BIG CROWD AT OPERA HOUSE

PROHIBITION AND INLAND REVENUE CONVICTIONS

At Dalhousie last week Justice Officer Stewart, working in conjunction with Inspectors Smith and Doyle of Campbellton, obtained four convictions under the Inland Revenue Act, for manufacturing spirits and home brew. Those convicted were Wm. Harquail, fined \$50.00; Arthur Charbonnet, \$50.00; Theo. Madson, \$50.00; and Joseph Fierette, \$50.00. Last week Justice Stewart with Inspectors Quartermain and Anderson made a seizure of home brew and part of a still in Newcastle. This will likely result in the conviction of Philip Le Galley and Annie Meloney who were the owners of the "beehive" still. The inspectors also had three prohibition convictions in Newcastle last week.

On Tuesday Inspectors Smith and Kane obtained a conviction against Joseph Winchester of Dalhousie for illegal selling. The penalty was \$50.00 and costs or three months in jail. Winchester chose the latter.

PROPERTY OWNERS WILL VOTE

Town Bill for Authority to Issue Bonds for Improvements Amended.

Last week a delegation of Campbellton citizens to the Municipalities Committee of the Local Legislature and discussed the Town of Campbellton bill to authorize the issuing of \$235,000 bonds for certain water and sewerage extensions. The bill was a splendid one and the expenditure as represented in the amendment.

The delegation while favoring some of the work planned, thought the time not ripe for the whole program, but expressed themselves willing to abide by the decision of the property owners on a referendum. This reasonable request was favored by the committee and we understand the bill has been recommended with the amendment asked for.

This means that if the property owners are favorable the work as planned will be carried out.

No doubt the Town Council will call upon the citizens at an early date.

DEATH SENTENCE FOR BETRAYER

M. Jeannes Declared Guilty of Betraying Nurse Edith Cavell.

Brussels, April 5.—M. Jeannes, betrayer of Edith Cavell, British war nurse, was Tuesday found guilty and sentenced to death.

Miss Cavell was executed by the Germans during their occupation of Belgium on the ground that she was a spy and revealed secrets to the Allies.

Grand Falls, \$5,505; Amherst, N.S., \$1,294; Springhill, N. Loss at head office had been \$164,000. A better year was expected in 1922. The losses in general had been sustained through depression and falling prices.



A BRIGHTER OUTLOOK.

The St. John Globe says editorially: Slowly but surely the clouds of trade depression are lifting. That is the verdict of the trained men on the world's bourse. Some, more optimistic than others, see the early dawn of the days when the hum of industry will be loud in the land. Those more conservative in their judgments declare the recovery cannot be rapid, but they agree that already the brighter prospect is clearly discernible through the mist of depression. Bankers and big men of business have given the lead to politicians, who naturally brightly paint the picture. The semi-monthly letter of The First National Bank of Boston voices this growing feeling of hopefulness, declaring: "A comparison between today and a year ago shows clearly a pronounced betterment in basic trade conditions: more volume; more concerns registering monthly profits; fewer business accumulating losses; fewer business as bankrupt, a distinct improvement in the relation between prices of farm products and finished goods." The same optimistic note runs through all recent utterances by big financial men, although there are many failures, many strikes and rumors of strikes and difficulties in Europe which create causes for anxiety. Discounting these, the men of big business continue to find evidence of a steady business improvement. They point to the decline in unemployment and the lowering cost of living indicated in government returns, and to improved trade figures as reasons for a better spirit. They do not say there is ground for that optimistic confidence which is the first essential of progressive expansion. Far from it. 


