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k. 45th ino'clock P. M. Rev. James Gillpatrick preached from Prov. 17, 16. In the afternoon simultaneous services were held at South Brat.ch, and East Ville—The services of the day were highly interesting, and the congregations large.

### MONDAY June 11th, 10 o'clock a. m.

Met according to adjournment. Rev. John Rowe proceeded to preach the Introductory Sermon from Isaiah 55ch. 10, 11v. A collection was taken for Domestic Missions.

The Circular Letter was read.

Resolved, That Bro. Jas. Gourley be appointed Treasurer, pro. tem.

Report on the Bible Cause was presented by Rev. A. Martell. Resolved, That it be received; and that the Rev. Jas. Gillpatrick, Agent of the American and Foreign Bible Society, be requested to make some remarks upon it. (See Appendix A.)

Resolved, That a collection be taken up this evening for the benefit of the Bible Cause.

Report on Education was presented by Rev. S. N. Bentley. Adopted. (See App. B.)

Committee on special business reported. Adopted. (See App. C.)

Adjourned until 2 o'clock.

Met according to adjournment at 2 o'clock. Opened by prayer.

Resolved, That Elder J. Shaw write the Circular Letter for next year.

The report of the French Mission was called for, and read by bro. Chute. (See App. D.)

Moved and seconded that the report be adopted-carried unanimously.

Bro. Chute, the Missionary to the Acadian French, addressed the meeting, and gave some interesting details respecting his labours among that people. He was followed by bro. S. T. Rand, Dr. Crawley, bro. Layton, and bro. Archibald. Bro. Ronald McDonald addressed the meeting in Gaelic, in behalf of his Romanist countrymen in Cape Breton. Bro. Hugh Ross interpreted his address. These addressess were listened to with great interest by all present.

Moved by Dr. Crawley.—That this Association concur in the

Resolution of the Central Association in regard to a mission to the Gaelic Romanist population of Cape Breton, and strongly recommend the Domestic Missionary Board of this Association, to unite with the Board of the Central Association, in sustaining the Rev. H. Ross in his agency for this Mission.

Seconded by bro. Rand-carried unanimously.

Breth. Crawley, Dimock, Martell, King, Ross, and Chute, were appointed a Committee to digest a plan for taising funds for Missionary support.

Adjourned till to-morrow at 10 o'clock.

Resolved, That in case the Delegates to the sister Associations cannot fulfil their appointment, they be requested to give notice to the Moderator, who shall be authorized to appoint others

Resolved, That breth. Rowe, Dimock, J. S. Layton, M. Parker be our Delegates to the Convention.

The Association was addressed on the subject by Dr. Crawley, who entered into a full explanation of the various points referred to in the Report. Bro. Gillpatrick and the Moderator, also ad-

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Report of the Domestic Missionary Board was read by bro. D. W. C. Dimock.

Resolved,-That the Report be received, and printed with the financial account in the Minutes. (See App. F.)

In connection with the above Resolution bro. Francis and bro. Martell, gave some very interesting and touching details of their Missionary labours in the County of Pictou.

The Committee appointed to digest a plan of raising funds for Missionary support reported.

Resolved.—That the Report be adopted. (See App. G.)

Resolved.—That whereas the Convention has recommended that each Association receive its appropriate part of the monies belonging to the Infirm Ministers fund, this Association instruct their delegates to receive the portion belonging to this Association, and pay it over to a Board appointed to bave the control of its funds.

The Committee on Temperance also presented their Report for discussion at the same time. (See App. K.)

An interesting and somewhat lengthened discussion on the use of Tobacco followed.

The Report was adopted with acclamation. It was then put to the whole meeting, and passed almost unanimously.

Report on Temperance adopted.

Report on Colportage was presented. Report adopted. (See App. L.)

Resolved,-That one thousand copies of the Minutes be printed, and that the sum of £9 be allowed the Editors of the C. Messenger for their publication.

