**CAMPBELLTON LOSES PIONEER CITIZEN**  
Mr. George Duncan Passed Away Feb. 17th After Long Illness

By the death of George Duncan which took place on 17th of February, Campbellton has lost one of its most best known citizens.

He was born 79 years ago and spent his whole life in town, living on the farm which has been in the family or three generations. During his life he took a deep interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of his country and in his earlier life was actively associated with all political events of any importance, being especially interested in and an ardent supporter of confederation. He was a conscientious and unflinching supporter of the known uprightness of character and unfailing integrity. Beneath a seemingly rough exterior he concealed feelings of tenderest sympathy for and kindly interest in his fellow citizens, and never turned away an appeal for aid if it was possible to give it. He was a Loyal and Patriotic subject of the British Empire and maintained until the very last a deep interest in the present struggle, being especially concerned in the part taken by our Canadian Soldiers. He is survived by his widow and two daughters, Mrs. W. F. Yorston and Miss Elizabeth Duncan, both living on the homestead. The funeral which took place on the 20th of February was largely attended. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Hugh Miller.

**GRAVE MISMANAGEMENT IN QUARTERING SOLDIERS**  
Three Hundred Men in Khaki Dumped off here in Cold. No Preparations.

During the recent election campaign the ratepayers of this town were informed both by the government paper and on the hustings that a company of soldiers was to be quartered here, and that the barracks was being prepared to receive them. Tenders for supplies were awarded and from day to day word was expected of departure of troops for this town. It was hoped that they would arrive here before election day. Had they done so they no doubt would have been met at the depot by the government candidates and a brass band.

But they were two days late. Came unannounced and unaccepted, consequently they got a cold reception. The train bearing a C. A. M. C. and a heavy siege battery, from London and Guelph pulled into the depot here about nine o'clock Monday morning and proceeded to the barracks.

Arriving there the C. O. was surprised to find the building locked and absolutely no preparation made for their coming.

The mayor was telephoned to but he knew nothing about the matter. It had been entrusted to our political contractor.

We could say a lot more, but refrain at this time.

Suffice to say three hundred soldiers were set off here and put into a barracks, freezing cold, with no provisions for heating or cooking, no water, no bedding, and allowed to shift for themselves. It was not until Tuesday that the citizens generally knew of the conditions and the Mayor and others got busy. Warm food was prepared and cooking utensils loaned so that food could be cooked.

On Tuesday the men were served hot pork and beans. Wednesday morning bread and jam with coffee without milk or sugar. Wednesday night the ladies of the town provided cake and pies, so the men enjoyed their first meal.

The men as a whole are a fine class of fellows and came here from one of the finest barracks in Canada, where they had every convenience, so it has been a real hardship to them. So much so that a number of them are suffering with severe colds, and two are in the hospital with pneumonia.

We hope that soon full provision will be made for the men's comfort, and in the meantime trust our citizens will extend to them all a helping hand.

**LANDRY BLOCK DESTROYED BY FIRE**  
Five Tenants Turned Out in the Cold—Loss Will be Heavy

The fire brigade was called out about 9 o'clock Monday morning for a bad fire in the Landry block opposite the I. C. R. depot, and the building was completely destroyed.

The fire started at the rear of the building and spread very rapidly. The adjoining buildings were not damaged beyond a slight scorching.

The building was occupied by A. Hopper, restaurant, N. Bernatchez, wholesale liquor, Thos. Roy, restaurant, Jos. Caron, barber, and Robert Gray, refreshments. The upper story was occupied as a dwelling and boarding house.

The building is owned by Asa Landry of Bathurst and there is insurance to the extent of \$5,000 on it. The tenants carried some insurance, but not enough to nearly cover their losses.

During the progress of the fire a rain load of soldiers pulled in at the C. R. depot, and the men at once ran to the scene of the fire and proceeded to help themselves to the stock of liquor in the Bernatchez store. Chief of Police Mann warned the men away but was struck in the face for his trouble. The crowd of soldiers became so large that it interfered with the firemen. Chief O'Donnell ordered the men away, stating that if they did not go he would be obliged to turn the hose on them. As they made no move to desert, water was turned upon them and immediately they scattered, some getting drenched.

The morning was bitterly cold, and the firemen had a cold, hard job.

# SOLID NORTH SHORE DEFEATS GOVERNMENT

## Restigouche to Albert Went Solid for Opposition-- Liberals the Victors 27 to 21-- Many Surprises for Government.

"The Battle has been fought and the Enemy are ours"

Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland, a solid North Shore from the Restigouche to the Petitcodiac for good government.

