The Farmer's Corner.

How to cure a bearing horse. I will give you a plan that has succeeded well with one of the worst cases I ever saw. Drive with harness on (out of the buggy) a half hour a day for two weeks, to break to mind the worst habit. When perfectly broken to whoop, put on an over check bit and over-check rein; hitch him up and spin him around in the buggy twenty or thirty times a day; then reverse and stop square up against the corner of a high fence or building, leaving room enough to turn out if he will not stand still. Never strike with the whip for not standing still. Some horses cannot raise with a tight over-check; some it will make rear a little at first, till they get used to it. It should be used at first with caution.

A GOOD DISINFECTANT.—One pound of green copperas, dissolved in one quart of water and poured down a water-closet, will effectively concentrate and destroy the foulest smells. On board ships and steamships, about hotels and other public places, there is nothing so dissolved in anything under the bed, will render a hospital or other places free from unpleasant smells. In fish-markets, slaughter-houses, sinks, and wherever there are offensive gases, dissolve copperas and sprinkle it about, and in a few days the smell will pass away. If a cat, rat or mouse dies about the house and sends forth an offensive gas, place some dissolved copperas in an open vessel near the place where the nuisance is and it will purify the atmosphere.

TO KEEP TOMATOES FOR WINTER USE.—As the tomato season is now here, I contribute one way of keeping them for winter use that may be new to some of your readers. I use them in February, sliced and seasoned with sugar and a little vinegar, that seemed every way as nice as tomatoes picked from the vines. They may be preserved in this manner: Dissolve a quart of salt in a gallon of water. Pick ripe tomatoes, but not overripe, leaving little of the stem on. The tomatoes must be well covered with brine, and they will keep till spring is over.

TO PREVENT A BONE FEVER.—When you find that you have a bone fever coming, apply a fly blister to the affected part with vinegar, and let it draw to its fullest extent, an early application of this kind will seldom fail to put back a fever. Of course the remedy is somewhat severe, but it does not compare in that respect to the disease.

TOMATO SACK.—To a gallon of stewed and strained tomatoes add six table-spoonsful of fine salt, three of pepper, four of allspice, two of cloves, and one of nutmeg, all powdered. Boil for an hour; then add one and a half pint of vinegar, boil fifteen minutes. Bottle hot, and put one table-spoonful of alcohol on the top of each bottle, then seal closely.

PANACEA.—Here is a grand panacea for swelling or weariness of the feet. It is as effective as it is simple: Put half an ounce of alum in a leacup and pour boiling water upon it. Let it stand for half or three quarters of an hour then pour off the liquid into tepid water, and therein soak your feet for ten or fifteen minutes. Rub them dry.

HERBS.—Herbs intended for drying should be picked just before the plants blossom. Wash them until they are entirely free from dust, and place them on a sieve to drain. Then put them in the oven and let them remain until they are perfectly dry. Afterwards rub them on the stalk, put in glass jars and cover closely.

In driving large screws, where the force to operate the driver is necessarily great, the slipping of the screw-driver occurs with more frequency than in medium and small screws and can be obviated as follows, viz: with the edge of a small "half-round smooth" file make several little grooves (longitudinal and with the bit) upon each side of the driver, should the tool be too hard to file, it is too hard for use, and may be remedied by holding it upon a piece of red-hot iron until it (the driver) assumes a deep blue colour, when immediately plunge it into cold water. Gritting the suggestions regarding handles and others apply to screw-drivers bits as well as handled screw-drivers.

In the repair shops we frequently encounter screws "rusted in" the removal of which baffles the skill of "old wheel horses" themselves. The reduction of this difficulty is a comparatively easy operation, and may be accomplished by holding a rod of iron, (poker), heated red hot, upon the head of the screw for a few minutes, when the attempt will generally prove successful.—*Cabinet Maker.*
