
Coal has been reached at a depth of 1.321 feet in Lord Londonderry's new colliery at Seaham harbor, in England, after a remarkable engineering feat. Owing to the presence of enormous quantities of water, forming a quicksand, it was found necessary to freeze the ground to a depth of nearly 500 feet. Twenty-eight holes were bored in a circle about the shaft to a depth of 484 feet and freezing tubes were inserted. Brine was the medium used to extract the heat from the strata. The length of the time required to form a wall of ice was 185 days, the wall being maintained for 353 days. In the shaft bottom the frozen sand was so hard that it could be penetrated only
