

The original herd of tame buf-falces, which numbered 700 and wase purchased in Colorado about twelve-years ago, has grown steadily and to-day numbers ground 6,000. Instead of being depressed by coming into contact with civilization and gradually dying off, as a great many people expected, these animals took to their surroundings immediately, resulting in such rapid increases in numbers that the Government has considered it necessary to put into operation a plan for the killing-off of a certain number each year in order to tain number each year in order to keep up the physical standard of the

The undertaking will involve much expense and labor. 

LOUIS PASTEUR, THE GREATEST BENEFACTOR OF THE HUMAN RACE

Centenary of the Birth of the Man of Genius Who Discovered Germs and Gave Us Our First Real Defense
Against Death.

The whole scientific world celebrated the centenary of Pasteur's birth on December 27 last. He was born in France, the son of a tanner. He showed no special aptitude in his early youth in the study of chemistry, to which he was to devote his life. He at first met with but meagre success. But he, however, soon showed a predllection for the study of crystals and their formation. It was while observing the formation of paratartrate of magnesis under the microscope that he was attracted by a multitude of wriggling germs in the field or the microscope. Thinking that they were alive he asked himself what might happen if they were destroyed by heat. Having done so, he found that these germs moved no longer, were killed, and the formation of crystals ceased. This was the first time that it ever dawned upon the mind of man that there exists about us a world of minute organisms that are directly concerned in the affairs of men.

Seeing an analogy between the phenomenon just observed and the ferment ation of beer, he found that the yeast plant was a living organism, that it grew upon the wort, decomposing it and producing as a result a third substance or beer. It is the life of the growing yeast which produces technique and not the mere chemical decomposition. 

Of course, these expectations are based on averages, which accounts for the seeming irrelevancy of my figures. The older a man gets to be the better are his chances to be among those who make the average high by living to a great age. Your present habits of life have a great deal to do with determining whether you will be one of those who live to fifty-five or whether you will go on to seventy-five. 


