up as follows: Teachers' Salaries, \$28,144.45; Interest, \$10,622.17; Rent and Insurance, \$5,776.21. Grammar School (including a balance from last year). \$3,875; Care of School Buildings, \$2,398.28; Office (including Secretary's salary, rent, printing annual report, printing school forms, advertising, books and stationary), \$1,724.42; Fuel, Water and Light, \$3,916.19; General Maintenance, \$1,-470.77; and Books for Indigent Pupils, \$13.02; the whole amounting to \$57,940.51.

The receipts not coming in at the times when payment of salaries and interest had to be made, the customary loan had to be raised, but this year \$5,000 was found to be sufficient, and this was refunded before the close of the year. The balance on hand on Oct. 31st was \$3,868.48, the largest balance this account has shown at the close of the year since the commencement of operations.

The total amount of assessment in default is 67,867.25, but as nothing has been received on the balance of 1872 (7,798.88) since 1876, the amount yet available may be set down as considerably less than 60,000.

If during the coming year the Board should decide to proceed with the erection of the much-needed buildings in the north and south of the city, the balance on Capital Account will be exhausted, and in order to meet the current expenses on Income Account the receipts will have to be very largely increased, or the Board will have to resort to extensive loans during 1884.

The following table presents at a glance the exact condition of the Income Account from year to year, the final surplus showing the amount in the treasury upon which to commence the year's operations—a sum sufficient only to meet the demands of the remaining two months of 1883:

## REPORT

#### OF THE

# INSPECTOR OF SCHOOLS.

#### To the Trustees of Schools for the City of Saint John; the Hon. John Boyd, Chairman:

SIR:

I have much pleasure in being able to report to your Board that the condition of the Public Schools in the City of Saint John, under your charge, is, upon the whole, highly satisfactory. Since my last annual report to you, I have again carefully examined and inspected all the schools; and I have this year to repeat, in regard to the discharge of their duties by the teachers and the general attainments of the pupils, the remarks made in that report. The teachers, as a body, have done their work faithfully and well. The progress made by the far greater number of the pupils has been marked and steady. Indeed, the Common Schools of the City of Saint John may now, I believe, fairly challenge comparison with similar schools in any portion of the world, and would honorably hold their own creditable place in any proper estimation of their merits and of the benefits they confer upon, and the advantages they afford to, the whole community.

There are, however, still existing certain wants and deficiencies, such as those which were specially pointed out in my last report. There is still in some schools an inadequate supply of apparatus and appliances for the purposes of the

respective standards of instruction. And there is yet the want of good school play-grounds, or a large, well-appointed and well-managed general play-ground, which all the children in the public schools should be entitled to use and enjoy. As this is a matter which, in my judgment, is of very great and constantly increasing importance, I take the liberty to again speak of it, and to repeat what I last year said in regard to it.

The occasional pressure of the large numbers of children admitted to the primary schools upon the space provided for them, as well as upon the time and the energies of the teachers in those schools, is also a point which deserves serious consideration, and the application, as soon as possible, of an effectual remedy.

It is gratifying to know that your Board have wisely taken steps to improve, in this and other respects, the state of the schools in the north-eastern section of the city. The prudent purchase of the spacious grounds they have within the past year acquired, and the erection of the proposed new buildings, will prove a great boon to a large part of our population in that quarter.

And if some provision should be made for the better accommodation of the children residing in that portion of the city commonly called the Lower Cove, another important step will have been taken in the right direction. I trust that we shall soon see the Mission House School removed to a more suitable situation; and on this point, also, I beg to refer to the remarks offered in my last report.

A list of the pupils who were "Passed" at the examinations of candidates for participation in the Superior School Allowance this year, is herewith submitted. They were sent up, of course, from only a few schools, and the total number of canditates is relatively small. But the examinations were tolerably satisfactory; and the results indicate that the work of the Eighth Standard is being well done.

