



"KING DEAD" SHOCKS LONDON. Telegram From Paris Which Was Not What It Seemed.

Telegram From Paris Which Was Not What it Seemed.

London, May 28.—The real facts about the scare caused by the rumor that King Edward had died suddenly in Paris, have only just leaked out. The actual facts are as follows:

A business man named Joseph King, who is fairly well-known in Paris and London business circles, dropped dead in the French capital from heart fall-ure. His friends at once wired to his agents in London the words "King died suddenly this afternoon."

The clerk who opened the telegram at once told everyone in the office that the King was dead. The rumor spread in an incredibly short time throughout the business quarters and the next morning there was almost a panic in the newspaper offices and a distinct slump on the Exchange.

These facts were gathered at the earnest request of the King himself.





CONSUMPTION CURES

Italian Physicians Experimenting With Various Methods.

Consul Dunning of Milan gives an consul Dunning of Milan gives an interesting account of some experiments in the use of the Behring system of vaccination as a cure for consumption which have been carried on by a group of Italian experts:

"Several oxen which had been vaccinated with the Behring treatment were slaughtered with other oxen which had been under inspection for

were slaughtered with other oxen which had been under inspection for some months, while others were allowed to continue in life in order to further develop the effects of the treatment. These animals were slaughtered in Milan some time later under the direction of the physicians interested in the earlier experiments. Of four oxen killed, three had been vaccinated with the Behring treatment and afterward had the tuberculosis virus injected into their veins. The autopsy, while ed into their veins. The autopsy, while it did not show definite results, gave encouragement to the investigators. The ox which had not been vaccinated showed tuberculous conditions in a marked degree, while the three wisch had been subjected to the treatment had been subjected to the treatment had remained immune and had resisted successfully, unless unknown contitions affected the result, the several injections of virus intended to test the potency of the vaccination.

"The experts engaged on the test

"The experts engaged on the test announce that at least two of the announce that at least two of the three oxen showed results which seem to indicate that this method for treat-ing tuberculosis is at any rate well founded, though they expressly add that very much remains to be done. Other cattle will soon be killed for further experiments when the treatment they are undergoing has progressed to a more useful stage. The most impor-tant tests in the cure of consumption in human beings which have been undertaken in Europe for some years are now going on in several wards of the famous Ospedale Maggiore (the Great hospital) under the direction of Dr. Gluseppe Carcano, one of the most active of the younger practitioners of northern Italy. Using a serum which has already had a good trial in Belgium and France, Dr. Carcano made a special study of the subject in several countries of Europe and became so encouraged that he decided to take up experiments with human beings on his taken in Europe for some years are experiments with human beings on his

I. Section 24 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903, as enacted by section a of the Municipal Amendment Act, 1905, is bereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:—
24—(1) In case the Council of any city or town by resolution declare that it is expedient that any portion of an adjacent township should be annexed to the city or town, and in case the majority of the ratepayers in any such portion of such township petition the Ligutemant-Governor in Council to add such portion of such city or town, the Lieutemant-Governor may, by proclamation to take effect upon some day to be named therein, annex to the city or town such portion of the adjacent township upon such terms and conditions as to taxation, assessment, improvements or otherwise as may have been agreed upon, or shall be determined by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

(2) The terms and conditions contained in such proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council and the proclamation shall have the same force and effect and be as binding as if such terms and conditions were embodied in an Act of the Legislature.

(3) The proclamation may, before it takes effect, be amended in any respect by a further proclamation and may any time when the council of such city or town, and any other parties interested agreed that the said proclamation does not correctly set forth the terms and conditions as to taxation, assessment, improvements or otherwise agreed upon, be amended to carry out such agreements.