Resolved, That this Association recommend the plan of raising the salaries of the pastors of our Churches, by an equal rate of assessment on the property of the members.

Resolved,—That bro. Charles Mosher, and bro. James Douglass

be recommended as suitable persons to be employed as Colporteurs.

The Committee on Union Societies reported. Report adopted. (See App. M.)

Moved by Dr. Crawley, seconded by bro. Malcom Ross,

That this Association have heard with much interest the statements made by the Rev. S. T. Rand, respecting the Mic-mac Mission, and take this opportunity of expressing their earnest hope and prayer that the Great Head of the Church may abundantly bless and prosper our brother Rand in the conversion of our Mic-

The Committee on the proper observance of the Sabbath presented their Report. Report adopted. (See App. N.)

Committee to prepare a memorial for deceased brethren presented their Report. Report adopted. (See App. O)

Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools was received. (See App. P.)

Resolved, - That a vote of thanks be tendered by this Association to the Christian friends and members of this community for

their kindness and hospitality shown to us during the Session. Minutes of the present session read and approved.

Concluded by singing a verse of the Union Hymn and prayer. Great harmony, christian affection, and despatch, characterized the Session. S. T. RAND.

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### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on Foreign Missions recommend the following Resolutions:

That this Association are assured that a deep concern for the condition of the perishing is the duty of every christian and of every christian community. That such sentiment wherever it is sincere will necessarily lead to contributions and efforts proportioned to the ability of the churches.

That such feelings and efforts have always re-acted and must continue to re-act most blessedly in increased spiritual life on the churches that have cherished and maintained them, and that therefore it is the interest as well as the duty of the churches of these Provinces to continue their interest and contributions toward a

Foreign Mission.

That in the estimation of this Association therefore it is desirable to maintain as intimate connection as possible with our brother A. Crawley, by acceding to his desire to go at once to the Heathen,-by the aid of the American Board, and by continuing to cultivate with him while abroad as close and frequent a correspondence through the Secretary of the Missionary Board or otherwise, as circumstances will permit; as also by offering to the American Board the funds, or a portion of the funds, collected from time to time in this country, so as to keep up the interest of the churches in our Brother personally, as well as with Foreign Missions in general.

That in such a course this Association see nothing to prevent the Convention undertaking to commence an independent mission under their own control whenever they shall be in circumstances to do so; and they trust that the Convention may therefore see proper to adopt such course—and that the Delegates of this Association to the Convention be instructed to bring their views as

#### Ladence inducati [F.] REPORT OF THE D. M. BOARD.

Not having heard from all the Missionaries appointed to perform Missions, the Board is not able to state positively the whole amount of time spent in Missionary labour, the past year,

Unavoidable circumstances prevented the Establishment of permanent Missions in some important localities, which it was hoped would have been effected-still the Board never lost sight of this object, and laboured, but without success, to ac-

With so small amount of funds it is exceeding difficult to accomplish any thing desirable or at all satisfactory; nevertheless, the labours of our Missionaries have not been in vain-we pro-

ceed to give a brief outline of their labours.

Cape Breton .- On this Island it was hoped that a continuous mission would have been sustained, at least for one year, but your board are able to report but 36 weeks. Bro. Shaw spent of this time 13 weeks, bro. H. Ross, 8, and bro. R. McDonsld 15. As the journals of these brethren have appeared in the Christian Messenger, information is given of the several places visited by them, and of the success of their Missions.

Prince E. Island.—Breth. Cogswell and Ross Ishoured on this Island, the former about 8 weeks, the latter 12. These labours

were not without tokens of the divine presence.

For some time they laboured conjointly, and were made to rejoice in witnessing the prosperity of Zion, and some hopeful

The ordinance of baptism was administered at St. Peters Road and a Union Society formed there.

In the spring bro. Ross resumed his labours on the Island; this mission he represents as one of great interest, and of spirituni reviving among the Churches, and of deep interest manifested in the preaching of the word.