In the hope that the coming year may be a year of

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increasing prosperity in all our educational affairs, and that no adverse circumstances may arrest the progress and the healthy development of our school system,

# AUDITORS' REPORT.

#### To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the Common Council:

#### GENTLEMEN :

By virtue of your appointment under the authority of Chap. 65 of the Consolidated Statutes, Sec. 95, to examine the books and accounts of the Board of School Trustees of the City of Saint John, for the year ending on 31st October, 1883, we respectfully report that we have examined the books and accounts and found them correct, (with the exception of an error of thirtytwo cents in Messrs. Magee Bros.' bill in July, and fifty-four dollars and seventeen cents twice charged in account of salaries, which latter amount will appear corrected in the accounts of the current year); the receipts accurately stated, and the expenditures properly vouched. The accompanying statements show the receipts and expenditures of the past year, and also the exact condition of the several accounts, showing a balance of \$22,158.22 on hand, 31st October, 1883, which amount we find accounted for as follows:

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## RULES AND REGULATIONS.

## DUTIES OF PRINCIPALS.

POSITION.—The teacher of the highest grade of any series of departments conducted in the same building, shall be designated the *Principal* of the school; and where different grades of *Primary*, *Advanced*, or *High Schools*, are respectively accommodated in separate buildings, the teacher of the highest grade of each shall be designated the Principal.—*Reg.* 25.

Note.—For the better supervision of scattered schools, those in the north and north-east of the city have been grouped under two Principals.

AUTHORITY.—The Principal of a school shall have a responsible supervision over the time tables, exercises, methods and general discipline pursued in all its lower grades, and over the conduct of all the pupils, as committed to teachers generally by the provisions of Regulations 22 (3) (7) and 28 (5); and it shall be competent for the Principal teacher, in his discretion, to exercise, on occasion, paramount authority in discipline, and to administer the same.— Reg. 25.

CONFERENCE.—It shall be the duty of the Principal of each school to convene a meeting of the teachers associated with him at least once a month, for conference respecting the interests of all the departments of the school.—Reg. 22 (13).

At these meetings, of which a record for the inspection of the Board of Trustees shall be kept, may be discussed and agreed on all matters affecting the proper management of each department, so that uniformity in discipline and instruction may be, as far as possible, secured; and it shall be the duty of the Principal, at his periodical visits to the other grades of the school, to observe and report to the Board how far the course agreed upon is being carried cut.—Order Board of School Tor tees.

VISITATION .- The Principal shall visit the other departments as

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often as practicable, always, however, with a due regard to the efficiency of his own grade; and time for such visitation may be found by making the recess of his own department, on the day of his visits, to come before or after the recesses of the other grades, or by exchanging with the teacher whose department he is supervising.—Order Board School Trustees.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTION.—Whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it may be desirable that the Principal shall give instruction to pupils of another grade, a written notification thereof shall be given to the Principal and Teacher, and such instruction shall be given by the Principal in his own room.—Order Board. School Trustees.

EXAMINATIONS.—Principals shall devote one whole day in every three months to an examination of the pupils of the other grades, and make a written report thereon to the Superintendent for the information of the Board. They shall also co-operate with the Superintendent in the work of grading, and assist him by every means in their power to complete the returns rapidly and satisfactorily.—Order Board of School Trustees.

## **DUTIES OF TEACHERS.**

It shall be the duty of each and every Teacher:

DEPORTMENT.—1. To maintain a deportment becoming his position as an educator of the young; and to strive diligently to have exemplified in the intercourse and conduct of the pupils throughout the school the principles of Christian morality. To this end, it shall be his duty to give instruction to the school, as occasion may require, concerning moral actions and habits.— Reg. 22.

RELIGIOUS TENETS.—2. While employed in the discharge of public school duties, not to make use of any religious catechism, nor to interfere or permit interference on the part of others, with the religious tenets of any pupil.—Reg. 22.

HEALTH AND MANNERS.—3. By familiar lessons to inform his pupils of the general conditions of health, how it may be retained and ill-health avoided. To maintain a regular supervision of the pupils in the play-ground, to see that no improper language is used, and that games are honorably played; and, generally, to

have a care out of school over the deportment of the pupils while absent from their homes. [Reg. 11, Rem. 1. The teacher, while superintending the pupils in the play grounds, will obtain knowledge which, in his subsequent instruction, he can turn to the best account, both in the encouraging of what is right, and in the dissuading from what is wrong; in a word, in the moulding of moral character.]—Reg. 22.

