As we look back over the twenty-five years we have been connected with this paper we feel a deep sense of gratitude to the many kind friends who have, some for so many years, assisted us by their kind words of encouragement as well as liberal financial patronage.

During this long period we have always worked in the best interests of the people of New Brunswick and the Northern Counties and have pursued an honorable course, advocating what we considered in the best interests of this section of country irrespective of whether such a course was detrimental to our own interests or not.

In dominion politics we have ever supported the party which we believed had the real property of the country at least, and this we have done through effort and as through good report, and are prepared to continue to support that party until the Liberals have in some measure proved their capacity to govern the country wisely and well. The late premier has recently left the Province to other hands to manage and the people hope that a more prudent and economical management of public affairs will now be inaugurated so that the burden of debt may not be increased in the near future.

If we could only see our subscriptions and otherwise would be prompt in making their payments we should be relieved of much anxiety in meeting business engagements. While there are many who pay regularly and promptly, there are too many others who, from want of attention rather than lack of means, allow their bills to remain unsettled, the aggregate amount of such indebtedness being a heavy load to carry. Newcastle Battery.

This battery fielded its twelve days drill on Friday last and on that morning proceeded to break camp and the guns and baggage were duly stored in the armory, the tents remaining on the field until they were thoroughly dry, which may not be for some days as the weather has again set in wet. Sergeant At. Russell, with gunners G. R. Anslow and C. W. Anslow being left in charge and remaining in camp day and night.

The inspection under Major Rutherford was pronounced satisfactory, and the regimental true being competition was proceeded with under the inspection of Major Rutherford who complimented the officers and men on the manner in which they had performed their duties.

Post Office Investigation Examination.

The case of the Queen vs. Smith was resumed on Thursday morning last. Mr. R. B. Bennett, Counsel for the accused, said that he would not continue the cross-examination of Inspector S. J. King. Mr. Winlow, Agent for Minister of Justice, had no more witnesses at present. The case was adjourned until Tuesday, in order that the magistrate might consider the evidence, and decide as to which, if any, of the charges had been proven.

## THE CHARGES AGAINST POLICE MAGISTRATE McCULLY OF CHATEAU.

REPORT THEREON OF COMMISSIONER G. G. GILBERT.

(From the Advocate.)

To His Honor John James Fraser, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of New Brunswick.

(Concluded.)

Re-examined by Mr. Tweedie. Menzies did all he could apparently to resist me, I did not hurt him any more than was necessary to get him out.

"Thomas Dunn—called and sworn. I reside at Newcastle, ever since I was born. I saw some of this matter between Menzies and Murray on the 30th of June last. I saw Menzies and a man go into Murray's and afterwards leave Murray's and go into Stables'. Menzies came out of Stables' with a piece of wood in his hand, and went into Murray's yard, I saw some casks come out of a hole in the wall of Stables' building. Menzies took charge of the casks, Murray came out of his back door and ordered all hands out, we backed out but kept out faces to the fur, Murray said to Menzies to get out with the rest, Menzies said he would get out, Murray said he would get out and took hold of him, they were about 12 or 14 feet from the gates, they tumbled into it got him outside of the gate, Menzies rushed in again and Murray caught him by the whiskers and said, 'I suppose, and backed him up against the wall of Stables'. Murray shoved him out pretty easy, Menzies was determined to get in, and Murray was determined to get him out. Menzies did not want to go out, and struggled but Murray put him out, Menzies hauled a pistol and said he would shoot anyone who interfered with him, Murray has not then then, Murray did not put him out until he said he would not go, Murray was too able for him, no one interfered with him to help either one or the other."

Cross-examined by Mr. Murray. I did not amount to a great deal, there were no lives lost, Murray said go out, nothing more, he said all hands leave the premises, or the property, I won't be certain what he did say, he said to go out, that's all. He turned round to Mr. Menzies, he had charge of the casks, he was standing along side the casks then, Murray pulled him away from the casks, he dragged him from the casks to the gate about 15 or 16 feet, the one gate was shut then, I won't be sure who shut the gate, when Menzies was put out. I was in the yard near the casks when Murray ordered us out. I was near the gate when Murray took hold of Menzies. I saw Shannon then, I saw all the struggle until Menzies was put out and after he was put out too. They shut the other gate on him when he was put out, and Menzies got in again about as far as the half gate would swing. I can't say but what I saw Shannon shove Menzies. I won't swear that Shannon did not interfere, Murray went over to the casks and told him to go out and grabbed him just alongside the casks, Menzies kept the casks as long as he could until Murray pulled him away, Murray grabbed him by the carry. We hope those indebted will carefully read this paragraph and then forward the needed to settle their accounts.