Bro. Cogswell states, "I visited in my four of Churches and preaching stations connected therawith, attended two Conference Meetings, seven prayer meetings, farce Sabbath-schools; administered the Lord's supper once, visited nearly one hun-

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dred families, preached fifty-one public discourses, and travelled

The Board being so limited in funds, thought it necessary to employ some means of increasing them-and accordingly employed bro. M. Ross to visit the Churches from U. Stewiacke to Port au Pique. In conjunction with other ministering brethren missionary meetings were held at U. Stewiacke, Onslow and Truro, Upper Londonderry, Great Village, and Port auPique, which resulted in a large increase to the funds of the U. Societies, while there were drawn from the Board, only two pounds.

At a meeting of the Board in Onslow bro. J. B. Bancroft was appointed a mission Agency to E. Town, Tatamagouche, Wall ce,

Bro. B. lahoured three weeks in this service, and besides the direct benefit from constant preaching, visiting, holding missionary meetings &c., he obtained in subscriptions about £18., drawing from the Board about £3 7 6.

In concluding this Report, your Board are led to hope that its present inefficiency arising from the limited amount of funds at its disposal will be removed, and some decisive change will

be made in the mode of our missionary operations.

The Board has learned with much pleasure that the Central Association has engaged to co-operate with us in our large mission field; and truly the claims upon us, occasioned by the destitution of so large a purt of this Eastern Section, may well make

us hail with gratitude the above office.

Pressing upon us are the spiritual necessities, not of hundreds only, but of thousands of our fellow-men; who have been, so far as direct efforts is concerned, uncared for, the salvation of their souls unsought. Shall it continue thus? Can we be clear of their blood if we let their souls remain, without energetic, and unceasing labour to enlighten them, and point them to the

The voice of conscience and of God in his word commands us onward. Providence is pointing out our duty-plain is our path-clear is our duty - in the strength of God shall we not

Makes the sum of £381 Which deducted from the whole sum required, £450, leaves a balance of £69 which this Committee are of opinion may be counted upon as likely to be provided by the Western and Central Associations, as their proportion of contribution towards the general Missions of the Eastern Association, inasmuch as these so greatly exceed in extent all other Missions undertaken in the

Province.

For the purpose of collecting for the several Churches within the Association the sums above placed against their names respectively, the Committee would recommend that the several delegates representing the Churches be each one requested to undertake to collect the sum set against their several Churches respectively, deducting what each Church may have already contributed for Domestic Missions this year. And that each delegate take the earliest opportunity to send the sums collected in their respective Churches, to the Rev. D. W. C. Dimock, Treasurer of the Domestic Missionary Board of this Association, or to write to inform him whether it will or will not be collected.

For the purpose of collecting the above named sum of £60 supposed to be claimable from the sister Associations it is recommanded that the Missionaries employed by this Association, or some one of them be requested to make occasional visits to the

Churches of the other Associations for the purpose of bringing to their notice the extended Missionary field of this Association, and to obtain contributions to that amount. All which is respectfully submitted.

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### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS PERIODICALS.

The Committee on Religious Periodicals report as follows:-Of the priceless value of a good religious literature, this Association scarcely needs to be reminded. To sustain and increase a healthy tone of morals, and to promote the varied interests of Christianity in our land, we must look in a great measure to the power of a vigorously conducted religious press. The help of this potent ally should be sought alike by the philanthropist, the pious parent, the educator of youth and the minister of the gospel.

In recommending the Christian Messenger to the continued patronage of the denomination your Committee feel that they are but echoing the sentiment of its numerous readers.

This periodical has won for itself a reputation surely indicative its future success. Its local adaptation and general character alike commend it. Its earnest advocacy of truth coupled with its dignified and kind bearing towards those who hold views differing from our own, reflect honor on its conductors. We congratulate the friends of the Christian Messenger on the improved appearance of the paper, on the wider range of selected matter presented by our industrious Editors, and we call upon correspondents to contribute more liberally to its pages. #### REPORT ON TOBACCO.

