MURDER AND SUICIDE IN NEW ORLEANS BY MEANS OF CHLOROFORM.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 30.—A phenomenal tragedy is that by which Juliette Dietz lost her life today, and which will cause the death of Etienne Deschamps as well. Juliette was but 15 years old, a handsome girl, Deschamps is a dentist, over 50 years of age but well preserved, a man of good address and handsome features. He Deschamps has lived in New Orleans for five years, and has been on intimate terms with the Dietz family for nearly two years past. He took a fancy to the little girl, Juliette, aged 15, and Lorraine aged 9, made them presents, and often took them out walking with him in the afternoon. They started for their usual promenade today at 1 P. M. and after long walks and rambling through the squares, they reached Deschamps' dwelling. He asked the girls to enter his house and when they reached his room told Juliette to be down on the bed and rest herself. The story which follows was told by Lorraine the only survivor. When Juliette was on the bed, Deschamps asked her to smell his handkerchief, which was evidently saturated with chloroform, for the moment she was sound asleep, he took her handkerchief and placed it on her face. He then opened the door, closed the door behind her, and locked the door behind her. The little girl was as she was hidden. It was an hour afterward before the door was broken open, and then the bodies of Deschamps and Juliette were found lying on the bed, the girl dead from chloroform and the man dying. The latter was taken to the hospital, but he never recovered, and there is no hope of his recovery. An examination of the body of the girl showed that Deschamps had committed suicide, and that Juliette was under the influence of chloroform.

CHLOROFORM, Feb. 1.—This morning's Standard says: "Bismarck is not likely to court a quarrel with the United States for the sake of gratifying the legal opinion of Herr Welser, or any of the pasting Germans who aspire to treat the Roman Empire as their Pacific preserve. SOME INTERESTING COMPARISONS

The revenue per head from these sources was therefore much smaller in Canada than in the United States.

ST. JOHN, PORTLAND AND CARLETON

The union of St. John and Portland does not seem to have received that measure of support which was expected after the report of the Dominion in regard to the bill. The bill will probably be passed in the "ticket of leave" measure which was passed in England, at the instance of Lord Grey, in 1852. The bill promised to assimilate and amend the laws which do not obtain in the several Provinces of the Dominion, in regard to cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, and bills of lading, and mercantile law. These, and the other measures promised, will make up a by no means inconsiderable session, and Canadians generally will be well pleased that more legislation is now being undertaken.

NOTE AND COMMENT

It is reported in London that the street car strikes on the surface roads of New York and Brooklyn, have been attended by scenes of violence and bloodshed, which show how powerless the authorities of these cities are to grapple with disorders, and how the lawless elements are able to do pretty much as they please in the two cities. The right of a man to refuse to work for such wages as are offered him is unquestionable, but when he attempts to prevent other men, who are out of employment, from doing so, he becomes a law breaker and should be dealt with in a summary fashion.

THE GLOBE IS QUOTING THE VIEW OF SIR CHARLES DILKE ON AN ASSASSINATION, WITH THE SPEECH MADE BY HIM AT THE SHREVEPORT OBSERVERS OF EVENTS. DILKE IS THE MAN, WHO A FEW YEARS AGO, WAS GUILTY OF A COURT OF LAW, AND HAS BEEN LINED IN THE FOLLOWING FASHION: "As we all know there have been questions connected with the relations between the government and the United States, which is true with reference to our national conduct towards our people and those on the other side of the border. I expect to be connected with which I am connected to investigate if we are not kept in continual session at Washington. I am not inclined to discuss it now. I simply desire to intimate that my feeling is that the people of the United States should be controlled by that eventually - not with war, not with violence - I believe will be adopted that will result in the end in placing the American flag upon the Canadian soil. (Applause.) While today there is not much inclination to come to the part of the United States and Canada, yet in my opinion, it will only be a very few years before they will be one country, and Canada, that stretches from the mountains which our northern border, will become a part of the United States of America." (Applause.)

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HUNGERING FOR CANADA

Our American cousins feel it very difficult to let Canada alone. They hunger for our broad acres, our magnificent agricultural lands, our splendid forests, and boundless prairies, our vast mineral resources and all the other treasures which a beautiful Providence has lavished on the Dominion of Canada. Almost every American in public life has something to say in favor of the annexation of Canada; almost every newspaper writer in the Union has spread himself in the type on the same all absorbing subject. Not long ago a committee of the Senate of the United States, of which Senator Culbertson of Illinois, was made chairman, was appointed to investigate the Commercial relations between Canada and the United States. Senator Culbertson, in his report, made a number of statements which are now being quoted in all the newspapers of the Dominion.
