#### TWO KILLED WHEN **GANGSTERS STAGE** PISTOL BATTLE IN **NEW YORK STREET**

**Bodies of Victims Are Riddled** With Bullets.

ONE IS ARRESTED

Other Two Escape in Motor Car-Seven Safes Are Blown.

New York, Sept. 29.-Two men were killed and one wounded in a revolver battle by gunmen on the east side, and seven safes in one Canal street building were blown open by burglars early yes.

An automobile conveyed the gunmen to Catharine and Madison streets about 2 a.m. and three men, revolvers in hand, leaped from it, and ran to the corner, where they opened fire on three others standing there. One of the gangsters was arrested at nistel point by: standing there. One of the gangsters was arrested at pistol point by a patrolman arriving on the scene during the shooting. The others escaped in the car. Two of the men attacked were killed instantly, their bodies being riddled with bullets. Other arrests followed in Brooklyn, where the police claim to have tracked the murder car. In a loft building in Canal street, about the same time as the east side shooting, burglars dynamited seven safes, going through the structure in the most businesslike fashion. The police made one arrest later in the day on "suspicion of burglary."





## PLAGUE IN "MESOPOT"

Addressing the Men's Brotherhood of Askin Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning Dr. J. Thornley Bowman gave a most interesting account of ms experiences with the British forces operating in Mesopotamia. Starting out from Busra he went through Mesopotamia to Bagdad, and later served in France. His experiences varied from fighting an outbreak of the pneumonic plague to caring for Turkish prisoners' plague to caring for Turkish prisoners

The plague broke out in Busra shortly fter he arrived there, and on account of the forces concentrated there was a menace to the British effort. Dr. Bowman explained that the plague is spread by rats and so an immediate onset was made on the rat population of Busra. Each morning a small army of rat catchers started out, and they helped rid the city of its plague carriers. The captures enabled the doctors to gauge captures enabled the doctors to gauge the extent and virulence of the disease. Dr. Bowman was not an admirer of the Turks, and not much more au ad-mirer of the Armenians. Turkish atroc-ities practiced against the Armenians were probably worse than anything that had been made known, he said, the lat-cet effort of their conpressors appagedly. est effort of their oppressors apparently having been intended to wipe them out as a nation. Dr. Bowman found the Arab tribes in Mesopotamia clean, digarian tribes in insoportamia clean, dis-nified and honest. Advancing towards them the British found them semi-hostile, but after passing them by in the advance they were always faithful, never making trouble in the rear.