The Committee on Tobacco submit their report.

Your Committee believe the babit of smoking, snuffing and chewing Tobacco to be injurious to the health, wasteful to the property and humiliating to christians. Your Committee beg to call your attention to the startling fact that some where about £4000 are expended by the Baptists of these Provinces in Tobacco annually. Then think of £4000 passing away from the Churches of Nova Scotia, while we suffer and are crampt in our Educational Missionary and other movements. Then let us ask who is not willing to forego the use of Tobacco in order to obtain annually £1000 for the education of 40 young men at £25 each in the College for the ministry, £1000 for Domestic Missionary purposes, so as to enable us to sustain ten Missionaries at an annual salary of £100 each—£1000 to sustain 4 Missionaries among the heathen—£500 for superannuated ministers, and £500 to circulate the word of God.

Your Committee would urge the importance of furnishing a Library to every Sabbath School.

The value of Sabbath Schools can scarcely be overrated. Many of our pastors as well as active members of our Churches are living illustrations of the blessings resulting from Sabbath School

It is however a matter of regret that many of the youth leave the Schools just at the period when their minds are expanding into maturity. Your Committee would request this to be taken into consideration, and believe nothing would be attended with greater success for the encouragement of youth to continue in their Schools, than the formation of Bible Classes under experieneed teachers. And they would further suggest that the youthful members of our Churches be recommended to join such

Your Committee hope that it is not necessary to enforce a careful and powerful preparation on the part of the teachers for the emeient discharge of this duty. The teacher should avail himself of every means within his reach, which may enable him to explain with clearness and simplicity the word of God to his

In concluding, your Committee feel gratified in learning that in many of the Schools the exercises are concluded by addresses to the whole School. An opportunity is hereby given to make such appeals to the pupils, as by the blessing of God may result in their conversion, while it may be a blessing to the teacher and the Church in general. 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Having observed that the cause of God is liable to sustain injury and that his people are often cast down and depressed in consequence of entertaining fears of a rupture in the Denomination, it is desirable to remove as far as possible what may appear to produce this paralyzing effect upon our efforts in the cause of Christ. (viz.,) The impression that conformity is necessary to union, that is that union of heart cannot exist while there are diversity of voices causing discussion, and resulting in the adoption of different modes of action. In consequence of this impression almost every practicable measure introduced for the promotion of the Reedemer's kingdom has caused alarm lest it should divide the denomination.

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Your attention therefore is called to a few circumstances that may serve to show that difference of opinion leading to the adoption of various measures, is not incompatible with Christian Union-i. e., -union of heart, and oneness of object-and so far is it from being a cause of depression—we should view it as an indication of health and vigour in the body, and as manifesting the existence of a principle established in the word of God, and deer as life to Baptists, (viz.,) the right duty and necessity of private judgement - i. e , the right of every brother to judge for himself by the word of God, whether that which is presented to him as religious truth is God's truth-and whether measures proposed for his co-operation are scriptural and efficient or not. While this principle of right is acknowledged and man continues imperfect we must expect differences of opinion will exist of necessity, and free discussion, resulting it may be in the adoption of various plans for the accomplishment of the same object,—yet not of disunion or strife, there being no more necessity for it, than there was in the case of Abraham and Lot.

The first incident to be noticed is the division of the Association in the sister Province. The proposition created a warm dis cossion; many were alarmed and expressed their fears that union would follow but the blow was struck and the proves that division does not necessarily cause disunion.

A similar proposition in this Province caused con fear and commotion, -the battle waxed hotter and hotter,-digision triumphed-which affords another proof that we are not the

less united though divided.

The introduction of Union Societies is another instance-different opinions existed disunion followed which resulted in the adoption of the system by the many, while others have continued to contribute to the same objects separately.