In my view, after Menzies had secured Murray's premises, and found no liquor there, his power under the search warrant was exhausted. That he had no right to place the property he had seized on Stables' premises to Murray's premises without Murray's permission. That when he came back the second time he was a trespasser, and that being ordered out, Murray was justified in putting him out gently, and that when he attempted to force his way in a second time, Murray was justified in using all the force necessary to prevent him coming in. It may be said that unless he did go in he could not take the liquor he had seized from Stables'. This may be true, but the difficulty arose from his unlawfully putting the liquor on Murray's premises and he put it there without Murray's consent, he not having asked Murray's permission either to put it there or to remove it, claiming as appears from his own evidence, that he had the right under his search warrant to get it off any man's property he chose without his consent. It did not appear that he could not have taken it away from Stables' property trespassing on Murray's, his only excuse for putting the liquor there was, that it was the easiest way.

I think in this case Murray was illegally convicted.

Part of the charges I have been considering are that Mr. McCully spitefully and maliciously convicted persons charged before him with the commission of offences.

All the legal gentlemen who gave evidence before me, while finding me in fault with the manner in which Mr. McCully tried cases, spoke of him as being an individual, honest and upright. With this evidence before me, I do not think I would be justified in finding that he has acted spitefully and maliciously.

Complaint was made during the investigation that parties living in Newcastle who were charged with violating the Canada Temperance Act were brought for trial before Mr. McCully when there was in Newcastle a magistrate (Mr. Niven) who was quite competent to try these cases, and thereby occasioning much unnecessary inconvenience to them and much expense in bringing their witnesses.

This no doubt is a very important thing to do, but I think the blame attaches to Mr. Menzies and the prosecuting attorney, and not to Mr. McCully, for when the Inspector laid information before Mr. McCully, I do not see how Mr. McCully could refuse to hear the cases, and no blame can attach to him, unless it could be shown that there was some compelling reason before him, and that these cases should be brought before him, which has not been done.

In investigating this matter, I had to consider the large amount of viva voce evidence given before me, and also the

would have to be granted for the shipment of United States cattle from our ports. The report of the committee was adopted.

On the canal estimates, Hon. Mr. Blair said he proposed to look into the Trent canal scheme, regarding the utility of which a difference of opinion prevailed. If it were found unprofitable to proceed further, then the government would assume the responsibility of not asking for further appropriations.

## SENATE.

Mr. Peley moved that the sale of liquors in the Senate restaurant be abolished after the present session. Defeated by 23 to 16.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell moved that the use of the Senate restaurant be restricted to members of the Senate. This was carried by 20 to 16.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—There was a lively spat at the opening of the house this afternoon over the report of the debates committee recommending the appointment of three new translators. Davis charged the liberals with seeking to appoint their friends, one of the proposed appointees being a law partner of Monest and the other a son of Pines, M. P.

Monest denied that one of the men was his partner, whereupon Earl rose and stated most emphatically he had heard Monest say so in committee.

Davis then wanted to know if there was any doubt about Pines being a son of the member for Rimouski at which there was great laughter.

Mr. Foster pointed out that not one word was being said in favor of the qualifications of the three candidates.

Mr. Laurier stated that the government in this matter simply stood by the rule laid down by the Tories in 1889. The house had nothing to do with the past political partnership of the new appointees. It was only concerned that from thenceforth their partnership should cease.

Hon. Mr. Blair, who had been awaiting his opportunity, rose and read a letter from Tupper to James Ryan of Moncton, dated 7th April, 1893, on the subject of the dismissal of Ryan's son from the service of the Intercolonial for openly taking part in opposition to the government at the last general election. This, said the letter, as you will readily understand, no government officer can be permitted to do, and your son's action was so conspicuous that it could not be passed over. Ministerial cheers.

