

Boards raised to rebuild residences

Two committees are being formed to deal with the problem of funding for campus residences one by the Ministry of Advanced Education, the other by the University Board of Governors.

The Advanced Education committee will be called the Ministerial Advisory Committee on Student Housing Funding. This committee will have two student representatives among its 22 members.

"The government has recognized the urgency of the problem," said John Mark Fisher, SU housing and transport commissioner. The Ministerial Advisory Committee is expected to formulate and present

long-term policy recommendations to the Minister by the end of December 1989

The Board of Governors committee, an eight-member board with 50% student representation, has a mandate "to undertake a major policy review of student housing and to recommend a policy re. student housing in the future," said Paul Robinson, administrative director for the BOG.

The scope of the BOG committee is particularly broad. "The administration is questioning whether or not they should be involved in housing at all," said Fisher.

Fisher, who will sit on the BOG committee, added that the SU opposes any move by the administration to disassociate themselves from student housing. "They are providing an extremely important service," he said.

David Bruch, director of Housing and Food Services, said that although such broad questions would be addressed, he felt such a direction was highly unlikely. "I'm confident that our residences will

be with us for a long, long time," he


Most university residences are in terrible structural shape and are in urgent need of repairs costing over 60 million dollars

The university has taken out a 2.5 million dollar loan for repairs currently under way at Lister Hall's three highrises and Michener Park's Vanier House. The repairs — which should be finished within two weeks - will stabilize the buildings at Lister for a period of four to five

At Lister Hall, water vapour has seeped into cement cracks in the concrete support columns of buildings, causing a considerable degree of erosion.

Structural problems are not unique to Lister and Michener Park. "All of the university residences except for HUB need substantive work," said Bruch. He said the total bill for the repairs needed to return the residences to lasting condition would be in the area of 75 million dollars. This estimate includes Lister, Miche-

Like death and taxes, tuition increases are inevitable

Tuition has increased 4 1/2% this year said Dave Tupper, Students' Union president.

In concrete figures, with general fees included, this translates into an increase of approximately \$140.00 for a full-time student in an undergraduate program.

According to figures in the university calendar and the registrar's office, a full-time student in an undergraduate program pays approximately \$1304.00 this year as compared to \$1160.00 last year.

This years 4 1/2% increase brings

tuition up to the ceiling imposed by the provincial government.

The ceiling is set at "no more than 1 1/2% of the percentage increase in the standard operating grant," said Dr. Paul Davenport, university president.

In addition to a tuition increase, library and computing services fees have doubled since last year. Students paid \$60 for both fall and winter sessions last year. This year, that amount has been raised to \$120 for the two terms.

"These are simply charges for services," said Davenport. He adds that "we have one of the finest libraries in the country and extensive micro computing labs.

Currently, student tuition covers 10-11% of the University's operating

The Next Decade and Beyond, the University's document of policy planning for the future, states that student tuition fees should not rise above 20%.

"My own view is that it is a sensible proposition," said Davenport. As a second alternative, tuition could be raised to the Canadian average of 16%, he said. "It is difficult to make judgements as there are changes from year to year."

There is a "need to recognize what is a reasonable student raise,' said Tupper. He adds that "as long as students are involved in making decisions it will be a fair one.

New and removed SU record store

Following a year of headlines, turmoil and uncertainty, Students' Union Records has emerged alive and well in a new HUB Mall

The future of the store, a flagship tenant of the mall since the early 1970's, had been in doubt following a series of decisions by last year's Students' Council and extensive renovations in HUB Mall.

The new location of SU Records is on the east side of the mall, Ho Chinese Food

The store has been reduced in size, from 2700 to 1600 square feet, but, according to manager Taras Ostashewsky, the wide-ranging and eclectic selection SU Records offers will not be dramatically affected.

Ostashewsky notes that the store has been phasing out classical vinyl long players in favour of cassettes and compact discs. This spacesaving move has been given impetus by classical music labels which are no longer issuing vinyl LPs.

As for other areas of music, Ostashewsky says that "we'll try to maintain our strength in our jazz, blues and rock catalogues. We'll also be placing greater emphasis on CDs as their sales increase, although records are still our best sellers in these areas.

Ostashewsky also notes that the store's special order services will remain the same, and "greater reliance will be placed in that area to help compensate for the space loss. But we'll still be able to find the more obscure titles."