Saturday was a regular winter day. A light fall of snow did not interfere with the voting and, all day, from evening to the closing of the polls, teams were busy getting the voters out to vote.

Shortly after 4 o'clock the polls closed, (they were a little late in opening) and soon the results were known. Liberal workers were disappointed with the vote in town, but on making comparisons with the previous election it was found that the Conservative majority had been cut in half in St. John's stronghold.

Tobique was the next poll and showed another majority for the Conservatives. Then came lower Durham, which showed clearly a hundred for the Liberals.

By this time the Liberals were beginning to fear the worst, but wiser heads continued to advise waiting for returns from Balmoral, Colborne, Grimmer, and other Liberal polls, and who were not disappointed. Balmoral was the first and a rousing cheer went up as the figures were announced, then Colborne came in with 31 majority for the Liberals; next Grimmer No. 1 (Anderson) with 171. It was then considered safe to announce that Messrs. Currie and LeBlanc had been elected.

Further returns brought the majority to 206.

There was great rejoicing at the Liberal committee rooms, and all during the evening when the provincial returns were coming in there was much enthusiasm, especially when it was found that the Opposition was running close, and at last when the final results from Queens showed that the government was snowed under and the Liberals had 23 to the Conservative 21, all went home satisfied that the province had given a just verdict of guilty to the Murray government.

There were no doubts here as to how Gloucester would go on Monday and returns Monday evening from that county showed that the Conservatives were snowed under, the whole four government men losing their deposits.

The province practically splits in two between the two parties with the result that apparently the control of the province will pass to the North Shore counties supported by the inland counties of Queens, Sunbury, Victoria and Madawaska with a solitary seat in St. John.



February 12th being Frances Willard's Memorial Day the Women's Christian Temperance meeting took the form of a social which was quite largely attended. Several papers were read—One showing the result of Francis Willard's life work in United States and one showing the result of that work in Canada. This paper was read and prepared by Mrs. William Currie.

**RESULT OF MISS FRANCES WILLARD'S WORK IN CANADA**

In 1903 the cost of liquor traffic in Canada direct and indirect was at least \$150,000,000 that is an average of \$50. per head, for the entire population of Canada, or in other words the farm lands of Ontario are worth \$620,896,000 so that in four years the Canadians lose through liquor the value of all the lands in that fair province.

At our present rate of Christian giving that would supply all the money given to foreign missions for three hundred years.

This is surely an appealing state of affairs. But other days are dawning; the wave of prohibition is sweeping over our land, it has begun in the west and is rolling eastward.

In Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba they have the prohibitory law passed prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor, also Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick, our own province, are the last to come under this law. In N. B. this law is supposed to take effect May 1st, 1917. In Quebec the movement is onward. In the city of Montreal only a limited number of saloons are allowed while this is an improvement it is not enough, let us pray that the good work may go on. Our Dominion Organizer after attending the Convention of Quebec Provincial Union says:—"The atmosphere was surcharged with the spirit of expectancy and optimism. Prohibition was the theme and the slogan was 'They have done it in the other provinces and we can do it in Quebec too'. The Provincial President presented the claims of the mothers and children and closed her address to the Premier by making the following statement:—"Some government is going to give us prohibition and why not you, Sir Lomer Gouin?"

With all the diplomacy of the politician the Prime Minister promised this but that promise has not yet been fulfilled, however the temperance people are in no wise discouraged. A few years ago when the vote was taken upon the Dominion Plebiscite the Province of Quebec gave a majority of 90,000 against prohibition, public sentiment has so changed that

A great cause of rejoicing is the amicable relations existing between the "anti-alcoholic League" of the Roman Catholic church and the Province Prohibition organization and we heartily concur with His Honour Justice Le Fontain, President of that League that the time has arrived for the temperance forces to launch a campaign for prohibition in our Province, to culminate in an influential deputation to wait upon the government demanding either Province Prohibition Act or referendum on this question.

The wave of prohibition has reached our farthest north. On Tuesday 29th day of August the Yukon Territory voted on a Prohibition Act—Bermuda is organizing for the campaign against their present liquor license Act. We bid them God speed in this good work.

St. John, N. B., Feb. 17.—Hon. Geo. J. Clark, until recently Premier of the Province, died at his home in Stephen at three o'clock yesterday afternoon. He had been ill a long time and resigned a month ago being succeeded by Hon. J. A. Murray, whose Government was defeated Saturday and yesterday.

He was elected to the Legislature in 1903 and was returned in 1908. He was elected speaker of the Legislature in 1909 and was re-elected at the opening of the session in 1913. In 1914 he accepted the office of attorney general and was returned by his constituency by acclamation. After the resignation of Premier Fleming in December, 1914, he was entrusted with the formation of a Cabinet and assumed office as Premier, taking the portfolio of lands and mines.