The introduction of an additional Baptist periodical in these

Provinces, is another case in paint.

Also with regard to the origin of the A. and F. B. Society in the United States, and the Rible Translation Society in England,

much difference of opinion existed, and while these excellent institutions have been preserved by union of heart in the body, yet some have continued their co-operation with the B. and F. B. Society, and still aid it m its great object of giving the Bible to the world.

The same might be observed in reference to the formation of the benevolent objects of the denomination. Great fears were entertained lest the time had not come, or that the proper men had not taken the work in hand, or that it was not called for and therefore would disunite God's people and destroy his cause.

Beloved brethren let not freedom of thought, free discussion leading to the adoption of a variety of instrumentality depress our minds and paralyze our efforts for the cause of truth, but let it rather kindle fresh gratitude in our hearts that we can all unite in seeking the accomplishment of the one great object of our spiritual existence (viz) the salvation of souls and the glory of God in any way we can possibly conceive or desire, so great is the variety of instrumentality now in efficient operation for that end. For instance those who are most interested in furthering the distribution of the Scriptures, translated without reserve into the languages of the heathen, as well as in circulating at the same time the old received English Version, may do so with the aid of the American and Foreign Bible Society; while others who to the Foreign Translation would add the circulation of what they deem a more perfect English Version, may accomplish their object thro' the labours of the Bible Union. We may feel united in heart to the officers and supporters of both, and respect them slike for their conscientiousness and zeal for the truth; we may be members of both and our hearts desire and prayer to God may consistently be-that the two might be prospered in the work of the Lord.

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Deloved brethren, -circumstances may arise that will call forth the talent, the energy, and the wisdom and piety of the whole hody, to discuss perhaps some doctrinal question on the subject of Church government or communion—Education or Missionary plans and measures-let us then put on the whole armour of God, and be prepared to entertain with prayerful deliberation and discuss any question on measures affecting our beloved Zion, cesting unnecessary fears to the winds, and follow the more ex-cellent way enjoined upon us in God's word, "Prove all things,

hold fast that which is good."

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# CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

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ART, 1.—This Association shall be composed of Ministers and other Delegates, who shall be members of the churches which they represent, together with Delegates from corresponding Associations, and such other breshren present as the Association shall see fit to invite to sit in Council.

Ann. 2.—The Association shall meet at such time and place as may agreed upon by the body.

ART, 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more, but no Church shall be entitled to send more than five in addition to their Pastor.

ART, 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding year shall call for a vote for a Moderator, which vote shall be given by ballot: no brother shall be chosen Moderator two years in succession. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions, nominate Committees unless ordered by the Association, and maintain due order. A Secretary shall be chosen whose duty it shall be to record the transactions of the Association, and to furnish a correct copy of the same for the Press.

ART.5th.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association giving an account of its state, particularly of its additions and diminutions within the last year, and generally of whatsoever relates to its peace and prosperity:

ART. 6th.—When any Church shall desire admittance into this Body, application must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of its faith and order; this being done and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall in behalf of the Association give to one of its Messengers present the right hand of fellowship.

ART. 7th.—When any Church shall neglect to make communications for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its continuance and shall engage to inquire into its standing and report at the next meeting of the Association.

ART. 8th.—Although as an Association all power over the Churches is disclaimed, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline. Yet it is deemed a privilege belonging to the Association for itself to judge of the propriety of receiving or retaining any Church in its connexion.

ART. 9th.—The religious sentiments of this Body are those expressed in the Articles of the faith and practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia.

ART. 10—Alterations or Amendments may be made to this Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any of its regular meetings.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1.—At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RULE 2.—No member of the Association shall leave the session before the business is concluded, without permission of the Association.

RULE 3.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded.

RULE 4,—No person shall speak oftener than twice on the same subject unless by permission of the Body.

RULE 5 .- All Resolutions shall be presented in writing.

RULE 6.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered at the time.

RULE 7.—These rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair at the opening of the session.