Along with its new location, SU Records is also sporting a new look, with all-new store fixtures emphasizing neutral colours. Patrons may miss the old location, but the new is still a far cry from the garishly-lit and decorated interiors of most record stores located in malls.

HUB all wet after sprinkler set off

"It was a swimming pool," said one of the maintenance workers assigned to clean up the waterlogged apartment in HUB Interna-

One of the residents of the apartment, Chung-Sea Lau, accidently set off the sprinkler system in his bedroom when he was reaching into his closet. The activated system inadvertently made HUB fire alarms go off, which summoned Campus Security and the Edmonton Police Department to the scene.

The two groups arrived, however, not to find a fire, but to find eight inches of water flooding the third-floor apartment, and the sprinkler still going strong.

Once the sprinkler was shut off, maintenance workers were called to clean up the water and the mess

it left behind. "The water was really dirty, and now the whole apartment smells," said Lau." I hope I can sleep here tonight."

Water also leaked down to apartments and stores below. Residents were forced to move their belongings onto tables and into the stairwell while workers removed the

Two HUB merchants, Candelier Card and Gift and Handbags and More, had considerable damage done to their stores. "I came to open the store at 9:00 and found half the merchandise covered in water, and most of it was leather," said Pushpa Sharma, owner of Handbags and More.

Tiffany Tsang, residence life coordinator with Housing and Foods Services, could not estimate how much damage had been done, but said it would probably take the whole day to clean up the apartments. After university workers had mopped and vacuumed what they could. Steam-o-matic cleaners were called in to finish cleaning carpets

and linoleum and to deodorize the apartments.

'We haven't had a chance to decide if someone is going to be fined for this, but chances are someone will," said Tsang.



In response to the suggestion of a crisis situation, Bruch said, "that is becoming very much a part of the question now. The 2.5 million (for repairs to Lister and Vanier House) simply couldn't wait, and we're definitely in a buying-time situation.

"75 million dollars is an impossible amount of money," Bruch said.
"It's way beyond current funding levels, and it's way beyond the province's means right now."

Furthermore, Bruch added, every university in the province and in Canada is having the same problem.

Prerequisites enforced

In a continuation of a program begun last year, any students enrolled in sociology courses without the proper prerequisites had their registration in those courses automatically cancelled by computer on Wednesday, September 13.

Dr. Robert Silverman, chairman of the sociology department believes that "this year the word is out" and few students will be affected.

"This is not a crackdown," he said, stating that the rules have been there for a long time but were previously not enforced by the sociology department.

Last year all students were given a warning in class and students who did not have the proper prerequisites were also given a letter in class before being dropped by the comouter.

The harder line stems from the feeling that if people are getting away with ignoring prerequisites it is unfair to those who follow the rules. There are valid academic reason for prerequisites, said Silverman.

For those students who can't or won't face another 200 level course but want to take a senior level sociology course, there is Soc 403, a senior level introductory course, that serves as a prerequisite said Silverman.

Boycott fights corporate greed

Corporate greed and insensitivity rears its ugly head. Again. Polygram Canada is now levying a "service fee" against all radio stations to which it sends its product. This has led the National Campus and Community Radio Association (NCRA) to organize a boycott against Polygram Canada. Polygram, one of the biggest and most powerful record companies around, doesn't need the money. So why the servicing fee?

I'm almost tempted to say that this fee has been levied for the sole purpose of sticking a thorn in the side of campus and community radio. I can't say that, however, because the Polygram reps are ever quick to point out that this fee has been levied against all radio stations, be they commercial or non-commercial.

Yet here is where Polygram is failing to make an important distinction. Campus radio operates on a limited budget. CJSR, for instance, barely makes ends meet on a paltry \$130,000 per year. As well, campus radio has different programming regulations handed down to them by the CRTC. In addition, stations like CJSR have a repeat factor of one. That means they can play a song only once per programming day. When's the last time you've heard 630 CHED do that in one hour?

Simply put, campus radio offers a service which Polygram fails to recognize. As long as they can fill their corporate coffers with the sales from a billion Bon Jovi albums, they think they're doing all right and don't need any promotional help from a piddling campus radio station. They could never be more wrong. Polygram owns and distributes wads of "alternative" labels. The Pixies, the number one college band in the States right now, is on 4AD - a Polygram-distributed label. This is just one in a slough of bands that depend solely on college radio if their product is to be heard.