PERMITS AND TRANSFERS.—4. Not to enrol upon the school register, in districts having more than one department or school, the name of any pupil in any term without a permit signed by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees. The teacher shall carefully preserve every such permit till the expiration of the term. In the event of any pupil being transferred from one department to another during the term, a line shall be ruled in the Register, opposite (to the right hand of) his name, and the words "Transferred to — Department or School" written thereon. A line shall also be ruled (up to the day on which he enters) in the Register of the teacher receiving the transferred pupil, and the words "Received by Transfer from — Department or School" written thereon. The attendance of any pupil transferred to another department or (public) school, within the term, shall be dealt with as directed in the Register.—Reg. 22.

Teachers are not to receive into their schools any new pupil who does not bear a permit from the Secretary, and they are required to be very careful to ascertain that such pupil is really new to the city public schools, in order that column " $21\frac{1}{2}$ " of the semi-annual report may be filled up correctly.—Order Board School Trustees.

Remark.—In order to fill column  $21\frac{1}{2}$  of the semi-annual roport, it is necessary for each teacher to retain a list of the pupils attending his department during the previous term, and to add to it the names of all new pupils who were in some other department the previous term, so that the information asked for may be furnished; or else to mark against the name of new pupils on the Register "For column  $21\frac{1}{2}$ ."

Teachers are not to receive into their schools any pupil from another school who does not bear a properly accredited "transfer during term" from the Secretary, or a grading transfer signed by the Superintendent. All transfer tickets of pupils removed "dur-

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ing term" are to be preserved, and delivered at the office of the Trustees at the close of each term.—Order Board of School Trustees.

SCHOOL REGISTER.—5. To keep with the greatest care and accuracy the Register prescribed by the Board of Education (to be obtained from the Board of Trustees, and to remain their property), and to call the roll just previous to beginning the regular school work each morning and afternoon. All cases of tardiness or absence shall be carefully enquired into, and noted in the Register.—Reg. 22.

SCHOOL WORK.—6. To furnish the pupils with constant employment in their studies, and to endeavor by judicious and diversified modes, to render the exercises of the school pleasant as well as profitable.—Reg. 22.

DISCIPLINE.—7. To practice such discipline as would be exercised by a kind, firm, and judicious parent in his family. It is strictly enjoined upon all teachers to avoid the appearance of indiscreet haste in the discipline of their pupils, and in any difficult cases which may occur, to apply to the Principal of the school (if a graded one), or to the Trustees, for advice and direction.— Reg. 22.

Remark.—Corporal punishment is discountenanced by the School Trustees of Saint John.

CHARGE OF PROPERTY.—8. Subject to the arrangements of the Board of Trustees, to see that the school house is kept in proper order in respect of cleanliness, neatness, heating and ventilation; and, especially, that the school room is always ready for the reception of pupils at least twenty minutes before the time fixed for opening the school.—Reg. 22.

9. To regulate the temperature of the school-room by a thermometer. In winter the temperature during the first school hour in the forenoon or afternoon should not exceed 70°, nor 66° during the rest of the day.—Reg. 22.

10. To have a care that the yards, sheds and outhouses are kept in order, and that the school house and premises are locked at all proper times. To exercise strict vigilance over the public school property under his charge, the buildings, outhouses, fences, &c., furniture, apparatus and books, so that they may receive no

injury; and give prompt notice in writing to the Secretary of the Trustees of any supplies which may be required for the school, or of any repairs which may be required to be made to the building, outhouses, furniture, &c.—Reg.22.

TIME-TABLE.—11. To keep in a conspicuous place in the school-room a time-table, showing the order of exercises for each day in the week or month, and the time devoted to each per day.—Reg. 22.

ATTENDANCE.—12. Not to be absent from the school, except as expressly authorized by the Regulations of the Board of Education, without permission from the Board of Trustees, unless in case of sickness, in which case the absence is to be immediately reported to their Secretary.—Reg. 22.

13. In graded schools to attend all meetings of the teachers of the school called by the Principal.—Reg. 22.

RETURNS.—14. To make the affidavit required by Section 88 of the Act, and furnish the Board of Trustees, when solicited by them or their Secretary, every reasonable assistance in making the Returns required by the Education office.—Reg. 22.

