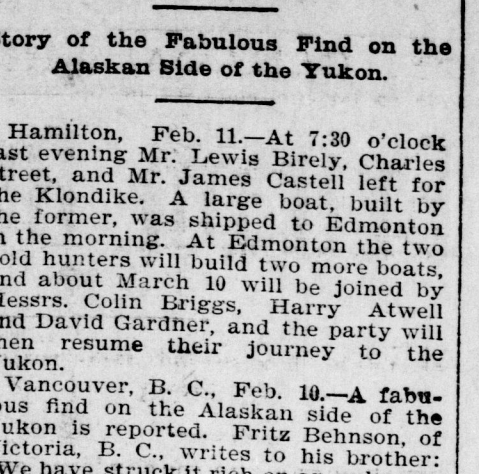
### Terrible Fate of a Farm Laborer Near Uxbridge.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.—The annual meeting of the Dominion Artillery Association was held yesterday in the railway committee room of the House of Commons. The president, Lieut.-Colonel Cole, occupied the chair, and attendance was large.

The report of council, which was adopted, contained the following: That in view of the increase of the establishment of field batteries and field instruction and caretaking be increased.

Lieut.-Colonel Cole announced that the programme for the competition between the British and Canadian artillery men was completed. The programme has already been completed. The program was spoken briefly in reply to the association, he commended the association for the excellent work done in reply to a vote of thanks.

Dr. Borden, minister of militia, spoke in reply to a vote of thanks. He said that besides an additional grant of \$2,100 to the association the government would defray the cost of the visiting British team. 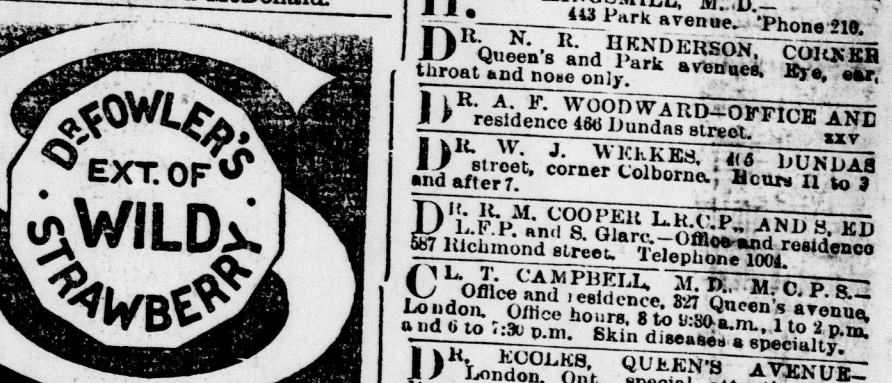
