FIREMEN CARRY TO SAFETY WHEN INTERNATIONAL HOTEL OF WINDSOR IS

ALLIED EVACUATION OF GERMAN TOWNS IS EXPECTED SOON

Premier Millerand Declares France Awaits Word of Special Commission.

Paris. April 28.—Premier Millerand. in making a declaration to the Chamber of Deputies today on the results of the supreme council meeting at San Remo, said that the Frankfort and Darmstadt said that the Frankort and Darmstadt territories would be evacuated by the French as soon as the Allied commis-sions had established that the German armed force over the number allowed by the convention of August, 1919, had been withdrawn. The whole German forces in the Ruhr The whole German forces in the Ruhr region, the premier declared, must be reduced to 10.000 men by June 10 next, and by July 10 all the German soldiery must be withdrawn and replaced by a police force of 10.000 men.

"I said at San Remo," M. Millerand continued, "and I repeat it here now, that it is a crime and a stupidity to believe France desires to annex any fresh German territory."

MODIFICATION OF ENGLAND'S DIVORCE LAWS BEING URGED

London, April 28 .- Legislation modifying England's divorce laws will be urged by the present session of the House of Commons. The government, it is contended, will in that event be morally bound to facilitate the passage of a measure which will sanction divorce on the following additional grounds:

Wilful desertion for three years, cruelty, lunacy, habitual drunkenness and commuted death sentences. The church view concedes the demand for the cheapening of divorce proceedings, the equality of the sexes, and increased grounds for nullity but declines to go further.

Was Ready to Die.

The officers said Best told them that when he complied he at first refused to pull the handkerchiefs tight, but she begged him to do so, saying she was ready to die.

SPRINKLER SYSTEM MIGHT HAVE SAVED **LONDON COLLEGIATE**

Fire Chief Talks of Citizen Advisors.

In referring to the collegiate institute fire of last Thursday, Fire Chief John Aitken informed The Advertiser today that the spectators making complaints on how the firemen were fighting the fire had nothing to base their statements on.

Many people are of the opinion that the water should come from the nozzle as it does from the hydrant. They do not figure on the friction which is estimated at 6 pounds to every 100 feet of hose. This makes a big difference in the pressure when there is a long line of hose laid.

The large rooms and corridors of the collegiate were also responsible for the terrific headway which the blaze made. The draught when the doors were opened sucked the flames through the building. The chief stated that the ventilators in many rooms had melted and the ventilators fallen out.

The high school in Houston, Texas, was recently destroyed by fire. During the fire the whole of the Houston fire department was in service. The firemen fought the fire for hours, during which they used 13,000 feet of hose, totalling 25 streams, seven steam fire engines, and four motor pumps.

Fire Chief Aitken is of the opinion that a sprinkler system would have saved the building. The collegiate institute would also have been practically saved if a sprinkler system had been in use.

HEAVY FIRE LOSSES.

London's losses by fire last year totaled \$92,000. For the first four months of this year the losses total \$300,000. Commenting on these latter figures, the fire chief says he believes a large percentage of this loss has been due to carelessness of the failure to take adequate safeguards. If Fire Chief Aitken is right-and he is in a position to know—there is a lamentable slackness among citizens in the matter of protecting life and property from this terrible destroyer. Eternal vigilance is the only way in which the fire-fiend can be curbed. Safety first should be the rule. Frequent cleaning up of nooks and corners, cellars and attics, in order to remove all inflammable matter, the installation of well-tested fire-fighting apparatus, and the observance of a hard and fast rule never to take chances where fire in any form is concerned, will help a lot to prevent such a heavy loss as the fire chief reports. Indifference, carelessness and recklessness are the immediate causes for most of the blazes, big and little.

STICKING TOGETHER.

For many months, since the signing of the peace treaty, scores of more or less noted correspondents, publicists and political students have been predicting the early demise of the League of Nations. Senator Lodge and the other treaty-wreckers of the United States Senate have been dwelling on the utter impossibility of the league functioning, as planned at Versailles. The Entente nations could not possibly live in harmony. Jealousy would split the alliance apart, and the league covenant would be buried in the ruins. Well, how has it worked out? The conclusion of the San Remo conference of the supreme council-which amounts to being a meeting of the League of Nationsfinds the dominating members of the league standing together, pooling their power and influences to see to it that the conditions of the peace treaty are carried out, and that in a way that will protect the little fellows and make for In the matter of Turkey differences have been brushed aside, and a policy that will end the bloody misrule of the Turk, and make for a happier Near East agreed upon. The Adri atic issue nears a settlement that will be just to all parties concerned in the Flume flare-up. Especially gratifying is the announcement that the Entente nations are solidly a unit in the determination to make Germany live up to the peace agreement. The leaders of the League of Nations have shown a firmness in these

Patriotic Fund Official Testifies Child-Suffering.

OTTAWA, April 27 .- The special committee on pensions and re-establishtance of the end of the first phase of its work. An increase of 25 per cent all round is necessary if pensioners are to live comfortably under the present standards of living, according to evidence given before the special committee today by Miss Helen R. Y. Reid of Montreal. Miss Reid stated that many soldiers' children in Montreal were suffering

children in Montreal were suffering from malnutrition.

The Canadian Patriotic Fund, of which Miss Reid is an official, is carrying a heavy burden because of the inadequacy of the pensions scales. Officials of the fund felt, however, that they should not be called upon to augment grown grown and property allowances. These head ment government allowances. They had other dependents of soldiers on their lists who were not receiving any pension or allowances, and with the addiional burden removed, the fund could

tional burden removed, the fund could carry ou for some years.

The whole question of augmenting payments from the patriotic fund would be discussed at a meeting of the national committee to be held in Ottawa this week.

Would Be Splendid.

Miss O. McDonald, a pensions board investigator from Toronto, thought a 25 per cent increase would be a "splendid thing" for the pensioners. However, she said, most of the widowed pensioners worked in order to save money, and they would do the same if their pensions were increased. and they would do the same if their pensions were increased.
During the afternoon two Ottawa widows were examined. One of these was receiving \$20 a month pension, on account of her only son. Out of this she paid \$10 for a room, and had to work to maintain herself. The other pensioner maintained four children on \$77 a month but to do so she had to pensioner maintained four children on \$87 a month, but to do so she had to go out and work. Her husband had been killed three years ago.



subject were made by Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor; Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress; J. G. Merrick, representing the Canadian Manufacturers' and Employers' Association, and F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor.

Hon. Gideon Robertson took occasion to say that he and the department of labor were honestly anxious to make progress on the line of industrial disputes legislation. No government, however, would attempt to enact labor legislation until it had been carefully thought out, and the feeling of, il classes of people to be affected by it had been made known. That was the object of such meetings as the present one.

Mr. F. A. Acland referred to the difficulties created by disputes in connection with municipal operations, such as street railways, waterworks and gas. Some policemen and firemen who do not come under the class of public utilities had asked for boards, but the department of justice distinctly ruled the policemen could not be classed as a public utility. Hence, the, department could not establish a board. There was much to be said for having firemen and policemen brought within the scope of some statute which would enable the men to have an inquiry into their grievances. the men to have an

It was pointed out that it would impose a hardship on the farmers in selling dressed meats in the city market, as it would necessitate them going a long trip to get an inspection certificate.
