London, March 10.—Sunday's storm, which was totally unexpected, advanced in a northeasterly direction across the Bay of Biscay. A blizzard prevailed over the whole of the south of England. It commenced in London at 6 o'clock in the afternoon. The storm increased in fury at night, and there was an unusual rise of the tide. All the channel steamers had boisterous passages. Even in the harbors the water was so rough that it was difficult to hold vessels to their moorings. The Dover mail boat nearly sank in the harbor, her paddle box was completely smashed. The mail service steamers cannot cross the channel. The sea makes a clean breach over the admiralty pier, where the telegraph clerk and a signal man are practically prisoners. Similar reports come from points all along the coast.

Throughout Great Britain telegraphic communication is interrupted by the blizzard.

LONDON, March 10.—The worst snowstorm of the season swept over the United
Kingdom yesterday, the wind blowing
with fearful velocity, driving the snow
around in drifts two or three feet deep.
The streets are deserted both by pedestrians and vehicles, while railway communication with the suburbs of London is
lmost entirely cut off. Telegraphic comnunication with the provinces is suspended,
as the wires are down in all directions.

Two trains full of passengers in the Midlands were snowed up last night and the passengers were not rescued until this morning. MANGLED AND MAIMED.

Disastrous Explosion in Glasgow—Soven Lives Lost and Many Persons Injured.

GLASGOW, March 10.—A condenser used in the manufacture of ammonia at Dixon's iron works exploded to-day with terrific force. When the ruins of the buildings in which it had been erected were examined three mangled bodies were recovered. Four other bodies, including that of the manager of the works, Mr. Milne, are still buried in the debris. A number of other persons were injured by the explosion.

Michigan Iron Miners Got What They

Ishpaning, Mich., March 10.—By temporarily conceding the demands of the miners the local management of the Cleveland iron mine here have averted what threatened to be a serious strike. The men demanded an allewance of fitten minutes' time for making the exit from the mine at the end of each shaft, which was at first refused. The miners assembled 250 strong and repeated the demand. After a short conference it was granted. The refusal would undoubtedly have precipitated a strike of over 3,000 men.

Springport, March 10.—While at the front as a soldier in 1862 Hiram McConkey, of this place, had a very severe attack of typhoid fever. Since then at intervals he has been out of his head, but always came out all right, until July 13, 1890, when he entirely lost his reason and was gradually bereft of his speech. Since last August he has lain as one asleep, and for eight months did not open his eyes or say a word. Saturday night something seemed to give way in his head, and blood flowed from his nose and ears, and he suddenly came to and recognized everybody the same as before he went asleep. The case is quite puzzling to the doctors, but as near as can be ascertained they think the blood in a portion of the brain became partly clogged and did not flow freely enough to keep the brain in action. McConkey stated that he could not remember anything since last July, but could remember everything previous to that for his whole life, and it seems as though he had been asleep.

THE LOUISIAN TERY Canada Ready to Help the United State

Washington, March 10.—The Postoffice Department recently called the attention of the Canadian postal authorities to the fact that the Louisiana Lottery Company had established headquarters in Montreal, and that by being on Canadian soil the postal lacilities of this country could be used in direct violation of the spirit of the recently-enacted lottery law. A reply to this communication has just been received from the Assistant Postmaster-General of Canada, stating that the laws of Canada forbid the use of the mails to all illegal and fraudulent lottery companies. He requests to be informed whether or not the Louisiana Lottery Company is an illegal institution. The department is assured of the friendly disposition of the Canadia authorities, and the desire to extend every assistance in the execution of the laws of this country.

Rights in England.

London, March 10.—An abduction under the most sensational circumstances is reported from Clitheroe, 28 miles from Manchester. Yesterday morning as Mrz. E. Jackson was leaving a church in that place a carriage drawn by foaming hores and containing three men was rapidly driven up and stopped near the lady, who was seized and forcibly conveyed to the vehicle. The carriage containing the abductors and their victim then drove rapidly away, with friends of the lady in vain pursuit. The abducting party finally alighted before a house in Blackburn and conducted Mrs. Jackson inside the dwelling. They then proceeded to barricade the doors and windows of the house and strennously refused admittance to the party of pursuers of the Empire. fused admittance to the party of pursuers who had followed them in another carriage.

fused admittance to the party of pursuers who had followed them in another carriage. It has been learned that the principal abductor and the occupant of the barricaded house in Blackburn is E. H. Jackson, who is the husband of the abducted lady. It seems that three years ago Jackson privately married the lady, then Miss Hall, and that she is the possessor of a fortune of £27,000. After the marriage Jackson went to Australia, returning, however, early in 1889. But the lady then absolutely refused to live with him. Jackson thereupon obtained a High Court order for restitution of conjugal rights, notwithstanding which his wife steadily refused to live with him and he resorted to abduction. After the abduction crowds of people surrounded Jackson's house, which they threatened to storm, in an effort to release Mrs. Jackson; but the chief constable warned them that in so doing they would be guilty of a breach of the peace, while Jackson himself from a window of the house shouted defiance at those outside, saying he had a large force ready to resist any attempts at rescue. Both sides were on the alert throughout last night and all to-day. The police have succeeded in maintaining order outside the house. Mrs. Jackson's solicitor has obtained a warrant against the abductors still remain barricaded within the house and cannot be arrested.

Removing Corn Tassels.

have noted for some time was conducted last season at the Cornell University Experimental Station. It was to test the claim that if the tassels are removed from corn before they have produced pollen, the strength thus saved to the plant would be turned to the avaries and a larger amount of grain be produced. In the general corn field a plat of 48 rows, with 42 hills in each row was selected for the experiment. From each alternate row the tassels were removed as soon as they appeared and before any pollen had fallen, this being done four times—on July 21, July 25, July 28 and Aug. 4. The corn stood till ripe and on Sept. 29 to Oct. 1 was cut, husked, the stocks and ears being weighed and counted, with the following result:

It will be seep that the number of good ears and the weight of merchantable corn were both a little more than 50 per cent. greater on the rows from which the tassels were removed than on those on which the tassels were left. This was not only true of two sets of rows as a whole, but of the individual rows as well. The whole plot suffered severely by drought. The hills of corn were three feet six luches by three feet eight inches apart; soil dry and gravelly and moderately fertile. As for as the time taken to remove the tassels could be estimated it paid from a commercial standpoint last season to remove all the tassels from half the rows. It might not be so on another soil, or in another season or under


