London, April 18 .- Southeast of Kemmel Hill, on the northern battlefront, the Germans pressed back the British line slightly, but the situation was restored by a counter-attack, the war office announces. During the night there was no change in the British frent.

In the Bailleul sector the Germans made three attacks before noon yesterday, and in each case suffered a com-

plete repulse. The Germans opened a heavy bombardment of the British positions on the southwestern part of the Lys battlefront, between Locon and Robecq, during the night. The bombardment was still in progress at dawn today. TEXT OF STATEMENT.

The text of the statement reads: "There has been no change on the British front dur

ing the night. 'The hostile artillery has shown great activity on the southern portion of the Lys battlefront from Givenchy to east of Robecq. ### London, Ont., Thursday, April 18. HEALTHY OPTIMISM.

TO FACE SUCH FACTS of warfare as the latest German drive towards Bailleul and Hazebrouck have occasioned need not create a spirit of pessimism among ourselves. Some of us read of the fall of Wytschaete, Wulverghem and Neuve Eglise, and deduce therefrom the conclusion that everything in the war-zone is going in the worst possible way with the British arms. These places were once peaceful villages; they became rest billets; still later they were converted, through shell fire, into what appeared disused brickyards; today they are merely yawning craters. Their abandonment means nothing more than a loss of ground, which is of no value, for the sake of holding the British front intact and saving human lives

The German armies, on the other hand, have created for themselves a very large salient, the present apex of which lies slightly to the west of Bailleul. Their line, commencing from the region of Ypres, extends south-eastward by way of Wytschaete, Wulverghem and Neuve Eglise and then almost due west to Bailleul. From this point it travels back nearly due east toward Arras. Though Bailleul has fallen, the fact that Meteren, slightly southwest of it, has been recaptured proves that the British are stiffening their resistance to the Germans, whose objective is Hazebrouck, some eight or ten miles southwest of Bailleul

Later dispatches say that the advanced British posts on the Ypres front have been evacuated. through Ypres and Poperinghe to Hazebrouck is to be defended by the northern flank of the British armies.

The Germans may attempt to reach Hazebrouck via Poperinghe or Steenvoorde, as well as through the southern area round Bailleul and thus flatten out the apex of their present salient. Should something of this nature be tried, it must be remembered that the larger the salient the greater the number of men required for its holding. Again, to quote a dispatch:

'The very intensity and fury of the German's attack now indicates that it cannot go on long at the present pace. He has used 115 divisions on the western front. He never had over 190, and at least 65 were needed to hold the line from Switzerland to the Seventy-five divisions have been withdrawn because of losses, and it is certain that the remaining reserve of fresh troops cannot be over ten divisions; while the Allies on their side have not yet made any great call upon their reserves. Therefore, the power to strike back must still lie with Foch.'

There is no need to go to the extreme of being either careless or frivolous in our estimate of the menace at our doors; but, on the other hand, it is nothing short of criminal to cultivate pessimism and inspire those with whom we come in contact with the same spirit. Then each man agreed, and lived up to his agreement, to do so much hoeing. Incidentally they paid the farmer for his supervision and direction through the season.

In November of last year they had \$42.00 still left in the treasury, and to each of thirty-five families there had been delivered (charges prepaid) vegetables to the market value of about \$31.00.

Everybody was perfectly satisfied; and the result is, those same thirty five men are going to double their efforts this year.

The point we want to make is this. If those thirty-five men had been left to their own devices, in their own back gardens, some of them might have taken off \$30 worth of vegetables for their efforts, but most of them would not. Whereas by tackling the job on the Community plan they shared each others good fortune, joked over their disappointments, and produced more than \$1,000.00 worth of vegetables at market prices, and so relieved the demand for food that much.

Why not try to do likewise? One other point that may help you

to decide is this.

The farmers of Ontario have been urged to grow more wheat, and to produce more abundantly of the farm products that can best be sent overseas. The people in villages, towns and cities, therefore, are asked to grow food to feed themselves as far as possible so that the overseas supplies may not be drawn on unless absolutely necessary.

It is quite possible that vegetables may be higher in price next fall and winter than they have been this last year, consequently every pound of food you grow will make you that much less dependent upon them.