Bands like Love and Rockets, R.E.M., and U2 broke into the mainstream market after years of college radio airplay. By failing to recognize the importance of campus radio, Polygram has virtually denied any new artist on their label the chance of becoming the next R.E.M. or U2. Remember, Polygram are the ones charging an unwarranted service fee. They are the reason the NCRA organized this boycott. They are the reason new artists will suffer.

The NCRA has no choice but to boycott Polygram's product. If the fee is successfully enforced, other record companies will surely follow suit. Stations like CJSR may well be able to afford one service fee, but they can ill afford a plethora of them. That is why Polygram's actions must be stopped in their tracks. If Polygram doesn't value the services offered by campus and community radio, then those services should be witheld. Certainly, sales will not drop immediately, but new artists will suffer. This is unfortunate, but the blame rests solely upon the shoulders of Polygram. Eventually, they would be left only with a troupe of has-been rockers to make and sell their records.

I would like to announce that *The Gateway* editorial staff, in a show of solidarity with CJSR and the NCRA, has decided to join this boycott. We will no longer review, interview, or promote artists that are on Polygram or one of their sub-labels. We will maintain this position until the issue is resolved.

SU to fund LSAT prep

The Students' Union is helping U of A students prepare for the Law School Admission Test (LSAT) exam. Currently, weekend preparation seminars are offered by Sexton and The International Test Prep Centre and are in the \$200-\$400 price range.

Because of the high costs, Suresh Mustapha, Students' Union V.P. academic felt there was a need for the S.U. to organize their own preparation tests." It is well within mandate to help students prepare and do well on their LSAT exams, and do it at a reasonable price," said Mustapha.

"It's tough for most students to pay the current seminar fee," Mustapha pointed out. "The existing companies are making money hand over fist on students, and its not fair because most students can't afford it." Mustapha explained that the only way that the U of A will run the prep. seminar is on a cost-recovery basis. "That way the test will be in the \$20 range and be more easily available to U of A students."

Right now Mustapha is working hard to tie up all the loose ends in getting the seminar ready for the proposed late October date. "Technical requirements like copyrights have to be taken care of, but the Law Faculty has been very supportive and have been helping us out a lot." Prof. Bruce Ziff from the Faculty of Law said that they are supporting these S.U. initiatives.

Mustapha hopes to run the first seminar with approximately 20-30 students, and then to well over two hundred during the second semester. "If this works well with the LSAT, then we'll look at similar seminars for the Graduate Management Admissions Test and the Medical College Admissions Test."

No rest for the helpful

Business is booming for one of the University's student services. The Student Ombudsman Service (S.O.S.) has had their two part-time staff kept very busy since they started on May 1. The S.O.S. was created to help U of A students sort through any problems which may be considered unfair.

Carsten Jensen from the S.O.S. office explained that the office deals with student problems ranging from class grades to sexual harassment. "We can help with pretty much anything students may encounter while on campus which is unfair," he said, stressing that "everything is kept completely confidential"

Over the summer the office was very busy with mainly two types of problems - class grades from the winter session, and entrance problems for the fall session.

Jensen said the office mostly concentrated on academic appeals for the first-half, and the last-half concentrated more on admission problems with a number of students being unable to gain entry into the University. "We helped approximately 50 students and took on over 30 files," he noted, adding, "we also had a heck of a lot of general inquiries which kept us pretty busy."

Because the S.O.S. office was so busy, both Jensen and Suresh Mustapha, Students' Union V.P. academic, feel that the position is going to have to be expanded. "There will soon be a time for a full-time Ombudsman. We've been very happy with their work, and very happy with the direction that they've taken," said Mustapha.

Mustapha explained that the S.O.S office has been very proactive, and is proving to be a good way for the S.U. to "get feedback on the practical application of S.U. policies since they are totally independent from our directives."

The S.O.S. office is located in Room 272 of the Students' Union Building where office hours are posted. There is also a 24-hour number 492-4689. All information is kept confidential and if anyone is unsure if they have a legitimate grievance, Jensen and fellow Ombudsperson Terri Mann would be happy to help.

NCRA Boycotts Polygram

Members of the National Campus and Community Radio Association (NCRA) are now officially boycotting records distributed by Polygram Canada. The NCRA has decided to take this drastic step because of a servicing fee Polygram is now levying against campus and commercial radio. As a member of the NCRA, CJSR, the University of Alberta campus/community radio station, has also decided to join this boycott.