PROFITABLE BEEF PRODUCTION

(Experimental Farm Notes)  
At the Experimental Farm at Napton, N. S., a number of tests have been carried on in feeding and finishing steers for the market. The results of the first test, that is, good butchers, heavy fed, versus good butchers, light fed, are as follows—Eight steers were selected in such a condition that they could be classed as good butchers. These were dehorned and fed a preparatory ration to get accustomed to their feed and surroundings; then divided into two lots of four each. The four heavy fed received 50 per cent more roots and meal than did the light fed. Number of days fed, 93; total live weight at beginning for Lot 1, heavy fed, 4478 pounds; at finish 5355, an increase of 877 pounds. For Lot 2, light fed, 4418 pounds at beginning; at finish 5185, an increase of 767 pounds. The original purchase price was 6 1/2 cents per pound, live weight. The selling price was 81 cents per pound, live weight. The gross profit was, for Lot 1, \$299.16; for Lot 2, \$139.81. The total cost of feed for period was, for Lot 1, \$99.16; for Lot 2, \$75.29, leaving a net profit in the first instance of \$54.72, or a profit per steer of \$13.68. In the second test, a profit per steer of \$16.95 was realized. The average profit per steer, for three years, over and above the actual cost of feed at market prices was for Lot 1, \$18.38; for Lot 2, \$22.39. The cost to produce 1 bushel of good butchers for Lot 1 and 8.64 cents per pound for Lot 2. The ration fed to Lot 1 at the beginning was 60 pounds roots, 6 pounds meal, and 1 pound molasses; at the finish 45 pounds roots, 16.5 pounds meal and 2 pounds molasses. Lot 2 received, at the beginning, 40 pounds roots, 4 pounds meal and 1 pound molasses; at the finish 30 pounds roots, 11 pounds meal and 2 pounds molasses.

From the above results it will be noted that a profitable limit can be reached in the amount of feed to good butchers and that in all our feeding work we should be guided accordingly. That is to say, feed liberally and well, but not to excess and good profits can be made by producing the right kind of beef.

An outline of the sermon is as follows:—That whether Ernie was in the Dalhousie School room or in the firing-line at Ypres, St. Elou, or the Somme he did his duty nobly and well. Mr. Colman said the four words of comfort that he would give all war bereaved parents would be, 1st A. In what nobler cause, could any man lay down his life. This is a struggle for freedom and justice. All those engaged in the struggle are making possible a better age in the days to come and making life easier for generations yet unborn. 2. We all must die sooner or later. Life at longest is short. How more honorably could we die than in laying down our lives in a worthy cause? 3. What counts is the Quality of life not the mere duration of it. A long life, mispent, is shorter and more empty than a short life filled with a noble purpose. How true are the words of the poet: "We live in deeds, not in years; in thoughts, not in breaths." 4. Death is not the greatest evil in existence. Dishevelled in sorrow. The war has taught us to re-adjust our valuation of things, we don't value life less, but we value honor and justice more. 4. For those who have died for the cause, we shall see them again in 'other world. The end is not here on earth. These our loved ones separated from us only for a little while. Even now, though separated by death, they and we are one in Christ. We shall see them again and with God in His presence we and they shall be at rest. Mr. Colman closed his remarks with the words of a mother whose boy had given his life for the cause. The poem which was entitled "Some Day" was as follows:

**SOME DAY**  
Some Day, Fresh grass will creep along the Belgian lanes;  
Some Day, the flowers will open to the May;  
Some Day, on the grave of my brave soldier the grass will grow;  
But not to-day.  
Some Day, the birds will build their nests again, along the River Somme  
for the cause,  
And on the fields again, will children play.  
Some Day, kind Time will lay her hand upon my aching heart,  
But not to-day.  
Some Day, the Widow's of Louvain will cease to weep,  
And from the ashes of those ruins grey  
Will rise a city fashioned by the love of all the world—  
But not to-day.  
Some Day, the Soldiers will come back again,  
And Canada will fling out her banners gay,  
And I shall see them marching past—the comrades of my boy,  
But not to-day.  
Some Day, that golden "Some Day" which the future holds,  
When the arch-angel's trumpet sounds and angels line the way,  
My soldier boy will come to meet me, holdive out his hands,  
And will say,  
"Welcome, brave mother heart the day at last has come."  
"The parting and the pain have passed away."  
Yes I shall see, my ears shall hear, my heart again grow young—  
Upon that day.
