

DIET CAN BALANCE

Whole Wheat Product Is Healthier, Dr. W. H. Hill Asserts.

To the average man who eats a fairly well mixed diet, white bread is W. H. Hill, dean of the institute of public health. On the other hand, he admits that white bread lacks certain things which are found in whole wheat bread. He puts it this way:

"It is not that white bread is in the dead of the puts in the set but the set of the puts in the set but the set of th itself a dangerous thing to eat, but that certain salts and the vitamines which are, of course, essential for the proper nutrition of the body, are

proper nutrition of the body, are lacking. If you are eating a properly mixed diet you will get these salts and vitamines in other things.

Dr. Hill does not agree with Dr. H. T. Crossley that white bread is one of the chief causes of constipation, although he says that if cread was to be practically the only diet of people, or one of the main things, white bread might have this tendency.

"Of course," he says, "If the ques-ion were whether a person could ive solely on white or wholewheat bread, then the answer would be that bread, then the answer would be that could not live on the white bread. But that is not a practical way of looking at the question. As I said, when it constitutes a reasonable portion of the whole diet white bread will do no harm."

In this connection Dr. Hill remarks that malnutrition among children is more in evidence among the well-to-uo than among the poorer classes, and gives as a general reason the