The NCRA's move to boycott is dramatic because Polygram Records is arguably the largest record company extant today. Besides having the rights to high-profile artists such as Bon Jovi, they have and continue to acquire "alternative" record labels for distribution. Polygram has the rights to artists such as Michelle Shocked, Billy Bragg, De La Soul, and the Pixies. For the moment, these artists depend on campus radio for virtually all their airplay. They also own the rights to Love and Rockets, a band who first flourished on campus radio, and has since moved on to commercial success in the mainstream radio market.

Polygram's charge is \$325 dollars per year, which is meant to cover all services that Polygram offers to any radio station, campus or otherwise. This includes all recorded and promotional material sent to campus radio stations such as CJSR. This fee may indeed seem nominal, but if it becomes established it could be the start of a dangerous trend. Commercial stations in major market centres will not be hurt if this policy is established and replicates itself. Campus radio, however, with it's limited budget, could be hurt. Polygram representative Dave Freeman is quick to point out, however, that this fee "doesn't even come close" to covering Polygram's cost for sending all this material.

All that makes no difference to the people


at CJSR. They feel that paying a fee to promote someone elses product is absurd. "We're boycotting Polygram solely for reasons of principle," explains station manager lan Istvanffy, "we wouldn't pay it if it was five bucks." Music director Glenn Drexhage also adds, "Don't forget, we're providing a service for them. After all, we're playing and promoting their product on the air."

Freeman said that he finds the whole idea behind the boycott "somewhat presumptu-'The Boycott presumes that campus radio should receive complimentary service, he says, "and that's just not the case." He also adds that the problem between the two factions is due to a lack of effective communication across the negotiating table, and that if the stations would speak with them on "an individual basis" much more would be accomplished. "The animosity is certainly not coming from our camp," he says, "In certain cases we have foregone the levy." He feels the whole boycott situation is due to a basic misunderstanding, and a result of "13, 15, or 17 people banding together.

Istvanffy, who said he is "not surprised" by Polygram's reaction to the boycott, points out that "every other major record label thinks we deserve complimentary service." As well, independent labels in a much worse financial position continue to send their product, free of charge, to stations like CJSR.

Istvanffy admits that this boycott will not affect Polygram Records for the short term. "They're still going to sell a million Bon Jovi records," he says, "but it's a cancer eating away at the core of their company." New artists that don't get commercial radio airplay and need campus radio will suffer as a consequence. Drexhage adds that "the next R.E.M. is not going to be on Polygram."

The issue turns on whether or not campus radio deserves complimentary service from




Glenn Drexhage, Music Director, and Ian Istvanffy, Station Manager, give the "thumbs down" to Polygram Records.

record companies. Though Polygram finds it hard to quantify, they doubt whether the total impact campus radio has on the market is relevant, and therefore feel that they do not deserve complimentary service. The NCRA, on the other hand, adamantly maintains that

they do. They contend that the promotional coverage and airplay they offer artists, especially those receiving little or no commercial airplay, more than compensates for the cost of promotional and recorded material that record companies send them.

Promising Future In Store For Child Prodigy

Imagine, just for a minute, that you're thirteen again. It's been a slow week — your grade eight class has only set one fire and sent two substitute teachers into early retirement with nervous breakdowns — and you're looking for something to do for the weekend. Hang out at the mall? The arcade? Go over to Jimmy's house while his parents are out and make yourself sick on his dad's sixty dollar scotch? Maybe fly in from Philadelphia to do the Tchaikovsky violin concerto with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra?

Probably not the latter. But then, you probably aren't Juliette Kang. Juliette has been playing the violin for nine years and is already on the verge of breaking into the upper strata of the world's concert musicians. And like Wayne Gretzky, Michael J. Fox, and Ermano Mauro, she started out in Edmonton.

Juliette started taking lessons with the Suzuki program for young children when she was four, "or just turning five, or something." She soon demonstrated she had perfect pitch and an astounding aptitude for music. Within a year her parents sent her to a private tutor, who, within a year sent her to another tutor until she ended up studying with E.S.O. concert master James Keene. He tried to teach her what he could, but eventually decided to refer her to the school he had graduated from, the acclaimed Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.

She auditioned on a half-sized violin and was accepted as their youngest violin student ever. She still attends Curtis and enjoys it tremendously: "It's very unique in that it's very small — it has about 180 students studying music. And they offer a full scholarship, which is different from most places. It's very comfortable and quiet."