Mr. Powell called attention to the summary dismissal of General Cameron from the command of the military college. He thought he had been very unfairly treated, and urged in common justice he should be given a year's pay in default of a year's notice for his retirement.

Borden said the government's action was taken in the best interests of the country and thought Cameron had been fairly treated.

Col. Donville asserted that cadets had come out of the college worse than when they went in. He charged that Cameron had shown favoritism in his treatment of cadets, instancing the case of his own son.

Mr. Cassgrain tonight asked whether any settlement had been come to on the Manitoba school question and if so what it was. If not, he wanted to know if any negotiations or correspondence was now going on between the government and the government of Manitoba. The people all through the recent election campaign had been given the most solemn assurances that Mr. Laurier, if he got into power, would send a commission to Manitoba to settle the whole question. It was promised that Sir Oliver Mowat would be the chief of the commission and that by his good offices especially a satisfactory settlement could be brought about.

Sir Richard Cartwright, in Mr. Laurier's absence, replied that as the premier had stated on more than one occasion, there is every reasonable prospect of an amicable settlement. More than that he could not say at present. (Laughter.)

The house having gone into committee of supply, the Indian department appropriation in the supplementary estimates were taken up and the committee reported.

A lengthy discussion took place to-night on the item of \$3,000 for commission to investigate the penitentiaries.

The opposition snuffed a job for some political friend of the government, the current report pointing to J. R. Noxon of Toronto in this connection.

A constitutional problem has arisen in connection with the action of the senate in debarring the commissioners from using the senate restaurant. The members of the commission claim that they are entitled to use the senate restaurant without let or hindrance and that in passing its order the senate was exceeding its authority.

A private meeting of the conservative party was held to-day, when the question was under consideration of appointing a central executive committee to advise with party leaders.

Commander Waltham, in charge of the government steamer Le Canadienne, reached Gaspé to-day from the Straits of Belle Isle. He states that the fishery along the Canadian Labrador has been good. All the fishermen are well off for the winter, except the usual dregs. There is no sickness or distress. The Newfoundland Labrador fishery has been bad, but the fishery on the south shore of the St. Lawrence has been remarkably good.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—A proposition was made by Mr. Fraser of Gaspé to the opening of the house to-day that all present bills left over from the present session be considered as having passed the initial stages next session.

Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Mr. Laurier both objected on the ground that it would cause confusion and the motion was therefore rejected.

Hon. Mr. Foster objected to the vote for the salary of the deputy speaker of the senate. The proposition was a strange innovation to a party that had insisted a hour ago upon the appointment of a deputy speaker.

The item was accordingly dropped. The opposition buntered the government about its failure to induce economy on the part of the senators in the matter of supplies of stationery. When the common vote for stationery came up it was reduced to \$4,000.

Hon. Mr. Foster pointed out the unfairness of the supplementary estimates in that they did not contain any reference to the expenses for next session. The sum of \$400,000 for indemnity and mileage should have been included.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said these items were provided for by statute, hence there was no necessity to include them in the estimates.

Hon. Mr. Foster replied that since confederation they had always been included in the estimates. Evidently the design was to make the country believe the government were more economical than was really the case.

On the item of \$30,000 for providing cold storage, Hon. Mr. Fisher explained the nature of the scheme which the government had in view. It would cost about \$10,000 to fit up a single steamer with cold storage accommodations, hence it would be necessary to make contracts for a term of years with steamship companies. It was also proposed to bonus all creameries in the country for the purpose of encouraging them to provide cold storage at the creamery building. This would cost \$200 where there is cold storage at present to \$500 where it will be necessary to put in new storage altogether, and it was proposed to give a bonus of \$50 this year, \$25 next and \$25 the third year. As to the benefit of such storage, sales were made in England last week from two creameries in the Northwest, the product of the one with cold storage netting 2 per cent more than the other. This bonus would consume \$10,000 of the grant. Besides there would have to be provided cold storage warehouses in the port of shipment, but the plan was to spend the money in advertising in England the results of our cold storage system and to spend \$1,000 in stimulating the shipment of eggs to the British market. As to the cold storage scheme, he favored a fixed sum covering a term of years with the steamships of five years on lines running to Liverpool, London, Glasgow and Avonmouth.