15. In case of a change from one school or department to another during a term, the teacher, on removal, is to deposit with the Secretary of the Trustees the required affidavit for the time taught. The affidavit of the teacher's successor is, in such a case, to include only that portion of the term during which he has had charge of the school or department, and is to be executed on the blank form contained in the Trustees' Return.—Reg. 22.

16. To hold a public examination of the school each term as required by Section 87 of the Act.-Reg. 22.

17. In graded schools, to assist the Board of Trustees in classifying the pupils according to their attainments, as required by Section 74 (2) of the Act.—Reg. 22.

18. To submit his agreement with the Trustees, and also his license, to the examination of the Inspector, or Chief Superintendent, whenever required, and to supply any and all information in his power relating to his school or department, whenever so directed by either of them.—Reg. 22.

19. The teacher of each department of graded schools shall, at the close of each school term, promptly furnish to the Board of Trustees a full and duly attested report of the department under

his or her charge, in accordance with the form supplied to the Trustees by the Chief Superintendent.—Reg. 22.

VISITING DAYS.—In order to facilitate the continuous acquisition of professional knowledge and skill on the part of those authorized by the Board of Education to discharge the responsible duties of teachers, and to secure in as high a degree as possible the educational benefits contemplated by the school system, the following provisions are ordained in behalf of Teachers' Visiting Days, for observation of schools, and Teachers' Institutes :

Visiting Days.—In the manner and under the conditions specified in Reg. 19 (4) any teacher may, with the concurrence of the Board of Trustees, substitute two Saturdays in each term, in place of two of the regular teaching days, in order to visit other public schools for purposes of professional observation. Before making application in this behalf to the Board of Trustees, it shall be the duty of the teacher to ascertain that the school or schools he proposes to visit will be in operation on the day for which leave of absence is sought, and also to acquaint in advance the teacher of any school which he intends to visit of the time of such visit.— Reg. 23.

Teachers' Institutes (3).—On giving written notice of at least one week to the Board of Trustees, and due notice to the pupils, teachers shall be entitled to be absent from their schools for the purpose of attending the sessions of the Teachers' Institute.— Reg. 23.

COLLECTIONS, SUBSCRIPTIONS, &C.—No collection shall be taken up or subscription solicited for any purpose, or notice of shows or exhibitions given in any school without the consent of the Trustees; nor shall any teacher act as agent for text-books, or sell stationery, or receive presents (unless presented to him on his retiring from school), nor award prizes or medals of his own to the pupils under his charge.—Reg. 24.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.—No person shall be admitted to or continue in any public school as a pupil, if he is afflicted with, or has been exposed to any contagious disease, until all danger of contagion from such pupil, or from the disease or exposure, shall have passed away, as certified in writing by a medical man.— Reg. 26. No ers b Or

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Note.-Blank forms of medical certificate are supplied to teachers by the Secretary of the Saint John School Trustees.

OFFICIAL VISITS.—When the schools are visited by the Chief Superintendent of Education, the Trustees and their Secretary, the City Superintendent, or the County Inspector, the pupils shall rise from their seats upon the entering and retiring of the visitors, and pay them the utmost respect while inspecting the school.—Order Board School Trustees.

HOME VISITATION.—Teachers are required to keep a record of the address of the parents or guardians of their pupils, and so far as is consistent with their other duties, endeavor by visitation at their homes to make themselves acquainted with the temperament, habits, and wants of their scholars. A record of such visitation shall be kept by each teacher, and a return thereof be made to the Trustees whenever called for.—Order Board School Trustees.

MONTHLY REPORTS.—Teachers are required to keep a Merit Book for the daily record of the school standing of the pupils. These figures are to be made up and registered weekly, and reported to the parents or guardians of the scholars every month on the forms supplied by the Secretary.

In addition to the semi-annual return made to the Board of Education, the teachers are required to file in the office of the Trustees, within the first three days of every school month, a report of the condition of their departments during the previous month, shewing the number of school desks, number of school days, number of names on the register, number of pupils belonging, number in attendance during the month, the weekly average, the daily average, and the monthly, weekly and daily percentage of attendance.—Order Board School Trustees.

