This prominent young London athlete, now serving in the air forces of the Empire, caused the death of Capt. Boelke, regarded as the foremost German aviator. Boelke had forty Allied machines to his credit, and out of admiration for his skill British aviators dropped wreaths to be placed on his casket in the erman lines. McKay and another aviator cornered Boelke so that the latter ollided with another machine and fell to his death.

craft and Cornered Kaiser's Premier Flying Man So That He Collided With Another Plane and Was Sent Down to His Doom-Honored by General For Great Work-Official German Reports Confirm Manner of Boelke's Destruction.

No story more thrilling to Canadians, and especially to Londoners, has comes out of the great war than the one telling how Sub-Flight Lieut. "Eddie" Mc-Kay, a prominent young local athlete, now in the British flying corps on the French front, with another aviator, was responsible for the death of Capt. Boelke, known as "king of the German fliers." The Advertiser today received details of the young Londoner's great feat in a letter from another London officer at the front. The letter is asfollows:

"EDDIE MCKAY IS GETTING MORE FAMOUS HERE EVERY DAY. HE AND ANOTHER AIRMAN ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE DEATH OF CAPT. BOELKE, KNOWN AS THE KING OF THE BOCHE FLIERS, AND ANOTHER ENEMY AIRMAN.

"IT SEEMS THAT MCKAY AND HIS FRIEND WENT UP TO BEAT OFF AN ATTACK OF TWELVE GERMAN PLANES, AND THEY DID THE WORK HANDSOMELY. THE HUNS WERE OUT-MANOEUVRED BEAUTIFULLY, AND WERE FORCED TO RETIRE. THE LAST TWO MACHINES TO TURN TAIL WERE CORNERED AND, COLLIDED, GOING TO THE GROUND WITH A

"IT WAS LATER LEARNED THAT CAPT. BOELKE WAS IN ONE OF THE MACHINES. THE FIGHT LASTED 20 MINUTES BEFORE THE HUNS WERE FORCED TO TURN TO SAFETY. "EDDIE WAS CONGRATULATED BY THE GENERAL FOR HIS GOOD WORK.

"A FEW DAYS BEFORE THE FIGHT WITH BOELKE HE WENT UP WITH FOUR OTHERS AND BEAT OFF AN ATTACK BY TWENTY GERMAN AEROPLANES. THE FIGHT WAS WATCHED WITH BREATHLESS INTEREST BY THE BOYS. EDDIE AND THE REST WERE CONGRATULATED IN ORDERS."

DISPATCHES CONFIRM EXPLOIT

This letter finds full confirmation in the dispatches of Boelke received from London and Berlin. The British simply announced that the man said to be responsible for the destruction of some forty British and French planes and the death of their pilots and observers, had been killed in an aerial combat. The Germans, however, gave details which explain how their king-pin aviator fell before the London boy and his con squadron mates. To bring the enemy machine to the ground by means of superior maneouvres is considered a greater feat in the flying profession than to ill an aviator by machine gun fire in the air. The German dispatch describing he death of Boelke appeared in The Advertiser of November 2, some days after e death of the super-flier, as follows:

GERMANS SAY BOELKE KILLED IN COLLISION

Assert He Was Not Shot Down by Enemy-Has Great Funeral. Berlin, Nov. 1.—Via London, Nov. 2.—The accident which resulted the death of Capt. Boelke, Germany's premier aviator, was due

to a collision with a German, and not an enemy's sirplane.

Although Capt. Boelke's machine was seriously damaged at a great altitude, he retained control of it until he was 500 metres above the ground, where he encountered a sudden gust of wind, and the machine got out of hand and crashed to the ground. According to a comrade of Capt. Boelke, speaking yesterday at the funeral service and death was due to a fractured skull.

Capt. Boelke's body was sent to his home at Dessani, Anhalt, yesterday after brief but impressive funeral services, which were ttended by Crown Prince Rupprecht and Gens. von Below, von Marschall, Saxt von Arnim and many other high officers, and the

YOUNG ATHLETE PROVES HIS METTLE.

Thus did the most famous of all Hun aviators fall before a young Canadian oy, who a few months before had been attending college in the city of London. 



BY ENGLISH WOMEN

"Bus" and "tram conductresses" are o common in England nowadays they attract no attention. Postwomen deliver the mails, gas and electric companies employ women to read the meters, women drive delivery vans, sell papers, run elevators, shine shoes, cut one's hair, take one's ticket, and act as butlers. In the country they have taken up farming, poultry raising and truck gardening. In fact, there seems no field hitherto given exclusively to men except soldiering, in which wo-men are not found working cheerfully and efficiently.

With the opening of the munition factories thousands of girls left domestic service and took their places as munition workers. In one small factory alone 2,500 girls are working in day and night shifts, earning approximately a dollar a day, more than twice the amount paid the average domestic servant. This factory is being enlarged, and will have 6,000 girls on its payroll. The work is easy. Britain's Generous Handling Of Crude Rubber Situation

Has Held Down Cost of Rubber Footwear While Prices of Other Necessities Soar

When, some twenty years ago, Great Britain began to establish great rubber plantations in her tropical Dominions, the outside world's industrial experts laughed in scorn. Were there not thousands of square miles of wild rubber trees in Brazil and elsewhere simply waiting to be tapped? Were not the marvellous chemists of Germany working diligently to devise a process for making synthetic rubber at a fraction of the cost of the natural article? Britain, they averred, was wasting time and money.

Six years ago the price of crude rubber jumped to \$3.00 a pound, because the 60,000 or 70,000 tons which seemed to be the limit of the forests fell far short of the enormously increasing demand-and the synthetic rubber promised by Germany failed to materialize. The 8,200 tons produced by the British plantations in 1910 was more than welcomed, and the scoffing ceased. By 1914 the plantations were producing nearly 100,000 tons, or 60% , of the world's supply, and the price had been reduced to one-third of the 1910 figures. This year the plantations are contributing 150,000 tons-75% of the total production-and Britain holds a monopoly which has been of vital importance in the War.

Controlling the seas as well as the supply, the British Government has effectually cut off the Teutons, while providing an abundance for the Allies. To neutrals, who might easily have been forced to pay any price. the monopoly has been truly a benevolent one, for so long as they resell none to the Germans, they get all the rubber they want at a lower price than before the war.

No nation, neutral or belligerent, benefits more generally from Britain's foresight and generosity in this matter than Canada. Besides the general use of the scores of rubber products, practically every Canadian uses rubber footwear more or less for at least six months of the year. Now that leather has gone up 80%, and shoes are costing two to five dollars a pair more than normal, the advantage of wearing rubbers and overshoes this winter is strongly emphasized. They cost so little compared to the shoes whose term of service they practically double, that it certainly is economy to wear them at every sign of bad weather. And there's another point, even more

The need for leather at the Front is so great, and the scarcity so serious, that it is a patriotic duty to save it all we can by wearing rubbers and overshoes.

"I'll see how you like the cakes before I tell you," she replied. Did they like them? They all declared they had never tasted such perfectly wonderful cakes.