Hon. Mr. Foster congratulated Hon. Mr. Fisher on the clear and business like statement. He would, however, advise him to go slow in the matter of five year contracts for cold storage in warehouses and steamships. He was very sorry that the minister had not brought down a longer estimate and decided to keep his contracts down to three years.

Hon. Mr. Fisher answered that he would take care to make contracts as

short as possible. He had thought it wise to ask only for so much as he would absolutely need, for had he asked at once for a larger sum his friends who expected contracts would also have expected good ones to be all required. (Laughter and applause.) The item passed.

While the items for harbors and rivers, Nova Scotia, were under consideration, Hon. Mr. Foster remarked that in the entire lot he did not see one for a constituency represented by a conservative.

"Oh, they have been getting money for eighteen years," replied Mr. Fielding.

On the item for steamship subsidies between St. John and Halifax and the United Kingdom ports, Sir Richard Cartwright explained that the Beaver line subsidy asked was to be reduced from \$25,000 to \$20,000; that the winter service to Glasgow would be performed by the Donaldson line and to Dublin and Belfast by the Irish line. The subsidy in both cases would be \$7,000 for a minimum of ten trips during the winter.

On the vote for Hudson Bay expedition (\$35,000), the minister of marine explained that it was not hoped to more than organize an expedition or provide the promoters with this sum. Capt. Gordon's first expedition cost \$75,000. The second \$50,000, and the third winter's expedition cost \$10,000. He was determined that this investigation should be done so thoroughly as to leave no doubt as to the period of navigation of the bay and strait.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper asked if the minister had any scheme perfected? Hon. Mr. Davies replied that he had not, having only looked over the matter. The sum of \$5,000 had been put in simply because the late government had determined to commence the organization of the expedition with that amount. He thought perhaps the imperial government might be induced to assist with the loan of a vessel.

The item passed, as did that \$3,000 for the entertainment of Li Hung Chang, Sir Hibbert Tupper commenting the government upon its choice of a representative in the person of Sir Henry Joly, whose services had been performed with credit and honor to the country.

At 11 p. m. all the estimates had been passed. The proceedings late in the evening were culled by a wordy war between Messrs. Quinn and Wallace over the administrations of the customs department.

The house adjourned at 1.30 to meet to-morrow afternoon.

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—By unanimous consent the house met at 2 o'clock to-day, and the house at once proceeded to consider the estimates.

On the item of \$25,000 for the subsidy to the Beaver line for a winter steamer service to St. John, Hon. Mr. Fielding moved that the vote be reduced to \$20,000.

Hon. Mr. Foster remarked that he hoped the service would not be improved. The company had given fourteen trips instead of ten, and as the steamers carried full cargoes it was important for trade.

Sir Richard Cartwright answered that they hoped to get a better service, and that the company would be continued here under the name and title of G. A. Lonsbury & Co.

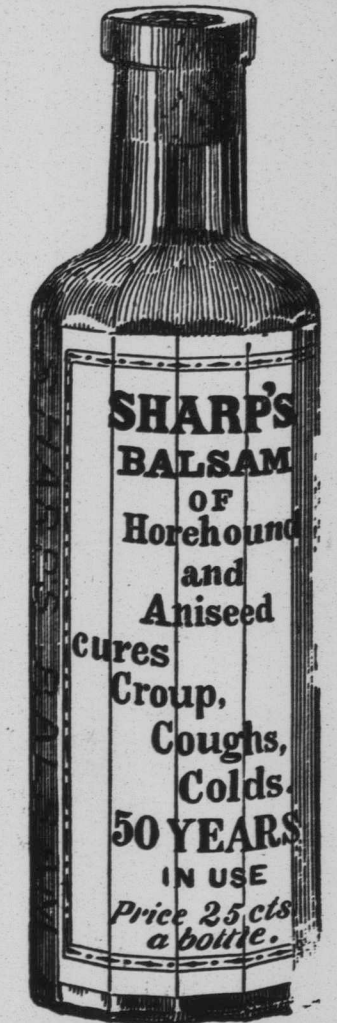