SCHOOL STANDING.—The following shall be regarded as the STANDARD for every member of the school : Prompt attendance at each school sitting ; unexceptionable conduct while subject to the teacher's supervision, whether in the school room or elsewhere ; industrious application in the discharge of every school duty; and excellence of scholarship in the subjects of prescribed study, according to the pupil's assignments in the course of instruction pursued in the school.—Reg. 34 (2).

The teacher shall assign a fixed numerical value to the above standard (say 5 or 10) for each half day (or for each day), to be available in respect of those pupils only who are present; and the teacher shall, according to his best judgment, determine and record at the time what abatement is to be made for any half day (or day) from this standard figure on account of tardiness, improper conduct, want of application, or imperfect scholarship. At the close of the calendar month the teacher shall make entry in the school register of the sum of the standard figures (or parts of them) retained for the month by each pupil, and the aggregate of these monthly entries shall be regarded as the pupil's school standing for the term.—Reg. 34 (3).

ROLL OF MERIT.—At the close of the term the teacher shall present a written report under his signature to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, stating (1) the names, with the School Standing for the term annexed to each, of the pupils having first, second, and third positions; and (2) the name of any pupil who, while a member of the school or department, was unavoidably absent, and whose actual average daily standing being allowed for such days of absence, not exceeding five in any case, would make his school standing for the term equal to that of a pupil whose name shall have been reported in the foregoing statement (1).— Reg. 34 (4).

## DUTIES OF PUPILS.

The following requirements are made of each and every pupil attending the city public schools :

1. That he come to school clean and tidy in his person and clothes; avoid idleness, profanity, falsehood and deceit, quarrelling and fighting; be kind and courteous to his fellows, obedient to his instructors, diligent in his studies, and conform to the rules of the school.

2. That he present to the teacher an excuse from his parent or guardian, for tardiness or absence from school.

3. That he attend (in districts having more than one department), the particular department to which he shall be assigned by the Trustees in pursuance of Sections 59, 74 (2) of the Act.

4. That he be present at each inspection and examination of

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his school or department, or present a satisfactory excuse for absence.

5. That he be amenable to the teacher for any misconduct on the school premises, going to and returning from school, except when accompanied by one of his parents or his guardian, or some person appointed by them.

6. That he come to school with prescribed text-books and school requisites needed in his class, (but in case his parents or guardians, after notice, fail to provide the required books, the Trustees are to provide the same as directed by the law).---Reg. 28.

Destruction of School Property.-Any school property that may be wilfully injured or destroyed by any pupil, is to be made good forthwith by his parent or guardian.-Reg. 27.

## **DUTIES OF CARETAKERS.**

1. To sweep clean the floor of the school premises, and carefully dust the desks and school furniture once every day.

2. To scrub the floors of the school-rooms, halls and stairways, at least once a month.

3. To keep the walls, windows and ceilings free from cobwebs, or other accumulations of dust and dirt.

4. To make and keep up the fires when required by the Principal, so as to maintain in each room a temperature of seventy degrees, at the time of opening school, and not less than sixty-six degrees during school hours; and in the Victoria and Albert Schools, and wherever required, to maintain fires night and day throughout the winter season, so that no frost may enter the buildings. Where stoves are used they are to be kept clean and neat, the fire-pots to be white-washed, and all other parts, together with the stove-pipes, to be thoroughly black-leaded and polished.

5. In the Victoria and Albert Schools, and wherever required, to attend the door during the gathering or dispersion of the schools, and generally to do whatever the Trustees, through their Secretary, or the Principal, may require to be done for the proper care of the school property.

6. To remove all accumulations of snow and ice at the approaches to the school building; to keep the sidewalks clean and elear, and the yards in a reputable condition.

7. To see that the outhouses and water-closets are kept in good

repair, the walls free from marks, and the floors and seats clean and decent. Also, to report to the Secretary of the Board when the vaults and ash-bins require to be cleaned.

Care-takers are supplied with brooms, black-lead brushes, blacklead, shovels, dust-pans, banister brushes, and dusters.

Care-takers are paid at the office of the School Trustees, on the first of every month ; and their bills must be presented monthly, the Principal or teacher of the school certifying thereon that the work has been performed in an entirely satisfactory manner.

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
