



KILL FIVE BANDITS

KILL FIVE BARNDIS Marta, Texas, April 4.—Five of the nine bandits belonging to the famous "Chico Cano" band were killed by Sth cavairy troops on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande yesterday, after Cano's sping crossed to the American side Tuesday night, raided a ranch and drove off cattle, horses and mules. When the troops of Captain Matter and Capitain Broathead's commands returned from Mexico yesterday they brough Cano's spurs, saddles belong-ing to the Mexican bandits and a quan-tity of aims, emmunition and a supplies. Tirree of the five Mexican's killed were identified as belonging to Cano's band and it is believed Cano escaped when the bandit rendezvous was charged by the American soldiers. SOME LENTEN RECIPES.

Egg and Potato Pie. Egg and Potato Pie. Boil as many potatoses as yol wish to serve at a meal. Add a small picco of butter, whip until creamy. Butter a shallow baking dish and fill it with the mahed potato. Make small holes in the potato, large enough to hold an egg. Break a fresh egg into each hole and sprinkle carefully with a lit-tie salt and pepper. Grate a little cheese over 11 and then dot generously with butter. Bake until the eggs are set—usually from fifteen to twenty minutes. Serve at once. This is ex-cellent for luncheon and children will take to it readily.