In addition to taking university level music and history she finds time to take high school courses in math and biology at a nearby private school. "I juggle my time between going to Curtis and going to high school. I go to both in the morning — it takes until about two o'clock — and then I go back to Curtis for night school." The afternoons are reserved for three to four hours of practicing. All this effort is not without reward. She's due to get

both her high school diploma and her Bachelor of Music in another two years.

Her astounding musicianship has brought her other rewards as well. She has won competitions across North America, including four consecutive firsts in the Canadian National Music Competition. In addition, her touring, both as a soloist and with the Curtis Orchestra, has taken her to England, Belgium, and France. A personal high point, though, was the prestigious Beijing International Youth Violin Festival. "I received fifth place, which I was very happy about."

Her unusual capacity for work may be in part due to the fact that she likes a wide spectrum of music, from popular — "when I have time I just turn on the radio" — to classical. She refuses to pick favorite composers, however. "I like a lot of things. I try not to have certain favorites because then when I'm not playing one of those pieces the things I'm working on would suffer. I try to like what I'm playing at the moment."

At this particular moment she's working on the Tchaikovsky concerto for the E.S.O.'s Sunday performance. The concerto is one of the most demanding items in the violin repertoire. It was originally deemed unplayable by the violinist who had commissioned the piece, but since has become a concert hall favorite due to its accessible melodies and test of virtuosity for the top players.

Although this is the first time she has played the concerto with a full orchestra, Juliette is quite confident about the piece. "I've played it off and on for about two years. It's very difficult, of course, with all the octaves and double stops." A greater concern, however, is its length. "It's very long, longer than most violin concertos, being about 35 or 40 minutes. It's tiring."

Juliette declines to speculate about her future. "I have several years of schooling left, so I don't really plan on anything." She has always enjoyed playing solo, however, and her achievement so far indicates that she is headed for a brilliant concert career.

Book Review

The Diamond Throne Book One of the Elenium David Eddings Del Ray Books \$26.95 Hardcover

ost fantasy fans know David Eddings from his five book Belgariad series. The success of that series led him to write a sequel five book series starring the same characters, collectively called The Mallorean Oddly enough, his latest book, The Diamond Throne, does not fit into this series - it is the

beginning of an entirely new trilogy, entitled The Elenium. This is unusual because his previous series is still missing the final two books.

Eddings' writing has brought him many fans due to his light but involving style. His fantasy has all the trappings of the stock commercial prototypes that seem to be spawning trashy books at a phenomenal rate these days - there is magic, a little bit of gigglish juvenile romance (mostly flirting and titillation), lots of action, quests, dark hideous monsters, and impish and lovable underdog travelling companions. Fortunately Eddings' stories also have intrigue, politics, and subtle plot complexities that other fantasy fare seems to skip in favor of introducing the next cute monster.

His smoothly-flowing dialogue, and adept characterizations lead to easy reading, and it is very difficult to put down his books. It is even harder to do so with his latest book - I have to confess I was so spellbound (gag, groan, I know, bad pun) that I read it in one sitting. The Diamond Throne is also captivating because it is so different from most fantasy writing. It has a dark seamy side to the characters. There is much intrigue and back stabbing.

Instead of having a naive but lovable kid, or a charming young prince, or an adorable little creature as its main character, this book stars a gruff and aging knight. It's quite refreshing not to have to reach for the cute-sickness bag when reading this fantasy novel. Piers Anthony, take notes.




The story revolves around Sparhawk, a gritty, tough, knight who has been living in exile. When he returns to his kingdom he is distraught to learn that his queen has fallen ill. The rest of the story sounds pretty much

like generic fantasy—the queen's been frozen in crystal and they have a year to find a cure for her, her ambitious and crooked underlings are attempting to usurp her power and expand the power of the Church, the only thing that can cure her is a mysterious jewel, a strange cult of evil demon-god worshippers is infiltrating the land, and a hearty band of knights are all that can save the world. But Eddings' skillful writing and intricate plots bring it all off without making the story seem contrived.

This fantasy has a very adult quality to it all. The characters are complex and their motivations cannot be discerned at a glance. Yet the book is also very easy to read and is well thought out.

The only annoying part is that the reader has to wait for Eddings to write the rest of this and his last story. This series of books is scheduled to have two more books, and there are the two books he has to write for his last series. To make it all more unnerving, like all his other books this one leaves off at the height of the action.

