



It is all very well to say that the property-holders on the street are going to pay for the payement and should be allowed to make their own choice. As a matter of fact the city pays for a portion of all pavements out of the general fund-in some cases a very large portion. Even if it paid nothing of the original cost, it would have to do all repairing in after years. Besides which, it is safe to say that of payement. They are influenced in rectly by agents of rival paying companies. The engineering department of a city ought to be in a position to form an unbiased judgment, and decide what is best in each particular case.

We do not know that much bland can be attached to the paving companies. It is the business of their agents to get work. Each one thinks that his own kind of work is the best, and he will use every possible effort to influence both ratepayers and councils. But we ought to be in a position of independence, where the competent and disinterested officials and representatives of the people can exercise more control than they have at present.

The matter is well worthy of consideration by municipal associationssuch as that which meets in Toronto at the end of the present month; and we hope if London is represented at that meeting-as it should be-our delegates will endeavor to secure the aid of that body in asking for remedial department for young ladies on vacalegislation.