So you might want to wait until at least one more book in this series is published or until this book comes out in paper-back, as it inevitably will, before reading it. But if you enjoy fantasy then *The Diamond Throne* is a very good purchase—it stands above the many others in this genre.



La Faculté Saint-Jean se définit aujourd'hui par son statut

universitaire de langue française. Elle dessert les étudiants capables de poursuivre en français des études universitaires. La Faculté se donne pour mission de répondre aux besoins particuliers des francophones de l'Ouest canadien.

Tout centre universitaire se doit d'enrichir dans la mesure du possible la vie non seulement intellectuelle mais culturelle de sa clientèle. Aussi, la Faculté Saint-Jean se voit-elle la mission particulière de contribuer à l'enrichissement culturel de ses étudiants aussi bien que de l'ensemble de la vie française en Alberta. Par cet engagement (concrétisé dans le développement de Saint-Jean) l'Université espère promouvoir la culture française dans l'Ouest du Canada.

J'espère de tout coeur que tous ceux et toutes celles qui auront choisi d'étudier à Saint-Jean respecteront les objectifs que l'institution s'est donnés et seront prêts à respecter son statut universitaire de langue française.

SADAHARU OH

Oh est le joueur de baseball qui a frappé le plus grand nombre de circuits au monde. Il a circulé autour des quatre buts, au centre desquels les lanceurs restaient toujours désolés, 868 fois. Ce n'est pas exagéré de dire qu'il est le meilleur frappeur que le Japon ait jamais connu. Sa manière de frapper était unique parce qu'il levait une jambe. Sa forme a été compérée à un flamant au repos. Est-ce logique d'affirmer qu'Oh aurait pu frapper deux fois plus de circuits que le chiffre mentionné ci-dessus, les deux pieds fermement sur la terre? Pas du tout, Oh a réussi à devenir le roi des circuits vraiment à cause de sa façon spéciale.

Oh est né à Tokyo en 1940, d'un père chinois et d'une mère japonaise. Il peut être décrit comme petit parmi les joueurs contemporains. On trouve l'utilisation très efficace d'un mouvement du corps en forme de flamant. Oh se rappelle qu'une balle de baseball a sauté très facilement

comme celle du ping-pong après son adoption de cette forme. Il a gagné le titre de roi des coups de circuits quinze fois dans sa carrière.

Les Giants ont remporté le championnat du Japon neuf fois de suite pendant qu'Oh régnait comme le roi des circuits. Cela va sans dire qu'il a contribué énormément à la victoire de son équipe. Néanmoins, comme Oh admet lui-même, Shigeo Nagashima avait une qualité de chef très forte. En fait, Nagashima avait le sumom de "Monsieur Giants". Oh et Nagashima, qui étaient appelés le O.N duo d'après le M.M duo des Yankees (Mantte et Marris), étaient complémentaires. L'amitié et la concurrence les ont rendus meilleurs que chaque joueur solo. Oh a prouvé son grand talent suffisamment de fois contre diverses équipes américaines qui ont visité le Japon après la saison régulière. L'ancien entraîneur de Baltimore, Earl Weaver, se souvient qu'Oh a frappé très bien contre n'importe quel lanceur américain.

Son nom, Oh, veut dire, littéralement, le roi. Comme c'est la tradition que les filles abandonnent leurs noms de famille lors du mariage au Japon, Oh a donné à toutes ses filles un caractère "ri", qui inclut la lettre d'Oh pour qu'elles puissent retenir l'origine d'Oh. Actuellement, Oh mène une vie tranquille, après son travail assez dur à titre d'entraîneur des Giants pendant cinq ans. Je souhaite qu'il reviendra au monde du baseball.



1989-90 hockey faces off

This weekend the University of Alberta Golden Bears hockey team hosts the Golden Bear Invitational hockey tournament.

The tournament will consist of the University of Alberta Bears rookies and three teams from the Alberta Junior Hockey League. These teams are the Sherwood Park Crusaders, St. Albert Saints and Fort Saskatchewan Traders.

Golden Bears Head Coach Bill Moores will use the tournament as an evaluation tool for judging his rookies.

"It gives us an opportunity to evaluate them (rookies) against players (from) that league (AJHL)" said Moores.

Moores feels all teams involved benefit from the tournament. He says each team can evaluate their own talent and the AJHL teams can evaluate the Bears.

If some of the Bears' rookies

cannot crack the line-up then the Bears would "like to place them somewhere where they can play the best hockey possible around and that would be Tier II (AJHL)" said Moores.

The Bears can then keep track on how these players are playing to see if they can make the jump to the Bears next season.

Moores feels the body contact that the rookies will face is a good indicator if they will be able to play in the Canada West division of the CIAU.

"Guys who looked very good where there's not quite as much contact in training camp and when it really gets rough or very physical, their not strong enough to handle that yet" said Moores.

The round robin tournament kicks off today at 5:00 p.m. with the Bears playing the St. Albert Saints at Varsity Arena. The final will be played on Sunday at 1:00 p.m. between the top two finishers.

From the start of the year the Golden Bear coaching staff felt the football team had a strong defence. This weekend the defence will face a stiff test from the University of Saskatchewan Huskies.

Saskatchewan scored 26 points against the University of Calgary and they possess three of the top ten receivers in the Canada West division. "They have the best runningback-pass receiver in the league in Terry Eisler," said defénsive backfield Dan Syrotuik.

Since Eisler will be coming out of the offensive backfield to snare some passes, Bear linebackers will have their hands full. "Eisler is a heck of a runningback with good speed," said linebacker Jeff Tobert. "We're making adjustments so that we can put our best people on him, and that usually means (linebacker) Mark Singer," Tobert continued.

The Bear defence will be put to the test by a ball control offence. "They control the ball by running short (pass) patterns," said Syrotuik. "They get into the second and three situation," he said.

Just how the Bears plan to combat the Husky offence is yet to be determined. "There's a number of ways to play against that type of offence: you can double the receivers, you can force the quarterback by sending (blitzing) people, or you can jam the receivers," said Syrotuik. "But zone is tough when they throw the ball quickly."

The Huskies have lost slotback Dan Farthing, an all-Canadian and their best receiver. "That makes things easier." said defensive Dwight Kosolofski. But Syrotuik isn't in a hurry to agree with his halfback. "(Saskatchewan) has replaced (Farthing) with a traditional tight end," he said. Lorne Keen is the 'traditional tight end' Syrotuik alluded to and he's currently second in receptions in Canada West. Keen was named the Most Valuable Player of the Border Bowl.

"He (Keen) can play inside and wide receiver," said Syrotuik. "He's also a very good blocker, but he

hasn't threatened deep yet."

The Bears beat the Huskies 30-27 in the Border Bowl, but according to linebacker Len Sawatzky. "In the first half we played mostly first year players and they played their first string," said Sawatzky. "In the second half we put in our first string and they used their second string." Saskatchewan dominated the first half while Alberta dominated the second.

That overshadowed a five point night by defenceman Howie Draper and an Adam Morrison hat trick.


"I don't know how. I'm just as surprised as you," said Draper, over his performance, "I just seemed to be the last guy who touched the puck."

The Bears were down 5-3 with less than five minutes left, until Oiler Ivan Matulik took a spearing major, which led to two Bear power play goals. Defenceman Guy Paradis ripped one by the short side of Oiler goalie Jeff Greenlay, while Dan Baker slid one under Greenlay after deking him.

Martin Gelinas scored to give the Oilers the lead, until Morrison scored with the Bear net empty. Cox then supplied the dramatics.

The win was Billy Moores' first since taking over the Bear head coaching job.

of chairman—was primarily responsible for that policy. Based on attendance at last year's Shrine Bowl, that policy was a failure.



The 1989-90 edition of the field hockey Pandas figures to possess a good mix of experience and youth, but according to Coach Dru Marshall, will be tough against oppo-sition teams of the Canada West Conference.

"University of Victoria is easily the strongest on paper," claimed Coach Marshall, a member of Canada's national coaching staff. With seven Vikettes having played national field hockey over the summer, experience should definitely lead UVIC to the CIAU Nationals in Toronto beginning November 3rd.

The ninth year Panda coach also predicts UBC as a team to beat at the three Canada West tournaments, due to the fact that five Thunderbirds will enter the '89-90 season fielding national experience.

The two other teams of Canada West, the University of Calgary Dinnies and the Lady Bisons from the University of Manitoba, each participated nationally this summer as well, acting as representatives for their respective provinces. Joined by Panda stickhandlers Sian Davies and Heather Jones, the U of Claced Alberta squad snatched up a bronze medal at this year's Canada

With tough competition in mind, the Pandas must thrive on strong team defence and work ethic to obtain a berth in the Nationals. "Our strength is always our teamwork," says Marshall, who also realizes certain individuals must contribute strong seasonal performances in order for U of A to be a legitimate contender.

The experience of last year's Panda captain Bev Wolfert, as well as Davies and Jones should help encourage exuberance from youth on the team. Exuberance in the form of players like Tara Croxford, who comes to play after competing in the Junior World Cup in Ottawa where Coach Marshall drew cocoaching responsibilities.

Even with strong teamwork, the Pandas will be in tough within the nation's strongest hockey conference. "I would be really happy with a third place finish in Canada West, and third place is realistic," claims the enthusiastic Panda coach.

Unfortunately the enthusiasm will have to be a factor on the road this year, with none of the three Canada West tournaments taking place in Edmonton. Tourney number one commences September 30th in Calgary, tourney number two in Winnipeg takes place the October 13th weekend, and UVIC hosts tourney number three beginning October 20th

The Pandas will have the disadvantage of playing on three unfamiliar field surfaces with Marshall insisting "the team that practices on their own surface has an advantage going into the tournament."

That's where this weekend's Alberta Invitational tournament comes into play.

Other than the Pandas' Alumni Game (Wednesday September 20th, 6:00 p.m., Pavilion), this weekend's Invitational will be your only chance to see the Pandas in action. With the University of Calgary invading town, and an Edmonton club chock full of Panda alumni (including three Canadian Olym-

pians), the Alberta Invitational promises to be a classic.

For the Panda coaching staff, this tournament delivers a chance to try out new ideas as Marshall is "interested in seeing how people fit together" before fielding the squad at the CWUAA tournaments.

Saturday's contests pit the Pandas in a 9:00 a.m. matchup against the Edmonton club team and a 1:00 p.m. battle with the Dinnies. The following day, Sunday September 17th, promises an 11:00 a.m. game versus Edmonton followed by another classic U of A/U of C confrontation to finish the tourney at 1:00 p.m. The place to cheer on the Pandas against their southern nemesis will be on the new turf behind Lister Hall pending completion of the field. Otherwise the Butterdome will offer up Panda field hockey action beginning Saturday.





Athletics' brass look ahead

On April 10, 1989, Dr. Robert Steadward, the Chairman of the Department of Athletics, announced his resignation. Steadward's decision came as a surprise as it ended one year short of his five year term which began July 1, 1985.

The void opened by Steadward's resignation allowed Dale Schulha to move from the Director of Marketing and Athletics to the Chairman of the Department of Athletics. Donna Gingera, the former Marketing and Facilities Manager at the University of Winnipeg was appointed the new Director of Marketing for the Athletic Department. Schulha graduated from McNally Composite High School in 1968, he attended the University of Alberta and earned a Bachelor of Physical Education Degree (B.P.E.) in 1972, a P.P.A.D. (Teaching Certificate) and a Master of Science Degree (M.Sc.) in Physical Education in 1974.

Schulha was also involved with the Golden Bear Football program for five years as a player. In 1968 he received the Percy Diagle Trophy for Rookie of the year. In his final year as a player, Schulha helped the Bears win the Vanier Cup. (He threw for a touchdown pass off a field goal formation).

Schulha has been with the University since 1985 when he was

hired as the Director of Marketing and Public Relations. Previous to that he had served as the Director of Physical Education and Athletics — Medicine Hat College (1976-1980), Instructor — Grant MacEwan Community College (1980-1981), Manager — Technical operations, Sports Division — Universiade '83 (1981-1983), General Manager — Lindsay Park Centre, Calgary (1983-1985) and Marketing Manager — Alberta Sport Council (February-August, 1985).

Gingera graduated with a Bachelor of Physical Education degree from the University of Manitoba in 1980. Prior to her position as Marketing and Facilities Manager at the University of Winnipeg, Gingera was Recreation Department Head with the Department of Communi-

ty Services for the Province of Manitoba (1984-1986), and the Director of Parks and Recreation for the City of Partage le Praire, Manitoba (1986-1987).

Gingera realizes the task ahead of her and she says that she will attempt to "turn the athletic competition into events and social highlights for all students on campus," she adds "we want the student at the U of A to enjoy being at the athletic events." After student involvement reaches its apex Gingera said she "plans to broaden out to the community at large, the external public." Schulha reiterated Gingera's point saying "we're going to put a focus initially on the student." Schulha said "that there would be added sponsors and more profiling of athletics events on campus."
